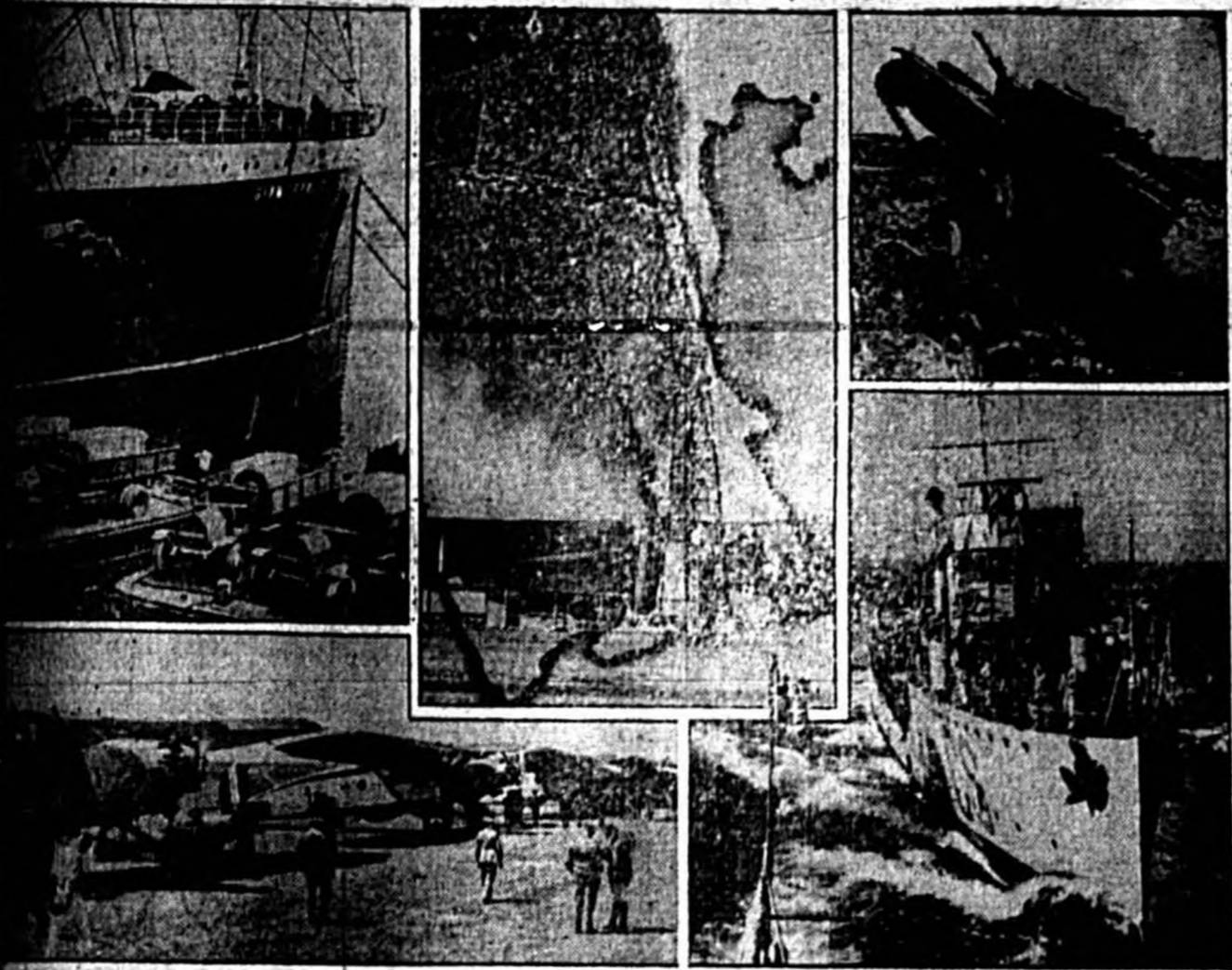

Military Committee Says General Doherty Wrong In Criticizing The President

Doherty Sold, Employes Bought

Magnate Disposed Of Valuable Oil Stock, His Attorney Says

WASHINGTON, Mar. 6.—(AP)—Investigations dominated the capital scene today with one Senate committee developing that Henry L. Doherty sold \$20,500,000 worth of his own company's stock early in 1929, and another voting against an inquiry into the Major General Johnson Hagood case.

Robert Burns' attorney for the Cities Service Company, told lobbyists that Doherty was selling Cities Service stock at the same time his employes were being "permitted" to buy it.

The proposed investigation of the general's case after criticism by the military affairs committee, a vote to 3-15 would establish a sub-committee to investigate the case and give its findings to the full committee.

Senator Doherty declined at his press conference to comment on the Hagood affair. He discussed relief, however, explaining he planned to confer again with advisers before deciding how much to ask Congress for to carry through the Hagood case.

Other Washington developments: Farmers were told their emergency crop and feed loans for this year will be available within 10 days. Seven Texas utilities companies asked for an increase in rates. The Treasury said that securities totaling more than \$2,000,000,000 were received for its March cash offering of \$1,250,000,000 in securities.

Explosions Said To Be Indicative Of A Protection Racket

MIAMI, Mar. 6.—(AP)—The Dade County Master Plumbers' Association held the blame yesterday for recent dynamite explosions in unfinished houses here.

Two explosions in the northwest portion of Miami last week damaged plumbing fixtures in buildings under construction and additional bombs have been found in other structures within recent weeks.

The explosion at 2250 S.W. 17th St. on March 3, was attributed to a dynamite charge placed in a basement by a contractor.

'Jafsie' Quizzed Miami Kidnap, Sheriff Reports

MIAMI, Mar. 6.—(AP)—Governor Harold G. Hoffman of New Jersey, back tracking activities of Dr. John F. Condon, today asked Miami authorities for details of a county jail interview Jafsie held here with Sam Garlick, convicted kidnaper.

Governor Hoffman telegraphed Sheriff D. C. Coleman he had been advised that the Lindbergh intermediary with his bodyguard, Al Reich, visited him for the purpose of kidnapping Sam Garlick as the person to whom Dr. Condon paid the ransom in St. Raymond's Cemetery, Bronx, New York.

The visit referred to was on Dec. 16, 1934. Sheriff Coleman replied that "Jafsie" had interviewed Garlick, now serving a life term. The sheriff said that the purpose of the interview was not specifically given. It was assumed it had some connection with the Lindbergh case.

Coleman is now at Orlando attending the peace officers convention and dictated his reply to his deputies.

Garlick and three others were convicted in the kidnaping of Dr. Santiago Clara, Cuban newspaper editor last winter. Coleman said "Jafsie" did not tell him the results of the interview.

T. W. Lawton Will Be A Candidate For Re-Election

Announcement of his candidacy for re-election to the office of County Superintendent of Public Instruction was made today by T. W. Lawton, native of Seminole County, where he started his education.

During the several years of his administration of the schools of this county no term has ever been shortened and never had a school term ended with any bills left unpaid. Teachers' salaries have been paid on time during Mr. Lawton's entire term of office.

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Robbers Loot Price & Warren General Store

\$200 Cash And About Half Of Stock In Lake Monroe Store Taken During Night

Robbers last night battered down both doors in the Price & Warren general store in Lake Monroe and looted the establishment of \$200 in cash and about half the stock of merchandise.

The robbery occurred between the hours of 8:30 o'clock last evening, when the store was closed, and 6:30 o'clock this morning when a clerk arrived with the intention of opening it for the day's business. However, he found it already opened, as the glass was broken out of the front door and the rear door was practically demolished.

The sheriff's office was notified immediately upon discovery of the robbery, but deputies were unable to find any finger prints or other clues of the robbers.

A complete check of the store had not been taken at noon today, but one of the proprietors of the store said that the robbers got about half of the stock. The ice box was looted, an unbroken barrel of coffee was taken, several dozen and at least 15 gallons of oil were stolen, a slot machine was carried away, and \$200 in cash was taken from the safe and cash register.

An unsuccessful attempt was made to rob the Price & Warren store about three weeks ago.

President Plans To Start Fishing Trip On March 19

WASHINGTON, Mar. 6.—(AP)—President Roosevelt is expected to leave Washington Mar. 19 for a vacation trip in Florida waters. His route is expected to take him to Warm Springs, Ga., where he plans to spend a day or two at the Warm Springs Foundation.

From Georgia he is scheduled to head for a Florida port where he will board the new Presidential yacht Potomac for a fishing expedition around the Bahamas.

In other years the President always went on his Florida fishing trips aboard the Neurnahal, palatial yacht of Vincent Astor.

Now, however, he is provided with a vessel that will permit him to cruise in the open sea. The Potomac replaces the yacht Sequoia which was a converted houseboat.

It was not divulged as to the port of embarkation in Florida, but it was recalled that in the past Mr. Roosevelt always sailed from Jacksonville and with one exception returned by way of Miami.

Short Illness Fatal To Archie B. Cameron

Archie Bruce Cameron, 74, died in a local hospital last night following an illness of only three days. Funeral services will be held Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock from Holy Cross Episcopal Church with the Rev. Martin Brian, assistant pastor, officiating.

Mr. Cameron was born in America, Ga., on Feb. 14, 1861, but had lived in Seminole County for 30 years. He had been in ill health for about two years, though death was caused by a sudden attack.

All Candidates Except Sharon Endorse Canal

Huge Ditch Won't Hurt Water Supply In South Florida

Nine of the ten candidates for Congress from the new Fifth District attending a conference in Palatka yesterday of the Democratic Committee for the district went on record as favoring construction of the Florida ship canal. But the tenth candidate, Judge Jas. G. Sharon of Sanford, alone withheld his endorsement.

In an address to the committee Judge Sharon did not voice opposition to the canal, but said he could not endorse it until he was shown that the big ditch would not be harmful to the water resources of South Florida.

Judge Sharon also told the committee he favors the "revolving plan" of raising money for old age pensions as included in the Townsend Plan. Three other candidates also spoke in favor of the Townsend Plan, and three expressed vigorous opposition to it. The three were James S. McCawley of Leesburg and O. Raymond Ellars and James J. Banks of Orlando.

One of the main addresses was delivered by Mrs. Hortense K. Wells of Tampa, national Democratic committeewoman from Florida, who declared that Alfred E. Smith should be "tied with a pink ribbon bow and delivered to the Republicans lock, stock and barrel." She charged that the party's 1928 nominee for president had been guilty of "destroying Democratic principles."

Praising Democratic women all over the country working in harmony, Mrs. Wells said she was confident of President Roosevelt's re-election.

Earlier, the committee had passed a resolution condemning preachers who criticize President Roosevelt and other government officials from the pulpit. The resolution called the practice un-American and unfair.

From the Daytona Beach Ministerial Association came a telegram denouncing the resolution. Signed by the Rev. Milford H. Lyon, president, it said:

"We affirm our stand for free speech for platform, press and pulpit. While recognizing that personalities and party politics have no place in the pulpit, nevertheless we vigorously protest against the proposed resolution."

BELOGRADE, Yugoslavia, Mar. 6.—(AP)—Charles B. Wilson, United States minister to Yugoslavia, narrowly missed being shot today when an opposition deputy began shooting at Premier Milan Stojadinovich. Wilson was sitting in the diplomatic gallery, and the bullet passed close to him. Other diplomats ran, but Wilson remained composed.

The premier was reading a message regarding next year's budget when deputy Damian Armanovich drew a pistol and suddenly began firing. After the first shot he was wounded. Three more bullets went into the floor. The assailant was overpowered and led away.

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Better Business Is Forecast In Spring

WASHINGTON, Mar. 6.—(AP)—Forecasting better business ahead, Secretary Perkins said yesterday she was "strengthening the federal employment services in the belief that they are going to be busy this spring."

A plan for cutting unemployment came from a committee in George L. Berry's Industrial Council, which proposed creation of a new federal commission to regulate wages, hours and child labor in industry.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 6.—President Roosevelt started his reelection campaign rolling formally last night by signing petitions giving his name in the primaries in Maryland, Massachusetts and Ohio. He arranged to speak in Baltimore, Apr. 13, to a meeting of Young Democrats.

The announcement was telephoned by the White House to the major press associations.

Suggestions in Berlin that Germany may denounce the Locarno treaty gave a greatly important angle today to the Italo-Ethiopian war.

Prince Ernst Von Starbuck, Austrian vice chairman, conferred with Mussolini in Rome.

Germany contends the Franco-Soviet mutual assistance pact is a violation, while Italy says the mutual Mediterranean pact is a violation.

The Italian contention is that the conference between the Franco and British general staffs was the pact.

It means that every voter will have to make a trip to the registration places and go to the trouble of getting his name on the books again. It also means that Supervisor of Registrations Thigpen will be put to a little lot of unnecessary work in registering everyone. But there is help for it if you want to (and you certainly should) will have to register.

Who Owns The Game?

The efforts made to prevent Seminole Indians, living in the Everglades, from hunting game, brings up the interesting question of: to whom does the game belong?

The Fort Myers News Press writes very enlighteningly on the subject as follows:

"Noting that the Seminoles say they want only to be let alone the Miami Daily News remarks that if they will agree to leave deer, turkey and egrets alone Governor Sholtz should strike a bargain with them. 'This brings up several questions. The main one is, who owns the game? The title, to be sure, is vested in the State of Florida. But it can very well be argued that there is a serious flaw in the title. The land and the game which is indigenous to it was originally owned by the Indians. They did not deed it to Florida, the Seminoles never having made that kind of treaty. Neither did they quitclaim it by surrender to force. The Seminoles were defeated in battle but there is no record that they ever conceded conquest. Their lands were seized and they were driven off. Subsequently due process of law was fixed up to legalize the white man's claim but the fact remains that it is no better than possession of any other stolen property.

"Having acquired the game through appropriating the Indians' lands, the white man now wants them to refrain from using what rightfully belongs to them. At least some white men do, although the list—and this is important—does not include the present de facto owner of the land, Baron Collier, who purchased from the state and national government most of the region which the Seminoles occupy, not only makes no objection to their presence but takes every opportunity, personally and through his agents, to assure them they are welcome. He lets them strictly alone so far as their habits and habits are concerned, the contacts of Collier county officials with the Indians being largely in the role of a hospitable neighbor.

But while Mr. Collier can make them welcome to the land, he does not own the game. The state lays claim to that, and goes over his head in denying or permitting trespass. Neither the original owner nor the present title holder has anything to say about that. Strangers in fact of Tallahassee make the rules, which say that the Indian must not maintain himself in the style of his tradition because it interferes with the pleasure of the white man.

"So, to be let alone it is demanded that the Seminoles agree to let alone that which they rightfully own the way on the land they neither desired nor abandoned. This is the realistic side of it. There is, of course, a practical side, which puts a somewhat different light on it. Few, if any, begrudge the Indians the game they need for their own use. What they are wanted to let alone is game the white man always the villain of the piece induces them to sell. That makes the fundamental problem, as always, one of dealing with the white man. If he can be prevented from debauching the Seminoles the problem is solved."

Stopping Accidents

The endorsement by the Florida Cattlemen's Association of the Joint Committee on Commerce in regard to the highways of the state of wandering cattle should be a big help in a worthy effort to reduce automobile accidents, says the Tampa Tribune.

"The Tampa Tribune says, is more important to many persons than presidential preferences. There is no question but that stray cattle on our roads are a menace to the safety of our highways and should be eliminated.

Pointing out the seriousness of mounting accidents, the Tribune tells of a traveling salesman who drives 35,000 miles each year has been inducted a one-man questionaire, and publishes his findings in the Review of Reviews. The question: What would you do to stop automobile accidents?

"Alan H. Tripp of Battle Creek, Mich., personally interviewed more than a thousand drivers and traffic cops, to find that 65 percent of accidents are caused by speed and also that 65 percent of drivers interviewed do not want the speed of cars reduced.

"Based on what he learned in these interviews, Mr. Tripp offers the following suggestions to eliminate accidents:

"Each state to have a motor vehicle complaint department that would welcome reports of careless or reckless driving.

"Make the black or white line between highway lanes 24 inches wide, instead of six inches, to prevent sideswiping and half of all accidents.

"Build no more roads until all main highways are three lanes.

"Build no more new roads until all roadside ditches are done away with, until all curves are straightened out where possible, and until protection bars are placed at all danger spots.

"Limit speed to 60 miles an hour, with governors on all cars to shut off the gas when that speed is reached.

"Patrol all roads with state police or county police under the supervision of one commissioner.

"Maintain state ambulances at strategic points, and telephones not more than eight miles apart, to cut down the death toll among the injured.

"The Review of Reviews is inviting practical suggestions for the elimination of highway accidents, and tells about a short piece of highway in New York state, that passes four schools, with a history of two accidents each month and eight deaths within a year and a half. An underpass now makes the crossing safe for children, and the two traffic lanes have been separated by 12 feet of parkway to eliminate head-on collisions."

Tallest Dam Stands Guard Against Flood And Drouth In Imperial Valley Lands

BOULDER CITY, Nev., Mar. 6.—(AP) Engineers say that the 4,364,994 cubic yards of concrete have harnessed the relentless Colorado river and given the world its tallest dam.

Completion of giant Boulder dam more than two years before the construction started, and its appearance by the federal government (on Mar. 11) ends an American epic supreme in its magnitude and scale.

Almost 100 years after Hernando de Alarcón, acting under Cortés' orders, discovered and explored the lower Colorado river, American engineers set to work on making the rich lands of the Imperial Valley safe for future generations.

Located about 25 miles north-west of Las Vegas, Nevada, in the upper Black Canyon, Boulder dam is 725 feet high and by far the tallest dam in the world. The famous Hoover dam in France is only 146 feet.

Approximately 115,000 acres were spent in construction of the dam. More than 1,000,000 cubic yards of concrete were used in dam and power house.

Boulder dam, however, may be distinguished by:

- 1. To permit flood control.
2. To permit an adequate supply for irrigation and for power.
3. To permit safe navigation on the river below Black Canyon.
4. To create a new reservoir and area.

The dam, which is the greatest in the world, is being built in the Black Canyon of the Colorado river, where the river is 1,000 feet deep and 1,000 feet wide.

Work on the dam started Mar. 11, 1931, and it is now nearly completed. The dam is expected to be finished by the end of 1936.

More than 100,000 acres of land will be irrigated by the dam. The dam will also generate 1,500 horsepower of power.

GENEVA, Mar. 6.—(AP)—When the United States old-age insurance law comes into effect Jan. 1, 1937, more than 125,000,000 persons in the world will be protected against poverty in their declining years according to figures of the International Labor Office.

At present compulsory sickness and maternity insurance cover 100,000,000 persons in 31 countries. Compulsory old-age, invalidity, and widows' and orphans' insurance protects 100,000,000 persons in 30 countries.

If it be realized that the millions of compulsory insurance, sickness, compensation and non-compulsory pension schemes are not on any account, there exist some 100 laws for the protection of workers or their families against industrial accidents, sickness, maternity, old-age and death, the labor office says.

The figure includes railway workers who are everywhere protected by special schemes, as well as government officials who are covered in nearly every country."

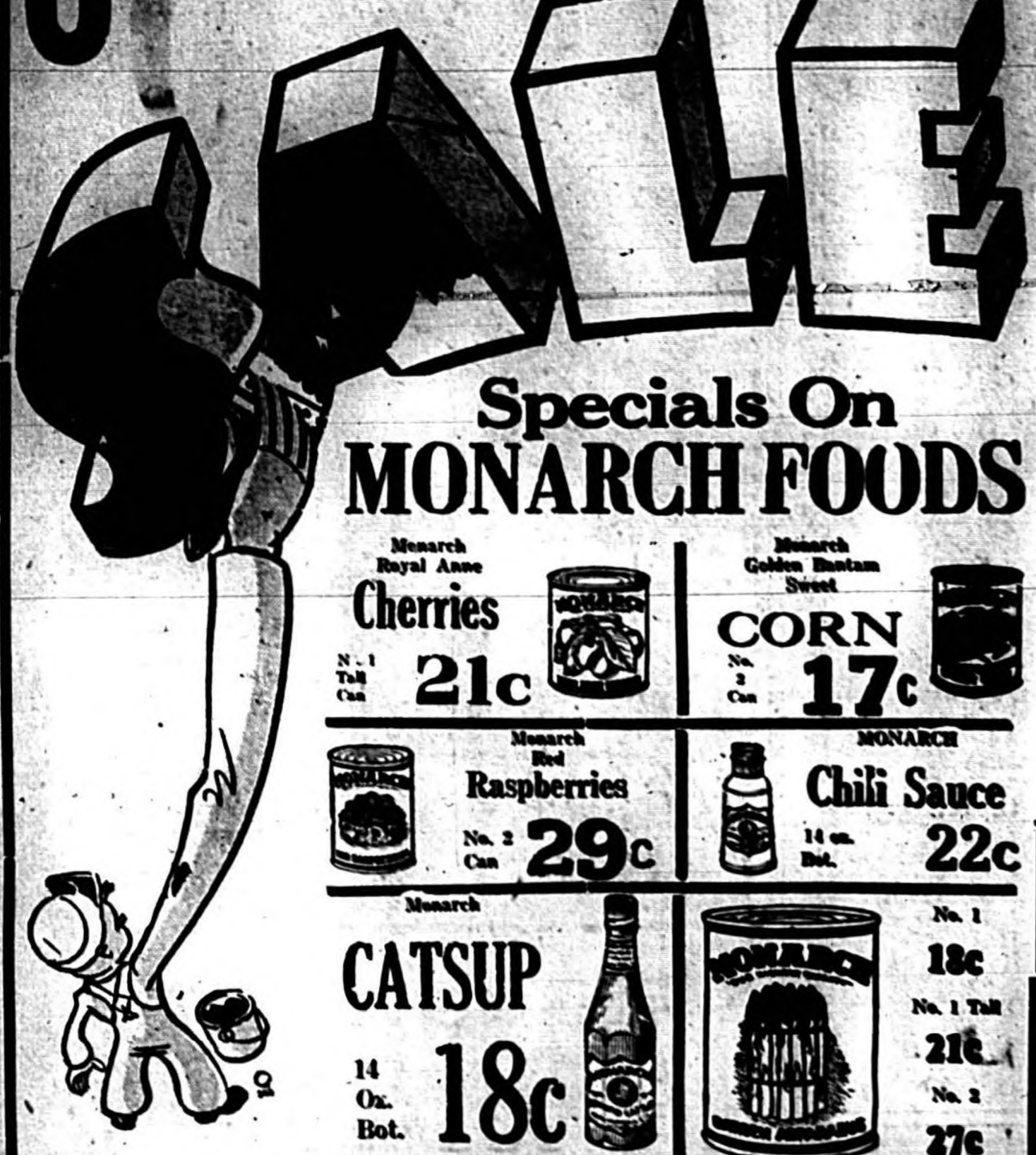

When he has been put upon notice he probably will not get the cooperation."

Senator Fletcher said the allotment confirmed with his repeated statements that "the President will provide funds for the canal if he can get it."

The \$200,000 extra allocation the President gave the canal project is in addition to the \$1,000,000 extra allocation the President gave the canal project in 1935.

Senator Duncan U. Fletcher, Democrat, Florida, returned from Washington today and said that he would "continue the fight" for the canal.
