

It is so much easier to follow along blindly in the wake of someone cise, allowing him to do all the thinking, and all the worrying, drifting heedlessly with the current, following aimlessly wherever it may lead, that one is inclined to wonder why anyone ever has any opposition at all. To grand against the shouts of the multitude, or the demands of the powerful, is one of the hardest things in the

But the easiest way is not always the right way. Is a theater when someone shouts "Fire!", everyone jumps up and dashes for the door. That seems to be the easiest thing to do. At least that is what the great majority of people generally do even though most of them get killed in the rush. 
