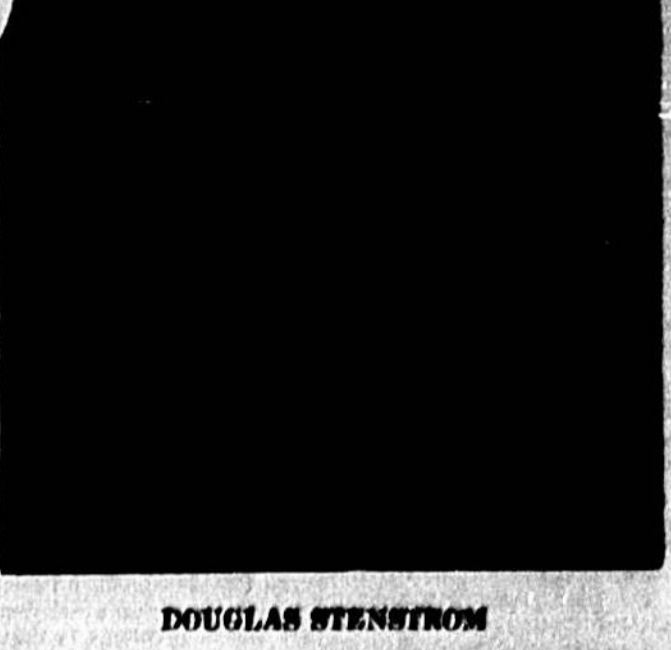

A Record Year For Seminole Banks In '67

Banks in Seminole County had a record business year in 1967 with prospects even brighter for 1968, survey by The Herald today shows.

Sanford Atlantic National Bank experienced an all time record growth during the year with deposits of \$152 million at end of the year, up 11 per cent over 1966. The bank's loan portfolio reports \$127 million in assets, a highest loan volume ever recorded.

During the year, Sanford Atlantic completed an exterior remodeling program. Purchase of 25 feet of First Street frontage from McCarty Corporation also was made and plans are now on the drawing boards for complete interior expansion and remodeling.

Florida State Bank of Sanford, which cites 1967 as the second best year in its history, shows an asset increase of \$2.3 million over 1966. Cash dividends to stockholders of \$33,000 represented a 10 per cent increase over the previous year and retained earnings increase was \$43,000.

The computer room was increased, completely enclosed in glass and equipped with modern heat, cooling and humidity control and overall operational space was increased by 800 square feet.

Total assets at U.S. Bank of Seminole in Sanford Plaza at end of the year were \$4.2 million, up \$2.9 million from 1966. Deposits of \$1.4 million represented a 50 per cent increase over the previous year.

With accounts to date of more than 4,000 persons, the bank has opened more than 5 1/2 new accounts each business day since it began operations Feb. 27, 1965. First dividends in the less than three years in operation, paid Dec. 27 at 20 cents per share, totaled \$6,000.

Industry locating in the county presents an optimistic outlook for 1968 and the years to come. A solid economic growth for the entire county is expected in spite of the imminent move of Sanford Naval Air Station.

South Seminole Bank reports a 30.9 per cent increase in deposits with a 28.4 per cent increase in assets. Total resources at end of the year were \$12.2 million with deposits at \$10.9 million. Stock dividends in 1967 were \$10,000.

Conner Nixes Goldsboro Center Site

The State Dept. of Agriculture has turned down the city's request for the Farmer's Market property on W. 13th St. for a Goldsboro Recreation Center.

An official of Commissioner Doyle Conner's office today reported the project was turned down to "make way for future expansion of the market."

City Commissioners last night discussed the possibility of appealing to Conner in person but no action was taken.

The commission had gone on record as not spending more than \$100,000 for the market. However, if the board is forced to purchase another piece of property, that figure will skyrocket.

In other business at the meeting last night the board approved a \$7,500 storm sewer master drainage plan study to be done by Clark Dietz and Associates. The survey will take in all of Sanford and include ways to alleviate flooding and loading of the sewers. Earl E. Gignatham abstained from voting on the motion saying the taxpayers couldn't bear any increase in ad valorem taxes. However, the \$7,500 was included in this year's budget and if the massive project is undertaken it will be done in phases.
