Tourist Mail Problem

Postmaster Joel S. Field calls attention to the fact that most of the highways across the country will soon be full of vacationers going in all directions. He reminds folks also that the mails will soon be filled with all kinds of messages to folks and friends who were left behind.

There will be matter-of-fact reports done in conventional style. There will be ungrammatical but effective postal cards, beautiful and expensive picture cards, and tags to which souvenirs and gadgets are affixed. There will be various rates of postage, various types of messages, and varying degrees of success in the communications effort.

It can be taken for granted that some of the cards will be improperly addressed, some will carry inadequate postage, and some will be devoid of both postage and address. Experience indicates that this will happen thousands of times—sometimes when the message doesn't seem to matter much and the attachment is of small intricate worth, sometimes when both the message and the attachments are obviously of considerable importance.

The most persistently troublesome tourist item for Postmaster Field and his associates is the postcard with an attachment but without sufficient postage. Occasionally, the matter will not "know" that his attachment gives the card first class status; sometimes the printer will complicate the situation by indicating that a 2c stamp is sufficient. The printer was right before some other merchant advised to the card a printed advertisement, a national park, or a bag of ore or a specimen of sacred soil, or some other geographically representative gadget.

Postmaster Field says that the rule for avoiding trouble with tourists' mail is simple. If post cards with attachments contain a handwritten or typewritten message, they require postage at the first class letter rate of 3c per ounce. If they do not contain a typewritten or handwritten message, they require the third-class postage rate of 2c for the first two ounces and 1c for each additional ounce or fraction of an ounce.

When insufficient postage is used more happens than the delay of the item in question. A lot of people get their feelings hurt. And all who are offended feel forces eventually in getting mad at the postal service.

State's Reputation For Citrus Known In Foreign Markets

LAKELAND—Florida's reputation for quality citrus and citrus products has now been established in Europe and Scandinavia, and "we are moving steadily toward making them permanent and lucrative markets for Florida citrus," two foreign merchandising experts of the Florida Citrus Commission said today.

Irene A. Nelson, Commission regional manager in Stockholm, Sweden, and Alfred LaRoque, regional manager in Frankfurt-Am-Main, Germany, voiced this opinion after a two-day journey halfway around the world. It is the first time the two have returned to Florida after being assigned their foreign posts more than two years ago.

"We've made tremendous progress in creating foreign markets for Florida citrus products during the past two years," Nelson said, "but after starting from scratch, we still have a long way to go."

He said that as a result of the Commission's work in Scandinavia, the drinking of citrus juices has become a national habit in those countries. Prior to the start of the program, the word "juice" was not even in the Swedish vocabulary.

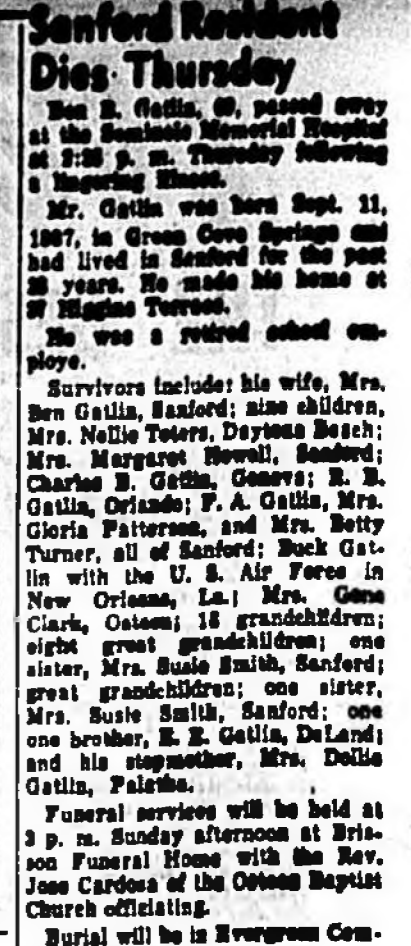
Scouts Proclaim Saturday Thanks To Lake Mary Day

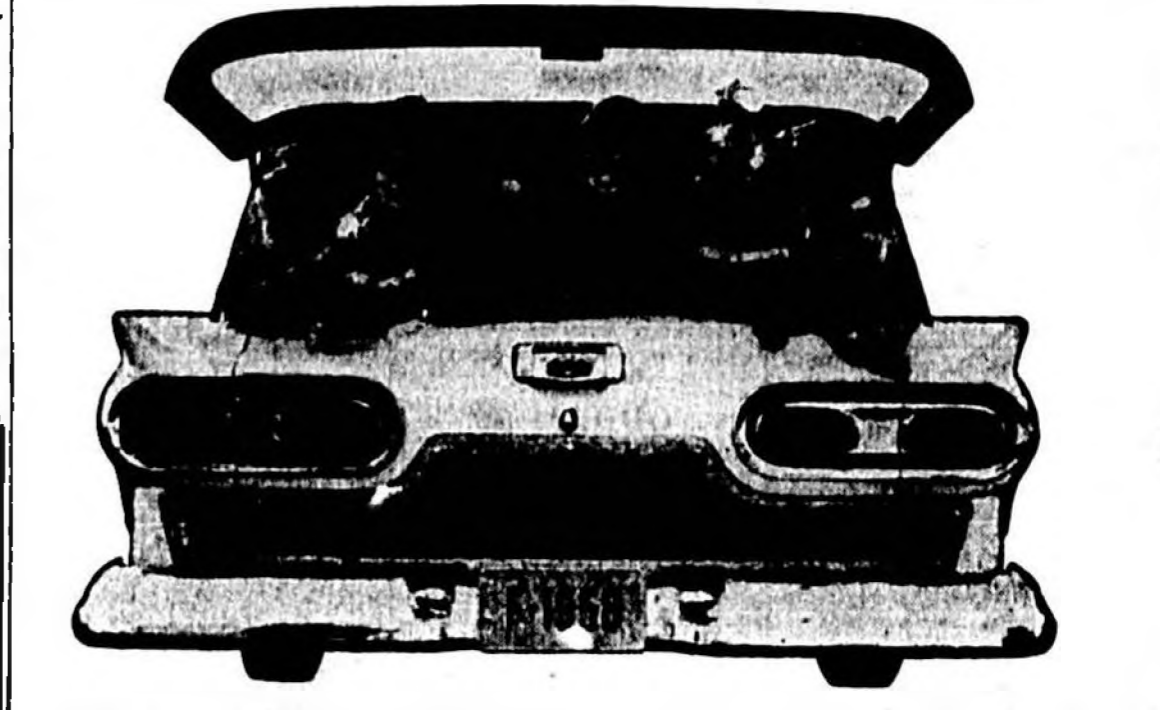

State Traffic Decline Revealed

TALLHASSEE (UPI)—Traffic declined on nearly every major Florida highway in April as compared to the same month of 1937, state Road Department records show.

The biggest drops came on U. S. Highway 19, north of Monticello, where traffic volume fell off 28.4 per cent, and State Road A-1-A north of Florida Beach where volume declined 31.1 per cent.

Other declines, noted by the electrical recorders, included State Road 635 south of Winter Haven, off 13.5 per cent, U. S. 17 north of Yulee, down 19.2 per cent, U. S. 120 at the Florida-Georgia line north of Jasper, down 10.4 per cent, U. S. 98, west of Panama City off 11 per cent, State Road 88 north of DeFuniak Springs, off 11.3 per cent, State Road A-1-A on the MacArthur Causeway, down 10.3 per cent, and U. S. 17 south of Orange City, down 10.8 per cent.

Individual Freedom Important In Diversifying Education

The individual's freedom in Sanford, Seminole County, in Florida and in America is to be able to say "I dare to be different," "I dare to be better," "I dare to lead."

That is the freedom which through the brilliant history of our country, has made it great—the freedom which has created so many leaders in all of the phases of our daily life.

So it stands to reason that nothing is so destructive to free government as regimentation. Enforced conformity of any kind, and particularly in the public schools, is a powerful factor working toward the destruction of American institutions.

If our children are forced to conform to a single educational system, with no differing orientations in accordance with differing practices and ideologies, we shall develop a mass common-denominator type of citizen, lacking the variations that are necessary to bring forth or to maintain a rich culture.

If we develop a standardized mind through uniform education; a common type of thinking through standardized government propaganda, mass circulation magazines and blanket radio and television coverage; a common dependence upon governmental assistance of all kinds, including conformity to standardized provisions for retirement, and maintenance in case of accident or disaster, we shall become a standardized herd of humanity—easy prey for manipulators and would-be dictators.

One of the safeguards against this powerful tendency is variety in education. The greater the number of private schools with differing emphases and ideologies and under a variety of sponsorships, religious and otherwise, the more likely we are to maintain our pronounced individuality and

to preserve our initiative and self-reliance. Schools conducted by Lutherans, Episcopalians, Methodists, Quakers and Catholics will all be different. Let parents have the right of choosing the kind of schools they want their children to attend. We will then be sure of continued differentiation in taste, cultural emphasis, methods of teaching self control and achieving individual character.

If we are to have public schools, let them be under local management insofar as possible. Until recent times, a local School Board controlled each school. There was no mass conformity to some overall pattern laid down in the State Capital or in Washington. Individuality flourished. The schools of that time were, in many respects, like private schools. They lacked the standardization which has come during recent decades.

Our Constitution does not authorize the Federal Government to exercise any function in connection with education except for defense. There should be no usurpation of power by Washington at this or any other point. Let the states be careful not to standardize their own school systems.

Let each school board exercise a large measure of control over what shall be taught, what books shall be used, and what kind of teachers shall be employed. In that manner many of the advantages of private schools can be retained in a public school system, and the evils of standardization avoided.

Civilization cannot be developed or maintained on a basis of uniform human beings. That type of society lends itself readily to manipulation and in times of crisis will almost certainly fall prey to the dictator.

Individuality and diversification are essential if we are to remain free.

Good Time In History For Youth

The vigorous multitudes of the young are on the march again, this troubled summer of 1968. From thousands of high schools and colleges they are going forth, robed in the gowns of scholarship, touched at this moment by the finger of destiny.

For many the moment has already passed; for others, it will come before the month is out. And by mid-summer, unless this year's harvest of youth differs greatly from those of the past, most of them will have forgotten that gentle touch of destiny. They will

be caught up, as virtually all of us are, in the business of striving to hack a way through the jungle of life.

"Touched at this moment by the finger of destiny" should not be scorned as a bit of highfalutin prose, signifying nothing. Nor should "striving to hack a way through the jungle of life" be dismissed as cynicism inappropriate to an occasion that is properly marked by hope. The fact is that graduates are thus touched, and the honest other side of the coin is that they will indeed find life a struggle.

If they do not find it so, they will be the first generation in all man's history to enjoy a life of surcease from pain and conflict. These have always been a part of the human condition. Probably they always will be.

Yet the challenge, and the finger of destiny, are there. Though we of this time are sorely beset by hazards and problems, this era is one whose potential for good has never been equaled. This is a good time in history for young men and young women. It is not a good time to cringe and blubber for security. But it is a good time for the display of courage, daring, willingness to try new remedies for ancient diseases.

Those have always been the qualities of youth. May this new generation have them in abundance, and use them well to advance the great dreams of mankind!

Last Week's Good And Bad News

The week's good and bad news on the international balance sheet:

France, facing political chaos, called Gen. Charles de Gaulle back to his leadership as premier this week.

A reluctant Parliament gave the wartime leader of Free France nearly dictatorial power to rule by decree for six months.

During that time, with Parliament in recess, De Gaulle will try to end the rebellion in Algeria, strengthen the shaky governmental financial situation and restore France's prestige as a world power.

Above all, he will draft and submit to a national referendum a stronger government and make it impossible for squabbling politicians to upset cabinet after cabinet as they have done for 15 years.

To the bitter chagrin of the extremists, De Gaulle appointed an all-star cabinet comprising left-wing, middle-of-the-road and moderate right-wing leaders.

De Gaulle then flew off to Algeria where a revolt by professional army men and extremists against any attempt to end the nationalist rebellion by compromise led to a threat of civil war and to De Gaulle's recall.

Already angry over De Gaulle's choice of a cabinet of moderates, the extremists were shocked when he announced that Algeria's nine million Moslems would have equal rights with the one million French colonists in future voting as part of France itself.

De Gaulle's situation at the moment was that French Communists may start trouble, that the right-wing extremists and army men whose revolt led to his call to office are bitter over his moderation, that all Algerian rebels still demand complete independence and that foreign governments are anxiously waiting for pronouncement to his foreign policy.

The French crisis completely overshadowed other foreign news. But there were two important developments in the cold war.

First, Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev agreed to President Eisenhower's proposal that experts representing the Western allies and the Soviet bloc of Communist-ruled countries start technical talks on the possibility of ending nuclear weapons tests through a control agreement which would prevent cheating.

Secondly, Khrushchev in another letter to Eisenhower proposed an immense expansion of Russia-American trade and asked for credits to finance Russian purchases. Khrushchev said that if the United States desired, trade between the two countries could reach a volume of several billion dollars within a few years.

The State Department announced the indefinite postponement of the departure of Dr. Milton Eisenhower, the President's brother, on a fact-finding tour of six Central American countries in his behalf.

The State Department said the postponement was due to delay in arranging mutually satisfactory dates for Dr. Eisenhower's visit to the countries concerned.

Actually, it appeared to be the result of the anti-American riots during Vice President Richard M. Nixon's recent "good will" tour of Latin America. Dr. Eisenhower probably will leave in July, when the riots against Nixon, who led the riots against Nixon, will be home on summer vacation.

SENTENCED TO CHAIR
MIAMI (UPI)—Norman J. Mackiewicz, who helped mastermind a spectacular escape from Dade County's skyscraper jail in March, was sentenced to the electric chair Tuesday for the murder of a policeman. Mackiewicz, formerly of New Britain, Conn., was convicted March 24 of fatally shooting Bal Harbour Police Lt. Robert Stach when the officer found him prowling near a swank hotel.

Concern Over U. S.-Latin American Relations Up

 WASHINGTON (UPI)—U.S. concern over relations with Latin America has steadily mounted, rather than abated, in the wake of Vice President Richard M. Nixon's violence-marred tour of South American republics.

President Eisenhower, Nixon and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles already have restated this country's friendship toward its southern neighbors and emphasized that the stoning of Nixon in Venezuela would not disrupt that friendship.

But officials and members of Congress alike feel that more must be done—that the traditional fraternity of the Americas republics must be given new meaning, new depth and a more demonstrable utility to the masses of the people in all countries.

One definite outgrowth of Nixon's tour is a growing conviction that Communist agents have been more effective in penetration of Latin America than had been apparent and must be more closely watched.

Including the Communist angle, three camps of opinion concern inter-American relations seem likely to emerge here.

One will contend that the problems revealed by Nixon's misadventures are primarily in the diplomatic field. Observers and officials in this camp think that U.S. policies toward Latin America are already altruistic and reasonably generous.

They believe that improvement of inter-American relations will be chiefly in the field of "implementation" of existing policies and programs with only a moderate increase in U. S. expenditures for assistance. Continuity, rather than change of policies, is considered to be the best course by this group. The belief of some that the Nixon tour was faulty in its basic concept, representing a political rather than diplomatic approach to Latin America. In some circles it is felt that the Nixon gesture to South America should have been concentrated exclusively upon participation in the inaugural ceremonies for President Arturo Frondizi of Argentina, which marked the restoration of constitutional representative government.

A second camp believes U.S. financial aid to Latin America has not kept pace with assistance given to other nations and that Latin Americans resent this.

Their view is that the numerous conferences and Pan American declarations have created a misapprehension in the popular mind of many countries that the Organization of American States and its auxiliary agencies have much greater authority and economic resources than is actually the case.

As a result, they think, the common people have expected more direct and obvious economic benefits from the inter-American system than have been physically possible.

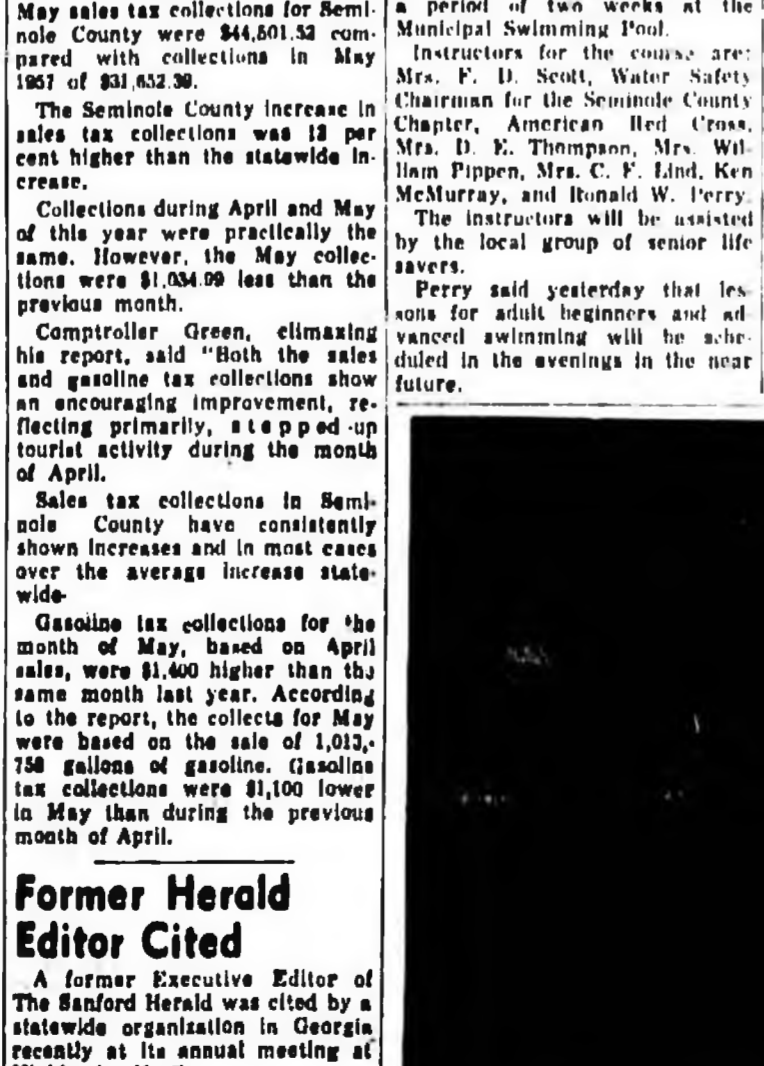

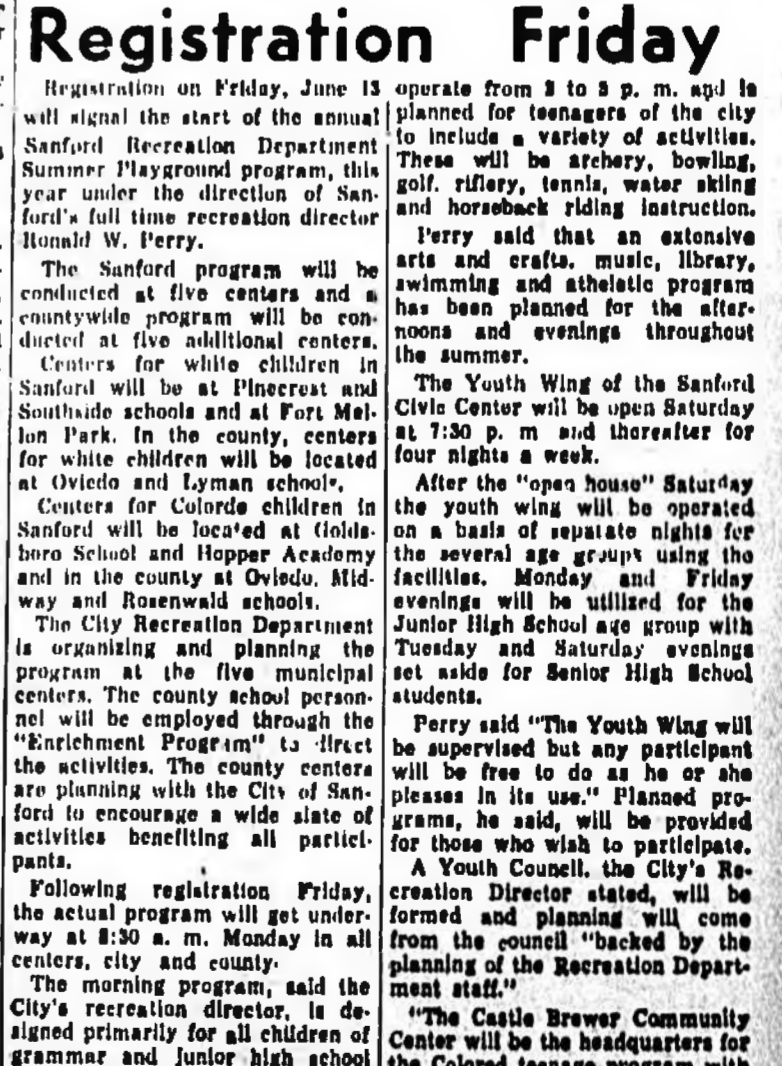
