WASHINGTON, June 4.—

General George C. Marshall said today the President should have the power to call up the National Guard because there is a variety of minor improvements that could easily grow to more serious proportions.

The Army Chief of Staff told the House Military Committee there were dangers that might be serious specifically with reference to the Panama Canal.

With regard to possible use of the National Guard he said the War Department is thinking of the Western Hemisphere.

He proposed authority would include the power for the President to send troops outside the continental United States.

When the committee evidenced interest in the subject, Marshall said he would be glad to discuss it.

Secretary of State Cordell Hull said he would "heartily" support a resolution declaring that the United States would not tolerate any interference with the Panama Canal.

The proposed resolution would be introduced by Representative Charles McNary, Democrat, Oregon.

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Science Is Creating More Jobs Than Lawton In Address

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Bondholders Lose Another Round In Fight

Circuit Court Of Appeals Upholds
Validity Of Amendment
Invoked By Sanford

The City of Sanford won another round in its fight with the holders of its old bonds, City Attorney Fred R. Wilson said today, when the Circuit Court of Appeals concurred in a decision of the district court and upheld the validity of the Pepper Amendment.

The amendment, which was passed by the City Council in 1935, provides that the City may issue bonds for the purpose of refunding its existing bonds.

In his decision, Judge J. W. Pepper said that the amendment was valid and that the City was entitled to issue new bonds to refund its old ones.

The decision is a victory for the City and its bondholders, who had been fighting the amendment for some time.

The attack on Paris was the first since the German occupation of the city in 1940. It was a surprise attack and the city was not prepared for it.

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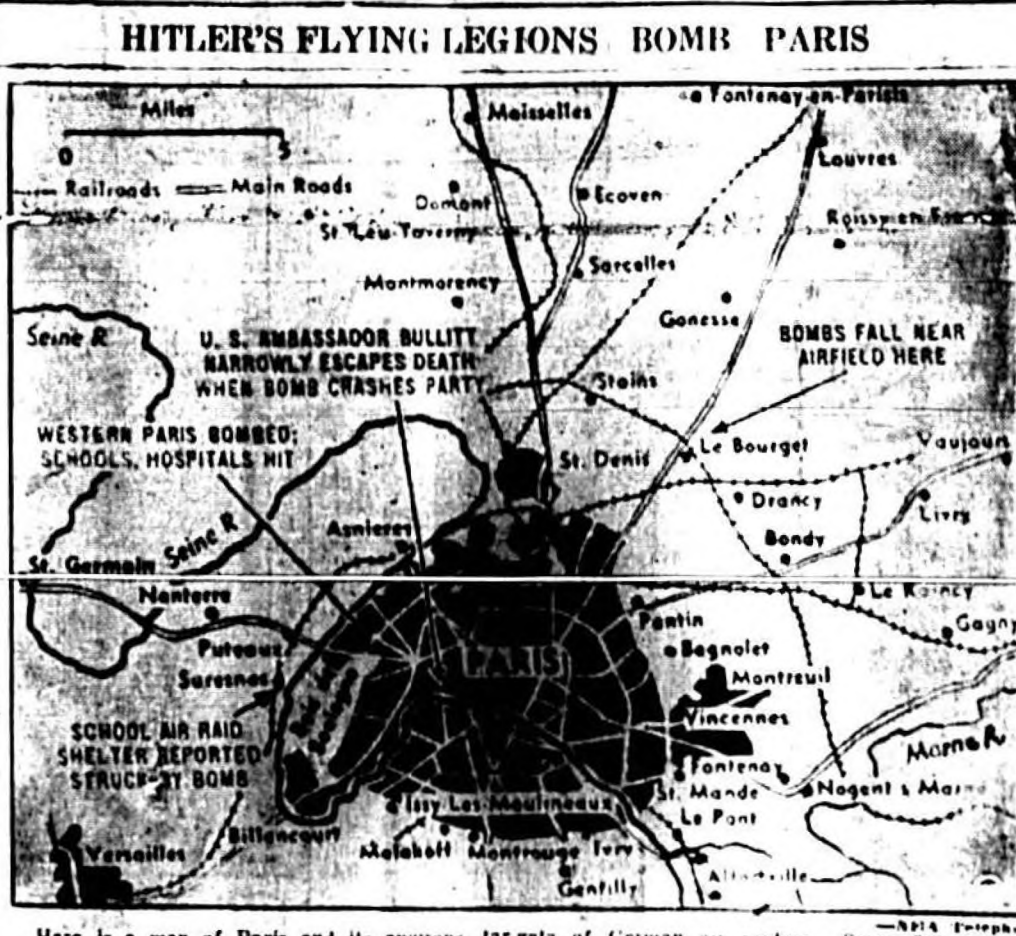

Officer Tells Of Allied Stand In Flanders Battle

Armies Fought Well Against Armored Tanks And Planes

LONDON, June 4.—(AP)—A Belgian staff officer said today his nation has "a quarter million men" training in France and hopes to have 500,000 troops in the field by fall to replace those surrendered by King Leopold III.

A major of Belgian grenadiers told how Belgian officers, non-coms and privates knelt on the beach every beach at Le Panne, near Dunkerque and begged to be taken off to "fight again for Belgium's honor."

"They had fought a good fight," he said. "They had been without food, without ammunition, without sleep for nearly two weeks. They had seen their comrades die and their world collapse. They still wanted to fight."

He told of conditions which he said were "beyond description" in King Leopold's surrender.

The German hit us hard and rolled us back from the beach," he related. "We had no food, no ammunition, no sleep. We were in a desperate situation."

On June 4, 1940, the German army had captured the city of Dunkerque and the Belgian army was in a desperate situation.

PARIS, June 4.—(AP)—The war ministry announced today the latest figures in yesterday's raid on Paris had reached 306 victims, including 254 dead and 52 injured.

The war ministry also announced that the number of wounded had reached 149.

Canada may be used as a base for the British empire's fight against Germany—in event of a Nazi conquest of England—it was indicated today by Prime Minister Churchill who told the Commons:

"We shall never surrender."

"And even if this island or even a part of it is submerged and starving, then our empire across the seas, armed and guarded by the British fleet, will carry on the struggle until in God's good time the new world in all its strength and might sets forth to the rescue and liberation of the old."

Churchill would be the last point to conflict among the empire's dominions and colonies.

Churchill told the cheering Commons that a fleet of 1,000 Allied ships had rescued 335,000 French and British soldiers in the great retreat from Flanders.

Even as Churchill spoke, German columns were reported by the Nazis high command to have continued on Paris.
