Sunshine Dismissal Motions Considered

County Court Judge Wallace Hall said this morning that he will rule sometime this afternoon on defense motions to dismiss misdemeanor Sunshine law violation and conspiracy indictments against County Attorney Thomas G. Freeman and County Commissioners Michael Hattaway and Harry Kwiatkowski.

The indictments also center on the Oct. 14 vote by commissioners to abort a controversial \$17,000 county purchase of 10 acres in south Seminole for use as a clay pit. In a hearing Tuesday afternoon defense attorneys argued that the Florida "Government in the Sunshine" law is unconstitutional.

'Sole Claudine' Named For Daughter Of French Chef

Other Enticing Recipes For You To Try

One of the dishes in the new book recently published "A French Chef Cooks at Home" by Jacques Pepin (Simon and Schuster) is named for the author's young daughter. We know Jacques and how much he adores Claudine, when we made "Sole Claudine" we weren't surprised that it tasted heavenly!

JACQUES PEPIN'S SOLE CLAUDINE
2 large heads iceberg lettuce
2½ pounds grey sole fillets (12)
Salt and pepper
1½ sticks sweet butter
¼ pound mushrooms, coarsely chopped
8 to 10 shallots or scallion bulbs, finely chopped (½ cup)
1 to 2 carrots, depending on size, cut into very fine strips (2 cups)
1 cup dry white wine
½ cup sweet vermouth
3 tablespoons flour
1½ cups heavy cream

Use only the large outer green leaves of the lettuce; save the rest for salad or another dish. Plunge 12 of the leaves into boiling water, bring to a boil again and let boil for a minute. Cool immediately under cold water. Dry on paper towel and remove the triangle that forms the hardest part of the stem of each leaf.

Cut each fillet into halves lengthwise, discarding the strip of little bones that separates the 2 halves. Sprinkle the fillets (you now have 24) with ½ teaspoon salt and ¼ teaspoon pepper. Set aside.

Melt 2 tablespoons of butter in a saucepan and add the mushrooms; ½ teaspoon salt and ¼ teaspoon pepper. Cook until all the liquid rendered by the mushrooms has evaporated. Set aside to cool slightly.

Butter a large, shallow non-gratin dish with 2 tablespoons of the butter and sprinkle with the shallots, ½ teaspoon salt and ¼ teaspoon pepper. Drop the carrot into boiling water; boil for 1 minute, drain and sprinkle on top of shallots. Spread the lettuce leaves on the table and place 1 tablespoon of the fillets in the center of each leaf. Roll 2 pieces of fish and place side by side on top of the mushrooms. Be sure that the whitest part of the flesh shows on the outside. This means that the fillets are rolled the proper way.

Fold the lettuce leaf on top of the fillets, and place on top of the carrot upside down so that the folded part is underneath. Repeat the operation until you have 12 neat little packages. They should be light, one against the other, without overlapping. Add the wine and vermouth, cover with a piece of parchment paper and bring to a boil on top of the stove; then place in preheated 400-degree oven for 8 to 10 minutes.

Lift the packages to a serving platter. Keep warm in a 180-degree oven. Place the juices and garnishes in a large saucepan and reduce by half on high heat. Mix together the flour and 3 tablespoons of butter and add to the broth, mixing fast with a whisk to avoid lumps. Bring to a boil and simmer for 12 to 15 minutes. (At this point you may pour into the sauce any liquid which accumulated in the platter around the fillets.) Add the cream, bring to a boil and simmer another 5 minutes. Check for seasonings, as more salt and pepper may be needed. Add remaining butter bit by bit, shaking the saucepan as you add, so that the butter blends well with the sauce. Serve immediately. Be sure each fillet is coated with the sauce.

County Officials May Sue; Sunshine Charges Dropped

County officials today threatened to file a lawsuit and called for an investigation of State Attorney Judge Wallace H. Hall yesterday dismissed sunshine law violation charges against County Commission Chairman Mickey Hattaway, Commissioner Harry Kwiatkowski and County Attorney Thomas Freeman.

Hall's dismissal ended charges against the trio and represented the third straight setback for Herring's office.

In a related development, the Pratt Committee — an organization of Democrats set up to combat Herring — called for a special investigator from the governor's office to "look into the misuse and abuse of the state attorney's office on political indictments."

Herring was "Tallahassee and unavailable for comment."

Kwiatkowski called the charges "just another attack by an incompetent state attorney." He commiserated with Herring's charges against "biased information and half truths."

Both Kwiatkowski and Hattaway said they were "relieved" to be out from under intense pressure generated by indictments issued by the jury on Dec. 16.

Kwiatkowski's attorney, Newman Brock, said the public should know that Herring's office, in the past, has filed charges against 21 public officials.

"Conservatively speaking, that represents about 55 counts," Brock said.

None of the officials were brought to trial, Brock said. "The people ought to know that it's blatant and speaks for itself," he added.

"I feel relieved about the whole thing," Hattaway said. Hattaway also said on behalf of his family he would like to "publicly thank" all those persons who stuck by him during the probe.

On advice of his attorney, Hattaway declined to comment on specifics of the case. But he criticized not only Herring, but his chief investigator, Jack Pulerwider.

"Jack's only purpose in life is to hang public officials. He has already been chastised by the courts for his Gestapo-like tactics," Kwiatkowski said.

"When you let somebody like that run loose, anything is liable to happen. A good example is Pulerwider's getting a waitress in his car and telling her to talk into a tape recorder," he said.

Kwiatkowski referred to an incident involving Mrs. Mary Grover, an Altamonte Springs waitress. Pulerwider reportedly taped statements by her under oath in a car at the restaurant parking lot on Nov. 22.

"You might do that in Nazi Germany, but not in America," Kwiatkowski said.

Attorneys for the trio argued tape recorded statements played for the grand jury were inadmissible and a violation of state law regarding grand juries. Also, the defense claimed indictments failed to set forth exact dates when the Sunshine Law was violated and that charges were too vague to even prepare a defense.

Charging Florida law, Hall said witnesses before a grand jury must testify in person. And, Hall's ruling states the "grand jury considered unsworn testimonial evidence."

The judicial ruling goes on to say that the charge "appears insufficient as a matter of law." The Sunshine law states all meetings attended by elected officials must be open to the public.

The grand jury charged Freeman, Kwiatkowski and Hattaway with violating the Sunshine law by meeting secretly between May 1 and Oct. 30, 1975 to discuss the county's plan to purchase a \$17,000 clay pit site near Markham Woods Road and for discussion centering on the hiring of Freeman as county attorney.

Spaziano Murder Trial Continues

Slain Girl's Roommate And Friend Identify Defendant

Both the roommate of Laura Lynn Harberts and the roommate's boyfriend testified today that a man on trial for first-degree murder in Miss Harberts' death came to an Orlando apartment in July 1973 asking for Miss Harberts.

Beverly Pink and Jack Harberts said she was frightened and asked Mallen to tell her "it was too late and to go away."

Mallen said Miss Harberts didn't want the jealous door opened and he talked to her in the hallway, "without opening the door, saying, 'Please go away.'"

Mallen said he could see a silhouette of a man with bushy hair that appeared to be wearing a blue denim jacket. He said the man "muttered some obscenities and banged down the steps" from the apartment.

Testifying about the mid-July meeting of Spaziano, Mallen pointed out the defendant in a courtroom as the man he saw face-to-face at the apartment door.

Both Fink and Mallen said Spaziano claimed to be a traveling cook who'd met Miss Harberts in Orlando's Eola Park. They said Miss Harberts wasn't at home at the time.

Miss Fink said she remembers that Spaziano had his black hair pulled back in a ponytail and that he had thick sideburns but no beard.

"Mostly I remember his eyes," she said. "They were noticeable because they're large and dark."

Mallan Marie president Ralph Dilasio, 42, and his 17-year-old son Tony, identified by prosecutor Claude Van Hook as former friends of Spaziano, were waiting at noon to be called as state witnesses in the Spaziano murder trial.

Heat Pump Efficiency Questioned By Board

Discussion about various Seminole County school construction projects — both proposed and completed — occupied much of the time during Wednesday's four-hour Seminole County School Board meeting.

Brought into question by the board, approval of architect's plans for Pincrest and Bear Lake Elementary school additions, was the efficiency of the proposed heating systems for the two buildings.

DainWood, Derryberry and Pavelchak, architects in Casselberry, proposed a heat pump system be used for the buildings. Board members questioned the efficiency of the system over strip heating systems.

Final plans for Teague and Taskawilla Middle schools were approved, subject to a change in the lighting system.

Board members also discussed the "punch list" — the final touch-up procedure contractors are required to complete before the final 10 per cent of construction money can be paid.

Vice-chairman Pat Telson reported several problems in the one-year-old addition at Jackson Heights Middle School in Oviedo. The contractor apparently failed to provide proper hinges on fire doors and failed to insure welding joints against rust on a covered walkway.

The board agreed the county needed to "get tough" on the matter of punch lists in general and placed the item on next week's agenda.

Members also rejected a bid to buy a van to be used for office repair.

The bid required the board to purchase the van under a state contract. Members directed purchasing agent Don Coleman to resubmit the bid to local dealers.

In other action, the board examined a proposed policy for determining where courtesy busing would be granted.

Employing a point system based on traffic counts, speed limits, age of children and other factors, the proposal was referred to an ad hoc committee on courtesy busing for further suggestions and input.

Terrorist Suspect Sought

BARTOW (AP) — Police are hunting for a fifth person allegedly involved in a gang linked to 16 brutal attacks in seven Central Florida counties.

Law enforcement officers said Wednesday that the person, who they did not publicly identify, was wanted for questioning in the case. An official said investigators had talked with the man twice Tuesday as they were arresting four other persons but let him go.

Meanwhile Wednesday, three of the four persons arrested in the case appeared before Polk County Judge Ed Threadgill on charges of buying, receiving and concealing stolen property.

The offense is punishable by a maximum of five years in jail and \$5,000 fine.

The three were identified as Morris Thomas, 27; his wife Lattie Mae, 25; and Luis Martin, 19, all of Bartow.

The fourth, 15-year-old Cody Martin of Bartow, identified as Lee Martin's brother, went before juvenile authorities and was ordered held without bond.

Thomas, on parole for armed robbery when arrested Tuesday, was also charged with possession of an automatic weapon that investigators say he believed was used in a DeLand murder last month.

Threadgill ordered Thomas held without bond and refused to lower \$50,000 bonds set for Mrs. Thomas and Lee Martin.

The stolen property charge involves confiscated weapons which police said were stolen in armed burglaries in Polk and Highlands counties.

A ski-masked gang of terrorists has been blamed by police for 16 brutal attacks in seven counties since last April, including as many as three murders and at least five rapes.

The Thomases and Martin told Threadgill they couldn't afford to hire attorneys. They were granted court-appointed ones.

Local Organizations Want Time To Study City Hall Site

Representatives of three Sanford organizations met Wednesday and resolved to ask the city commission for time to study the issue of where to locate a new city hall.

At the noon luncheon at the Holiday Inn, which was sponsored by the Bankers' Committee of the Greater Sanford Area Chamber of Commerce, a resolution to ask city commissioners to delay final action on locating the city hall until the commission's first meeting in March, in order that the issue can be studied, and possible alternative sites can be evaluated, passed unanimously.

In September, the city commission voted to locate the new city hall at the city-owned site at French Avenue and Seminole Boulevard.

Attending the meeting Wednesday were representatives of the Greater Sanford Area Chamber of Commerce, the Downtown Business Association (DBA) and the Downtown Development Corporation (DDC).

Howard Hodges, chairman of the Bankers' Committee, led off the meeting by reminding those present that the committee had recommended the new city hall be located at a site in the Downtown area of Sanford.

"There are many definitions of 'Downtown,'" Hodges said, "but we were thinking of Downtown in relation to the downtown area."

He emphasized that, as far as his group was concerned, Downtown meant the Central Business District. He added that, in his opinion, locating the city hall in the Central Business District would draw people Downtown, and help the merchants in that area.

"My purpose in calling this meeting was to have representation by these groups, and make our motives clear," Hodges said.

"I would like to suggest that we go before the city commission on January 28 and ask for time to make a study of this."

David Farr, chairman of the Downtown Development Corporation, said he would support the Association Board of Directors' indication that his group wanted to study the issue of the new city hall site "in terms of what it would and would not do for Downtown businessmen."

He added that the DBA was willing to work with the Bankers' Committee and the DDC in studying the issue.

At this point Mayor Lee Moore, who represented the City of Sanford at the meeting, advised that those going before the commission be specific in their requests.

"Don't go down there and say 'don't do anything until we can get people together and come up with a recommendation,'" Moore said.

In answer to a question by banker John Mercer, which asked where the groups were going to obtain the needed information, DDC board chairman Miss Sara Jacobson said the DDC would like to "house a committee from the three groups to provide information, and perhaps to suggest an alternative site."

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Robin Roberts Elected To Hall Of Fame

NEW YORK (AP) — Robin Roberts, former pitching ace of the Philadelphia Phillies, has been elected to baseball's Hall of Fame, The Associated Press learned today.

It was not immediately known if any other players received the necessary 75 per cent vote from ballots cast by the Baseball Writers Association of America.

The announcement of those elected was to be made at a news conference later in the day.

Roberts, a right-hander, won 286 games in 19 major league seasons. He fell nine votes short of the requirement in last year's voting.

He and Bob Lemon, another standout pitcher from the 1950s, had been considered the leading candidates to be elected this time.

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
