

British Army Wins Flaming Six-Hour Battle In Egypt

Allied Planes Pound Retreating Enemy Forces As Fight Picks Up Speed

CAROL, Nov. 4. (AP)—Directly behind the British heavy bombers destroyed the medium sized merchant vessels and approximately half of the jetties in the harbor of Tobruk, a United States Army Middle East communication announced today.

Britain's desert armies were reported today to have won the first major test in the new campaign for Egypt by routing the Axis in a flaming six-hour tank battle and jeopardizing Field Marshal Erwin Rommel's entire position on the El Alamein front, 80 miles west of Alexandria.

A Cairo bulletin said the British Eighth Army again thrust itself forward in two sectors along the 38-mile front Monday, and again yesterday after defeating Rommel's tank forces Monday.

The British offensive is now in full swing with Allied planes pounding the withdrawing Axis forces.

Outlasting a 10-day drive, painstaking at first through the Axis depth defenses, the Imperials yesterday burst into the open desert where it was tank against tank and gun against gun.

A number of enemy tanks were knocked out and many prisoners were taken in a new advance, a British communiqué said, "and heavy fighting continues."

The battle line was swinging westward from the El Alamein front, where the British had drawn all their mobile formations from the southern and central sectors into the northern sector behind a vanguard of 500 tanks, including American-made "General Grants" and "General Sherburnes."

G. O. P. Gains Seats In Both House, Senate

The Democrats had elected 200 House members and had lost a net of 12 seats of who were elected to represent the state.



Bulldogs Go Through Passing Scrimmage To Meet U. Of F.

ATHENS, Ga., Nov. 4. — Warned by scouts that Florida's line is one of the toughest in the South, Coach Wallace Butts sent the Bulldogs through a long passing scrimmage Tuesday afternoon, the first workout of the week for the 22 boys who did the playing against Alabama Saturday.

Coach Howell Hollis, who watched the Gators play Maryland, said Coach Tom Lieb had developed a line that is capable of stopping Georgia's running game unless it is at the peak, in which case the Bulldogs will have to duplicate their last week's performance and take to the air.

Captain Frankie Slinkwich, who tossed the winning touchdown heaves against Alabama, was hitting his targets with deadly precision this afternoon.

Slinkwich, incidentally, is headed for a new world's record for total ground gained this season. The football, mostly by passing, has racked up 1237 yards against seven opponents to lead the Nation.

Had Schwank set the existing record last year when he led the Nation with 1928 yards, Slinkwich has four more games to play, which means he will have to average only 123 yards per tilt to break the record. In the seven games to date he has an average of 205 yards. Frankie's best effort was against the University of Cincinnati when he came through with 363 yards on four pass completions and 136 yards rushing.

Against Alabama he was stopped almost cold on the ground, getting only 26 yards, but his passes averaged 271.

Frankie played one of his best games last season against Florida, scoring two touchdowns and kicking a field goal. If he can repeat that performance this week, then Georgia's stock will be much more valuable.

Georgia will leave for the Florida tilt Thursday morning and will put up at The Inn at Ponte Vedra Beach. Hotel accommodations were not available in Jacksonville.

Since all hands came through the Alabama tilt without injury, Coach Butts will probably stick to his usual lineup against the Gators.

Juke Joint Brawl Brought Before City Court Judge

Jealousy, a juke joint brawl, and two revolvers found on the floor of the juke joint in Goldsboro after the brawl led to the arrest and arraignment before Judge F. L. Miller in City Court Monday evening of Moses Singletary, jealous negro husband and J. B. Marshall, dapper and well-dressed negro, whose alleged attentions to Singletary's wife were the stated cause of the quarrel.

Singletary said that on a previous occasion, he had gone to the home of Marshall to "reason" with him, and that he only carried a gun for "protection." He added that Marshall had pulled a knife on him and that the only thing that prevented a fight then was the fact that Marshall's wife had pulled him inside the house.

On the evening of the brawl, J. B. Marshall was, he said, seated in the "caboose" or booth of the juke joint, listening to a "piccolo solo." Suddenly Singletary entered, revolver in hand. Scared witless, Marshall found himself gotten out quickly. It was brought out that Marshall quickly knocked the gun out of Singletary's hand. Singletary insisted that the other revolver, later found on the floor, belonged to Marshall, but no proof of this was found.

The case ended when Judge Miller adjudged Singletary guilty on two counts \$50 and costs of 90 days for carrying a concealed weapon, and \$15 and costs of 45 days for assault and threats. Marshall, prior to being dismissed, was lectured by Judge Miller, and told to avoid all appearance of paying attention to another man's wife.
