




City unveils tool to curb prostitution, drugs

SANFORD - City commissioners approved a first reading of an ordinance that will give officers a new tool to fight prostitution and drug dealing in problem areas of the city.

The ordinance would create an exclusionary zone that would bar repeat offenders from returning to the neighborhoods where there is a "significantly higher incidence of criminal conduct

SANFORD -Seminole County school board and government are one step closer to realizing plans for the abandoned University of Florida agricultural test site on Celery Avenue.

About three years ago, county officials started trying to wrestle the 63-acre site, located north and south of Celery Avenue

between Brisson and Sipes avenues, away from the state to quell drainage issues in the Midway community. Seminole County unveiled a conceptual plan Tuesday that would not only work in solving drainage in the 275-acre basin, but also provide land for a new elementary school for

the growing area. Sanford agricultural test center sometime in the 1970s. It was used to test new types of pesticides, different strains of celery and other agricultural needs. The state is ready to hand the land over to Seminole County, but sevroadblocks have remained over the years, said Thomas Radzai, senior engineer in the county's road operations and stormwater

division. He said the university and Department Environmental Protection (DEP) have each been balking at which entity should clean up the site. The site is reportedly contaminated with arsenic left over from

pesticide testing.

"Even the levels that are there don't impose an immediate health hazard," Radzai

Several buildings also remain on the property, which are estimated to cost between \$200,000 \$300,000 to demolish.

"Once they've been off the site it's hard to get them back out there," said Mark Flomerfelt, road operations and stormwater division manager, referring to the university.

After three years in negotiations, the county may be inching closer to leasing the Celery Avenue land from the state as they recently picked up a new partner in the endeavor.

Iraqi Diary: Mission accomplished | Commuter rail to be onto Route

Editor's note: Staff Sgt. Charlie C. Carlson III, son of Sanford historian Charlie C. Carlson II, is deployed in Baghdad as part of the 549th Military Police Company. He is providing the Herald with a journal of his experiences.

29 Jan. 2004 We accomplished our long range convoy escort mission down south and are safely back at Camp Marlboro.

Our mission began at 0600 with preparing our vehicles, and we pulled out of Camp Marlboro at 0730 with me and my scout trucks [humvees] in the lead ten minutes ahead of the main escort element. We were headed for CSC Scania. CSC stands for Convoy Support Center, where we were to link up with the convoy of new replacements coming up from Kuwait. CSCs are spaced out along the main supply route from Kuwait to Baghdad, they serve as safe havens en route for convoys and a place for rest and repairs.

We moved out

south from Baghdad, but only after getting into a traffic jam on Route Predators. From there we proceeded southward until we hit Route Jackson. On a civilian map "Route Predator" is

Highway 5 and "Jackson" is Highway 8 and Highway 1 is "Route Tampa." We got into some very heavy fog on Route Jackson and the temperature was getting colder by the minute. The fog was so thick that we could not have seen the enemy if he was sitting on

the hood of our vehicle.

Finally the sun peeked out

of the clouds and we turned



Focus of public meeting is feasibility of using St. Johns River as water supply

The public is invited to a meeting to hear the results of the St. Johns River Water Management Districtís St. Johns River Water Supply Project. The meeting is Wednesday, Feb. 11, from 5 to 8 p.m. in the Seminole County Commission Chambers, 1101 E. First St., Sanford.

"The District is concluding a threeyear study to determine the feasibility of using the St. Johns River as a potential water supply source to help meet future needs in east-central Florida," said Alfred Canepa, assistant director of the District's Department of Resource Management. "The results of the study are very encouraging. It is feasible to use the river as a source of supply, there are places that lend themselves to siting one or more treatment plants, and it can be done with only moderate impacts to rates paid by utility customers.'

District staff members and consultants will provide information and answer questions about treatability, plant siting, demand and affordability.

The District's Governing Board adopted a water supply plan in April 2000. The plan addresses current and future water needs through the year 2020. The plan identifies traditional and alternative water source options to meet future water needs. One of the alternative sources identified in the plan is the St. Johns River.

"The District's role is to identify and investigate the feasibility of water source options," Canepa said. "Local governments and water supply utilities ultimately make the decisions as to which options to pursue. The results of this study will help them make more informed decisions concerning the St. Johns River."



Donations lacking at Seminole County Salvation Army

SANFORD - The Seminole County division of the Salvation Army says it is seeing a decline in donations since the announcement in January that the international organization received a \$1.5 billion grant from a well-known philanthropist.

The donation, made by the estate of Joan Kroc, wife of McDonald's founder Ray Kroc, is designated for the construction and operation of Ray and Joan Kroc Community Centers across the country. The community centers would be similar to the facility constructed in

ter provides educational and cultural programs for children and families.

"The donation is great, but the need to reach out in Seminole County still continues," said Capt. Robert Reckline, corps officer of the Seminole County division of the Salvation Army. "The \$1.5 billion is a restricted donation and does not help with day-to-day operations."

Reckline said he has seen a decline in the amount of donations by Seminole County residents since news of the Kroc estate's donation, which is the single largest to ever be given to a charitable organization.

Reckline said about 12 donations were received in the mail in the past two weeks.

"This time a year ago we probably received about 25 a week," he said,

The Seminole County Salvation Army helped 4,546 people in 2003 with services such as food, prescriptions and after-school programs for children. During the holiday season, the organization provided 1,200 people with clothes, toys and food.

"The donor's help is what makes it possible," Reckline said.

Reckline said Salvation Army is planning to send mailings explaining the situation and urging

people to donate. He says he hopes that more information about the grant will help inform people how it is being used.

"We've been in this county since 1933," Reckline said. "The Salvation Army has

Noted Swedish descendent dies

Raymond E. Lundquist, Sr., 88, the oldest living descendent of Swedish immigrants who worked for Gen. Henry Sanford in the 1870s, died Friday, Feb. 6, 2004.

Lundquist was born in Sanford on May 18, 1915, and grew up in Upsala, near Sanford. He raised his two younger sisters in the Swedish community following his parents' death. Upon graduation from Seminole High School, he joined the Army.

He met his wife, Aria Jane, at the dog track, through mutual friends. It was love-atfirst-sight for the couple, and

The couple enjoyed 64 years of wedded happiness. After returning from his military duty in Japan, at the end of World War II, the couple started a laundry business at the Mayfair Country Club. Lundquist was the golf professional while Aria Jane ran the laundry. The couple lived at the country club during that

Lundquist was an avid golfer and continued to give lessons for many years. Shortly after the city acquired ownership of the course, Lundquist left to pursue a business in real estate with former Sanford mayor Robert A. Williams.



Located for easy access at 2102 French Ave., the Ice Cream Depot offers an affordable assortment of traditional hand-dipped ice cream, as well as vanilla and chocolate soft serve. The store also includes novelty items on their menu, such as slushes, floats, frozen yogurt, handmade ice cream bars, sundaes and sugar free soft serve.

Ice Cream Depot's signature 'Tornado' is a favorite, and is made of soft serve ice cream swirled with the customer's choice of candies. A chocolate chip cookie ice cream sandwich, and customizable ice cream cakes for special occasions are also must-try treats.

Four million box decrease

made to orange crop estimate

The U.S. Department of Agriculture decreased its orange crop forecast for the 2003-2004 season by another 4 million boxes, to 246 million boxes. This is the second reduction since the October record estimate of 252 million boxes.

While Valencias remain the same at 118 million boxes, Early and Midseason varieties were reduced from 132 million boxes to 128 million boxes. The Navel portion of the Early-Mid estimate was reduced 500,000 boxes to 4.3 million. According

to officials, the monthly row count survey indicated a smaller crop than previously predict-

The grapefruit estimate remains the same at 40 million boxes; 16 million white and 24 million colored.

The Specialty fruit estimate was reduced by 800,000 boxes, from 6.7 million to 5.9 million boxes, with the early varieties covering the decrease from 4.4 million to 3.6 million boxes. Honey's remain at 2.3 million; Temples remain at 1.4 million boxes; and Tangelos remain at 1.3 million boxes.

The yield for frozen concentrated orange juice (FCOJ) was unchanged at 1.53 gallons per 90-pound box of oranges.

The Florida citrus industry has a \$9.1 billion economic impact to the state and employs nearly 90,000 people, directly and indirectly. Florida Citrus Mutual, founded in 1948, is the state's largest citrus grower's organization with more than 11,500 members.





bombs and mines]. After passing them I got to thinking about the fact that we were ahead of them and they had not swept that far south yet. As the main element behind us passed the British sweepers, SSG McDavid came on the radio and said they were the "New Buffalos." I asked Sgt Bates if he had ever heard of the "old buffalos." I've never heard of a vehicle called a buffalo, except a water buffalo, but that's a water trailer. McDavid always seems to know about military vehicles. We joke that he should write for "JANE'S," that series of reference books about military weapons and

At about 0930 we stopped in the middle of nowhere on the roadside for a 10-minute break. The mechanic ran a quick check on our vehicles while the gunners stretched themselves after being in the turrets for so long.

We remounted and continued our journey and was passed, at a high rate of speed, by two SUVs driven by Australian military contractors.

Soon we came to an Iraqi Police checkpoint and were flagged on through. For a long time the trip was uneventful, then about five miles north of Scania, our destination point, we came upon a bad traffic accident involving an Iraqi bus and one of the Australian SUVs that had passed us a ways back. We pulled up and notified the main element behind us and then got out to assess the situation.

I ran up to the Australian driver while Geiger and Richardson brought up the CLS bags [first aid]. The vehicle was crushed down on the driver's side pinning him tightly in the wreckage. His arm was bleeding profusely so we tried to stop the bleeding. When the main element reached our location, I called up our medic, PFC Hildebrand and he

immediately went to work treating the driver. The driver's name was Dave and he had several deep gashes in his left arm that were pouring out blood, and an open fracture with the bone sticking out and possible internal injuries or at least broken

I climbed into the other side of the vehicle with Sgt. Hunter and tried to get the victim out that way. We had to pry open the door with a crow bar. I had Sgt. Bates call for a medavac chopper and told him to pull his vehicle up past the overpass and block off a landing zone for the chopper. Then we were notified that Camp Scania was sending out two humvee ambulances which arrived in a short time. A colonel [doctor] was with the ambulances and took over the work on Dave. I then assisted the medics in getting him on a backboard

and into the ambulance. I wish "Australian Dave" a speedy recovery and trust that he has learned about driving too fast on an Iraqi highway.

We used our tow bar and pulled the wrecked SUV into Camp Scania. The new replacement unit was there waiting with their convoy to link up with us for escort to Baghdad. Now imagine what these new replacement troops must have thought. We rolled in pulling a wrecked SUV, our windshields are riddled with bullet holes from a year of patrols, and then we climb out of our humvees with our DCU sleeves and flak jackets saturated with blood from the traffic accident. I bet those new guys were thinking "what have we gotten ourselves into?"

They were ready to move out, so we staged with them and were soon back on the

road headed north escorting their convoy to Baghdad. Our return trip was uneventful and the new military police unit was escorted into Camp Muleskinner.

I would like to commend our medic, PFC Hildebrand. His fast action may have saved the traffic accident victim's life. It certainly kept him from going into shock and losing too much blood. I praise all of our medics, from SSG Sutton all the way down to the lowest ranking medic. My soldiers are quick thinkers, too, and they helped the medics. If I ever needed a medic on the battlefield, I would want one from our medical section. PFC Hildebrand was recognized for his actions with a special award from the company commander. That ends our long-range mission, it was completed safely and we made it back to Camp Marlboro.

provide a cheap alternative -- a ride is estimated to cost about \$1 for 12 miles — and another option to a crowded roadways.

"It also improves mobility for people," he said. "There are people out there that can't drive because they don't have a car or they can't physically drive. This is a way to improve mobility in the region."

Commuter rail is different from light rail as it runs less frequently and would run on existing rail lines. Commuter rail is also powered by a diesel engine as light rail is powered by electricity.

Critics have argued that the commuter rail project would have more of an environmental and noise impact on surrounding communities.

Other concerns that remain include persuading CSX Transportation to let the passenger train run on its tracks and figuring out whether if enough people would take advantage of the resource.

"We would love to hear from people that are going to use (the commuter rail) because that's always one of the questions," Cone said.

Another sticking point is the \$155 million price tag. The project is proposed to be funded 50 percent federally and the state and local governments picking up the rest of the tab. For local municipalities and counties to foot a bill that is more than \$30 million in capital costs and additional \$10 million a year in operation and maintenance costs could be asking too much.

"We are working on ways that we can reduce that," Cone said. "We're looking if we can change the service and reduce that cost. For instance, maybe we don't do as frequent service in off-peak times."

Transportation department observes aggressive driving month

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is participating in Aggressive Driving Awareness Month in February, to call attention to dangerous driver behaviors that are becoming increasingly common.

"There are certain environmental conditions that when they are present, any of us can be capable of aggressive driving," said Dr. Patricia Ellison-Potter, Psychologist at the National highway Traffic Safety Administration.

The number of highway traffic miles driven in the United States has increased almost 50 percent since 1987 and with congestion on the rise in Central Florida, commuting life can become very

frustrating. FDOT is encouraging drivers on Interstate 4 and other heavily traveled roads to assess their own behavior to determine if their anger behind the wheel is growing to dangerous levels.

To find out if you are demonstrating frequent or occasional signs of aggressive driving, check this list of behaviors that can hurt people and jam highways:

• Speeding

• Tailgating Making frequent or

Ellison-Potter has concluded, "Drivers these days don't have the same civility toward people they used to. The public does perceive aggressive driving as a serious problem.

FDOT wants to remind drivers that traffic accidents are usually caused by driver behavior and are avoidable, not inevitable.

More than half of the congestion on Central Florida's Interstate 4 is due to slowdowns caused by traffic crashes and disabled vehicles. This "rubbernecking" behavior, considered a symptom of aggressive driving, is doing more to clog our roads than the volume of cars traveling on them, according to traffic analysts.

Although specific accident figures are not immediately in Seminole County, the city of Orlando reported 31 fatalities and 30 crashes on the interstate during this past year in its patrolling area.

FDOT nad awarded an \$85,000 grant to the Orlando Police Department to fund special unmarked police cars and training focused on eliminating aggressive driving on Interstate 4 and the East-West Expressway. The grant was given in August of 2003 and a marked difference in highway congestion has already been noted.

Steve Homan, FDOT director of Public Information for District 5 says, "If people would cut down on their aggressive driving behavior, congestion would be reduced and they would get to where they need to go faster. They think driving aggressively

Through her research Dr. available for Interstate 4 with- will cut down on their commute time when in fact, it has the opposite effect."

Although Homan is an FDOT spokesman, he is also a Lake Mary resident, who drives to and from his office in DeLand every day, and is fully aware of the aggressive drivers on Interstate 4 between the two areas.

"I see them all the time," he said, "and they are, beyond a doubt, a danger to us all."

Researchers say aggressive drivers hop into the anonymity of an automobile and take out their frustrations on fellow travelers. In many cases, these frustrations are due to a lack of planning and a feeling of "always running late" on the part of the driver.

To avoid becoming aggressive, motorists should plan their schedule allotting a larger span than needed to arrive on time. Drivers should concentrate on the roadway, obey the speed limit and traffic signals and choose relaxing

Since aggressive driving often leads to accidents, FDOT wants to remind people to "move it" if they are involved in an incident on the road. Florida law requires a driver to make every reasonable effort to move a damaged or disabled vehicle or have it moved so as not to obstruct the regular flow of

If you see unusual behavior on the roadway, dial *FHP to report aggressive, impaired or unsafe driving. Thanks to funding from FDOT, the Orlando Police Department now has two unmarked cars patrolling Interstate 4 in Orlando, on the lookout for aggressive driving.


It's been a good news, bad news kind of week for a trio of Seminole County's favorite





He concluded his big league career by batting .239 with two home runs and eight RBI for the Expos in 2001.

Everything was rosy for Blake when he signed with Arizona last spring along with former Florida and Dallas Cowboys star Emmitt Smith

But after a tough season and a change of coaches, Blake got caught in an age and salary cap woes, which are becoming a yearly thing in the NFL.

New Arizona Head Coach Denny Green announced the termination of the final two years of Blake's three-year contract.

"Josh McCown is our starting quarterback," Green asserted, "so we felt it is in Jeff's best interests to release him now to give him the opportunity to catch on with another team.

"We've looked carefully at our quarterback situation and we feel Josh is going to be an outstanding quarterback. The fans deserve to know who the starting quarterback is. I don't think we need to have a contest to see that Josh McCown is going to be the starting QB of this team.

"In year three, he is ready to step in and be the starter. He has a lot of outstanding tools to do well in the NFL. He has a quick release, he has the size, the height, he has the speed, he has the athletic ability and he has the gunslinger mentality that says that he really wants to do well. I think it is good for the football team to establish that as we make this new approach to the Cardinals that along with that we are decisive in who they are looking to lead the football team

on offense."

Blake, 33, a 12-year veteran, leaves the Cardinals after posting a 3-10 record as a starter last season in his only campaign with the team. In the 13 contests, he completed 208 of 367 passes (.567) for 2,247 yards and 13 touchdowns with 15 interceptions. He also gained 177 yards rushing on 30 attempts with two touchdowns.

Blake leaves Arizona with career statistics that include 1,805 pass completions in 3,195 attempts (.565) for 21,529 yards and 132 touchdowns with 95 interceptions, plus 414 rushes for 2,022 yards and 14 touchdowns.

yards and 14 touchdowns.

Before joining the Cardinals last season, Blake played for the N.Y. Jets (1992-93), Cincinnati Bengals (1994-99), New Orleans Saints (2000-01), and Baltimore Ravens (2002).

"It isn't about Jeff, it is about Josh," said Green of the move. "It is about Josh being in his third year and being ready to be the starting QB, I think that when you draft a player you expect that player to play. Some play the first year, some play the second year and they better start to play by the third year. You look at the Carolina game where the Cardinals had a chance to win that game, McCown did everything he could to help that team win that ball game."

"Jeff was solid as a starter. He came here to be a starter. It would not be in Jeff's best interest to change his role. Every player has to know his role, accept his role and be the best at his role. Jeff can become a free agent and he has a whole month to find the right situation, whether that is as a starter or a backup somewhere. He now has time to do that and that is important."



Bravo Company returns after 404-day deployment



Daughter charged in murder of father

Altamonte Springs police have arrested two persons in connection with the murder Tuesday, of Steve Schuloff in his apartment at 630 Cranes Way in Altamonte Springs.

Officers were called to the apartment when Schuloff's girlfriend reported she was unable to locate him, and that there was suspicious activities at the apartment when she tried to contact him.

When officers were able to gain entry into the apartment, they reported finding a large amount of blood on the mattress and a black baseball bat lying on the mattress near Schuloff's body. He reportedly had been wrapped in a blanket and a green plastic storage container. It was determined that Schuloff's daughter, 16-yearold Courtney Christine Schuloff, who lived with her father, and her boyfriend, Michael Lawrence Moran, 20, of Orlando, may have been

Moran was located a short time later, near the Altamonte Mall, with blood stains on his clothing. He was taken into custody, and officers said he was in possession of Schuloff's wallet, car keys and cell phone.

Courtney later arrived at the Altamonte Springs police station with her mother. She reportedly told officers that on Sunday, Feb. 8, her father had beaten her at her residence. She said she met with Moran at the Altamonte Mall later and told him about the beating. She said
