## FOUR HUNDRED HOMES IN THE BOTTOM LANDS UNDER WATER OF FLOODS

Washed Away and Rich Lands Ruined

(Hy The Associated Press) OMAHA, Nebr., March 24.—Unprecedented ice gorges in the Missouri river and tributary, streams have precipitated conditions which present a flood menace for all lowland between Vermillion and Omaha flooding of thousands of aeres of rich farm lands in three states and the destruction of farm homes and at least a partial inundation of Sloux City and several lesser cities and towns.

More than four hundred homes in the bottom lands of Sloux City are untenable and a two-foot rise in the waters of the Floyd river backing up from the Missouri river would, according to authorities, inundate an additional forty residential blocks.
