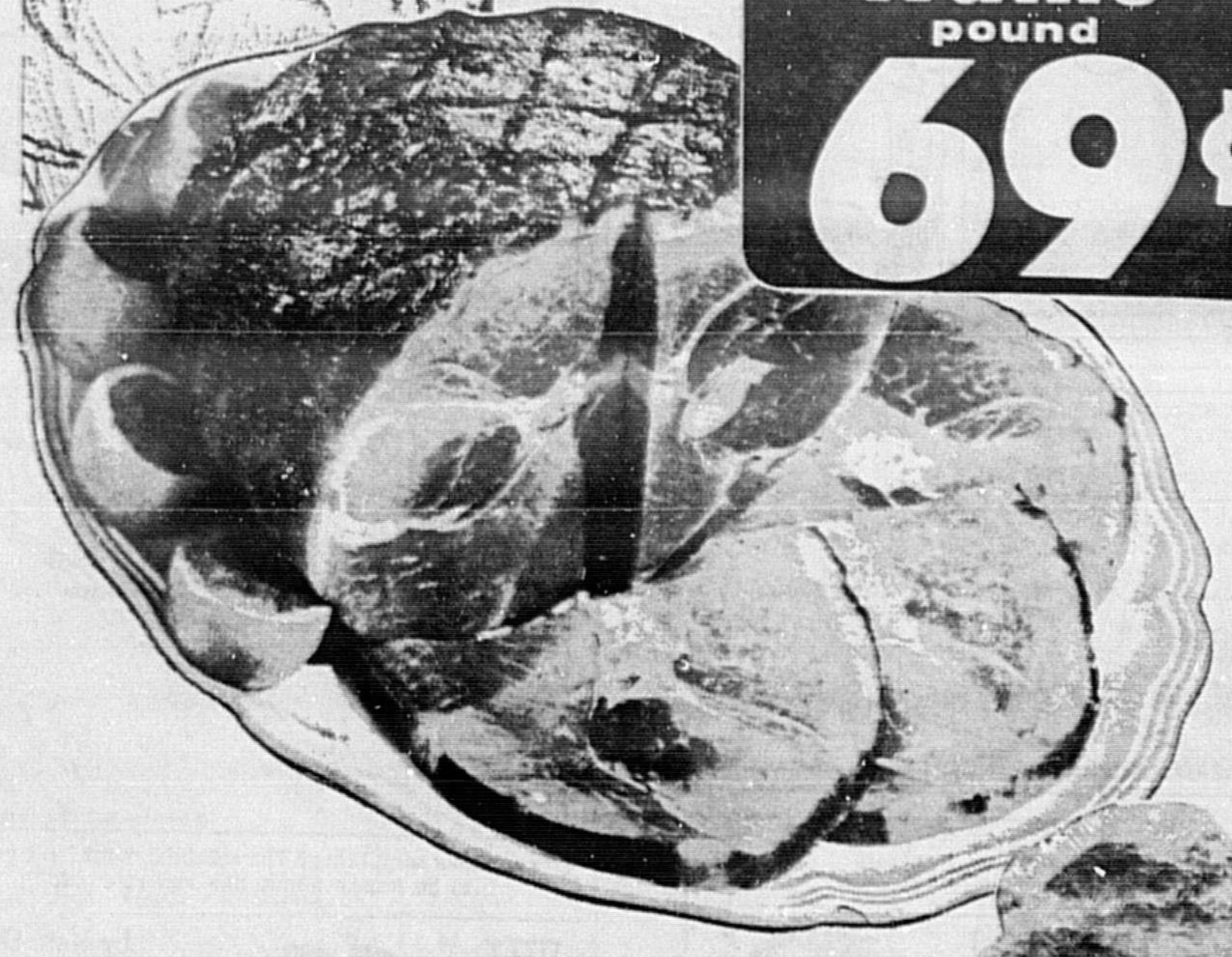

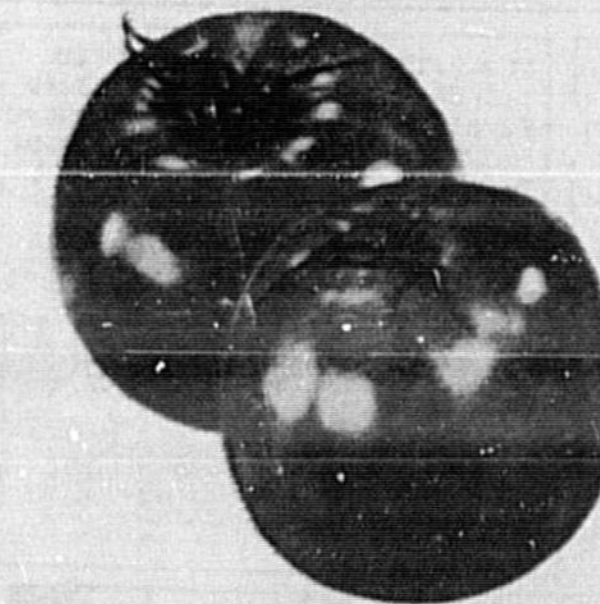

School Mix Illegal In Earle Measure

A bill which would prohibit the assignment of public school students in Florida on the basis of race, creed, color or national origin. The measure is based on a New York state law enacted in 1969.

Earle described the bill, by saying: "My bill makes it illegal to assign students to Florida public schools on the basis of race, creed, color or national origin. I believe it is time to force the ultra-liberal to swallow a good dose of his own medicine. We can all agree that race should not be a factor in the treatment of individuals under the law.

"It is only logical then that it is morally and legally wrong to force a student or teacher of any race to attend a certain school on account of his race. Such forced assignment is in fact the worst sort of racism.

"It will be very interesting to watch the liberals choke on this bill, since the language is based upon the New York state pupil assignment law. All I want is for Florida students to have at least as much freedom as New York state students! If the federal courts, in their great wisdom, should decide that my bill is invalid, then New York's pupil assignment law will also be invalid. The South may not 'rise again', but my bill may at least cause nothern hypocrisy to fall!"

Casselberry Meets 'New Lawman'

Police Chief Hassle Goes On

Two police chiefs eyed each other last night at the Casselberry City Council meeting ... one was trying to hold onto his job; the other wanted the job.

The principals in the City Council battle really sat on the side lines, with nothing to say, listening as Mayor Curtis Blow and councilmen argued between themselves.

Police Chief Donald Brumley is trying to hold onto his job, his reappointment overdue since early January.

Introduced by Mayor Blow as the man he will present at next Monday's meeting for appointment as police chief was Donald Stanley, presently police chief at Safety Harbor, a small community west of Tampa.

The status of Brumley has been a question ever since Blow did not reappoint the former Sanford police sergeant as chief near the first of the year. The council has maintained Brumley as chief. The mayor has not suspended Brumley from his office. According to reliable sources in Casselberry Blow is expected to suspend Brumley if Stanley is not appointed next week.

The three councilmen leveling criticism at Blow were Richard Wirz, Louis Kirby and William Grier. The three councilmen insisted that they have never seen any allegations against Brumley and that the citizens of city seemed "well pleased with the chief."

According to council chairman Thomas Napier a letter was sent to the mayor requesting that Blow's allegations against Brumley, and that Napier had received them. City Attorney Kenneth McIntosh told the council that it would not be in the best interest of the city for Napier to reveal the Mayor's allegations at this time.

Napier sat quietly as the council looked at his intended replacement's qualifications. Stanley was also in the room, awaiting any of the councilman's questions.

If Brumley is suspended by Blow he has the right to ask the council to review the charges against him as they would then become a quasi-judicial body, according to McIntosh.

New Clerk OK'd For Sheriff

Army Reserves, Others Join Saturday Scout Camp Work Slated

County commissioners approved employment of an additional clerk typist for the sheriff's department at a meeting held last night.

Sheriff John Polk indicated in a letter to commissioners that his request for an additional clerk in the criminal department stemmed from an increased number of criminal cases.

Total number of cases for 1969-1970 were 4,802, and in the first five months of 1969-1970 were 2,054.

Anticipated caseload was a given as 5,468 for a total increase of 1,666. Average number of cases for 1969-1970 per month are 359. This number does not include cases that are nolle prossed, plead not guilty or cases from justices of the peace handled by the sheriff's office.

Commissioner Greg Drummond felt that the department could manage with the three current employees and that an "internal shifting of responsibility was needed." Chairman John Alexander stipulated that the additional clerk not be assigned to the criminal department per se but assist in civil cases also. Funds for the clerk's position already has been budgeted from the other employee salary account.

Dedication Slated

The newly constructed Bernarr Macfadden gymnasium of Sanford Naval Academy will be dedicated on March 24, according to Rear Adm. Harry Smith (USN-Ret.), superintendent of the school, which is one of the five Naval honor schools in the United States.

The dedication address will be given by Joseph P. Wiegors, chairman of the board of the Bernarr Macfadden Foundation (sponsor of the Sanford Naval Academy), and son-in-law of the late Bernarr Macfadden, the world renowned exponent of physical culture, for whom the gymnasium has been named.

The mayor of Sanford and civic and business leaders have been invited to the dedication. The dedication is one of a number of events planned for the annual Parents' Day at the Academy. Parents from many communities in Florida, from other states and from countries outside of the United States will be present during the dedication and will participate in many of the events that will be planned.

Parents are expected from Florida, Georgia, Alabama, Illinois, Virginia, South Carolina, New Jersey, Maryland and Thailand.

A full dress parade will be held at 10 a.m. March 25, at which time the entire battalion of midshipmen of the academy will be formed and pass in review at Sanford Municipal Stadium. The public is invited.

No. Orlando Opens Election Campaign

Sanford's 5-ene Improvement Board (SIB) is "between a rock and a hard place" regarding the availability of a city commitment for providing funds for paying half of costs of implementing SIB's five city beautification projects.

This indication of the City Commission that it will provide for 50 per cent of estimated \$100,000 costs of undertaking city beautification is needed before an application can be made to U.S. Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for equal matching funds to finance the same projects.

Attending the SIB session today were W. E. Knowles, city manager; Gerry Dake, city planner; Lynn Raiser, city building official; George Hoff-Deer Abby.

Councilman David Tilson, who is opposing incumbent Clifford Jordan for the mayoralty of North Orlando, initiated his campaign at a meeting of village council last night. Tilson took a verbal blast at Jordan in regard to favoritism in enforcement of an ordinance relating to trailers.

The ordinance specifically states that no house trailers are permitted in residential areas, and that campers only are permitted in yards if they are occupied.

Tilson told council that one resident had such a camper and used it for guest accommodations. When Police Chief Lynn Lyon was apprised of the situation and attempted to enforce the law, the resident called Jordan. Jordan gave permission since it was an overnight stay.

Tilson contended that the ordinance should be enforced or that the mayor be empowered to grant "on the spot" variances. Tilson maintained that the law should apply to everyone and not at the whim of the mayor.

Tilson continued that after the incident another resident learned of the mayor's exception and allowed his son and a guest to sleep in a camper in the resident's yard. The resident "naturally" maintained a "what's sauce for the goose" attitude. Tilson contended that mayor's action opened a "Pandora's box" of future incidents unless action were taken.

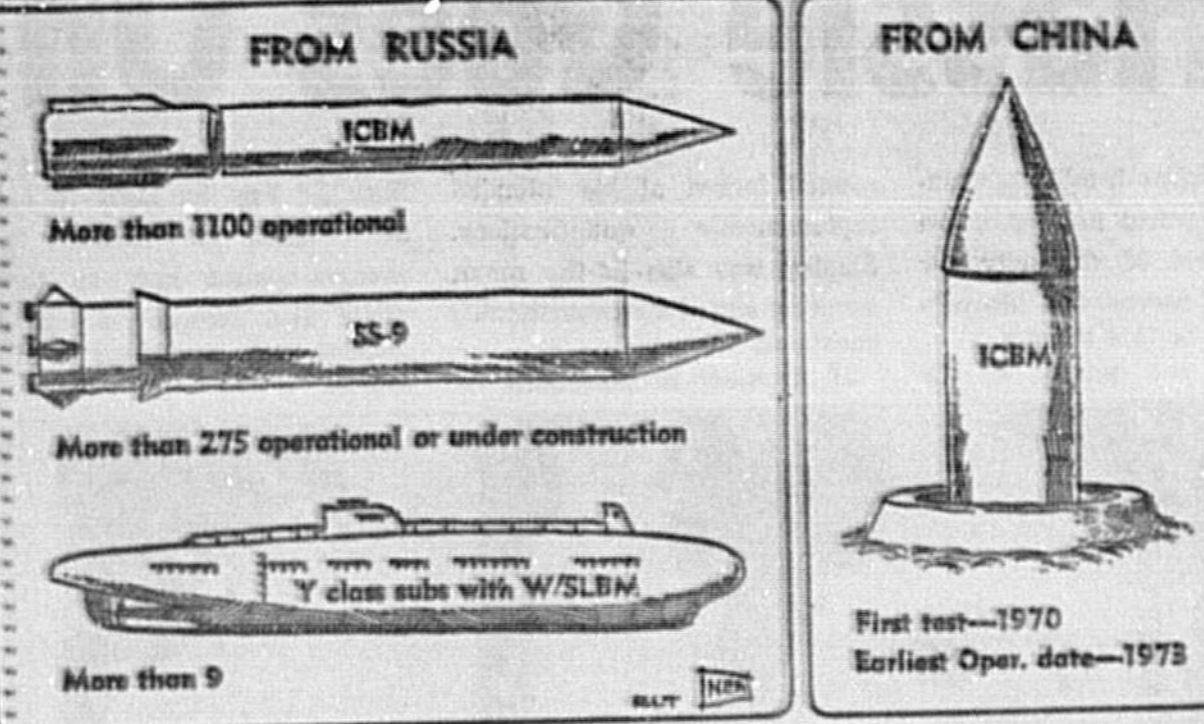
Tilson also mentioned the abandonment of junk vehicles, another violation of the ordinance. (Continued on Page 2A, Col. 2)

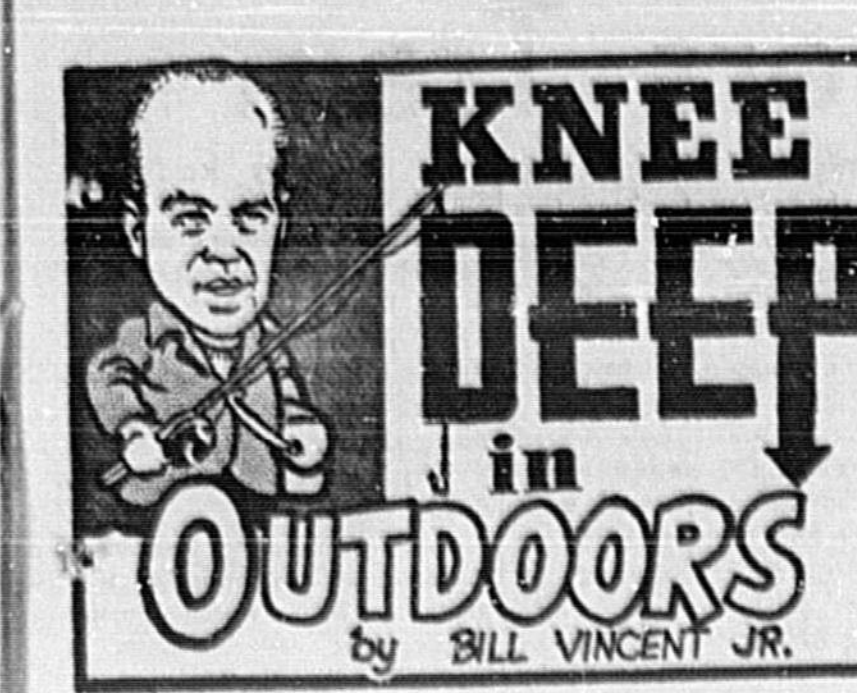

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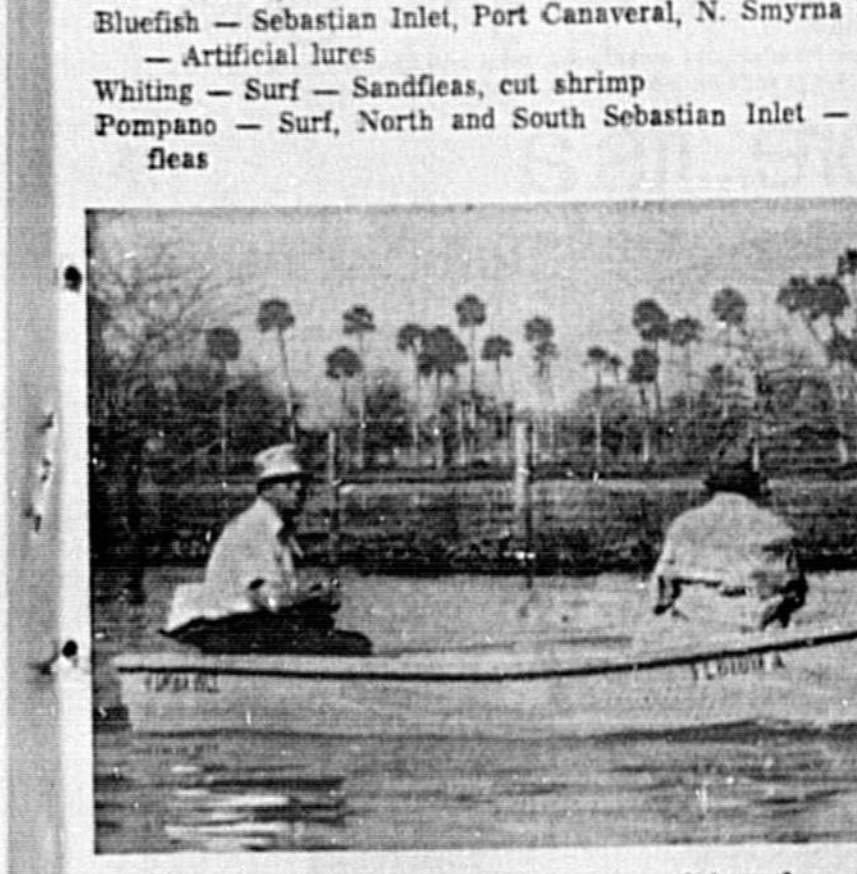

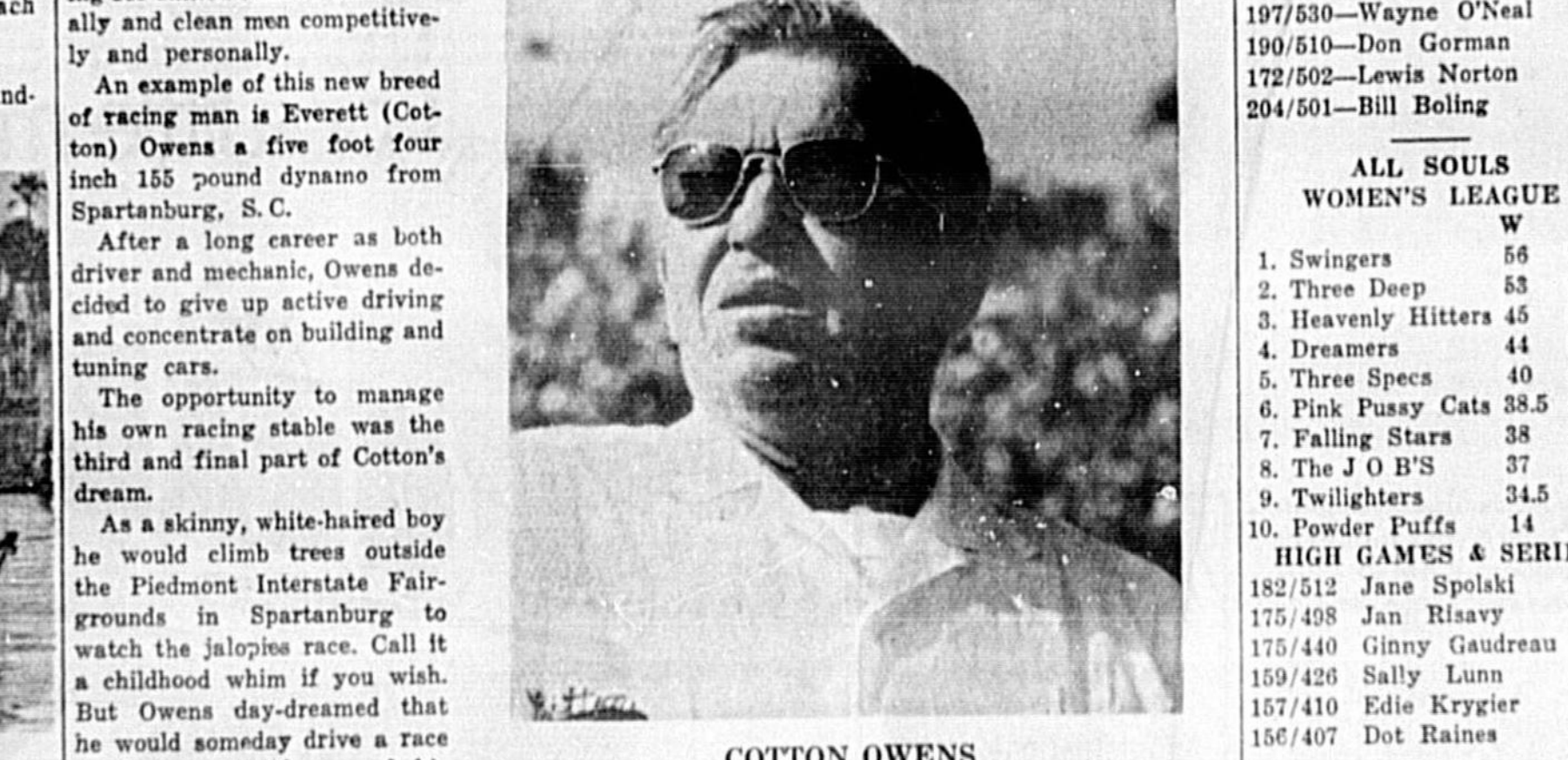

Kirk Sees Satellites' Other Uses

MIAMI (AP) — Gov. Claude Kirk said today Florida may begin using satellites to keep up with oil spillages in the state's ports.

Kirk said Florida is looking into the possible use of satellites which monitor ocean tides and weather conditions and other natural phenomena.

"Hopefully we can rent time on these (satellites) and keep pace on everybody," Kirk said.

The governor, appearing on NBC television's "Today" show originating in Miami, said also his administration—through Lt. Gov. Ray Osborne—is going to suggest to the Legislature next month that a package of laws be passed on oil and chemical spillages.

"Our lovely lieutenant governor, who's a wonderful guy, will have a 14 point program that we're going to introduce to our legislature we hope to cover this with punitive measures," Kirk said.

In February there were oil spillages in Tampa Bay, the St. Johns River and St. Mark River. Acid spilled into Tampa Bay in another incident.

"A lot of these ports are not really doing what they should be doing with what they call oil buffers," Kirk said. "If they had that we wouldn't have any problem. It's sort of like having a city without a fire department."

Kirk, who arrived at an open air studio on Disneyworld Bay in a cabin cruiser, also was asked about his stand on busing to integrate Florida schools.

"Florida's the No. 1 state in the nation in the sense of compliance with school integration rulings," he said. "We probably do a better job of it than you do in New York. But the problem is that forced busing is illegal and immoral."

"Anybody who is forced busing... what they're saying is that the ghetto is always going to be there and it's always going to be black and so we're going to let them ride an extra hour every morning and every afternoon just to taste something else. We are insisting that they (ghettos) are not going to always be there and always going to be black," Kirk said.

Pools Gas Heaters Proposed

If one owns a swimming pool, yet hasn't been in it since Thanksgiving — or before — one needs to talk to the "friendly gas man." Because gas pool heaters make it possible to use a pool in all but the worst of winter weather.

Here in South Florida, experts agree that there are seldom as many as 15 days in any winter when it wouldn't be perfectly comfortable in a heated pool.

And new, improved designs, introduced in the last years or so, have greatly reduced the expense. In simple terms, if one can afford a swimming pool, one can afford to heat it. Because pool sizes and locations vary so widely, it is impossible to quote exact figures. However, gas engineers say a good rule-of-thumb is that a heating system will cost approximately ten per cent of the cost of the pool itself.

That's a small investment, they say, when it will double the return on the much larger investment represented by the cost of the pool. Conservatively, they figure a family with a heated pool can use it twice as much as one without heat. This applies not only to mid-winter, but to evenings and early morning dips in spring and fall when absence of the sun's warming rays make things just a little too chilly.

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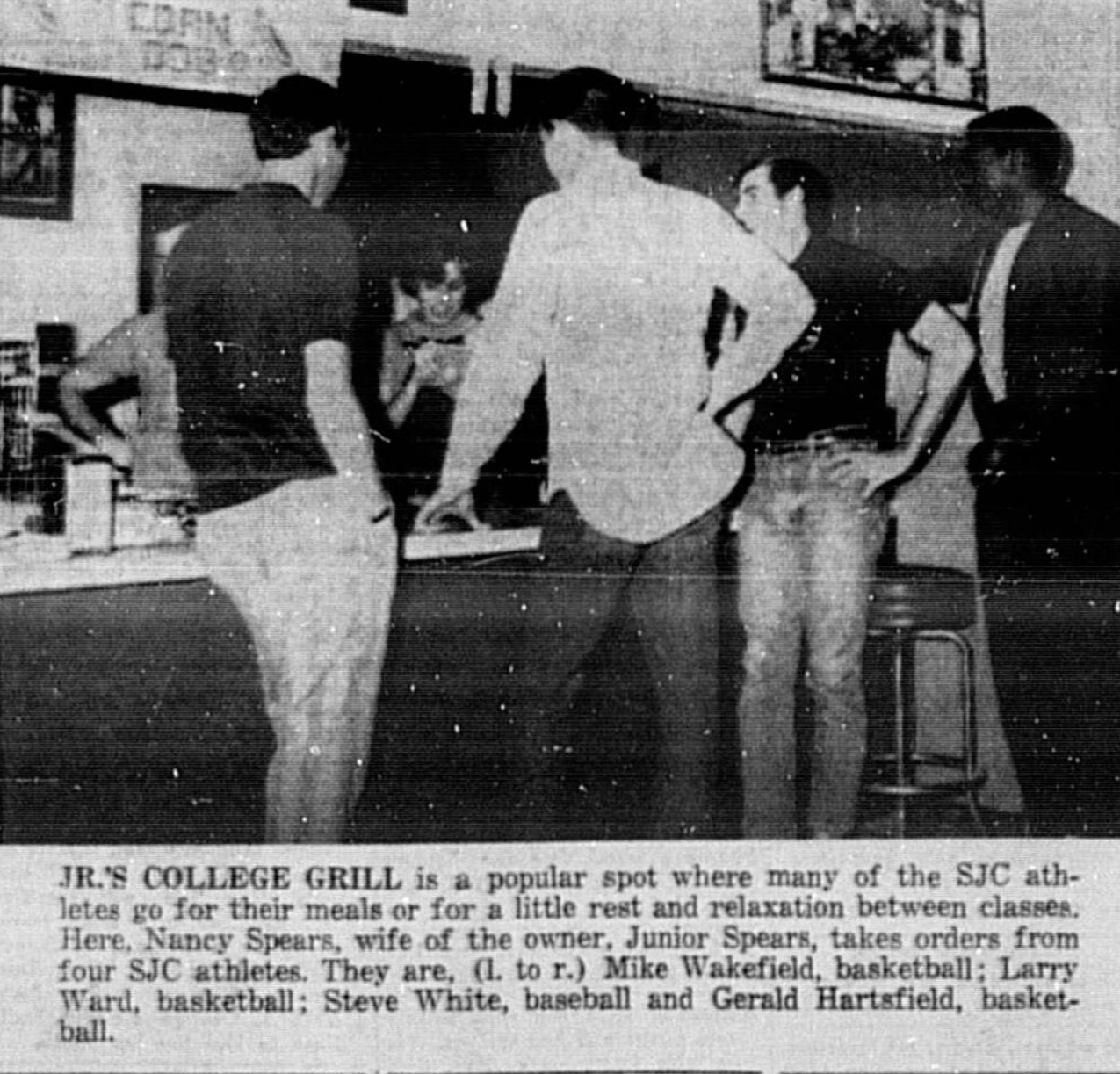

Altamonte's Firemen Wary Of 436 Traffic

The traffic situation in Altamonte Springs has become so hazardous on SR 436 and Longwood Avenue the municipal fire trucks are experiencing difficulty in answering alarms and are being delayed by as much as four minutes. The trucks are unable to reach the intersection and Chief Gary Kaiser admonished City Council at a meeting yesterday for the trucks to enter the oncoming lanes in tantamount to "suicide."
The situation also received the consideration of Police Chief Fred Folsom, who made recommendations to council regarding SR 436. Folsom advised that no left turns should be allowed on SR 436 at its intersection with SR 436; that parking in front of the postoffice be prohibited on SR 436 between Longwood Avenue and Newberryport and that the speed limit on SR 436 be reduced to 30 miles per hour within the city limits in order that local traffic may enter.
Council is forwarding a request to the state Department of Transportation (DOT) asking the agency to order the above recommendations by the police chief be placed in effect.

For Altamonte Anti-Pollution \$304,000 Grant OK'd

The city of Altamonte Springs has been recommended to the Federal Water Pollution Control Administration for a grant of \$304,000 in connection for sewer facilities for the municipality. The project was stated by the State of Florida Department of Air and Water Pollution Control as having conformed with the water pollution control plan of the state and is listed as No. 31 on the department's priority recommendations for the fiscal year 1970.

Phase I and Phase II documents have been submitted to the federal agency, and cover collection and pumping facilities for two separate geographic areas. The treatment plant plans cover initial construction of an aereated lagoon system called Phase I. The Phase I lagoon facilities are now under construction.
Construction of the permanent treatment facility and all of Phase II is expected to begin in 45 days. The Phase I plant will be incorporated into the

overall Phase II plant as part of the polling pond system. The federal agency was asked to consider Phase I reimbursement and Phase II conventional PL-600 grant. The state agency recommended that the municipality be considered for a 10 per cent bonus for conforming to wide area planning.
Notification of the project approval is the culmination of a dream of six years by Altamonte Springs Mayor W. Lawrence Swafford. When the letter of approval was read to a meeting of city council yesterday, consulting Engineer Harold Redcliff stated the record should reflect "let's do it now." Swafford quipped "yes, but the proper ones are not here."
Swafford commended the municipality does not intend to raise taxes but will "make the system pay for itself." He was understandably elated and remarked that the dream "was about to come true in spite of a lot of people who thought it wouldn't work." In answer to Redcliff's statement of "we told you so" Swafford replied tongue in cheek, "Let's let the press tell them."
A bond ordinance for sewer construction was placed on first reading at the meeting, and was subsequently adopted as first reading. During the lengthy reading of the ordinance by Redcliff, William P. An and fiscal agent Kirby Gundy, Swafford asked Gundy if he were fatigued to which Gundy exclaimed, "Gosh no, I've been waiting for this moment for six years, too..."

Police Chief Job In Air

Donald Stanley, Mayor Curtis Blow's nominee to replace Casselberry Police Chief Donald Brumley, told The Herald this morning via phone from Safety Harbor, where he is presently police chief, that he was totally "unaware of the police chief situation in Casselberry."
Stanley said that he did not know any of the circumstances surrounding the mayor's intended replacement of Brumley and that he now is going to investigate before he would accept the controversial job.
Stanley told The Herald, in an exclusive interview, that he had been told by former Casselberry Police Chief James McCall, who is presently in a law enforcement capacity in West Florida, that there was an opening for police chief in Casselberry and that he simply requested an application and submitted it to Blow for the job.
McCall was fired on Jan. 12, 1969, by Blow. A Herald story published on Jan. 14, the following day, gave the following reasons for McCall's non-reappointment by Blow. Quoting from the story, "Blow made it clear to citizens attending the council meeting that he would not publicly divulge his reasons for not reappointing McCall. He did tell residents, however, that he would discuss the matter with them individually if they would have the former chief with them in his office for the discussion."
According to The Herald story, "Last year, Mayor Blow had a continuing fight all year over Chief McCall. The council insisted McCall should be replaced while the mayor insisted on his authority to name the head of the police department."
