### PSC Begins Considering Phone Rate Hike Request

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The Public Service Commission begins 10 days of hearings today on Southern Bell's petition for a \$340 million rate increase.

The new request comes only 17 months after the PSC granted Southern Bell a \$140 million rate hike, more than \$100 million less than the big city utilities.

More than two dozen Southern Bell lawyers and executives are lined up to argue for the new rate increase.

If it is granted, customers will pay up to 40 percent more for their basic, minimum residential phone service: Customers in Miami, for example, will see their current \$15.20 monthly fee charges jump up to \$17.30 a month.

Based on past rate requests before the PSC, the commissioners probably will not grant Southern Bell the full amount of the request, but it's almost certain that customers will pay something more, although just how much more will not be determined until June.

### There's \$5 In Garbage

MIAMI (UPI) — Several Dade County workers are collecting big paychecks handling garbage. They work at the county's newest trash plant, a \$25 million state-of-the-art facility located at Black Point. Since it began operating last year, workers have been collecting big overtime checks, the subject of an investigation started last week.

Chairman Ranji, a maintenance mechanic, saw his paycheck for 1982 balloon from \$17,650 to \$28,332 because of overtime. Michael Roy Thompson saw his year's pay go from \$20,000 to nearly \$32,000. And electrician Trevor Mario Ojeda's paycheck went from \$14,680 to \$24,810.

# Lake Mary Ignores Threat; Nixes Lot Split

Despite a threat from Sanford lawyer Paul Logan to challenge the legality of Lake Mary's subdivision ordinance in court, the Lake Mary City Commission for the second time has turned down a request to subdivide a lot to make two home sites on Evansdale Road.

Logan, representing Carol Schoolcraft of 312 Evansdale Road, said his client wants to split her home site to create another lot where a second house can be built. He asked for a waiver from the subdivision regulations which require paying, drainage, sidewalks, streetlights and other improvements to residential developments.

Logan said the municipal ordinance which requires compliance with subdivision regulations if a parcel is split once could, in his opinion, be successfully attacked in the courts.

"There's a good chance I'd prevail. I'm going to try," he said. Logan called a prospective court fight an "uphill battle," adding he loves litigation.

"Require us to do anything you want and we'll try to meet it," Logan told commissioners Thursday.

Rio Stanley, chairman of the city's Planning and Zoning Commission, said Logan gave the advisory board no reasons for the request for the waiver. "If he told us, we don't want to meet the requirements," Stanley said. Stanley said the board turned down

the request because of the oddly shaped resulting lot and because of the lack of space on the new lot to meet setback requirements for an acceptable private tank location except for under the house.

In addition, Stanley said the proposed lot split does not appear compatible with the neighborhood. He said Logan's attitude before the advisory group was: "Give us a variance or else."

Logan, during a lengthy presentation, said that the house to be built would be as large as half the houses in the Evansdale area and the Schoolcraft property is assessed for tax purposes at more than the two adjacent parcels.

### NAACP Threatens Legal Action Over Voting Methods

The state chapter of the NAACP is prepared to take dozens of county school boards to court in order to force a change in election methods that the blacks claim dilute their voting power, its attorneys said.

"It's our contention that every school board in the state is tainted and tainted under an illegal statute," said civil rights lawyer Thomas Warren, who is representing the NAACP.

Warren sent letters to 18 high school boards in the state, including Gadsden, but Graham, chairman of the NAACP's suspending legal challenges.

Warren said he hopes the letters lead to negotiation and changes in the current system. Otherwise, the NAACP would consider bringing suit against any or all of the 65 school boards that still have at-large, countywide elections, Warren said.

"We want to put it on the line from the start, just crytime on notice, what's coming down," said Warren.

Warren and the NAACP centered a 1947 state statute that allows at-large countywide elections in Florida. The statute says candidates must come from particular districts and run for specific seats although

voters from all over the county can cast ballots for any candidates.

But in 1981 and 1982, the 5th and 11th U.S. Circuit Courts of Appeals struck down at-large election systems in Escambia and Gadsden counties.

Escambia and Gadsden are now operating under a single-member district system, in which only people living within a district vote for the representative from that district.

"It is undesirable that black and Hispanic citizens throughout the country continue in the State of Florida have had their voting power unconstitutionally diluted," Warren's letter said.

# Pentagon Plans 'Star Wars' Weapons Research

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Pentagon plans to spend more than \$7 billion in the next five years on research and development in the area of "star wars" weapons on ways to counter chemical and biological warfare.

The proposed allocations for these defensive systems are outlined in the Pentagon's budget for research and development in the fiscal years 1984 through 1988, a 53-page document classified confidential. The total projected spending for research and development over

the period is \$167 billion.

The substantial amounts proposed for these programs underscores the Pentagon's concern about Soviet intrusions on the battlefield of the future.

## Socialists Favored To Win In Portugal

LISBON, Portugal (UPI) — A weak economy helped make Portugal's Socialist Party the electoral winner of elections today, the sixth anniversary of a bloodless revolution that ousted authoritarianism in Lisbon's capital.

The party, led by Antonio Monteiro Soares, would win the vote because it has a clear advantage, probably with the center, because of its record in the 200-seat Parliament.

President Antonio Bernardino Soares called the election when a near-right coalition that has ruled for 2 years collapsed with the unexpected defeat of Pedro Passos Coelho's Prime Minister's Social Democrats, last Dec. 15.

## Bombing Clues Found

Police said embassy officials said 81 people were confirmed to have died, including 17 foreigners. Some of the confirmed deaths remained unconfirmed to the public.

## More Border Fighting

VIENNA, Austria (UPI) — Germanys on two fronts, say west German officials, by increasing troops in their common border to guard the border against East German forces following Hungary's troops to the border.

West German border and defense troops moved into West German sectors last week, destroying signs and leaving a "border" line.

West German officials said they were increasing their military presence in the border region along the "border" line.

## Kreisky Steps Down

VIENNA, Austria (UPI) — Chancellor Bruno Kreisky announced his resignation, fulfilling a pledge to step down if his Socialist Party failed to win an absolute majority in general elections and triggering a scramble for power.

The outgoing Austrian leader said he would coordinate talks aimed at forming a coalition between the Socialists and either the main opposition People's Party or the small liberal Freedom Party.

## License Plate Prices Jump May 2

Friday is the last day for the owners of heavy trucks, passenger cars and garbage trucks to take advantage of bargain prices before they increase next month.

Beginning May 2, owners of heavy trucks will be paying nearly double the last month's license plate and insurance costs. Passenger cars and garbage trucks will also see an increase in their license plate and insurance costs.

These increases, which also affect plates on all other types of vehicles, are due to an increase in the cost of the license plate and insurance. The Florida Department of Transportation said that the cost of the license plate and insurance will increase by 50 percent.

## W-D Child ID Program Now In Seminole

A voluntary program for child identification called Project "Ident-Child" is underway in all 11 Seminole County cities and towns as well as the rest of Central Florida.

The program is designed to protect parents, without charge, with identification cards which will feature their child's fingerprint and other pertinent data. The card will be the personal property of the family to be retained up to last identification officials for positive identification in the event the child is lost or missing.

To participate, a parent or guardian simply accompanies his or her child to the nearest "Ident-Child" station or requests a mobile service. When their child is ready to be scanned, the child's fingerprints are on a "Ident-Child" card. The parent then fills in other identifying information such as name of child and sex. The card becomes the legal property of the parent to be held at all times. When their child is missing, they can go to any "Ident-Child" station to have their child's fingerprints scanned and compared to the card. The card is then returned to the parent.

L.D. Lilly, Seminole County president and corporate security director, will be heading "Ident-Child" in providing this service on a statewide basis. He estimates that over one million children are missing annually each year and that 100,000 are never found. Lilly added.
