Demos Maul LBJ's Policy

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson's effort to shape consensus on his Vietnam policy is taking a very public mauling at the hands of some of his own party's members on the Senate foreign relations committee.

Secretary of State Dean Rusk's defense of U.S. policy in Vietnam before the committee triggered an angry, shouting quarrel among the panel's Democrats that was witnessed by a nationwide television audience.

Republicans, posing the political implications of the scene, confined their questions to the venerable subject of the hearing—the administration's \$5.4 billion foreign aid bill, but the heated Democratic squabble publicly over Rusk's defense of U.S. policy in Vietnam before the committee triggered an angry, shouting quarrel among the panel's Democrats that was witnessed by a nationwide television audience.

Chairman J. William Fulbright (D-Ark.) indicated the committee might hold testimony on the aid measure on Monday and resume his publicized hearings on South-east Asia policy held earlier this month.

Fulbright said there is "great uncertainty in the country" over the war, and he wants to hear from Sen. Wayne E. Albert (D-Ore.), starting at 2 p.m. through his own-voiced glasses, declared: "What the administration likes to see, that's the issue."

Comments from Democrats, who split on the Vietnam issue, appeared quickly apart on whether to stay apart from the Vietnam inquiry. But in any case Rusk's fight appearance Monday is a U.S. military spokesman said five Vietnamese — three of them women and one a child — were killed and others persons, including eight Viet Cong terrorists, killed in the heart of Saigon during the morning rush hour today with civilians caught in the crossfire.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Food prices have reached their peak and will be going down for the rest of the year, according to Agriculture Secretary Orville L. Freeman.

In an interview with UPI, Freeman said this included the whole range of foods, and that the price of grain production would be the chief factor forcing prices down.

Freeman said he could not predict when lower prices would be felt at the retail counter but it would happen as soon as processors pass on the lower prices to consumers.

Freeman said the farmer clearly is not contributing to inflation and high food prices. He noted that farm prices now are about 12 per cent lower than in 1962.

Since then, he said, everything else has gone up, including wages, corporate profits and transportation, everything.

Airmen Called Him 'Stupid'

CHICAGO (UPI) — To hear two crewmen tell it, Lyndon B. Johnson was 'brash and naive to go along on the World War II bombing mission that won him the Silver Star.'

"I thought the guy was nuts," turret gunner Robert Marshall said in an interview. "Anyone who wanted to fly along on one of those missions had to be out of his mind."

"We thought the man was stupid," tail gunner Harry Haren said. "There were no milk runs those days. We were getting clobbered."

It was early in the second world war. Johnson, then a young congressman, had been dispatched by President Roosevelt to find out why American bombing missions over the South Pacific were virtually ineffective.

He was at a remote air base near Townsville, Australia, one day when Marshall and Haren were briefing him on the B-26 for a mission over New Guinea.

Johnson — a lieutenant commander in the Naval Reserve at the time — asked for, and got, permission to make the flight. He wore his Navy uniform that day because, he told the B-26 crew, if the plane was shot down over enemy territory, he would be treated as a prisoner of war, not as a civilian spy.

There were two things wrong with his thinking," Haren said. "One, on those low level runs, there weren't any survivors if we were shot down. Two, nobody took prisoners of war in those days — military or civilian."

Japanese Zeroes spotted the "lame duck" and swarmed in for the kill.

"During the battle, I swear that if we had had another gun, Johnson would have grabbed it and whaled away at the Zeroes," Haren said. Bullets riddled the plane's fuselage.

The pilot wheeled around and headed back to Australia, ducking into some clouds to lose the attacking fighters.

"If there had been no cloud cover that day," Haren said, "Johnson wouldn't be president today."

Two years later, Marshall and Haren learned that the young congressman had been awarded the Silver Star of that aborted mission. None of the crew was honored.

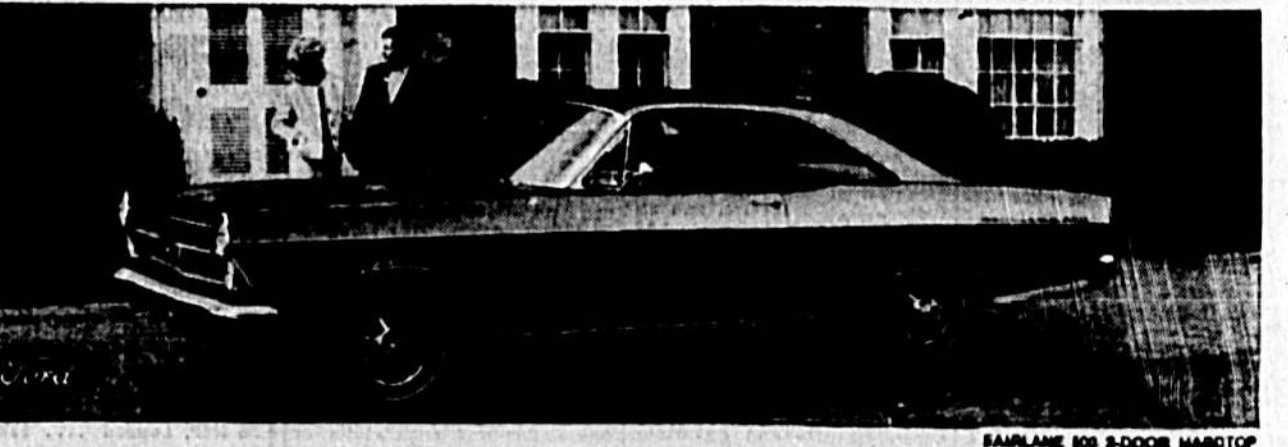

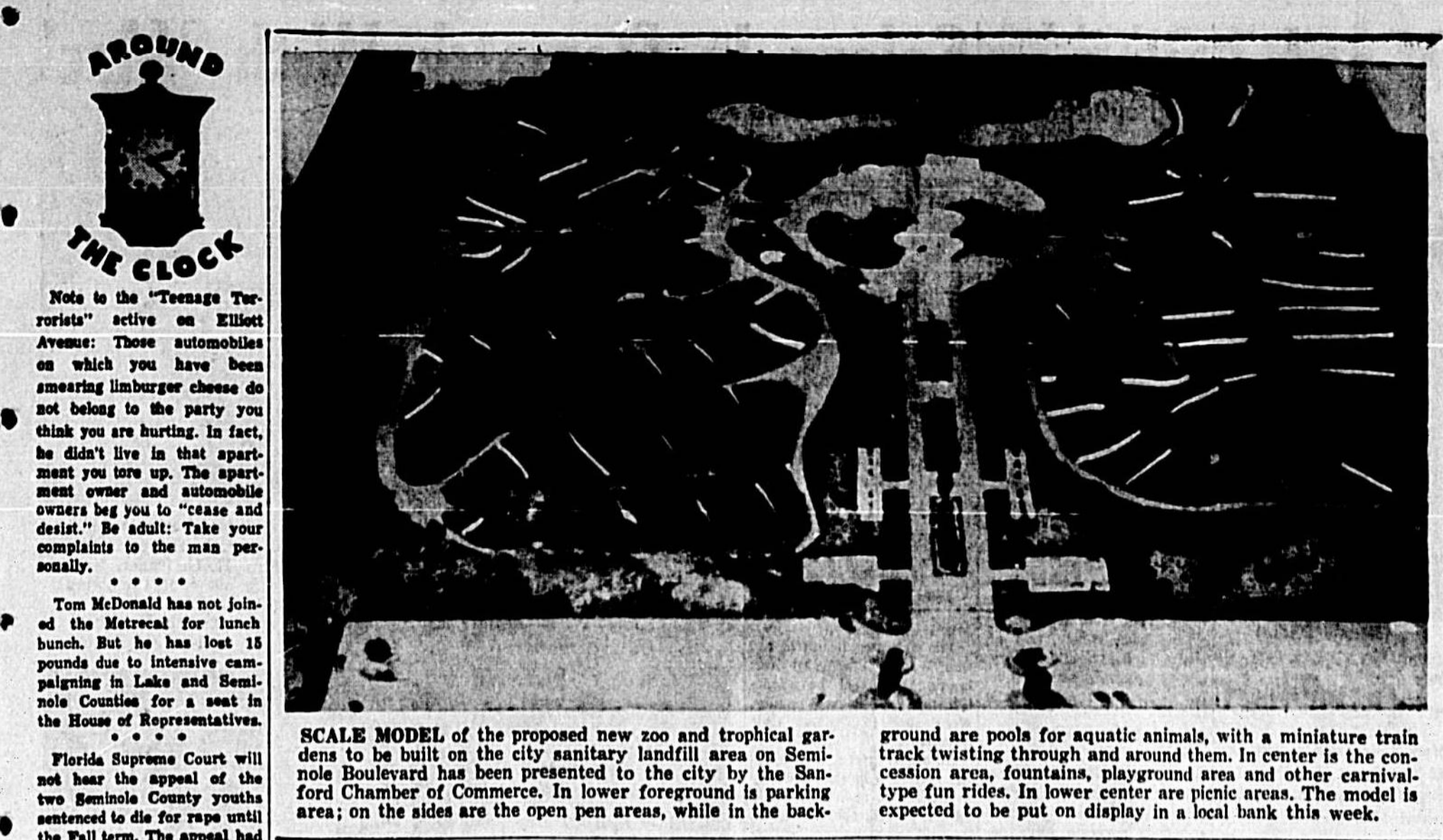
