City for sale? County considers city hall purchase

Is the city of Sanford for sale? That was the question posed by Seminole County Commissioner Dick Van Der Weide during yesterday's Seminole County Commission meeting.

An overflow crowd attended the weekly meeting, most to address the issue of Seminole County space needs. The current courthouse building is considered to be bursting at the seams, housing many county offices as well as the courtrooms. The county has come under pressure from courtroom personnel to make a final decision on the matter.

The county plans to spend between \$40-50 million on the expansion of the existing courthouse to accommodate their needs but Seminole County Commissioner Daryl McLain had promised to add a

new idea to the mix, one he promised would save the county taxpayers' money.

"My concern is that the county cannot afford a \$50 million courthouse in one fell swoop," McLain said yesterday. "We have to live within our means."

With that, he proposed purchasing the existing Sanford City Hall and using it as office space while phasing in courthouse expansion around the city hall.

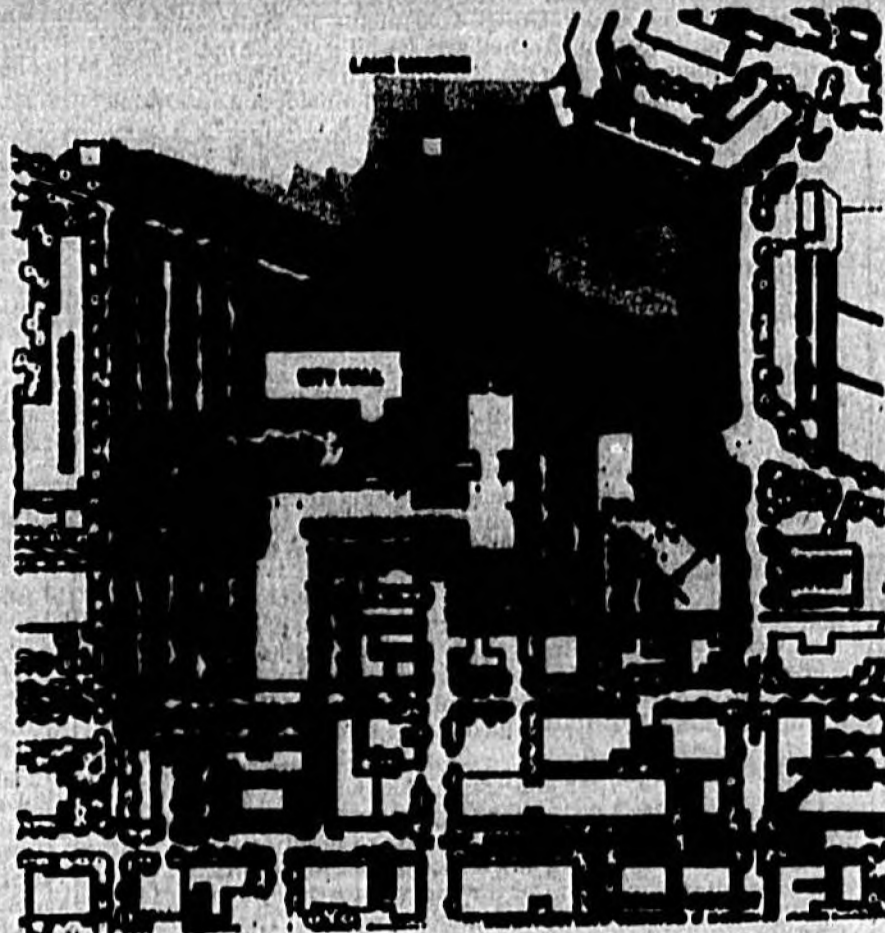
With the funds saved using a phased-in approach, a new Sanford City Hall could be built," he said. McLain's district includes Sanford.

"Instead of a new courthouse, let's consider a new city hall," McLain said. "We can purchase the (current) city hall and use it as a building block for the courthouse."

He proposed a partnership between Sun Bank and the city.

McLain said he was concerned

30 students interested in crime

SANFORD — As Russia struggles to form a democratic society, there are problems as well as advantages to their way of life.

One of the problems the citizens of that fledgling nation have faced is that of increasing criminal activity.

So when a group of 30 cultural exchange students arrived in central Florida recently, they expressed a keen interest in law enforcement facilities in this country. Looking for the best, they said, they selected the Seminole County sheriff's office and the John E. Polk Correctional Facility in Sanford.

The students, ages 14 to 17 are all from Yaroslavl, Russia, a city about 150 miles north of Moscow.

Proposed referendum will place two chiefs under city manager

SANFORD — This Sept. 3, during the Republican primary election, citizens of Sanford, regardless of party affiliation, will also be voting on two items. One would have the police chief and fire chief reporting to the city manager rather than city commission, and the other would move the city election from December to March.

The two chiefs would not actually be mentioned in the proposed referendum. Rather, it would call for a yes or no vote, that the city manager shall "direct and supervise the administration of all departments, offices

and agencies of the city."

The city manager already has control over all but the two chiefs.

City Clerk Jan Dougherty brought the election matter up during the city commission work session Monday afternoon. "What I need is effective dates for these two items," she said.

The request, however, resulted in a confusion of discussions based on two separate matters although pertaining to the position of police chief.

Sanford Chief Ralph Russell has submitted his letter of retirement to the commission, effective Jan. 3, 1997.

Present city policy suggests that if the second in line

Hotel rises above drug haven image

SANFORD — When Claire Gangler read the ad for hotel manager, she was unprepared for what she found when she applied for the job.

"I came home and told my son, 'I love a challenge, but that's ridiculous,'" Gangler said.

The Florida Hotel on Oak Avenue showed signs of neglect that went beyond chipped paint. Owner Joe Ingram admitted at the time Gangler applied, the hotel was rough. Drugs, rowdiness and, according to residents and Gangler, prostitution were common.

But Gangler, a mother of five adult sons, said she saw people who needed help.

She moved into the hotel,

bringing her own brand of management backed by 30 years experience in the hospitality industry. Tough as a drill sergeant and as caring as a mother hen, she drew up a set of rules and enforced them rigidly.

Residents must agree to the following:

- No more than two visitors are allowed at a time.
- No overnight visitors are allowed.
- Radio and televisions must be turned down low after 10 p.m.
- There will be no drugs allowed. If Gangler even has any suspicion, residents must leave.

And according to residents and the hotel owner, she means business.

Nowadays, Gangler said when

Tampan arrested for making checks, says crime's his life

TAMPA — For six weeks Richard Mansueti says he has been making and cashing checks for a detective in Tampa, the investigator trying to stop his counterfeit check business.

He once called the detective and threatened to blow up a school bus if Mansueti did not stop his investigation, he told The Tampa Tribune. And at the scene of one his burglaries June 18, authorities found a note scribbled on the back of a counterfeit check. It read: "Give Detective Mansueti my greetings."

Mansueti, 27, was arrested Tuesday, ending his latest admitted crime spree that included burglaries at a high school and a gas station. The charges he faces include grand theft and 21 counts of larceny.

Making counterfeit checks would have been more profitable were it not for his intelligence in evasion. Mansueti and wild partner, he told the Tribune after his arrest.

"White-collar crime, that's where it's at," Mansueti said. He was called, he says, and asked to make a high-speed clear with numbers from the Hillsborough County Sheriff's

Office. "I refuse to work a regular job."

He told the newspaper he was trying to upgrade the quality of his checks with a better printer when he made his dedication to white-collar crime and turned to burglaries.

Mansueti admitted he stole computer equipment at Hillsborough Junior High School in Gibbstown on June 18.

But he wasn't happy with the quality of the printer. Mansueti said he decided to let a nearby Avon station with the help of a group of teen-agers, he said. Normally he doesn't do burgle-

ries, Mansueti said. This one could not be avoided because he already had spent all his money on drugs, concrete and boat rides.

With two friends on orders to watch for cops and to alert to cops, not to call, Mansueti said he used a blowtorch to get through the gas station's back.

He made off with \$600 to buy a Hewlett-Packard printer at Wal-Mart and went back to business, he said.

Mansueti, who also goes by the name Christian Johnson, was being held today in the Hillsborough County Jail on \$25,000 bond.



Bomber gets life in prison

JACKSONVILLE — A man convicted in an apartment bombing that killed a 70-year-old man has been sentenced to life in prison.

James Arthur Collins, 45, was convicted of the March 1980 bombing at the Cedar Grove Apartments in which Sherwin Friday died. In March, Collins was found guilty of maliciously and knowingly damaging the apartments by explosion.

Friday was killed when a box he found outside his apartment exploded.

Total testimony showed that Collins placed the bomb in a mailbox for being fired as maintenance supervisor at the apartment complex in May 1980.

The federal life sentence doesn't allow parole or early release.

What a hole-in-one

WILDWOOD — Every golfer dreams of a hole-in-one, but not like the experience Bill Self recently had at Kings Lake Golf Club.

The 63-year-old golfer was shooting his next shot the 11th on when a 20-foot putt, 15-foot-deep ditch, opened himself into the hole.

The next day, before planning to do more of the hole, he happened to get a hole-in-one.

"You could call it a hole-in-one on 11," he told the daily newspaper in Leesburg's Fantasy City.

Self was looking for holes at The Fantasy community, located on the golf course just north of Wildwood, at about 7:30 a.m. Sunday to get a few hours of golf.

He drove the car across Fantasy Boulevard and was heading to the clubhouse to meet his partner.

"All of a sudden, the earth gave way," he said.

Chief's office begged

TAMPA — When keys to a stolen car disappeared from the Tampa Fire Department, officials asked a search that turned up an inactive logging device in the chief's office.

Police investigators found the top Sunday in Fire Chief Pete Bane's office while searching for building for electronic logging device, said Capt. Ed Webb, fire department spokesman.

"The thing we wasn't able to determine was whether the device was new or old, whether it had been there a couple of weeks or couple of years," said Webb.

The officials requested the security check about three weeks ago after keys to the office of the chief, fire marshal and general department and the central headquarters were missing.

A long, strange trip

CHARLESTON, S.C. — It's been a long, strange trip for Alvin Thomas of Miami.

Two weeks ago, the motor on Tom's 10-foot boat caught out in the Atlantic Ocean near Miami and he drifted 500 miles north before being rescued days later by some fishermen from Folly Beach.

Then last week, as he set off to return to Miami, the motor caught out again about 50 miles southeast of Charleston. But this time he was close to land and some local residents helped out.

"He was a real nice guy and an excellent seaman," said William S. Roberts of the Sanford, which is off of Tom's boat.

Roberts and his partner, Robert, in Tom's for a 70 horsepower motor during the week before the motor stop. Roberts swapped the gear and got it working and then Roberts and some others gave Tom food, gas and money.

They also let him stay in a dock used by fishermen while he made repairs.

Roberts said Tom left last week, saying he would use the International Waterway to get back to Florida.

'Contact winner' turns in station owner

DELAND — A teen-age girl made an embarrassing mistake by picking up a ringing pay phone while walking by a service station.

The caller identified himself as a car jockey, and he told the 17-year-old girl that she could win money by donating tapes for 30 seconds for the radio station owner, police said.

She performed as instructed, returned to the phone and was told she could win more money by donating the owner's car keys with a radio in the station station.

Again, she did what the caller told her to do. The girl handed a tape, returned to the telephone, heard a voice of gratitude and realized she had been tricked. She ran home to tell her mother, and both went to police, June 18.

She identified Richard Chum, 35, as the man involved and signed a complaint. He was charged Monday with larceny and bond and immediate release and was released on \$2,000 bond.

Florida Bar seeks injunction against Miami-based attorney

MIAMI — Accusing a Miami attorney of "fraudulent practices," the Florida Bar asked the state Supreme Court to stop the lawyer from further contact with any relatives of victims in the crash of TWA Flight 800. Jeffrey Lee Allen is the third lawyer the Bar has taken action against since the DC-9 plunged into the Everglades on May 11, killing 110 people.

Tuesday's petition was the result of a Bar investigation into the conduct of attorneys who visited a hotel to seek business from relatives gathered there in the days after the crash.

Earlier this month, the high court issued a restraining order against Hamilton Hernandez and Pablo Pava to prevent them from contacting family members, pending a Bar disciplinary hearing.

Family members say they were harassed by some lawyers and their employees trying to get their businesses through phone, mail or in person.

In an affidavit, Bruce E. Newbold said Allen gave him this card even though the complaint he filed already had an attorney. Newbold's two contacts were killed in the crash.

Allen also wants a return to review any existing contract or agreement entered by Allen in connection with the TWA jet crash.

Marlins 5, Giants 4, 10 innings

MIAMI — Charles Johnson singled home the winning run with one out in the 10th inning Tuesday night and the Florida Marlins beat San Francisco 5-4, the Giants' fifth straight loss.

The Giants tied it in the ninth on Shawn Dunston's leadoff homer against Robb Nen.

Gary Sheffield, who earlier hit his 23rd home run, drew a leadoff walk from Rod Beck (0-3). Jeff Conine grounded into a forceout, but Terry Pendleton followed with a double.

Kurt Abbott was intentionally walked to load the bases, and Johnson singled cleanly to left.

Trailing 3-2, the Marlins took the lead in the sixth inning when Sheffield hit an RBI single and Pendleton had a sacrifice fly.

Sheffield and Kurt Abbott homered in the second, giving Florida a 2-0 lead.

San Francisco took a 3-2 lead in the sixth on Robby Thompson's two-run homer.

More upsets at Wimbledon

WIMBLEDON, England — Fifth-seeded Yevgeny Kafelnikov became the latest upset victim at Wimbledon, losing 7-6 (8-6), 6-3, 6-7 (7-2), 4-6, 7-6, to Britain's Tim Henman.

It's the first time that five of the top eight seeds failed to reach the second round.

Steff Graf, showing no signs of a troubling knee injury, opened her bid for a seventh Wimbledon title with a 6-4, 6-1 win over Ludmila Richterova.

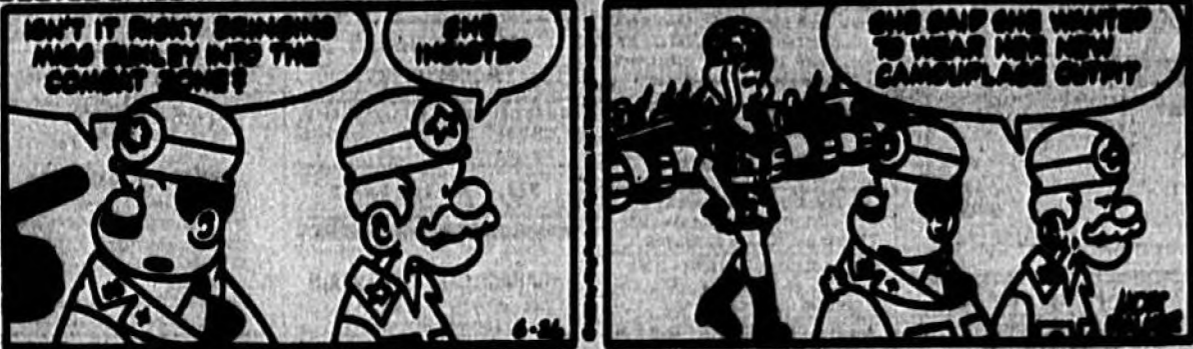

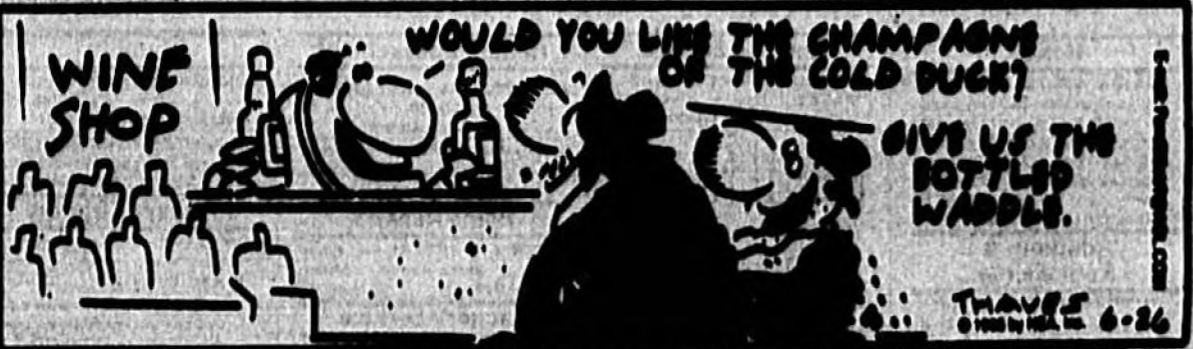

Caffeine could be the culprit



PETER GOTT, M.D.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Why haven't you written about headaches and the caffeine connection? I discovered that one and a half cups of coffee a day could cause six headaches a day. My doctor suggested abstaining from caffeine and things are in better control.

DEAR READER: It's true that some people are especially sensitive to caffeine, which may cause headache, irritability and insomnia. However, such reactions are not common in the general population. In fact, many headache remedies contain caffeine; for some people the drug can actually reduce the severity of migraines.

Your doctor deserves credit for suggesting that you eliminate caffeine from your diet. The ploy worked and you should cheer the abstention. Don't forget to check the labels on non-prescription medicines before taking them, as I mentioned, many over-the-counter drugs contain small amounts of caffeine.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Every now and then about an hour after eating, my husband will go to the bathroom and announce that his meal "ran right through him." I say that's impossible. Who's right?

DEAR READER: You're both correct. Your husband's perception is valid: A meal did run through him — probably one he had the day before, not the most recent one. Your view is also accurate: Food is not evacuated in a matter of minutes; it takes hours.

Here is what I think is happening. Your husband eats a meal that, for one reason or another, causes tremendous bowel stimulation and accelerated peristalsis. This causes him to have diarrhea that is composed of the partially digested remains of a previous meal.

Although certain substances — notably laxative salts — will rapidly traverse the entire intestine in a matter of an hour or two, regular food moves through much more slowly (several hours). Thus, diarrhea that immediately follows a meal is made up of food from which water has not been extracted) that was probably eaten long before.

Because this symptom may reflect a harmless intestinal disorder called irritable bowel syndrome, I am sending you a copy of my Health Report "Irritable Bowel Syndrome." DEAR DR. GOTT: What happens physiologically in the case of essential tremor? It appears there is a short-circuit somewhere between the brain

and the muscles. What progression and deterioration can I expect? Would chiropractic adjustment help?

DEAR READER: No one knows the

cause of benign essential tremor, a harmless hereditary condition marked by face-to-face, slow shaking of the head, hands and voice that is often accentuated by stress and the performance of skilled work.

The affliction is probably not due to a "short-circuit" in the central nervous system, as are many, more serious neurological disorders, such as multiple sclerosis.

Although essential tremor tends to increase with age, it does not lead to deterioration. Small amounts of alcohol or beta-blockers may suppress the tremor, which is not affected in any way by chiropractic manipulation.

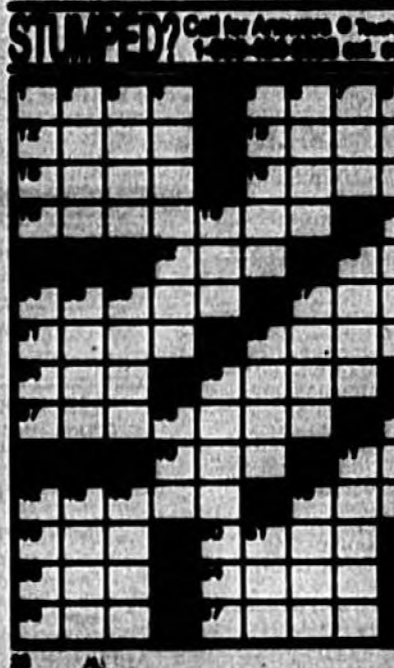

Slowly up, quickly down

What was English poet Lord Byron's full title? In "The Deformed Transformed," Byron wrote, "What's a drinking? A mere pause from thinking!"

Well, at the bridge table, when the dummy has appeared, you should pause to drink in the cards. Don't "win" if you go down, like today's declarer, because you played too quickly.

Both teams in a match reached four hearts by South. The speedy declarer won the spade lead with his ace, ruffed a spade in the dummy and then paused for thought — too late! He was destined to finish one down.

The second declarer took a long pull on his soda before playing from the dummy at trick one. After winning in hand, he led his singleton club.

If West had won with the ace and switched to a trump, declarer would have won in hand and played a diamond, reaching the 10-trick goal one way or another. So, West withheld his ace, hoping declarer would misguess. However, after West's overall, this wasn't likely. South called for dummy's club king, ruffed a club back to hand and led a diamond to dummy's queen. West correctly playing low. Declarer ruffed a club high in hand, ruffed a spade in the dummy, drew trumps and was gin with one spade, six hearts, one diamond, one club and one spade ruff in the dummy.

A final point: If West leads a trump at trick one, the contract can be defeated. Suppose South wins and plays his club. West goes in with the ace and leads his second trump. As long as West leads the first diamond, nine tricks are South's limit.
