Joyce Suber, former land acquisition coordinator for Seminole County who was fired in August 1996 amid accusations of improprieties within her department, considers suing the county to get her job back. Seminole County Public



The way we were: SHS football

This is additional information about Sanford High School football as found in early Salmagandis. While looking through some of these old Salmagunds, I found that Sanford's football team had a dismal record until 1922 In 1918 there was no football team as several of the boys were off serving in World War I In 1920 it was decided to dispense with football and run centrate on baseball

There is a picture of the 1921. team, but underneath is writ ten 'SHS's football prospects were seriously handicapped this year because we didn't have enough boys of Joe Corley's circumference, but she was there in spirit and attacked the mighty Gamesville team as zealously as she would have attacked Ovjedo

In 1922, SHS had a 'stile miff football team and played a full schedule SAB Wilkin son was the coach. I remember writing about him in a previous column. He was a graduate of the University of Florida, and a highly touted athlete while there RF Cooper, agriculture instructor was artifetic direc-

Doreen was born 46 years ago in Rochester, New York. She is a friendly and enthusiastic woman who speaks softly and cautiously about her life and her disabilities. You see, at the age of 11, she had a stroke and a cerebral hemorrhage, leaving Dorsen with a paralysis of her right side, a condition that is womening as the whole right side of her body continues to weaken.

She also does not have any peripheral vision on her right side. Doreen also balance problem as well as seizures. All of this. however, has not stopped her from enjoying Щe Tracy, her married daughter who recently graduated from the University of Florida.

She graduated from the University of Central Florida with a BA in Elementary Education. Doreen has also done graduate studies in Early Childhood Education at UCF. She has an AA from the University of New York. but since her health has gotten progressively worse, she is unable to work any

Doreen spends most of her time, when her health permits, involved in voluntary causes. For many years she taught youngsters in: remedial reading, kindergarten, learning disabilities and emotional disabilities. Nowadays, she teaches adults, by her volunteering efforts.

Her objective is to educate the public regarding issues and obstacles that challenge individuals with disabilities, in addition to aiding and promoting Paratransit Transportation in the Tri-County Orlando area. The reason Doreen feels so strongly on educating the public, comes down to children. Growing up was not exactly easy.

When she was a child, she was constantly ridiculed by her peers, because of her disability. This was due to the fact that children did not know about disabilities and consequently were not taught about them. This was evident later on in life when Doreen began teaching children. She no-ticed that after awhile they did not even notice her afflictions.

These efforts have included: Lynx Transportation's Consumer's Advisory Committee vice chair). The City of Altamonte Springs Disability Advisory Board Metroplan's (formerly the Metropolitan Planning Organization) Bicycle/Pedestrian Advisory Committee and the Florida/Orange Reading As-

Doreen has also been involved in the 1996 Atlanta-Paralympics Games. She assisted in increasing the awareness of the Paralympics Games in Florida. She talked with local leaders, as well as past Paralympics participants. She was instrumental in organizing the "Orlando Kick-off Dinner."

Describing why she does what she does, Doreen says simply and quietly, "I want so ciety to realize that there are rights like the ADA for the disabled." 

Larry King: Man of many questions

ORLANDO - He has interviewed famous names like Mulcolm X. Martin Luther King Jr., Eleanor Roosevelt and Cary Grant. He has kissed Marion Brando on the lips. And in the next year, he hopes to interview Pope John Paul II. He is Larry King.

Arguably the best interviewer in the business. King has been in the game nearly 40 years. He started doing interviews and writing about the Miami Dolphins. Now, he is seen in 220 countries on the popular CNN show Larry King Live.

"A truly good interviewer in the main thing in a good interview," said King taking time out of his holiday vacation to talk in a green room at the Disney-MOM Studios. King relaxed back on the black leather couch with his eyes framed in the standard square lensed glasses talking about the essentials of a good interview. "A good interviewer is sincerely interesting," said King, "and tries to ask a question that brings the guest out."

King likes to read about six or seven newspapers daily to keep up with what is going on and may be pertinent to an upcoming interview. "I'm pre-pared but not prepared," said King, 'I read my newspapers daily but you have to give me-what a person did today." In preparation for interviews, King's show has a large staff

ich gathers facts on those he is about to interview and then King takes those facts and develops the conversation from that point.

However, recalls King, some interviews have not been wine and roses. 'Robert Mitchum drave me to drink." King said in a longue and cheek manner. When I asked him questions with 'why', which usually get more than a one word answer. he gave me one word answers." And he does have a bit of a

wish list when it comes to people he would like to talk to. "We are hoping to get the Pope," said King, "Princeso Diana would have been number two and [Fidel] Castro would be number three." Other than the retiring Nelson Mandela, King said that we really do not have a great world leader to interview. There are no intriguing personalities," said King.

Before King dashed off to an awaiting car that would drive him to Tampa for another engagement, he was able to give his views on the future of the media. "Skyrocketing." said King on the outlook of the business. There is no limit." King has a book scheduled to be released sometime in 1998 where he talks to such media mogula as Bill Gates, Michael Eisner and Ted Turner about their respective fields in the fu-

1997 is a wrap with more movies to see

Before we can officially adjourn this movie year and get ready for the next, some unfinished business items must be addressed. Screen Tests proudly presents the year end closcout column - a short look at some films that I have not yet reviewed in this space.

You may notice from thorough reading of this column that I start with three prime examples of great comic writing and nearly end with four lousy throwaways - unless you consider Mortal Kombat:


Annihilation.

First, and foremost, is Woody Allen's wild, audacious Decenstructing Harry (Four stars). Allen plays another neurotic, depressed character who is also a boozing, womanizing writer, who draws on life expe riences in creating his novels. Allen flips from one dimension to the next and, sometimes. crosses paths with them. The one dimension is the world within the author's books, and the other is where Allen's writer actually lives. And all the while, we learn that the writer cannot survive if he does not have his writing because his writing is where he finds happiness and belonging. Allen blends some of his old themes with brash writing. stylish camera work and a bit of self parody to form one of

the year's best films.

If the Oscar nominations dropped in our laps now, not only should Woody Allen's screenplay be a candidate, but also the scripts of Good Will Hunting (Three and a half stars) and As Good as It Gets (Three and a helf stars). Hunting, directed by Gus Van Sant (Drugstore Cowboy) and written by co-stars Matt Damon Wohn Grisham's The Rainmaker) and Ben Affleck (Chasing Amy), deals with an under achieving genius and a brooding psych teacher doubling as a therapist. Some of the dialogue sequences seem directly from a Tarantino script. You can't imagine how invigorating and engrossing it is listening to good actors smoothly translate well written dialogue from the page to the voice track. (Having Robin Williams doesn't hurt either.) That also happens in As Good as It Gets where Jack Nicholson, Helen Hunt and Oreg Kinnear play three very unique and too perfectly drawn - loners, who come together and end up being the best thing for each other. The film is directed and co-written by James L. Brooks (Broadcast News) mixing side splitting comedy bittersweet touches.

Speaking of Tarantino, Quentin comes out of his histus to direct Jackle Brown (Three stars), a film that monotonously dictates the steps of a scam involving an arms dealer (Samuel L. Jackson) and a

tired flight attendant (Pam Grier). Based on Elmore Leonard's Rum Punch, Jackie Brown could have been sheered of its nearly three hour running time in places. And even though the use of a certain ethnic word is used in excess thus raising the ire of director Spike Lee, Tarantino makes a marginal slice of entertainment, but, heed my warning before viewing. Pulp

Fiction it ain't. Next is two period pieces: one live action, one animated. Washington Square (Three stars) proceeded The Wings of the Dove, but, as far as Henry James' adaptations go. Dove is still the better. Jennifer Jason Leigh [A Thousand Acres] and Albert Finney (Miller's Crossing) play a daughter and father are torn against each other over a young suitor the father does not trust and the daughter could not be more smitten with. The pace is tiring but the

acting is head on strong. Anastasia (Three stars) is one of the first non-Disney animated films to vie for a piece of the Mouse House box office. 20th Century Fox's Anastasia touches off a string of animated pictures trying to dethrone Dianey as king of animated films. (Dreamworks, with ex-Disney man Jeffrey Katzenberg, and Warner Bros., long famous for the Looney Tunes, will be releasing their own features in the next year.) Anastasia, although it is fashioned after a Disney animated romance, ta enjoyable as it is based on the legend of the Russian princess.

Either you like them or you don't. I thought that Tomorrow Never Dies (Two and a half stars) is trite James Bond. Bad guy wanting to take over the world, libidinous rendezvous with exotic women, nifty spy gadgets, heart pounding stunts and worldly locales continue to be staples and , for me, road blocks. Bond may be reliable revenue for the Broccoli family, but, next time, throw a new spice into the old recipe and see what happens.

Two Oscar winning directors have issued movies for the holiday season. First, Francis Ford Coppola (the Godfather films) directs, executive produces and writes John Orisham's The Rainmaker (Two stars). The film conveniently wraps up plot points as a young, idealistic lawyer (Matt Damon) goes up against a corrupt insurance company to fight for justice. And this is not a Coppola stamped film rather a tear jerker with a moral. BLAIII Also, Kevin Costner returns

still with a soft gluteus

maximus after the spanking delivered to him and director Kevin Reynolds in the Waterworld debacle. Costner tries to gain his old glory by directing another epic along the lines of his Oscar winning Dances with Wolves. But The Postman (Two stars) is no where near that league. It is a cross between Road Warrtor and Dances as Costner leads a makeshift Pony against a military nut bent on dictatorship. The film tries these obvious poor attempts at feel good moments, and you have to wait three times for Costner's character to finally accept his leadership role. The Postman falls to deliver.

Here is the other end of the comedy spectrum. Welcome to the dungeon of films that hold us prisoner while they deliver what they think is humor for two hours. Mouse Hunt (Two stars) is supposed to be geared for children yet is uneven with a lot of adult themes and situations throughout. But I liked the mouse which is reminiscent of Jerry from the Tom and Jerry cartoons except this one does not have as much personality.

Tim Allen and Kirstie Alley, a king and queen in the sitcom television world, team up in the new film For Richer or Poorer (One and a half stars). Horse jokes, cow dung jokes and pokes at the Amish community - yes, again - bathe this new production. This is one of those films that failed in the

The next two comedies are geared at the younger audience as well. Older folks may find them cute but dismissable. Home Alone 3 (One star) takes the old story line and just plugs in some new parts here and there. Mr. Magoa (One star) takes an old favorite cartoon and humanizes it thus starving us of all the fond memories we had of the double visioned goof, Quincy Magoo, played here by Naked Gun Lealte Nielsen.

Finally, there is Mortal Kombat: Annihilation (One star) which does nothing but introduce more characters from the popular video game. but does nothing with them.

As the ad says, "destroy all expectations."

Building the perfect pavilion






Now is the time to fish for a lunker bass

SANFORD _ January through April is a great time to key in on a lunker bass. Large shiners produce many fish over the 8 pound mark this time of year. Most anglers fish shiners with floats near heavy cover. This is a proven tactic, but these balts will also attract mudfish and gars. At \$10.00-\$12.00 per dozen for shiners, it can get pretty expensive feeding "trash" fish.

Trolling shiners with an electric motor is not a well-known tactic, but it is absolutely deadly for heavyweight bass. Slow-trolling is also very cost effective, because mudfish and gars move too slow to catch up with a trolled shiner. Shiners also live longer, because casting them from an anchored boat slowly kills them as they "splat" on the wa-

Bass are scattered, and trolling shiners is the most effective way to locate fish. When one fish is found, I tend to catch several in the same general area. After a couple of trips to the same area, I can usually key in on certain spots that consistently produce fish. Lake Poinsett and Lake Winder are particularly good areas to troll live shiners. Look for weedy points out into the lakes, and get ready for action.

I hook the shiners through the lips with a 4/0-7/0 Weller weedless hook, depending upon the size of the shiner. Use level-wind



recis, and turn down the antibacklash mechanism enough that the shiner cannot pull it out when trolling. I smally let out about 50 feet of line and then follow structure such as weed lines. This method is also very effective over submerged weed beds.

This method is not for the faint of hear, for jarring strikes are the norm, and basa will AVERAGE over 5 pounds. In fact, it seems that I have to "wade through" a lot of 8 pound fish to eventually catch one over the 10 pound mark.

SHUPE'S SCOOP

REMEMBER THAN 90 PERCENT OF THE BASS LIVE IN ONLY ABOUT 10 PERCENT OF THE WATER. WHEN TROLLING LIVE SHINERS, I TYPICALLY FIND THAT BASS ARE BUNCHED UP IN CERTAIN AREA. I CAN USUALLY CATCH FISH CONSIS-TENTLY IN THESE SPOTS ONCE I FIND

The river is high, but base action will be good where bass are contained. Fish sloughs and other areas with distinct boundaries. Big shiners are hard to beat this time of year for big bass. The section of river from Lake Poinsett to Lake Winder has a lot of bass over 8 pounds. Lake Monroe has fair speckled perch action. Just head for the nearest crowd of boats and start drifting with Missouri minnows.

Huge winter flounder top the bill at Sebastian Inlet. Bounce finger mullet slowly across the bottom for fair action with flatfish to 12 pounds. Redfish, bluefish and snook will be scattered.

Captain Jack at Port Canaveral has no offshore reports due to high seas and dirty water. Inside the Port. flounder and sheepshead are providing fair action. Redfish and trout are hard to pin down this time of year due to passing cold fronts. Several days of cold weather will put them in the holes, while warmer weather will find them cruising the flats in the afternoons.

Bluefish and sheepshead dominate the action at Ponce Inlet. Redfish, drum, and jack crevalle are also present. Live or dead shrimp are the top baits. Redfish and trout are scattered in Mosquito Lagoon.

Narrated by Martha Mikler Van Dyke, the play included eight mini scenes in Act I and a grand finale in Act II when throngs in Boston gathered on



DEAR ABBY: This is in response to the letter you printed from Calvin S. Holm, Thiensville, Wis., referring to people who succeed in spite of the fact their parents could not afford to help them with finances for schooling or much of snything else. I, too, was a Great Depression child. I have a true story that I hope you will print in order to pass along the message that help is out there if you pray and hope:

MY PAVORITE CHRISTMAS

It was December 1932. In those days, \$1 was a lot of money, and \$5 was a fortune. We lived on a farm in the Colorado Rockies, 5 1/2 miles north of a small village called Divide.


The town consisted of a combination post office, general store, filling station, and an upstairs residence for the owner's family. There was one other filling station, perhaps five or six houses, a schoolhouse, and a community hall where neighhorhood meetings, country dances, stc. were held.

The schoolhouse was a two-room building with two teachers. One room was for grades one through five; the other was for grades six through 10. There was a barn where we could tie up our horses, with a feed box in each stall for a lunchtime oats anack for the horse. These was also a watering trough

I rode horseback to school every day, with my kid brother on the back of the saddle. It was cold at times.

Christmas was coming and

things looked very bleak. I knew there was a benevolent organization in Colorado Springs called the "Mrn. Santa Claus Club" that gave warm clothes to poor people. So I stole a penny postcard from my mother's stationery iyes, a prepaid postcard cost I cent at the time). I addressed it to the Mrs. Santa Claus Club and told them about our cold horseback rides to school. I asked if they had any warm clothes, shirts, pants or jackets for my 6-year-old brother or me. I told them I was 9, and said if they happened to have some toys for my 1-year-old baby brother, they would be very much appreciated.

The day before Christmas, we

would be very much appreciated. The day before Christmas, we got a notice from the post office that there was a large box addressed to me. Dad picked it up. It was from the Mrs. Santa Claus Club. When we opened it, I could not believe what was inside: warm jackets, pants, shir's, underwear — all the right size for me and/or my kid brother. There were also small blankets for my baby brother, and to top it off, toys for each of us.

My parents were elated, and my mother forgave me for stealing the postcard. She said, "I think God knew what he was doing."

In addition, the two teachers at school had procured, at their own expense, a present for each kid in the school: a pair of lace-up boots for each boy, and a pair of fur-lined overshoes for each girl.

So, Abby, that's the story of the best Christmas I can remember thanks to a very benevolent group of people and two generous schoolteachers.






