# Seminole Crops Escape Freezing Temperatures

Seminole County crops apparently escaped with little or no damage from the freezing temperatures of early Sunday morning, in the opinion of R. F. Whitner Jr., of the Central Florida Experiment Station. Official low temperatures were 33 degrees at around dawn, Whitner said, adding that the lack of cold winds tended to save the crops from freezing.

Some ornamentals, especially poinsettias, were hurt by the cold. Forecast was for some "spring frosts" tonight with a warm trend.

**In The State**  
LAKELAND (AP) — This Christmas was the coldest in Miami and most of the farming areas in Florida were hit by subfreezing temperatures. But the federal state frost warning service in Lakeland reported no significant damage to citrus or the tender vegetable crop.

The chilly 41 degrees recorded in Miami was a degree colder than the previous low set in Miami at Miami Beach, it was a windy 44-45 degrees colder than the previous record in 1955.

"Lower east coast got by," Warren Johnson of the frost warning system said. "And there wasn't any significant damage to citrus."

Johnson said some damage was reported to cucumbers, squash and beans in the Immokalee area. The damage was isolated rather than extensive, Johnson said.

## One Killed In Seminole 21 Perish Over The State 417 Across The Nation

A Casselberry woman, Mrs. Carl Stoddard, 61, of 208 Lincoln Rd., was dead on arrival Saturday night at Winter Park Memorial Hospital as a result of a two-car collision on Highway 17-92.

Her daughter, Mrs. Kathleen Marcus Burrows of 241 Triplet Dr., Casselberry, the driver of the car, was charged by Casselberry Police Department with failure to yield at through intersection. The Christmas Eve accident happened at 8:15 p.m. when she drove her 1965 Mustang convertible out of Piney Ridge Road, across the north-south line and into the path of a southbound 1959 Cadillac sedan. Both vehicles were terminated a total loss.

Mrs. Burrows was treated for a cut on her head and abrasions at Winter Park Memorial and released.

Investigating officers were Lt. Leroy Lee and John Mueser of the Casselberry Police Department assisted by Buddy Smith of the Florida Highway Patrol.

Casselberry Police also reported a two-car accident at 10:45 p.m., Friday, on Seminole Boulevard when Mrs. Linda M. Britton of 1262 Seminole Boulevard left her 1969 Cadillac sedan parked on the road with a flat tire. Michael R. Cromwell of Casselberry ran into the rear of her car with his 1963 Volkswagen.

Cromwell and his wife, Carol Ann, were treated at the Orlando Air Force Base Hospital for facial cuts and internal injuries.

Estimated damage to the Britton car was \$300 and to the Cromwell vehicle, \$800.

There were five accidents in the city limits over the 24 hour Christmas holiday. The only serious mishap occurred at 20th St. and Mallonville Ave.

Burleson was charged with driving while intoxicated and failure to have his vehicle under control. The accident occurred at approximately 7 p.m. Christmas eve.

A car-truck collision on U.S. 1 near Jacksonville was fatal for Robert Lee Shipes, 32, of that town.

Alvin Mack Hamrick, 16, of West Palm Beach was killed Friday night when his motorcycle and a car collided near West Palm Beach.

In Miami, Henry Bourdeau, 34, of Hollywood was killed Friday night when his car hit a utility pole.

Lydia M. Halstead, 73, of Vero Beach died Saturday in a two-car collision near Pompano Beach.

The final day of the 73-hour Christmas holiday traffic count opened today with fatalities running 29 per cent behind last Christmas, and the National Safety Council said it was a hopeful sign.

The toll stood at 417 early this morning.

"I hate to say it too flatly, because the road can still fall in but if it keeps up the way it's going, the death toll certainly will be below last year," a council spokesman said.

"Of course," he cautioned, "we have to bear in mind that last year's toll was unusually high." Over Christmas 1965, a record 729 persons died in traffic.

The council has predicted 830 to 730 deaths between 6 p.m. Friday and midnight today, the counting period. For comparison, the Associated Press counted 391 deaths during the nonholiday period Dec. 3-12.

If this Christmas did not set a record, it would be the first such nonrecord in its years. Record numbers have died in traffic over each of the last eight holiday periods, the greatest carnage coming last Thanksgiving when 784 died in four days. The figure was the largest for any holiday period of any length.

The council spokesman said the best way to keep alive is to leave early for home. In his words, "We've found that it's the last-minute rush—people rushing, driving fast—that causes deaths."

Other 1966 records included 348 dead over the New Year; Memorial Day 342; Independence Day 379, and Labor Day 638.

A change in the tax laws that becomes effective Jan. 1 will permit a taxpayer who normally claims substantial deductions and receive a large refund to reduce the amount of tax withheld from their paychecks.

Up to \$700 in annual income will be exempt from withholding payments under this plan. There is no change in overall tax liability. The plan simply is a device to bring a person's withholding more in line with the actual tax he must pay.

Beginning Jan. 1, these other tax law changes take effect for the 1967 tax year:

The self-employed must pay Social Security taxes quarterly and to a maximum of \$422.40, instead of the present \$405.90.

For estimates of income, taxes withheld from wages plus quarterly payments of estimated tax must total at least 90 per cent of the tax a person owes instead of 70 per cent.

Corporations must begin paying taxes on a current basis in 1967 instead of in 1970.

Persons 65 and over who itemize income tax deductions can deduct only those medical expenses exceeding 3 per cent of their gross income, instead of all medical expenses. Other taxpayers are already subject to the 3 per cent clause.

## Social Security In Bigger Bite From Salary

WASHINGTON (AP)—Taxes are going up for U.S. wage earners as much as \$13.75 each next year even if President Johnson doesn't ask Congress for an income tax boost.

The reason: Social Security taxes increase Jan. 1 to help pay for Medicare, increased retirement and disability, and other benefits voted by the last Congress.

The new levy is 4.4 per cent of the worker's first \$6,000 in earnings, up from the current 4.2 per cent.

Thus, a person making \$6,000 or more next year will pay \$260.40 for Social Security. He paid \$277.20 this year and \$174 in 1965. Employers must match each employee's contribution.

The increased rate is expected to raise an additional \$1 billion next year. Of that amount, \$280.40 individual maximum, \$33 will go into the fund paying for the Medicare program that began July 1.

President Johnson has said he'll announce next month whether to ask for more income taxes. Costs of the war in Vietnam and the state of the economy are key factors in that decision.

Johnson also has said he will ask Congress for more Social Security benefits next year. Increased benefits could mean another Social Security tax hike or a look to general funds for financing.

## Bombers Raid North Vietnam After Truce

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP)—U.S. bombers raided North Vietnam today as fighting in the Vietnam was resumed following the end of a two-day Christmas truce.

A U.S. military spokesman said American warplanes renewed bombings of the north despite bad weather. At the same time, U.S. B52 heavy bombers staged three raids during the day, two of them within 25 miles of Saigon and the third in the once-neutral demilitarized zone separating North and South Vietnam.

Both the U.S. and South Vietnamese high commands still withheld any charge against the Communists of violating the truce, although it was punctuated throughout by gunfire. The two commands reported a combined total of 122 combat incidents during the 48-hour ceasefire, but they listed only 27 of these as significant.

"We are not characterizing these incidents as violations," a U.S. spokesman said.

The Communists charged the United States with breaking the truce, but even their accusation appeared somewhat muffled. The North Vietnamese News Agency said U.S. planes intruded over the north Sunday during the truce but made no claim that bombs were dropped. Hanoi said one U.S. plane was shot down.

A U.S. spokesman said he had no report of any American plane loss, but acknowledged that U.S. planes flew reconnaissance flights over the north during the truce.

## Warning Sounded

With rumors in Tallahassee about raising auto insurance rates in high accident areas, Seminole County residents should start today on putting more safety in their driving.

If we start now on establishing a better record, maybe we still have time to escape the pocketbook blow from such a program.

Edward Williams, insurance commissioner, is working up this plan with insurance companies, and it also would provide cuts in rates for areas whose drivers have good highway records.

More people have been killed in Seminole County this year so far than for all of 1965 and we still have two weeks to go.

We are now in the worst week of any year — the Christmas and New Year's holidays. If we are not extremely careful about driving with the extra care flooding our highways, our record could become even more disgraceful.

This is something we cannot afford to have happen.

The death, pain and property damage toll doesn't seem to slow down our bad record. Perhaps the threat from Tallahassee on insurance rate increases might do the trick.

## Problem Needs Airing

If smog were only a problem in Los Angeles and New York, most Americans wouldn't need to worry about it. If it were a problem confined only to the big cities, it would still not be cause for overwhelming national concern.

The fact is, however, that no less than 7,800 communities have air pollution problems of varying degree, according to the U.S. Public Health Service. There simply aren't 7,800 big cities in the country.

Today, the waste that is dumped into the air by one town adds to the pollution over another. City pollutes city and state — and the countryside in between — at an ever-increasing rate that is beginning to exceed the natural capacity of the atmosphere to cleanse itself.

Air pollution is always annoying. When it is combined with a temperature inversion, such as occurred in New York at Thanksgiving and occurs regularly in Los Angeles, it can be fatal to the elderly and persons with respiratory illnesses.

No amount of effort by any one city, no matter how strenuous, can do more than ameliorate the local problem. Air pollution, the same as water pollution, demands a regional approach.

So far, there have been no interstate attacks on the problem through the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. It has identified three critical regions and ordered the six states involved to hold air pollution abatement conferences.

A New Jersey-New York conference is to be held early next year. Millions of Americans will be watching with smarting eyes in hopes that it will arrive at some solutions other regions can apply.

Every citizen should be allowed to breathe the air of freedom without gagging.

## Bruce Biassat - Ray Cromley Political Notebook

COLORED SPRINGS, Colo. (NEA) — Recently a starry New England conservative told a moderate Republican leader he believes that Gov. George Romney of Michigan would beat Richard Nixon in a 1968 presidential primary in New Hampshire.

Though this is the purest conjecture about a very distant political event, it may serve to put in somewhat better perspective the rather misleading presidential promises of many governors and other political figures who met here for two days.

The words "Romney is in deep trouble" were heard with surprising frequency in talks with some of these men. They reflected largely his continuing

fuzziness on the big issue of Vietnam, his delay in making known his 1968 intention, his frothy moralizing.

These responses are being underscored heavily by veteran political reporters who hammer at Romney in press conferences and in print. Since his remarkable re-election a month ago he has not had a "good press."

Even Romney's staunchest friends among the many moderate governors assembled in Colorado found themselves stressing the negative.

He does stand high in the polls; he is moving about; his campaign is visibly rolling (though his pace and character do not seem to please all observers).

Possibly most telling of all, his image with the general public continues to be far stronger than it is with the political sophisticates he encounters at closer range. Voters watching him on television believe that "Hall to the Chief" could be his son. Aggressively, he looks the part.

Obviously, Romney has many huge tasks ahead — maintaining himself in the polls, developing some plausible specifics to fill the aching void in Vietnam, getting better organized to win friends and, ultimately, 1968 convention delegates.

To that end, he probably has to win primaries in places like New Hampshire and wide-open Oregon, to mention just two. Despite the early talk of a rash of favorite sons and a "brothered convention," he may find sufficient opportunities to build momentum. If he does, conservatives might polarize strongly around Nixon or California's Ronald Reagan to narrow the field tightly by convention time.

## Author Of Controversial JFK Book Hospitalized

MIDDLEBURY, Conn. (AP) — Author William Manchester, whose yet unpublished account of President John F. Kennedy's assassination, has become a Manchester, who lives here with his wife and three children, was selected by Mrs. Kennedy to write a definitive account of the assassination on the strength of an earlier book he had written about the president.

Manchester entered an agreement not to publish the book without her consent, then went to work researching it. When publication was announced for early next year, Mrs. Kennedy charged he had broken their contract and included in the account passages representing an invasion of her privacy.

Friends of the writer denied a statement in a court affidavit signed by Sen. Robert F. Kennedy that Manchester "was being treated for an obsession with the thought the book might never be published."

"Bill Manchester just got plain tired," the friend said. "For a time last spring he was suffering from nervous exhaustion. But to say he was obsessed is baloney."

Kennedy family representatives and Look magazine, which plans to serialize the book, reached a settlement last week on the passages to be removed. Negotiations are still under way between the book's publishers, Harper & Row, and the family.

NEW YORK (AP) — Negotiations go back to work today on trimming disputed passages from "The Death of a President" as its author, William Edward Greenbaum, attorney for Harper & Row, publishers of the book, indicated progress had been made in talks Saturday and said, "There's not much left, we'll try to work it out quickly."

A spokesman for Mrs. Kennedy, whose suit to block publication of the account comes up for a hearing Tuesday if no out-of-court settlement is reached, pointed to wading through the 300,000 word manuscript as one of the areas of difficulty.

**Renewed Spirits Spur Christians**

Christians returned with renewed spirit to the workaday world today after a Christmas on which American soldiers at turkey in the jungles of Vietnam and pilgrims kissed the spire in Bethlehem where they believe Jesus was born.

Britons lapsed back into the routine by observing Boxing Day, a legal holiday when Christmas boxes are traditionally given to messengers and mailmen.

The holiday mood ended abruptly in Vietnam, where U.S. B-52s roared in from Guam and bombed Communist positions an hour after the end of a two-day truce.

As the festivities came to a close, there were these memories of Christmas 1966:  
Miguel Alberto Gori, the aged Latin patriarch, placed a plaster figure of Jesus on a 14-pointed silver star in a grotto beneath Bethlehem's Church of the Nativity at the place where tradition says Christ was born.

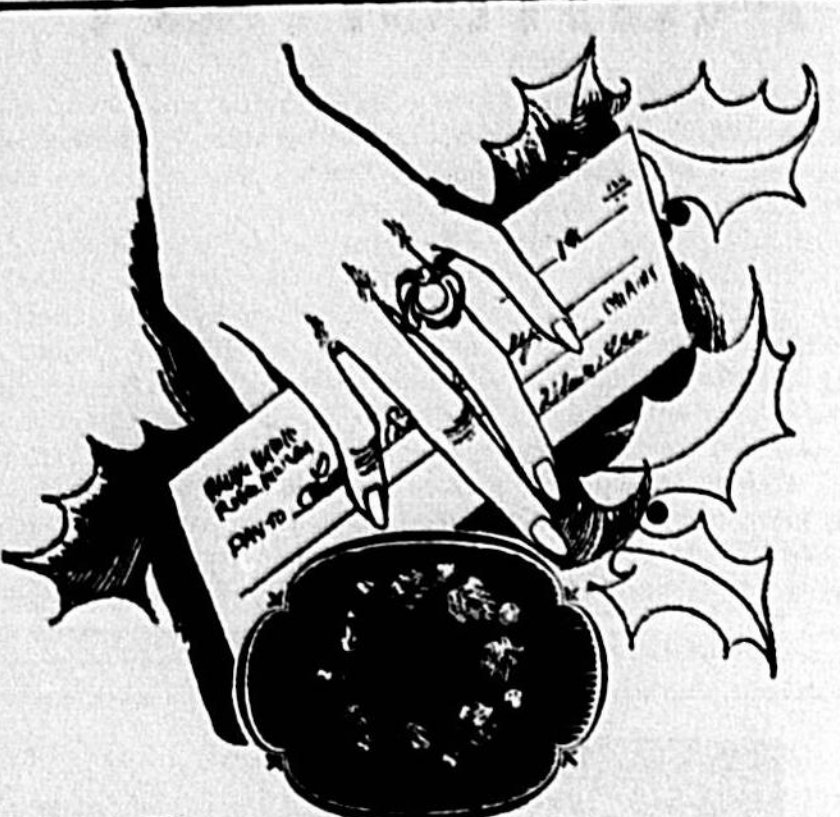
About 15,000 tourists and pilgrims, some from as far away as Tokyo, heard bells peal joyfully across the sunny hills of the Holy Land.  
Pope Paul VI gave his Christmas noon blessing to the City of Rome and the world before 100,000 persons gathered in spring-like weather in St. Peter's Square. The 69-year-old pope spoke strongly but had circles of fatigue under his eyes after a Christmas Eve trip to Florence to celebrate midnight Mass and console victims of last month's floods.

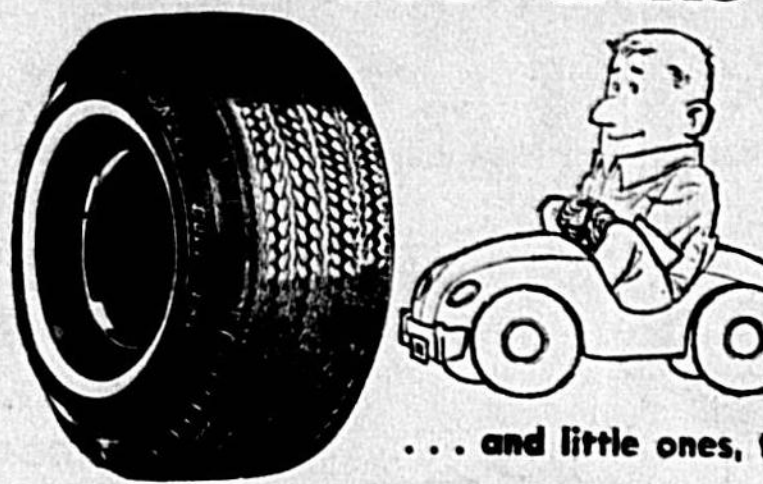
Christmas services were led in Vietnam by Francis Cardinal Spellman, archbishop of New York and Roman Catholic military vicar to the armed forces, and by Baptist evangelist Billy Graham.

In Hanoi, the official Vietnam News Agency preceded an account of Christmas Eve services by saying that U.S. aircraft have deliberately attacked more than 200 parishes and nearly 100 churches in North Vietnam since Feb. 7, 1965. Frenchmen paid about \$10-15 per cent more than last year for 2.2 pounds of fine grass, the fat goose livers that are a feature of holiday feasts. In India, the government banned multi-course Christmas and New Year's dinners to save food.

Some Christians had difficulties with Communist authorities. East Germany refused to grant West Berliners holiday passes through the Berlin wall to visit relatives and Kurt Schurf, Protestant bishop of Berlin, said, "We are expecting Christmas Eve and Christmas with many sorrows."

**Birds Cost U. S. Air Force \$10 Million Annually**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Air Force scientists reported today a growing peril from birds colliding with military and commercial aircraft.  
They said damage to Air Force planes alone amounts to about \$10 million yearly.  
"Bird aircraft collisions are far more common than the public suspects or than pilots care to admit," declared a report from the Air Force Office of Scientific Research.  
"The menace is growing as aircraft speeds increase, as more air miles are flown each year, as greater numbers of aircraft are powered by jet engines," said the report exhibited at the opening of the 133rd meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the world's largest general science organization.  
The report said the innocent feathered foe range from starlings to whistling swans and from seagulls to sandpipers. It indicated the biggest hazard comes from birds being ingested by a plane's engines, especially those of jet aircraft.  
But scientists also reported damage to wing panels, flaps, landing gear and other elements of aircraft structure.  
The researchers cited statistics to illustrate "the grim fact that bird-aircraft collisions are increasing in frequency and cost."  
—U.S. Air Force aircraft collisions of this type totaled \$39 million, nearly six times the number reported for the previous year. In previous years, however, only collisions causing actual damage were required to be reported. But incomplete records for 1966 appear to bear out the trend.  
—U.S. commercial airlines report an average of 300 such collisions yearly, and private fliers report another 500. But the scientists indicated there may be many more because all estimate of human fatalities from such accidents.  
Looking to the future, the scientists said:  
"Bird-aircraft collisions can never be prevented entirely as long as birds and aircraft are in the air together. But the probability of such collisions can be reduced."  
Air Force scientists take the view that in the long run, biological studies of the birds, including their migratory, foraging, reaction to weather changes, and other habits, offer the best hope of minimizing the menace.

## 'Great Society' Hit By Lawmaker

Rep. A. S. Herlong Jr., in an exclusive interview with The Herald today, pledged to vote to cut back funds for the "Poverty Program" which he termed "one of the greatest wastes of the peoples' money in the nation's history."

"Administration of the program is costing oodles of money and there is very little, if any, accounting for the vast funds allotted," Herlong declared.

"The program has more or less been given a blank check. The best way people can fight poverty is by going to work," Herlong opined. "We can't fight a war and poverty, too." Seminole County Action is also part of the program.

"The program was designed to get votes of the people who can't think for themselves, but the last election showed instead that the people were alienated," Herlong said.

"While such programs as Headstart are good, other money was expended for such things as teaching contract bridge," he pointed out. "All of the peoples' problems cannot be solved by spending money. Scripture says 'The poor you will always have with you.' Only in the hereafter will we have everything that we want," Herlong stated.

"It is my hope that the administration will work instead of Congress in good faith and cut back the program where there is waste. It is our experience, however, that the program will be cut back in the areas which will be most felt at home in order that the people will bring pressure to bear," Herlong remarked.

The representative again stated his position. "The closing of Sanford Naval Air Station is a farce and a gross waste of money. . . . I laid it on the line for them dollar-wise. In other words, I proved to them they were in error in that they claim they will save money by closing the Sanford base and moving the base to Albany. Herlong said, "It will cost millions of dollars more to improve the Air Force base at Albany and to move there, than it would to make the necessary improvements and stay in Sanford."

"Apparently saving money is not the criteria for the move. I want to make it clear the people at SNAS were not a party to this action. The people in the Pentagon are the perpetrators of this action," Herlong revealed.

"I hope the same man who prepared the cost estimates for the two bases does not do McNamara's income tax or the Internal Revenue Service will be after McNamara," he said.

"I hope the same man who prepared the cost estimates for the two bases does not do McNamara's income tax or the Internal Revenue Service will be after McNamara," he said.

"I want to make it clear the people at SNAS were not a party to this action. The people in the Pentagon are the perpetrators of this action," Herlong revealed.

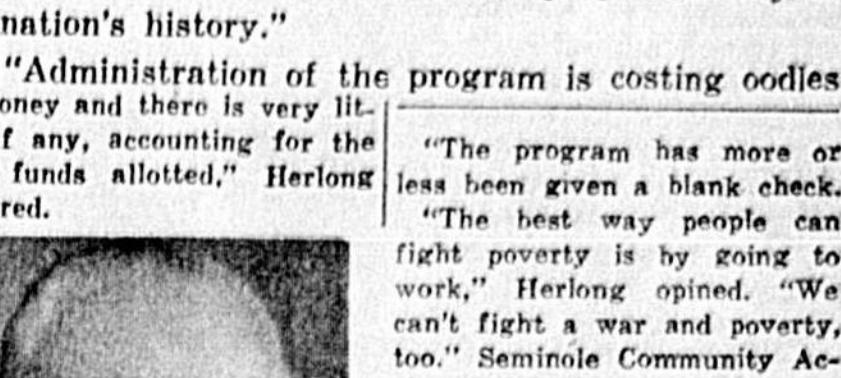
