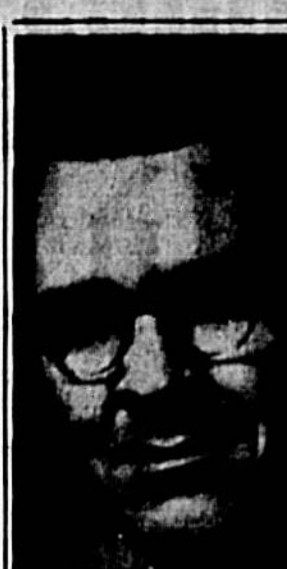


Hanoi Oil Depots Hit Again By Jets

SAIGON (UPI)—U. S. jets returned to the Hanoi area today and bombed three underground storage areas and a radar control center. One of the oil dumps was only seven miles from the North Vietnamese capital. Heavy ground fighting broke out in South Vietnam today and troops of the U. S. 1st Infantry Division were locked in a major battle with about 2,000 to 3,000 Viet Cong in the north of Saigon. U. S. air strikes there killed an estimated 100 Communist and American action men this killed 100 Viet Cong.



The increased tempo of the war was reflected in figures released today which showed American losses suffered last week. The figures included 131 dead—almost double that of the previous week. Yesterday's air attacks on the Hanoi-Haiphong area were having major military repercussions. The United States was at last again commencing and primary target of the Hanoi-Haiphong area. The Viet Cong have been expected but the Soviet Union said today it would give "growing support" to North Vietnam. But it made no specific promises.

Huge Defense Bill Includes GI Pay Boost

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Senate and House negotiators approved a \$17.7 billion defense bill which would authorize money to build nuclear-powered vessels for the Navy and give military personnel a 3.5 per cent pay boost. The compromise bill, worked out at a 15-minute conference session, would give the Navy \$130.5 million for a guided missile nuclear-powered frigate and \$20 million to buy some hardware for a second frigate. The bill also contained an \$11.4 million House-approved provision to speed development of an advanced medium strategic bomber to take over from the B52s now in the Strategic Air Command.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson's fair housing measure, reduced in coverage but with stronger enforcement provisions, passed its first congressional test. Supporters now think it will pass the House. The House Judiciary committee approved the administration civil rights bill with an open occupancy housing provision 96 to 0 after days of behind-the-scenes maneuvering and negotiations.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Leroy Collins, Michigan rights lawyer on the U. S. Senate, plans to be back home before the end of the year to start laying the groundwork for his campaign. Collins, a former governor, announced his resignation effective Oct. 1 as undersecretary of commerce. He said he will take up law practice in Tampa and run for the Senate next year.

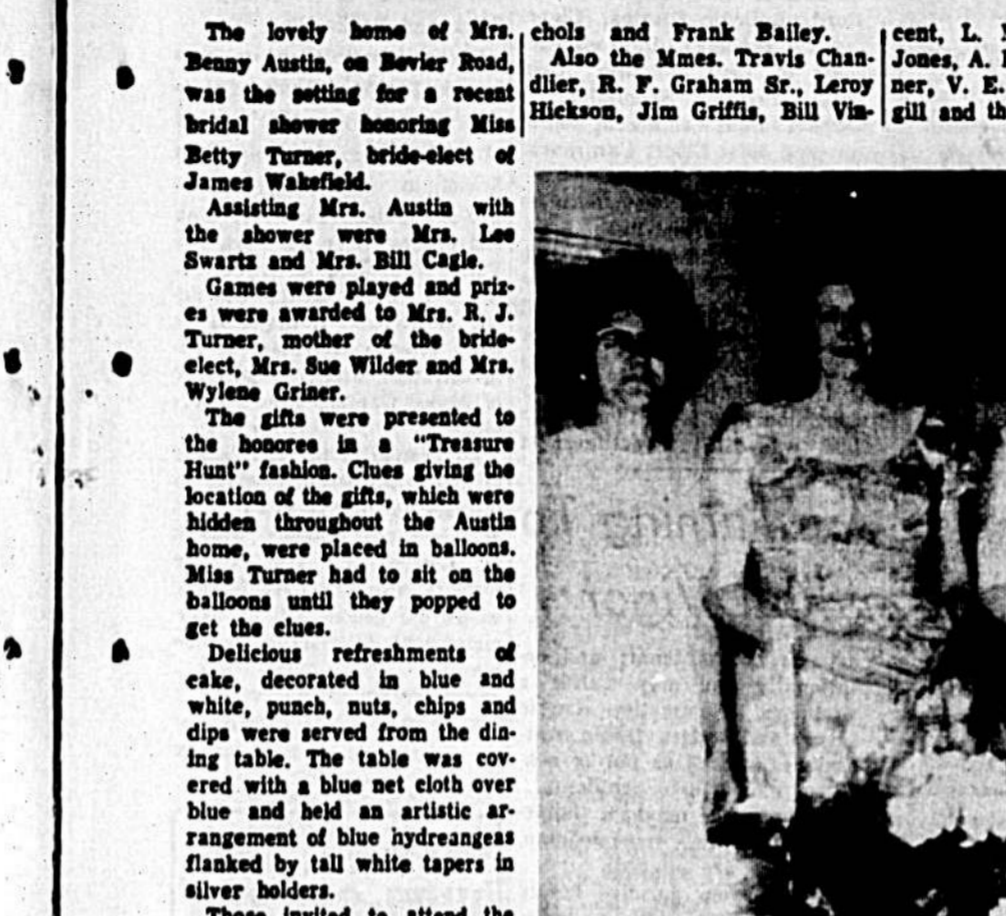

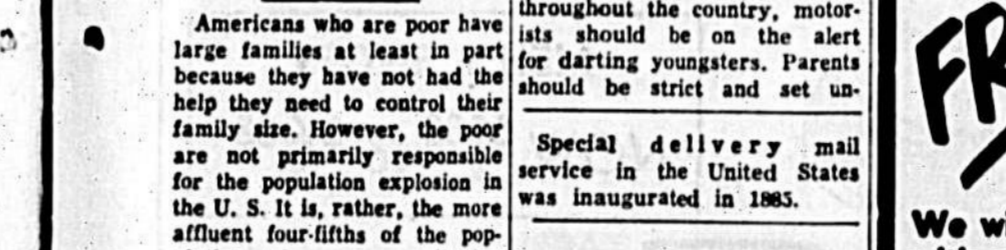

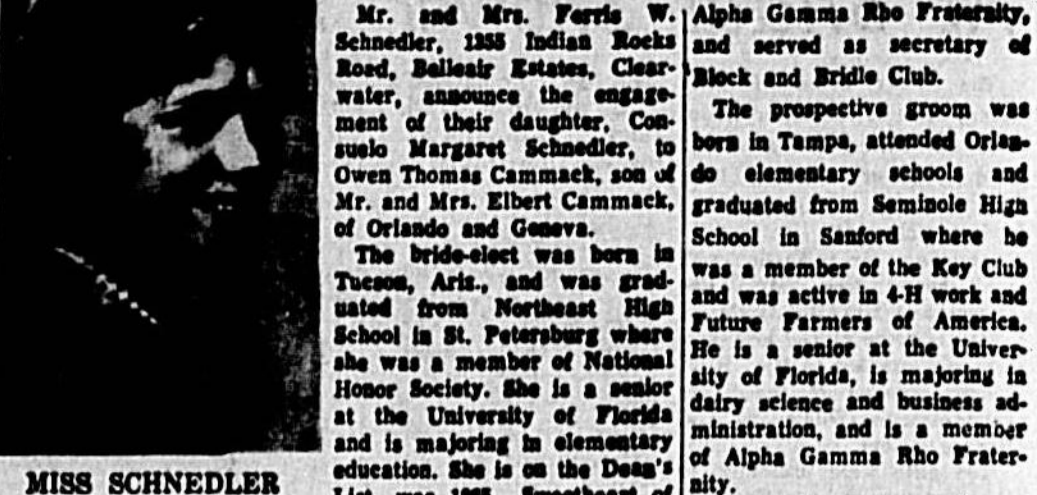

BAKED BAR-B-QUE FISH
1 lb. fish fillets
1 tbsp. butter
4 thin slices or rings of thin sliced lemon
2 tbsp. parsley
1 cup tomato soup
1/2 cup water

Place fish in baking dish. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Dot with butter, top with lemon and onion rings. Mix soup with water; pour over fish. Bake at 400 degrees for 30 minutes or until done.

BARBECUED MEAT PATTIES
1 cup soft bread crumbs
1/2 cup skimmed milk
1 lb. ground beef
2 tsp. salt and pepper
1/4 cup Worcestershire sauce
1/4 cup ketchup or tomato soup
1/2 cup water
1/4 cup chopped green pepper

Mix bread crumbs with milk. Combine with ground beef, salt and pepper. Shape into patties and bake in baking dish. Combine remaining ingredients and pour around patties and bake in ungreased dish at 375 degrees for 45 minutes.

PEACH CRISP
3 Mc. 2 1/2 cans sliced cling peaches
1/2 cup molasses
1/2 cup cinnamon
1/2 cup sifted flour
1/2 cup brown sugar
1 cup shortening, uncooked
1/2 cup melted butter

Place drained peaches in casserole. Sprinkle with molasses and cinnamon over peaches. Combine flour and brown sugar; add butter, mix thoroughly by small amounts; sprinkle over peaches. Bake in preheated oven (375 degrees) for about 30 minutes. Serve warm or cold with cream.

FRESH PEACH ICE CREAM
(For 1 gallon freezer)
2 1/2 cups sugar
1/2 cup vanilla
4 eggs
4 cups condensed milk
3 qt. whole milk
2 cups peach and mix with sugar. Beat eggs and condensed milk; add vanilla. Combine all ingredients in freezer can. You could substitute fresh strawberries if you wish.

FILLED TAFFY
2 cups sugar
1/4 cup vinegar
1/2 cup butter

1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. soda
2 tsp. baking powder
1/4 cup raisins

Cream butter and sugar. Add molasses and egg yolks. Beat well. Add soda, baking powder, salt, and spices to flour. Add sugar and milk alternately to batter.

It's no news that the nation's cities are going through a time of troubles, and the troubles come under a variety of headings—Pollution, Traffic, Crime, Housing, Schools.

Of all of them, the last mentioned seems to constitute the most serious threat to the future of cities.

Most significantly, the losses were typically caused by the migration of middle-income, small families to the suburbs.

As one example, San Francisco registered a five per cent population loss between 1950 and 1960 but a 25 per cent increase in school population.

Local taxing ability is the most important determinant of social policy in American cities, says the report.

Until we find the means to reverse that equation, and let social policy determine the resources to be used to education, we face a sea of rising troubles in our cities.

Just how the government is supposed to do this wasn't spelled out. As of now, the mayor's reaction is just a resolution—a cry for help.

But it is a cry which will inevitably increase in volume and range until no one, matter how far out of the city he lives, will be able to ignore it.
