Mere Survival May Become Chief Concern

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Mere survival may become man's chief concern in an overpopulated, underfed world, says a prominent scientist.

Dr. George Harrar, president of the Rockefeller Foundation of New York, Tuesday night told a California Institute of Technology conference on "The Next 90 Years."

"The more developed nations cannot for any considerable period of time or in any significant dimension feed portions of the world which remain static in terms of their own food production efforts.

"Unless this is clearly understood and maximum efforts are made to reverse systems of underproduction wherever they exist, survival will indeed become man's chief concern."

Earlier in the conference three Caltech professors, who wrote a best-selling book "The Next 100 Years" 10 years ago, revised their forecasts gloomily on the basis of events since then.

"They reported the earth's population is growing more rapidly than expected and that the world is likely to run into a food crisis within 10 years instead of 100.

Caltech biologist James Bonner cited a widening gap between rich and poor nations and predicted: "We will, I suspect, begin to regard the starving populace of the undeveloped nations as a race or species apart, people totally different from us, as indeed they will be."

"They are just animals," he will say, "and a serious reservoir of disease." The inevitable culmination of the two cultures will be that one culture (the rich) will devour the other."

ALLIGATOR POACHERS MIAMI (AP)—South Florida game wardens say alligator poachers are their biggest problem.

The alligators are protected by law but their hides can fetch up to \$1,000 a night. Wardens say the gator hunters have two-way radios to warn each other when officers approach. They use airplanes to spot concentrations of alligators by day, then visit promising locations under cover of night.

Wardens in the Everglades area spend at least a third of their time trying to protect the alligators.

"We have to spend so much time slapping mosquitoes at night out in the 'glades trying to catch these fellows before they kill off every 'gator in America," say Game and Fish Commission area supervisor Tom Shirley.

Labor Dept. Would Police Union Elections

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Labor Department is asking the Supreme Court to strengthen the department's hand in policing union elections.

It wants a broader interpretation of the 1959 Landrum-Griffin law than the "grudging approach" taken by lower courts. Under the law the secretary of labor can step in after a union member has exhausted machinery within the union for challenging election procedures.

The Labor Department does not quarrel with that interpretation. But it maintains that once the secretary steps in, he has the power to go beyond "the four corners of the complaint" and, if he finds any violation, to ask the court to set aside not only the election the union member challenged but also subsequent ones.

At the same time, the department says it is empowered by the federal law to supervise a new election, under court order, once the earlier election has been found invalid.

"Without supervised elections, those who have been illegally chosen might perpetuate themselves in office through their control of the election machinery, using techniques which are not demonstrably unfair but which nonetheless favor incumbents," the department has told the court through the solicitor general's office.

If no supervised election is conducted to break this cycle of control, a single invalid election may taint several which follow it.

At the moment the department has 28 such cases pending in federal courts.

If the reasoning of the lower courts is not reversed by the Supreme Court, the department contends, these lawsuits face wholesale dismissal.

Under the Landrum-Griffin law unions are required to hold elections at least once every three years.

The secretary of labor normally cannot go to court seeking a supervised election until six months after the earlier election is challenged.

Once he does, a trial usually is held. Thus, the litigation is apt to be still going on after the next regular election is held.

In one of the three cases the department is appealing, the U.S. Circuit Court in Philadelphia has suggested the secretary should obtain a temporary injunction in the meantime.

The same course was suggested by the U.S. Circuit Court in New York City.

The department contends that "by taking such a step the secretary is, in effect, asking a court to maintain in office the very union officials whose election he is challenging."

Within the next few weeks the Supreme Court will announce whether it will hear the government's appeals.

Corned beef and cabbage has a large following... and so wonder! It's hearty, nourishing and delicious. But here's how you can move corned beef into La Grande Classe. Stop thinking of it as plain old corned beef and cabbage. Give it the elegant treatment. Serve it on your prettiest platter or silver tray, surrounded with as many root vegetables as you can. Rutabaga, turnips, parsnips, carrots, tiny whole onions and new potatoes have a delicious flavor when simmered in the pot juices with the corned beef and cabbage. When ready to serve, slice the beef and lay it in overlapping slices down the center of the platter. Drain the vegetables carefully and arrange them attractively in clumps around the meat, placing the bright carrots next to the white turnips, the green cabbage next to the orange rutabaga and so on. Use tiny whole beans whenever you need a bright color note and as the final touch to this picture platter, use lots and lots of crisp fresh parsley. An assortment of interesting dark bread such as pumpernickle and rye, in your prettiest bread basket, is perfect to serve with your corned beef dinner. Here is a tip to remember when cooking corned beef. It should be submerged in cold never hot water, then allowed to come slowly to quiet boil. If submerged in hot water and allowed to boil rapidly, the fibers will toughen.
