

### Officials See A New Era In Ireland After Three Months Of Boundary Pact

LONDON, Mar. 16.—(AP)—The new Irish Boundary Agreement has ushered in a new era, characterized by the friendliness and co-operation shown by the two Irish governments in relations with each other and with the Imperial Cabinet at London.

This was the consensus of a census by The Associated Press of the heads of the Dublin and Belfast governments and other leaders of both states, some of whom even spoke hopefully of the prospect of eventual union of all Ireland. The agreement has been in operation nearly three months.

President William T. Cosgrave of the Free State Cabinet said: "I am well satisfied with the results of the London Agreement and with the friendly relations between the governments which it has facilitated. The result has been beneficial all around."

In Belfast, Sir James Craig, Premier of the Ulster government, while carefully avoiding reference to the possibility of union, stressed the co-operative aspect of their new relations. He characterized them as "two neighbors who are friendly, who wish to solve each other and thus effect economies."

"North and South Ireland must live together as neighbors," said the Ulster leader. "Both administrations must turn their minds from those matters which have divided them in the past and concentrate on affairs that really affect the welfare of the people, so that the whole of Ireland, and not the part alone, may be prosperous."

Prospect of Union  
Cardinal Patrick O'Donnell, Archbishop of Armagh, saw a prospect of union. "It seems to me reasonable to infer that the success which the Northern Government has had over the boundary question and the satisfaction resulting therefrom, will leave a disposition in which the Northern Parliament may more readily consider the advantages of Irish unity later on," he declared.

And Joseph Devlin, leader of the Ulster Nationalists, that party in the North which hedges for the union of all Ireland, said his followers: "The proper way to bring about unity is by working for it. It cannot be coerced into unity with the rest of Ireland by force. The only real union can be brought about by allowing the old passions to die and by depending less upon shibboleths and more on charity and good will."

A survey of official and other authoritative opinion on both sides of the border showed a prevalent belief that what has happened in Ireland can best be illustrated by two Februarys, a contrast of the reign of terror with the terrible days of 1922, when no man's life seemed safe on either side of the disputed border. In February, 1922, the Ulster border was literally "plugged with steel; thousands of Ulster special police were mobilized; raiders from the south had penetrated Ulster and seized hostages; Ireland south of the border was a Ulster book to those who lived in Ulster.

February, 1926, found normal and cordial relations between Dublin and Belfast, and with London. Sir James Craig's advice, that North and South should turn their minds from those matters which have divided them, is being followed. The North has reduced its costly police force. There has been a speedy release of political prisoners. The London Agreement by abolishing the abortive Council of Ireland, which was most irksome to Ulster, has substituted friendly co-operation.

One of the most important common interests is agriculture. Soon after the London Agreement was signed the Ulster Minister of Agriculture went to Dublin with his staff to consult with the Free State's Minister of Agriculture, and a reciprocal visit to Belfast is expected soon. Similar co-operation has been arranged in other phrases of administration.

Its removal caused an immediate favorable reaction. The market quotation of the Free State National Loan rose at once and remains at two to three points premium.

Finances Good  
New Free State loans, which must be floated in connection with the River Shannon power development scheme and other enterprises, will be marketed much more easily because of the removal of the war debt obligation, which meant an undetermined liability estimated as high as one billion dollars. The Ulster Government also has reaped financial gain by the facilitation of settlement of pending difficulties between Belfast and London.

The Agreement has caused a beneficial change in the relations between the people along the border and of the minorities in Ulster with the rest of the Orange. There is no longer any question of forcing the North into a union with the Free State, and the South frankly recognizes that union can only come in time by agreement between the two governments on the basis of equality. The Nationalists in the North, no longer able to rely on support from Dublin, have abandoned their former attitude of Ulster legislation, and Nationalists are anxious to take their place as an official parliamentary opposition.

In no field is the new era better exemplified than in sports, which have exerted a great unifying influence in Ireland.

Sports Help Unity  
Exactly four years after the great raid of February, 1922, over the border into Ulster, Earnest Crawford, captain of the Irish Rugby football team which recently defeated England for the first time since 1917, rose at the dinner celebrating the match and said: "I am proud to represent Ulster and Munster, from Connaught and Leinster and all Ireland our team was recruited. Ulster and Cork teamed together while the score was being clinched. The victory was made by Frank Hewitt, son of a business man in Sandy Row, the hub of Ulster Orangeism, and a man by the name of Dennis Cussen, a Dublin Catholic."

Before the match Timothy Healy, once hated by all Ulster Unionists and now governor-general of the Free State, passed through the players, from North and South together, and wished them the best of fortune.

The picture Irish leaders paint is not all rosy, though hope and friendliness are pronounced. Sir James Craig is advocating the removal of the customs barrier between the two states, while Ernest Blythe, the Free State Finance Minister, emphatically declares that it will be maintained. The North generally believes the customs belt is stereotyping Irish parties as nothing else could.

Another shadow in the picture is the sentimental legislation passed by the Dail Eireann, such as the creation of a separate college, issuing of stamps with the King's name from official documents. All this has an adverse effect in Ulster, and in Belfast there is a popular saying that nothing would do more to bring the North and South together than for the Dail to take a holiday for a year.

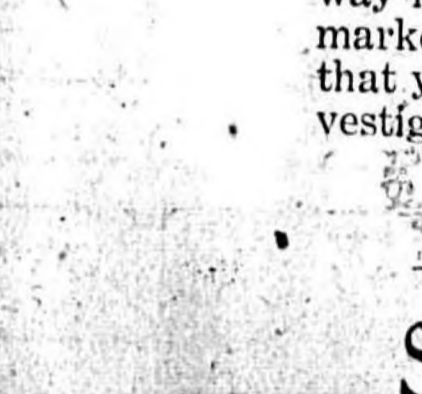

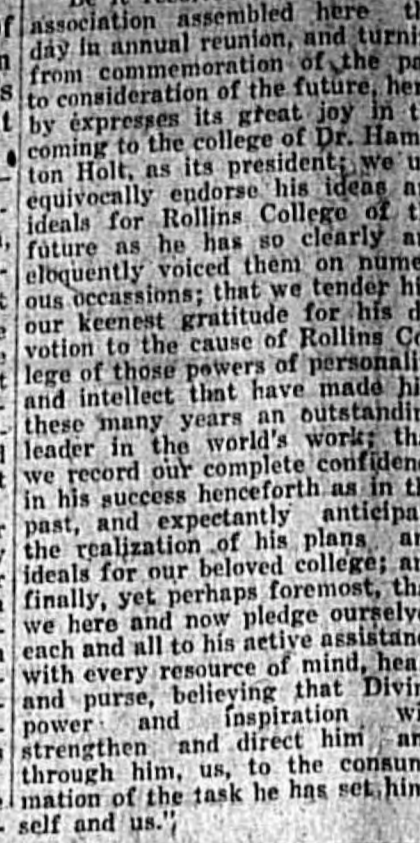

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### FRENCH WOMAN THINKS WEDLOCK ENJOYED THERE

Says American Women Do Not Have Half the Satisfaction in Marriage That Their European Sisters Enjoy

NEW YORK, Mar. 17.—(AP)—American women do not have half the satisfaction in marriage that is enjoyed by the French, it seems to Dr. Max Nordau, noted French political and philosophic writer.

The American woman does not have nearly so much of her husband's society, says this French girl, or does she share his interests or have with him a real companionship, as do the French women.

"Oh, yes, the French women have almost been most happy in their married life—" as surprise sits high in the interviewers' face. "Our French wife, our freedom of speech and manners, our theatre, have given a different impression. But it is not the true one. In most cases our marriages are extremely happy. Husband and wives share high ideals. There is a deep moral intimacy between them."

"The woman is the center of the home, and yet her interests are not confined to it. Her husband comes to her with many of the problems of his profession or political life—there is a saying in France, 'Cherchez la femme'—and it is true that for every man in a position of influence there is almost always a woman. More often than people think it is his wife."

Mr. Nordau, who is here with an exhibit of her modern paintings, also will lecture on the feminist movement in Europe.

"Our happy married state is one of the difficulties in our movement," she adds. "Because of this position of women, there has been among the masses in France a great inertia in the matter of struggling for the vote. 'We are happy so,' they think, 'why change?'"

"Nevertheless, there are some very bad laws for women. What French woman would like to gain is a few improvements in their laws, without losing anything in the matter of the good position they now occupy with their men. And I believe that we can do it."

SCHOOL DECIDES EDISON IS MOST NOTED AMERICAN

Lakeland High School Ballot Results in Wizard Running First and Henry Ford Being Given Second Place

LAKELAND, Fla., Mar. 17.—(P)—Thomas Edison, the inventor, is the greatest living American in the opinion of the majority of the 200 students of the Lakeland high school. It is shown in a survey conducted by Miss Catherine Craig, an instructor in the school. Ranking next to Mr. Edison was Henry Ford and then President Coolidge and General Pershing in order, the latter trailing Mr. president by only one vote. Luther Burbank, the naturalist, and Billy Sunday, the evangelist, tied for sixth place in the survey while Colonel William Mitchell, former assistant chief of the United States air service, who retired after being court-martialed for criticizing the service, was the next ranking greatest American in the opinion of the students.

The survey also covered the life ambitions of the students and the subjects they found hardest to master. Like the survey recently conducted in Atlanta, it was shown that the teaching profession held first place in the life ambitions of the majority of the students enrolled at Lakeland high school this season. Those desiring to be school principals numbered the same as those desiring to be teachers but was defeated by such vocations as engineer, architect, nurse and musician.

The school is not without its students, who like adventure, who have an aesthetic or artistic nature and who long for self-expression. One student wanted to be a "chadlegger" and a young man expressed a desire to be a doctor. A youth registered athletic instructor and another capitalist but did not indicate the method of acquiring his abundance of currency. Two students declared their intentions of being writers—one a novelist, one a cartoonist and one designer. Other occupations included mechanic, secretary, dietician, bookkeeper, chemist, interior decorator, factory superintendent and violin and piano teacher. Latin, geometry and algebra in the order named are the three hardest subjects of the curriculum for the students of the institution, according to the survey, with Latin leading by a good margin. History was next with English and mathematics of any kind following close behind. One student found home economics to be the hardest subject. Only four met with difficulty in

### Chamber of Commerce Predicts Building To Exceed One Billion This Year

One reason or another the cost of a building as stated in the permit is from twenty to twenty per cent under the actual outlay. Suppose we add \$12,000,000 to care for this. It would give us nearly \$63,000,000 worth of new building authorized during January and February, the first two months of the year. And it should be borne in mind that this does not include figures from scores of towns where construction is proceeding rapidly, nor are the millions expended in suburbs and in the county included. The state expects to spend roughly \$12,000,000 on highways during the year. The counties will at least triple that amount. Altogether I believe the highway construction will represent in the neighborhood of \$50,000,000.

"How much the railroads and public utilities will spend, no one knows but it seems to be evident it will run to between \$75,000,000 and \$100,000,000.

"Millions will go into the development of deep water harbors, and municipalities will spend other millions for street paving and extension of sewer, water, gas and electrical facilities. Other vast sums are being spent on the development of our agricultural lands. The expenditure of these hundreds of millions makes it certain that this year will be the best Florida ever has experienced. There will be work for everyone who desires to work.
