WASHINGTON, June 4.—(AP)—General George C. Marshall said today the President should have the wartime power to call up the National Guard because there is "a variety of minor movements that could easily grow to more serious proportions."

The Army Chief of Staff told the House Military Committee there were dangers that might be met specifically with regard to the Panama Canal.

With regard to possible use of the National Guard he said the War Department is thinking probably of the Western hemisphere. He proposed authority for commanding the Guard, which would include the power for the Guard to march outside the United States. When asked whether evidence of international trouble would command the President to call up the Guard, he said:

"The Secretary of state has informed me he would "heartily" support a resolution declar-

ing that the United States would not interfere in any way with the internal security of countries in the western hemisphere from one non-American nation to another."

The proposed resolution he said is based squarely upon an understanding that it will respect to established boundaries.

### Fern Park Issue To Be Decided At Meet Tonight

### Board To Decide Ac- tion After Hearing From Both Groups

Fern Park residents who are

opposed to the plat of Casselberry approved recently by the Board of County Commissioners appeared before the Commission at its regular meeting in the Court House today to again demand that the Board take steps to rescind its action as applied to the section of Fern Park which is included in the Casselberry plat, and while no action was taken at this morning's meeting the Commissioners called a special meeting for tonight at 8 o'clock at which time both sides will be heard in connection with the controversial issue.

The issue first came to life in the latter part of April when Hubbard Casselberry, a fern grower of the section, appeared before the board with a plat embracing most of the section and a petition which he said was signed by the majority of those who would be affected. The Commissioners approved this resolution pending a legal investigation by the County Attorney E. P. Housholder.

Speaking at this morning's meeting of the County Board the spokesman for the section charged that the board had the right to do what it did.

Mr. Casselberry tried to show the name of the new addition, the section being known as the Casselberry.

After a discussion of the matter Mr. Housholder, who is a member of the Casselberry section, said:

"Casselberry is a good name, but we have to consider the rights of others in the section thereby making Casselberry a platted subdivision of Fern Park."

The Commissioners intimated that something along this line may be worked out in connection with the meeting tonight.
