

Word Power: Master Two More Plurals

For nouns ending in qu (quae), where the u is like w. If you change y to i, add an i, it won't trouble you.

There are not many words in English whose singular form ends in qu (pronounced kw), and all of them from their plurals the same way.

Four such words are obsequy, milquetry, colloquy and obloquy. The final qu is pronounced kw, so that the u is like w. How do we form the plural of such nouns? The rhyme goes on:

If you change y to i, add an i, it won't trouble you. Good. Applying the rule contained in the verse, we now have these plurals: obsequies, milquetreries, colloquies and obloquies. And that's all there is to that rule.

Up to this point we have given you several rhymes which cover both the main spelling rules (for nouns of most frequent difficulty) and the principal exceptions. But whether to add simply a or an to nouns whose singular ends in o—here the very best advice would be to consult the dictionary when you are not certain. It so happens that there are no very many exceptions to any rule we could give here that the rule is almost worthless. Suppose we take a quick look.

The plural of potato is potatoes; here has harsen for plural, and associated has mosquitoes. Notice that all these singulars end in o; and in all cases also that the final o of the singular is preceded by a consonant. The only rule, actually, for forming the plural of nouns which end in o is this: if the o of the singular is preceded by a consonant, add es to the plural.

You no sooner have this rule in your hand than a good speaker comes along and tells you that the rule does not work on octo, tobacco, piano and a few dozen others.

Which is very true; but that the wiser course is to consult your dictionary when in doubt about forming the plural of words ending in o.

In our next article we shall take up such matters as why we also shall look into words that have brought over—singular and plural—into English from other languages, mainly Latin and Greek.

A Quia Right now, review the rhymes pertaining to the formation of the plural. Look them over carefully, and pick out the proper spelling which in each of the following parentheses. One of the best ways to memorize your verses is to quote the part of the approximate verse which helps you decide in the parentheses which follow.

Drug Mark-Up Of 820 Per Cent Shown In Survey
 NEW YORK (UPI)—New Yorkers can pay \$1.55 for a drug in one city pharmacy and \$1.50 for the identical drug in another pharmacy, a discrepancy of 820 per cent, a survey disclosed Tuesday.

The survey also found that minority groups are "generally exploited and pay more for drugs than upper income groups," and the middle class pays more for drugs than either the rich or the poor. The survey was conducted over the past six months in 12 areas of Manhattan selected on the basis of income level, racial concentrations and population totals.
 It was released today by William F. Haddad, president of Citizens Committee for Metropolitan Affairs, a non-profit civic foundation which conducts investigative research on critical city problems.
 It is a 45-year-old national drug cost survey conducted by the federal government as part of its program on poverty.

The Century Of 'Instants'

Smart Shopper's Guide

Editor's Note: This is the tenth in a series on the purchase of clothing and food designed to help every consumer become a wise shopper and get more for his money. A typical family of four can raise its standard of living 15 to 20 per cent by more careful buying habits.

Instant coffee. Instant coffee, instant tea, instant soups—and on and on—the list is now part of our vocabulary and daily menu. Big changes now appear in the frozen food area, such as a new combination of dehydration and freezing. This is called "freeze-drying." The food first is frozen, and the moisture turns to ice crystals. Then it is dehydrated under vacuum at a low temperature. The result is a light, airy, porous material which is easy to rehydrate. The crystals pass off as a vapor and do not go through the liquid state which tends to cause some mushiness in frozen foods as we now know them. Freeze-dried foods retain their bulk but lose water weight. When cooked with water they return to their natural state with little loss of taste or nutritional value.

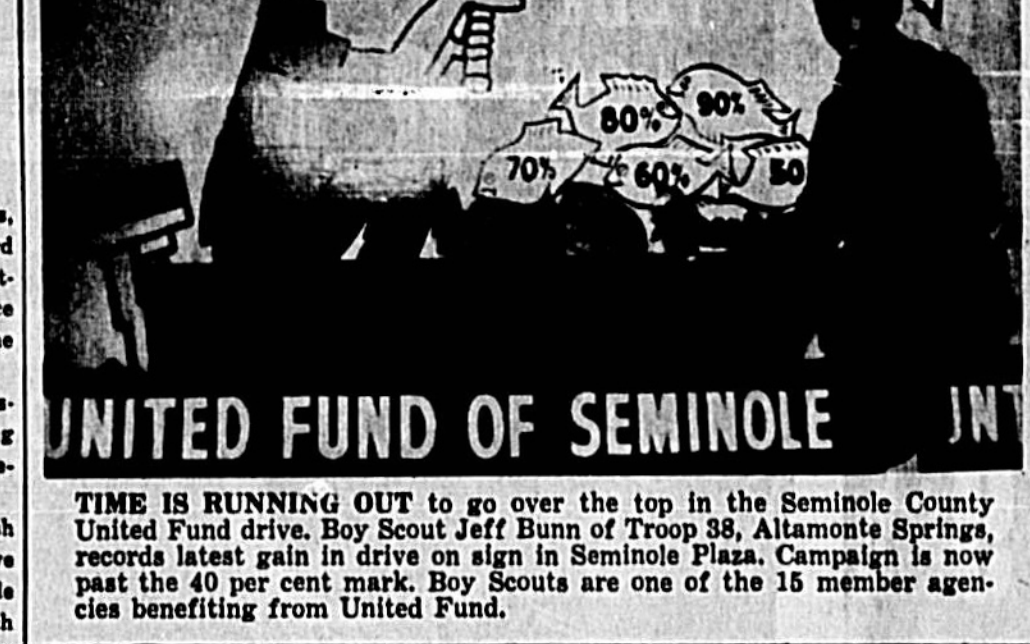

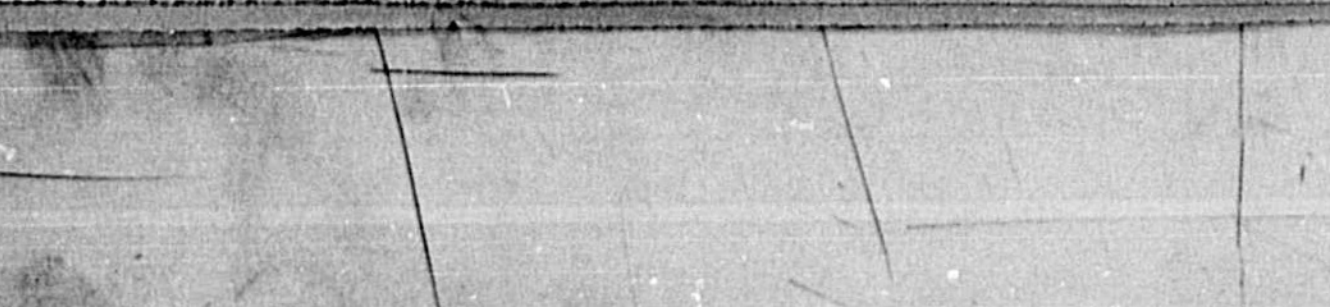

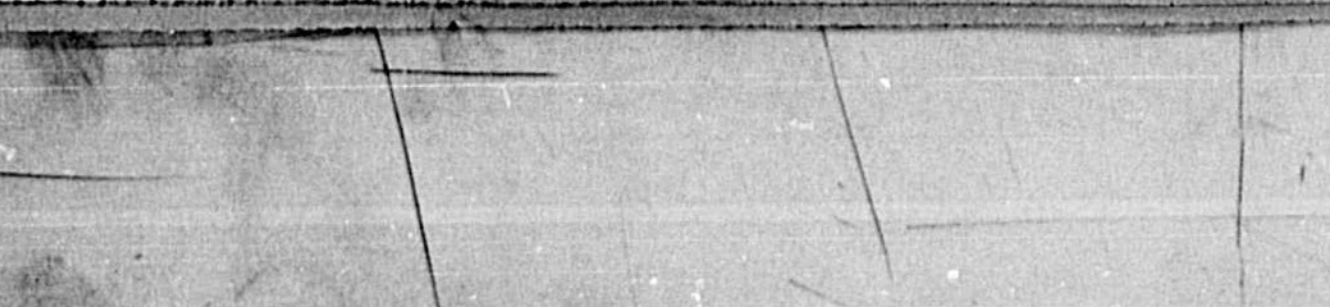

Astronauts Plan Aerial Rendezvous

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI) — Weather experts today agreed on a tentative "all clear" to America's planned attempt to launch Gemini 8 and astronaut Walter M. Schirra and Thomas P. Stafford on a "space chase" into orbit next Monday.

Meteorologists predicted good weather for the scheduled blast off "and probably for the entire flight," expected to run about two days.

The good news came as veteran Schirra and rookie Stafford turned to a drill designed to make sure the worldwide tracking network was ready for the complex launching that will send them aloft to attempt the first link-up with another satellite in space.

Weather is always a critical factor in manned space flight. The first launch was postponed three previous times because of unfavorable weather that threatened to cause damage to the spacecraft.

Forecasters called for partly cloudy skies with ceilings above the 5,000 foot minimum over the Cape at launch time Monday. Generally calm seas and moderate winds were forecast for the main recovery area in the western Atlantic Ocean.

The 23 electronic outposts stretched around the world were being put through a day-long series of exercises simulating various portions of the complicated space rendezvous mission.

All the tracking stations were linked into the mission control centers here and in Houston just as if the behemoth spacecraft were actually sweeping around the earth.

Rehearsals were becoming a steady routine for the crew as they prepared for the launch. The first launch was postponed three previous times because of unfavorable weather that threatened to cause damage to the spacecraft.
