Health Department confirms TB case

SANFORD — An individual at Geneva Elementary School has been found to have tuberculosis disease, the Seminole County Health Department announced Friday.

At this time the individual is not in school and will not return until adequate clearance by the county Health Department is provided. This report is under investigation by the department, in cooperation with Seminole County Public Schools.

Although it is unlikely that this individual was infectious, the Health Department has notified those students, teachers and other school staff with whom this individual had prolonged close contact to be skin tested for TB.

The disease is passed from one person to another through particles discharged from the lungs into the air when the infected person coughs, sneezes, sings or shouts. Transmission occurs primarily when people are confined in small areas with little ventilation over extended periods of time.

A classroom is typically not considered a high risk area for transmission. TB has been curable in nearly all cases, and those who contract it normally recover completely if all medications are taken as prescribed.

The TB skin test consists of a small injection under the skin of the forearm. The test is ready to read after 48 hours and it must be read within a 72-hour period by a health care professional. Those individuals with a positive reaction to the test are offered a chest x-ray and further evaluation.

Children in pool dodge bullets

SANFORD — Local residents on Mangoustine Avenue and 10th Street were caught in a crossfire late Thursday afternoon when subjects shot at Corey Freeman of Sanford.

Freeman, 27, received multiple gunshot wounds and was airlifted to the Orlando Regional Medical Center. He is currently stable with non life-threatening injuries.

During the shooting, right in front of 1014 Mangoustine Ave., there was a kiddie wading pool with three children in it, Sanford Police Spokeswoman Cleo Cohen said. Some of the gunshots hit the wading pool, but none of the children were hit.

"As tragic as it is, it could have been more tragic," Cohen said.

Yesterday afternoon, the Sanford Police Department responded to a disturbance call. According to Cohen, a purplish color minivan with two suspects drove up to Freeman. At least one of the suspects exited the vehicle and began firing shots at the victim.

As the two suspects fled the scene they crashed the minivan and fled on foot. One of the suspects, 34-year-old Bobby Cofield, was caught by officers

New advisory group discusses consolidation

SANFORD — A new county advisory committee acknowledged three areas in which Seminole County and its seven cities can consolidate services — libraries, parks and recreation, and stormwater.

The Joint City/County Advisory Committee met May 18. On hand were County Chairman Carlton Henley, Commissioner Randy Morris as well as mayors and representatives from each of the seven municipalities.

The committee will reach its full contingent of 23 when representatives from the Private Business Association

meetings will be televised on Seminole Government Television.

The purpose of the May 18 meeting was to identify, evaluate and make recommendations regarding increasing efficiency of service and savings for the tax payer, according to a county statement. The

meeting was open to the public, but no public input was received. Only a handful of people attended the meeting other than the committee members.

"It's amazing as to the number of ways the cities and county are working together for the benefit of our citizens," Henley said. Each government representative listed how their city and the county work together. Trails, public works, annexation agreements, water service, environmental service, animal control, public safety, and fire protection were just a few mentioned.

Henley said the purpose of

Family members, police vow to catch local man's killer

SANFORD — The uncle of a murdered Sanford man joined police investigators May 18 in canvassing the neighborhood around 908 Celery Ave., trying to find any kind of lead.

Rodney Brown is the uncle of Mark Anthony Pearson. Pearson was gunned down in December in front of his mother's home on Celery Avenue.

Police know the shooting took place about 7:20 p.m. on Dec. 20, 2004. They know that friends transported Pearson to Central Florida Regional Hospital and left him at the Emergency entrance. Pearson was later pronounced dead.

Hospital personnel provided a description of the two vehicles that showed up with Pearson. Investigators located and interviewed the occupants of the two autos.

The information gathered so far has not lead to any indication of who shot Pearson, so they want people in the area who might have seen something to tell them what happened. A \$5,000 reward from CrimeLine is being offered.

"These victims are not forgotten," said Cleo Cohen, Sanford police spokesman. "We're going to aggressively pursue this case to closure. The

only closure we will accept is an arrest and conviction."

Brown, who lives on West 20th Street, said his nephew was shot right in the front yard of the small blue home on Celery Avenue.

"We want to let the family and neighbors know that the police are on the job," Brown told reporters. Brown has been involved with police to find the killer. Later he said since Pearson is a family member, he would like to see the police

Steering committee wrangles over park

SANFORD — The Waterfront Master Plan Steering Committee bumped heads with city project manager Chris Smith at their monthly meeting Wednesday, May 18.

Some committee members felt that Smith had thrown a wrench in things when he offered a different option to the committee for choosing a landscape architect for Fort Mellon Park.

On April 25, the City Commission came to a consensus to allow the Waterfront Committee to finish out Fort Mellon Park and to have members assist in reviewing the submissions from a Request for Qualifications, or

RFQ for a lead landscape architect for the park.

After a lengthy discussion led by committee member Jerry Mills, in which they discussed running an RFQ to find a landscape architect to head the project, Smith offered a different option.

Because the process can be lengthy and the committee is coming toward the end of this year's cycle for applying for more money from their Florida Recreational Development Assistance Program or FRDAP grant, Smith suggested another way of selecting a landscape architect.

Smith said that if they choose to have one of the city's civil engineering con-

Sharpless was arrested Thursday at 5635 S. Sanford Ave., inside a camper in the rear of the residence. Sharpless was booked into the Seminole County Jail on a charge of burglary. His bond is set at \$4,900.

and arrested for attempted murder and aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.

Cohen said it had apparently started a few days earlier when Freeman was involved in an altercation with one of Cofield's sisters. That altercation resulted in Freeman's arrest.

"He bonded out and this was apparently a continuation and retaliation of that incident," Cohen said.

Cofield has an extensive arrest sheet in Seminole County. Of 42 booking reports in the Seminole County Jail, eight of them are for battery or domestic battery; two are for aggravated assault; two are for stalking and aggravated stalking; and one non-aggravated assault charge.

Among other crimes Cofield has been arrested for include multiple charges of possession of cocaine and marijuana with and without intent to sell; theft of a vehicle; burglary of a structure including an automobile; shooting/throwing a missile; tampering with a witness/victim; robbery; possession and use of a firearm; hit and run; DUI; and numerous other traffic violations.

The victim, Freeman, is classified as a career criminal, Cohen said. Freeman has also had a number of bookings in

the Seminole County Jail. The most recent being the initial altercation from May 17. He was charged with two counts of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon without intent to kill; two counts of possession of a weapon or ammo by a convicted felon; and aggravated battery with a deadly weapon.

Past charges brought against Freeman in Seminole County include charges for drugs; probation violation; robbery; burglary; contempt of court; resisting an officer; driving with a suspended license; and multiple battery and domestic battery charges.

The Sanford Police Department is currently looking for the second suspect, who they identified Friday as Cofield's brother, 33-year-old Ronald Cofield. Probable cause exists for his arrest for attempted homicide. The police department is considering him armed and extremely dangerous. He is described as a 5'6", 174 lb., black male with black hair and brown eyes.

sulting firms as the lead for the project, instead of a landscape architect, the city could begin spending the grant money they have already received for the park and have yet to spend.

"It sounds more technical than it is," Smith told committee members.

He said that it is highly unlikely for FRDAP to release more funds when previously released funds have not been spent. And, because it is close to the end of the cycle to apply for more of the grant money, they may have to wait until the next cycle to receive more.

Smith discussed having one of the city's consultant civil engineering firms do the construction documents for the project. That firm would serve as the prime construction team. In turn, a landscape architect would work on a sub-contract basis, but the selection process would still be similar. The Waterfront Committee would still have a

part in the selection.

Members of the committee stressed that although they did not want to be responsible for losing grant money, they strongly felt that a landscape architect should be the prime construction team.

"You've thrown a monkey wrench into it," Mills said.

Smith told committee members that they would not be losing any money, they would just have to wait for the next cycle to have more money dispersed.

In an interview, Smith said he had sent committee members clarifications on the FRDAP grant.

"In my opinion, grants are easy to apply for. It's hard to administer, and it's almost impossible to get reimbursed," Smith said.

Chairman Robert Segal said the committee was now dealing with a "whole different ballgame" than they were earlier in the meeting.

Segal asked, "Does anyone

follow this?"

Smith urged the committee members that this was just another option they could look at.

Committee members discussed the option Smith laid out before them, but all but one committee member felt that a landscape architect should be the front-runner for the project.

"This is too important to let the FRDAP drive our calendar," Committee member Ron Fraser said.

Stephanie Powers brought forth a motion to give city staff the decision power to lay out the park and to have them do the short process, by using one of the city's consulting civil engineers, in order to receive more of their FRDAP grant for this upcoming cycle deadline.

Joe Montisano seconded the motion, but then withdrew it after further discussion among committee members. The motion died, when

no one else would second it.

Committee members discussed that by going through a landscape architect, they may be able to find one who has done a number of similar parks, and in turn who may have a civil engineer and other construction companies who have also worked on similar park projects.

Smith said in an email that the committee members just want to be able to get the best landscape architect out there.

"Which is good," Smith wrote.

In other news, the Committee passed a motion to move forward with the Fort Mellon Park survey. Chris Smith will work with committee member Fraser to fine-tune the most recent draft of the survey. The survey will go out in water bills in July.

The next Waterfront Master Plan Steering Committee is scheduled for June 15 at 4 p.m. in the city manager's conference room.

Worker's death investigated

SANFORD — The Seminole County Sheriff's Office is investigating the May 18 death of a subcontractor, who was working at a construction site in northwestern Seminole County.

Eyewitnesses say Jose Fuentes Rodriguez, 50, was working about 15 feet off the ground when he fell from a truss. The home was under construction at 1744 Brackenstus Place at a new sub-

division. A call to 9-1-1 came in about 1:50 p.m. The victim was rushed to Central Florida Regional Medical Center in Sanford, where he was pronounced dead.

Rodriguez's relatives are notified in Central America, lists an Orlando address. Representatives with the Occupational Health and Safety Administration were also contacted.

The Way We Were: Return to the summer of 1943

While skimming through the Friday, Sept. 3, 1943, edition of the Sanford Herald, I found several interesting items that, for some reason, I had not included in my July 2004 columns taken from that newspaper. So, here they are.

Invasion of Europe Begins

The large headline in the paper reads "British Eighth Army Lands in Italy."

The Allies had begun the invasion of Europe when the British Eighth Army stormed across the Strait of Messina from Sicily and landed in Southern Italy, along with a Canadian contingent at 4:30 a.m.

General Eisenhower was Supreme Commander and American planes and warships had played a prominent role in preparation and support of the landings.

(In my Sept. 4, 2004 column, I reported from the Sept. 8, 1943 paper that Italy had surrendered).

Other sectors of the war were also active. Huge fleets of American bombers had plastered Nazi occupied France and the Russians had dealt staggering new blows to the Germans.

Housholder to Head War Fund Drive
Governor Holland had announced the previous day that State Senator Ernest Housholder had accepted the district chairmanship of the War Fund Appeal.

This fund had been organized by a group of prominent Floridians to raise the state's share of the \$125 million the Nation's War Fund was asking for. It would be used for carrying on the work of our servicemen and for aiding the stricken European people who were fighting on the side of the Allies.

Senator Housholder, a native Floridian, had been a prominent figure in public life in both Sanford and Seminole County. He had held several offices including county judge, county prosecuting attorney, city commissioner, Mayor of Sanford, and was presently a member of the State Senate.

Ball Game to Benefit Hospital

A diamond ball game was to be played on September 9, between the Kiwanis and Rotary Clubs to benefit the Fernald Lawton Memorial Hospital.

Manager Howard Long of the Kiwanis team, along with his assistants, C.D. Workman and E.C. Harper, were announcing that their team was engaging in brisk training activities. The initial workout consisted of watching some of the Navy boys practicing in the park.

The only jarring note in the Kiwanis baseball progress was the holdout for better contract terms by John Leonardy who had been picked as the Kiwanis starting pitcher. He contended that the contract had been drawn up illegally.

In the meantime, Dr. R.W. Ricker, dentist, was reported to be pulling a lot of teeth to get his pitching arm in shape to relieve Leonardy. Also, the team had been put on a mineral oil diet by Dr. L.H. Dame in order to lubricate stiff joints.

Dr. L.T. Doss was examining spinal kinks that might lower batting averages and Dr. Henry McLaulin was giving their batting eyes the once-over. Ed Lane, first baseman, was doing a lot of walking the streets, getting his legs in shape to snare wild throws.

Ed Lane had several comments about the Rotary Club's starting pitcher, Ed Higgins. "Old man Higgins thinks because he has talked several times to the owner and manager of the Boston Braves that he, himself, is a ball player. It is my belief that he may have been a pitcher before the war, but that was the Civil War."

It was reported that Ed Higgins had been seen driving his car with all the windows rolled up, to keep from catching cold in his pitching arm.

Manager Levy advised the public not to take the forgoing reports too seriously, but he hoped that many tickets, at 25 cents for adults, and 10 cents for children, would be sold in order to raise funds for equipment for the hospital.

Correction

I'm sure that you realize that I do not write the headlines for my columns. On my May 8 column, the headline read "Early B&B's, Every Business Opportunity Counts".

Nowhere in my article did I state that my parents had operated a bed and breakfast (B&B). It was strictly a tourist home where people rented a room for the night, just like a motel. No breakfast was served there or in any of the other tourist homes in Sanford.

It was not until many years later that bed and breakfasts came into being in the United States.



Progress measured in 'baby steps' and sign language!

Welcome to Stetson's Corner, where weekly we hope to share a bit of what is good about the Village of Geneva. This column is dedicated to a man who did the same - Deputy Sheriff Gene "Stetson" Gregory, who was killed in the line of duty July 8, 1998 in the place he was sworn to protect, but which could not protect him. Geneva will never be the same because of Deputy Gregory... it will be better.

This week's column continues to follow the progress of Nicole Garris of Geneva as she recovers from serious injuries sustained in a car accident March 8...

April 1 - After a lot of stimulation the nurses have been able to get Nicole to move both her right and left legs, feet, arms and hands. This is done by voice command as well as by physical stimulation. ... By Tuesday evening, her sedatives had worn off and were pretty much out of her system. The nurses and doctors were able to get Nicole to follow commands such as 'squeeze my hand', 'give me a thumbs-up', 'show me a peace sign'. Wow! Now they know she follows commands and it is not just reflexes. ... The monitor, which was placed in her head measuring the pressure in the brain, was taken out late Tuesday evening as well. We are told she is becoming "very active" but still in a coma. She opens her eyes for longer periods of time and they appear to be clear. Her eyes seem to follow voices/sounds, but it does not appear she can actually see anything. ... Also, today they allowed Nicole to breathe on her own. She did so for about 3 hours! This was considered a major accomplishment since it has been over three weeks since her accident.

April 4 - We are soooooo excited the swelling has subsided and now the brain can begin to heal itself. Good news! Baby steps!!!!

April 13 - On Friday, they moved Nicole via ambulance from ICU to a rehabilitation hospital nearby. They did this because she is no longer con-

sidered to be in a coma and would have to be moved out of ICU. Instead of moving her to another floor of the hospital, they sent her to a rehabilitation hospital where she would begin her therapy. ... She has a tracheotomy, which is assisting her breathing with about 40% oxygen. The ventilator is not connected to the tracheotomy tube, but rather flows into a masked area. This is considered assisted breathing and she is considered to be breathing on her own with assistance. Her temperature has been around 99.8 +/-, which is much better than it had been. ... Nicole seemed to recognize all of our voices. We noticed when I talked, her eyes would turn in the direction of our voices. She did this several times. We then held up a picture of Jacquelyn and Nicholas and she seemed to follow it when we moved it.

April 25 - Nicole continues to work hard at her therapy on a daily basis. According to her doctor, Nicole is responding at a 20% rate. She is able to track and follow a balloon held in front of her and she is much more active, moving her arms and legs. Nicole has a telephone in her room and so when I know that her father is going to be there, I call and ask him to hold the telephone up to her ear. Ed, myself, Nicholas and Jacquelyn all talk to her and her Dad says that sometimes, she moves her mouth as if she is trying to talk back. I know she can hear us and I believe she misses her brother and sister, so we will continue to call and hope for the best.

May 3 - Upon my arrival on Thursday, I found Nicole asleep in a wheel chair in her room. I awakened her and her eyes were very wide open (like a deer in headlights). I kept saying that it was Mom, and I leaned over to give her a hug. All of the sudden, I felt her left arm around my waist! At first I thought maybe it was just a reflex, but then I began to rub her back with my hand and she started to rub my back with her left hand. It nearly scared me to death!!! I was soooooo excited. As I sat beside her, I just began to talk, telling her about my flight, etc. All of the sudden her mouth began to move like she was trying to talk to me. Of course no words came out, but she was certainly giving me the scoop. ... Later

that afternoon her therapists Joanne and Rita came in to give her some therapy. Nicole did really well. They sat her up on the edge of the bed and Nicole actually balanced herself, held up her head and sat upright unassisted for a few moments. When the therapists left, they waved and said goodbye. All of the sudden, Nicole began to wave. I told them "Look, she is waving to you," and they both came back in. They waved to her and once again she waved back. They were both very surprised.

May 9 - Over the weekend, Nicole began trying to communicate by nodding yes or no to questions. At first the nurses were skeptical, but then, they asked her a series of questions and she answered correctly to them all! The speech therapist said that Friday during therapy, Nicole was making some sounds and she thought perhaps Nicole could speak. Then, this morning, when John went to visit her, he took the mitt off of her left hand. (She has to wear the mitt so she does not pull out her NG tube in her nose.) She began to sign to him! She was signing letters. Nicole took sign language for a number of years in high school and one year in college. John tried to find someone that knew sign language, but none of the nurses knew it and it was too early for the speech therapist to be in. John said she kept signing the same letters over and over and when he did not get it, Nicole got angry at him. ... John said that she is definitely in the frustrated state. ... Well, I can't begin to tell you how overwhelmed I am to hear all of these improvements. When Nicole first got to Fairlawn Rehabilitation Hospital on April 8th, for the first 2 +/- weeks she really did not do anything and the therapy staff was very concerned. Now look at her!!!! You go girl! ... Our prayers are being answered, for without them, where would Nicole be? ... Love to you all, Robin, Ed, Nicole, Jacquelyn and Nicholas.

Nikita will also represent Central Florida at the regional and national levels.


The national Youth of the Year award will be presented at the White House in Washington, D.C. and a \$10,000 college scholarship will be awarded.




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

this committee would be to see where this cooperation could be extended.

Morris pointed out several other areas, including a lot of effort the Orlando Sanford International Airport.

"We've spent more time on Larry Dale than the rest of you combined," Morris said.

Henley suggested that this kind of cooperation, together with a large amount of time devoted by volunteers is why Seminole County "is what it is."

Lake Mary Mayor Thomas Greene pointed out that the county has helped attract high tech business to the I-4 corridor with incentives. The county also plans two pedestrian bridges in Lake Mary, one from the elementary school to City Hall over Lake Mary Boulevard, and the other on Rinehart Road.

The county also provides services directly to the cities

such as the supervisor of elections, the Sheriff's Office and the county property appraiser, said Mayor Bob Goff of Casselberry.

The group then discussed what priorities for future consolidation might be considered.

Information technology, libraries, transportation (including a commuter rail system), stormwater, and parks were just some mentioned.

Some municipalities like Sanford had not had the chance to discuss consolidation ideas. Sanford Mayor Linda Kuhn said the city commission would discuss ideas at its next meeting Monday, May 23.

Greene pointed out that Lake Mary is out of space for parks and would like to reach out to Sanford or the county to what possibilities might arise. He also mentioned the possi-

bility of a pool near Lake Mary High School, and expansion of libraries. Lake Mary doesn't have a library within city limits.

Altamonte Springs has a library, but it is city owned, whereas the rest in Seminole are run by the county. Some changes may be possible there.

The county will be given an update on the libraries at its next meeting Tuesday, May 24, Henley said.

Members of the group agreed that a good first step would be to get on the same page with these issues. They need to answer where each one is at with stormwater, for example.

In the end, the group agreed to research three areas for possible consolidation: libraries, stormwater, and parks and recreation. Each entity will have staff work on these for the next meeting.

Along for the journey has been Convergys Corp., one of many technology companies that aid the school, but one that has grown in relationship to the school.

"It's been a work in progress," said Brenda Palmieri, senior human resources manager with Convergys. The company has many employees who have mentored Crooms students, and representatives sit on the school's advisory board.

"This has blossomed into a full-blown business partnership," Palmieri said. "It's been a very valuable experience from an HR and business standpoint."

Convergys has been involved with the school since day one, Collins said. The company has even helped determine parts of the curriculum.

Students have visited Convergys for internships and job shadowing. The company has been involved with career fairs and last year developed a course for students using the computer language JAVA. Some students will have futures with the company.

"We absolutely believe that some of these kids will come to Convergys," Palmieri said. "We think these are bright, talented kids."

Mentoring commitments are for one-year normally, said Cathy Alper, Crooms career specialist.

Many of the 25 or so mentors from Convergys have made two, three or even four-year commitments. Some have become parent figures in the lives of these students, Alper said, relating the testimony of one student.

"They do get heavily involved besides academics," she added.

In the beginning, the concept was so new that officials didn't know what to expect. Would the students all graduate as programmers and network proficient people, some wondered.

"The kids knew better," Collins said. "Actually, I think to some degree it's actually

gone beyond our expectations."

Every senior, she added proudly, is FCAT proficient, meaning they have passed both parts of the state assessment test. Many have college credits and industry certifications.

"All of them are employable right now," she said. She estimated that 80 percent would move on to some form of higher education. Some may go right into the workforce. Either way, continuing education will be part of their lives, she said.

"They will be committed to lifelong learning," Collins said. "They know better than us that things are changing."

Palmieri said the business community has recognized the value of a concept like Crooms.

"We've really stepped it up because we feel it is so important," she added. "We've tried to take the lead. We want to be and we believe we are the model for this type of relationship."

Alper said she often highlights the relationship between Convergys and Crooms when she speaks with other companies.

Collins said Crooms Academy, a Seminole County magnet school, was a response to a need.

The old Crooms had such a rich tradition, especially with educating the African-American population in Sanford in the early 20th cen-

tury. The district remains under a federal desegregation consent decree, she said. People wanted the academic part of Crooms to be restored and business people desired the information technology component.

No district in the nation, according to Collins, has put together the academics along with a certification program and having a laptop school. Each Crooms student receives a laptop computer that is integrated into their study. Students can reach the Internet from just about anywhere on the campus through a wireless network.

"We are always breaking new ground," Collins said.

Not only have the students been trained, the teachers have learned and become proficient in the new concept. They have had to devote a lot of commitment and flexibility, Collins said.

At least one neighboring county has inquired about how Crooms integrates the laptops into education.

"It's not as simple as handing a computer to a 14-year-old student and saying, 'Use it wisely,'" Collins said. Teachers, students and parents have had to learn how to manage and monitor laptop usage, she said.

Another teaching moment occurred when FCAT scores dipped a bit because students were too into the technology. The standardized assessment is still done with pencils and paper.

Collins said the FCAT writing scores rebounded nicely.

"We really did put the laptop aside," she said, especially for handwriting, grammar and mechanics.

The first set of graduating seniors serve as pioneers for future classes. The seniors met the challenge and never used their situation as an excuse, she said.

"The first graduating class did not have a senior class to look up to," Collins explained.

"They set their own standards, and they set them high. That is the greatest legacy they will leave."

do more.

"Today is impressing the family," he said of the re-canvassing of the neighborhood. "We hope this shakes up the neighborhood."

Most doors that Brown and investigators knocked on remained closed. Kathryn Fryer, who lives at 906 Celery Ave., said she was not home when the murder took place.

Fryer said suspicious people always walk up and down the street at night. There are no lights in front of the homes on the north side of Celery, she pointed out.

She said she does not feel safe, especially with small children. The woods on the east side of the street are a mess and all kinds of people walk through at night.

"That's why I'm trying to get out of this neighborhood," she said.

Pearson's cousins said they have no idea who could have shot their cousin.

"We were watching Monday Night Football and our cousin came in and told me Mark Anthony had been shot," said Chip Perkins,

Pearson's cousin who lives in Sanford.

Investigator Daniel Camargo said they wanted to talk with neighbors again. He said maybe some people have thought about it since their first canvass of the area in December. Maybe people in the neighborhood have changed their minds about giving police any information.

"It speaks highly to have the family here," he said.

Camargo and others left cards on doors and with people they met asking for assistance from residents. Cohen said Friday that several calls have already come in through both the CrimeLine number and the department number.

Butera a semifinalist for Bench Award

UCF junior catcher Drew Butera was named one of 10 semifinalists for the Coleman Company - Johnny Bench Award, the Greater Wichita Area Sports Commission announced Thursday. Thirty-seven catchers from 16 conferences were nominated for the award by their coaches and that list was trimmed to 10 semifinalists.

"We are proud of Drew and the progress he has made over his career at UCF," stated head coach Jay Bergman. "Drew has put in a great deal of hard work to be in position to earn one of the nation's top collegiate awards." Butera, a 48th round draft pick of the Toronto Blue Jays out of Bishop Moore High School, is widely considered one of the top five catching prospects in the collegiate ranks for the 2005 Major League Baseball Draft. "Butera's catch-and-throw skills help him stand out as one of the nation's top defensive catchers," stated Baseball America National

Writer Will Kimmey.

In 2005, Butera has put up the best offensive numbers of his career. The Lake Mary native is batting .330 - second best on the team - with career-highs in home runs (5), hits (63), runs (46), doubles (12), RBI (38) and stolen bases (8).

Arguably the nation's top defensive catcher, the son of former Minnesota Twins catcher Sal Butera, has thrown out an amazing 45-percent of would-be base stealers, having held the opposition to just 28 stolen bases in 51 attempts. He limited the nation's leader in steals - Adam Godwin of Troy (76 stolen bases in 84 attempts) - without a

stolen base in two attempts in a three-game series at Troy.

A comprehensive biography will be created on each of the semifinalists and sent to the national voting panel at the end of May for a vote to determine the three finalists. The finalists will be announced on June 1, 2005, prior to the NCAA Regionals and Major League Baseball Draft. A final vote among the national committee will occur during the College World Series. All finalists will be brought to Wichita and the winner will be announced at the 8th Annual Greater Wichita Sports Banquet on June 29, 2005.

Johnny Bench presented Cal State Fullerton catcher, Kurt Suzuki, with the award last June in Wichita, Kan. Chris Iannetta of the University of North Carolina and Landon Powell of the University of South Carolina were the other finalists for the award.

"We prefer to play our home games at 6 p.m. after receiving input from our fans, alumni, students and season ticket holders," Orsini stated. "As we begin a new era of UCF football in Conference USA, we wanted to keep the traditional evening start times we have had at UCF."

The Golden Knights begin the season Thursday, Sept. 1 at South Carolina in the first college football broadcast of the season on ESPN. UCF will be making its fourth consecutive appearance on ESPN in season openers.

Game times have also been set for an additional four road games. The Southern Miss game on Oct. 15 will start at 7 p.m. while the East Carolina game on Oct. 29 has a 2 p.m. kickoff time. The final two road games of the season, Nov. 12 at UAB and Nov. 19 at Rice, will have 4 p.m. and 3 p.m. kickoff times, respectively.

USF and Louisiana-Lafayette have yet to announce game times. At least eight Seminole County High School graduates are expected to play for the Golden Knights this season led by Brandon Marshall from Lake Howell.

A junior, Marshall was one of the top receivers on the team as a freshman and caught eight passes for 84 yards in starting three games at wide receiver last season before being switched to safety because of a rash of injuries on the defensive side of the ball.

He started the last seven games at safety and led the team in tackles with 51, 30 unassisted, grabbed one interception and had a career-high 13 tackles against Marshall. The former Silver Hawk, who also played quarterback and was a standout in basketball and track at Lake Howell, also returned three punts for 33 yards against Kent State.

Warm temps, hot fishing

Things are really heating up on the east coast of Central Florida. The bait is thick and so are the fish.

Reports of large gator trout are being talked about by many fishermen. These large trout are in the spawning season and can be very aggressive. The two hot baits seem to be a top water plug such as a Skitterwalk, Poppa Dog, Chug Bug or a Zara Spook and the other hot bait is a soft jerk bait such as the Rip Tide Flats Chub rigged on a Daiichi Bleeding Bait offset 3/0 hook.

You need to go early for these big trout because they feed best under low light conditions. Don't think however you can't catch quality trout in the middle of the day. My largest trout came last Memorial Day toward the end of a charter.

It was around 1 p.m. and we were just about to call it a day when I spotted the trout. My client was standing beside me talking and I asked for the rod. I make a cast with a Rip Tide 3 inch mullet and this trout nailed it. After a 12-minute fight I landed a 31-1/2 inch 10 pound trout.

Don't hesitate to throw top water baits in the middle of the day. You never know when that big female might be lurking for an easy meal.

Speaking of hot, the redfish have been chewing like crazy. The big fish are in large schools of 200 plus fish and will eat baits that are presented

properly. We were able to snag a couple on top water last week and that in itself is an awesome sight. The mouth of a redfish is on the bottom so they have to lift their head to eat a top water bait. When you see a 20 plus pound fish come out of the water it is awesome.

Cut bait and live bait have also worked well. The Rip Tide Realistic Crab rigged on a 3/8 ounce Rip Tide Pro Jig Head works well also. Just look for bait being crashed or large pods of mullet to find these fish. Big reds hang out in deeper water, usually 3-5 feet, and will tail and fin. The tails are huge and are very hard to miss.

Also look for tarpon cruising the flats. We jumped a 15-pound fish last week. This fish crushed a Chug Bug. Tarpon can be very spooky on the flats, but if you approach them properly they will eat. Cut mullet or live mullet will catch their attention. Just remember to bow when you hook one or it will be goodbye Mr. Tarpon.

Whatever you decide to chase, get out and fish.

SO YOU THINK YOU KNOW EVERYTHING? TEST YOUR KNOWLEDGE WITH BOATU.S. ONLINE BOATING COURSE

A lot of boaters have years of practical experience spent on the water. But are you sure you know everything there is about staying safe while boating?

In conjunction with National Safe Boating Week through next Friday (May 27), the BoatU.S. Foundation for Boating Safety and Clean Water challenges all boaters to test their boating knowledge with a free, online safety course at <http://www.boatus.org/onlinecourse>.

The course covers a broad range of topics for both power and sailboaters. Accepted by many states as a certified boating safety course, completion can also bring possible insurance discounts.

"The best part of this course is that it's free and can be done any time of the day or night," said BoatU.S. Foundation Boating Safety Director Chris Edmonston. "While it's great for less-experienced boaters, we get feedback from older salts who tell us they have benefited from it as well. They thank us for learning something new or reminding them of something they learned long ago. This is a great way for all boaters to start fresh for the season."

The course is recognized by the U.S. Coast Guard and the National Association of State Boating Law Administrators and is based on 60 multiple choice questions. Designed as a teaching tool, background material on question topics are available throughout the exam and corrections and explanations are given when a question is answered incorrectly. Any unfamiliar topics can be reviewed with a "study topics" button.

Those with 80% or more correct answers are given a certificate of completion. The course can also be started and stopped at

anytime - you don't need to complete it all at once.

The BoatU.S. Foundation for Boating Safety and Clean Water is a national 501(c)(3) nonprofit education and research organization primarily funded by the voluntary contributions of 590,000 members of BoatU.S. The Foundation operates more than a dozen programs including a low-cost EPIRB rental program, the "Help Stop the Drops" national clean fueling campaign, a free kid's Life Jacket Loaner program, and has awarded hundreds of thousands of dollars in grants for nonprofit groups for boating safety and environmental projects.

FWC PUSHES THREE MAIN MESSAGES FOR BOAT-SAFETY CAMPAIGN

In honor of National Safe Boating Week, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) is also getting out the word by keying in on three core messages as its Division of Law Enforcement gears up for a busy summer boating season: stay alert, wear your life jacket and don't drink and operate a boat.

The agency says keeping these messages in mind can dramatically decrease your chances of getting into an accident and increase your chances of survival if you do.

"In 2003, Florida led the nation in boating deaths with 64, and last year we had 68. We hope to reverse that trend by alerting boaters to the biggest dangers," said Capt. Richard Moore, Florida's boating law administrator.

Moore said the agency honed in on the three safety messages after analyzing Florida's boat accident data.

Collisions with vessels or fixed objects are the two leading types of accidents. Last year, they accounted for nearly half of the

mishaps on Florida's waterways. Moore said this reflects the importance of staying alert to everything going on around you.

"One of the biggest misconceptions about boating accidents is that they are caused by extremely reckless behavior, but when you look at the numbers you see that it comes down to people not paying attention or making one careless move," Moore said. "We want people to go out and have fun, but also to understand the minute they lose focus something could happen."

Moore said alcohol and not wearing a life jacket are the two major contributors to fatal accidents. In 2004, alcohol use was the primary cause of 21 percent of boating deaths. Almost one-third of the fatal accidents were classified as "falls overboard," and drowning was the cause of death in 65 percent of those fatalities.

"We don't know the exact number of people who would have survived these accidents had they been wearing a life jacket, but there is no doubt that most might still be alive today if they had worn a life jacket," Moore said.

Starting this weekend, the FWC will flood Lee County with the three key messages to test out a new boat safety campaign. The \$250,000 pilot program will target boaters with television, print and radio advertisements, billboards, point-of-sale displays and handouts from law enforcement officers, the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary and the U.S. Power Squadrons. The agency is conducting pre- and post-campaign surveys to evaluate the campaign's effectiveness. If the pilot program is successful, the FWC will roll out the campaign to other target areas with high boating-accident numbers.

Scott Dalton then pushed a bunt back towards the mound, but Boone hurler Austin Hudson also made a wide throw to third, leaving the bases full with no one out.

Bevis then helped his own cause with a single to center to plate Bisgounis and Randy Fontanez followed with a grounder to short that was misplayed, allowing Prano and Dalton to score and close the deficit to 4-3.

But Oviedo would get no closer as Sean Roberts' grounder forced courtesy runner Brett Bevis to third and Derek Lopez's shot toward right was snaggged by the

Braves second baseman and he doubled Fontanez off second to end the inning.

It appeared the game had settled down as Bevis went out and struck out the side, around a two-out walk, and Hudson got a pair of ground outs and a strike out in the bottom of the second.

But any hopes of a battle to the end or another Lions rally disappeared in the top of the third inning.

Mathews led off with a single and, after a fly out, three more Boone batters got hits, chasing Bevis.
