### BIBLE VERSES TODAY

We have known many saints to go peacefully to sleep at night and wake up in a better world. It is an end devoutly to be prayed for. Death is a friend, not an enemy. Knech walked with God; and was not; for God took him.—Ge 5:24.

It's funny to hear radio commentators and see newspaper columnists talking about "the people of Georgia", in connection with this recent lynching, when they seem to forget entirely that the same state which produced the sheriff which permitted the lynching of his negro charge also produced General Clay.

It is an unfair labor practice, the Supreme Court has ruled, for an employer to give his employees a raise, that is, if he is in the midst of contract negotiations with the union. Such a display of generosity on the part of the employer might tend to prejudice the workers against the union, might convince them that they would do better trusting in the tender mercies of the employer than to rely wholly on the strength of the union.

One of the joys of reporting was illustrated the other day when Senator MacArthur of Ferdinand struck a Miami Herald reporter in the face just outside the Senate door as a result of the dispute over the racing bill. Unfortunately, the reporter had just gotten out of the hospital following a hernia operation so he couldn't hit him back. But when our own state Legislature learns how to settle its arguments without resorting to violence, then there may be some hope of imposing peaceful ways upon less enlightened people of the world like the Russians and the Chinese.

Nearly everybody is against any kind of tax bill, but nearly everyone, if we listen to the appeals of the lobbyists in Tallahassee, is in favor of appropriation bills. It doesn't make much difference what the money is to be spent for, or why, just so it is spending the people's money, it stands a mighty good chance to pass. There is virtually no one to oppose it. But when the tax bill is introduced to pay for it, then the howls of anguish go up. It seems to us that we need a good strong constitutional amendment prohibiting any appropriation bills which do not include the taxes to pay for it.

When John L. Lewis sat down to testify before a Congressional Committee, he referred to the coal mine operators as "polecats". We don't know, but we think there should be some law of libel or slander to cover situations like that. We don't believe we could call anyone a "polecat" in the newspaper and get away with it, unless we could prove it. But Lewis does it repeatedly. Not only did the operators "polecat" in his loaded vocabulary, but so in his own case who happens to disagree with him. Some day he is going to call someone a "polecat" who is going to resent it, and then there won't be any more John L. Lewis.

When considering the relative value of city taxes, state taxes, and federal taxes, consider the what each gives you. Our City provides the police and fire protection, the roads and sidewalks, sewerage collection. It also provides the parks and pathways, recreational facilities, as well as the public education system. The state gives highways and the federal government gives the national defense and the social security system.

### Dr. Holt Retires

Commencement exercises at Rollins College today saw the last public appearance of Dr. Hamilton Holt as president of the institution of which he became the head and leading personality in 1925. For nearly a quarter of a century this Connecticut Yankee, who officially retires on August 31, has presided over the destinies of this Central Florida college with which Sanford has been so closely connected since it was incorporated in the old Lyman Bank of this city in 1886.

Dr. Holt had enjoyed an extensive and highly successful career before coming to Rollins. He graduated from Yale University in 1894 and did post graduate work at Columbia for the next three years. In 1897 he joined the staff of the "Independent", one of the nation's leading magazines of that day and soon became its managing editor. In 1913 he was its owner and editor, and as such sponsored a number of movements well in advance of his time.

In the light of what has happened since, it seems almost supernatural for him to be writing in the Independent of 1907 on the need for a world peace organization. He represented his magazine at the second Hague Peace Conference, and in 1911 declared in the "World's Work", "Let us add to the Declaration of Independence, a Declaration of Interdependence. . . Let the United Nations succeed the United States". Remember, that was in 1911.

Following the first World War Dr. Holt was a representative of the League to Enforce Peace at the organization of the League of Nations in Paris and later toured the United States, speaking in dozens of cities throughout the country in behalf of American entry into the League of Nations. "If the covenant is defeated", he declared, "the nations cannot go forward on an orderly basis of international co-operation."

His work at Rollins has been characterized by the same forward thinking and general disregard for ancient worn-out methods. Believing that the lecture system of imparting knowledge was probably more informative to the lecturer than the student, and that annual examinations merely proved it, he developed the "Conference Plan" providing for "the free exchange of thought between the pupil and teacher in personal conferences during which the student is helped over difficulties, shown how to study, and given an illustration of the scholarly attitude toward knowledge."

He believes in well paid teachers in order to get the best teachers, in a high tuition well interspersed with generous scholarships for deserving students, and a limited enrollment so that the number of students does not exceed the capacities of the teachers to instruct. He has been eminently successful in attracting nationally prominent men to the college and has personally raised over five million dollars for its endowment.

More important than the millions he has raised is the imprint he has left upon the minds and hearts of thousands of students and faculty members, and the cultural enrichment he has brought to the people of Central Florida who will greatly miss both his stimulating influence and his warm humanity.

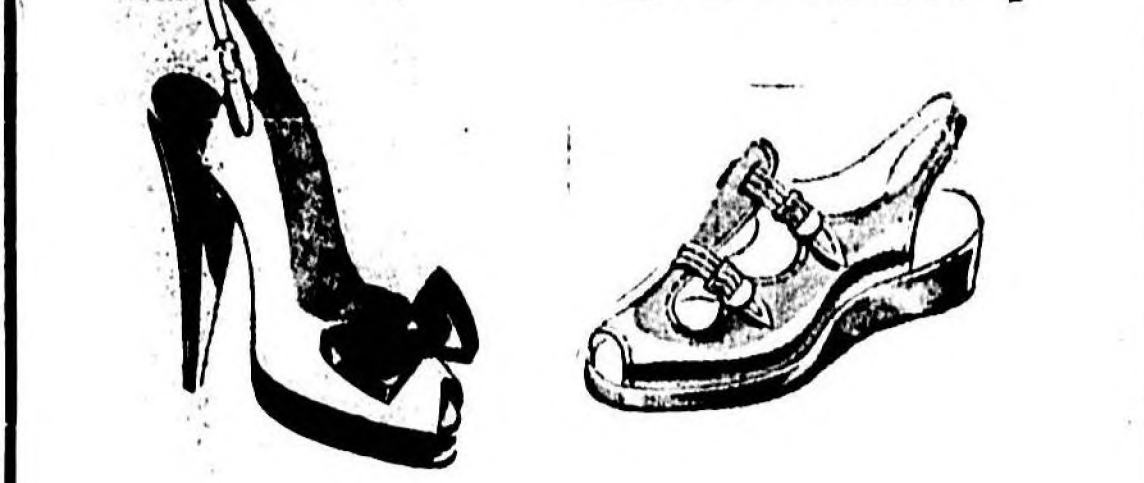

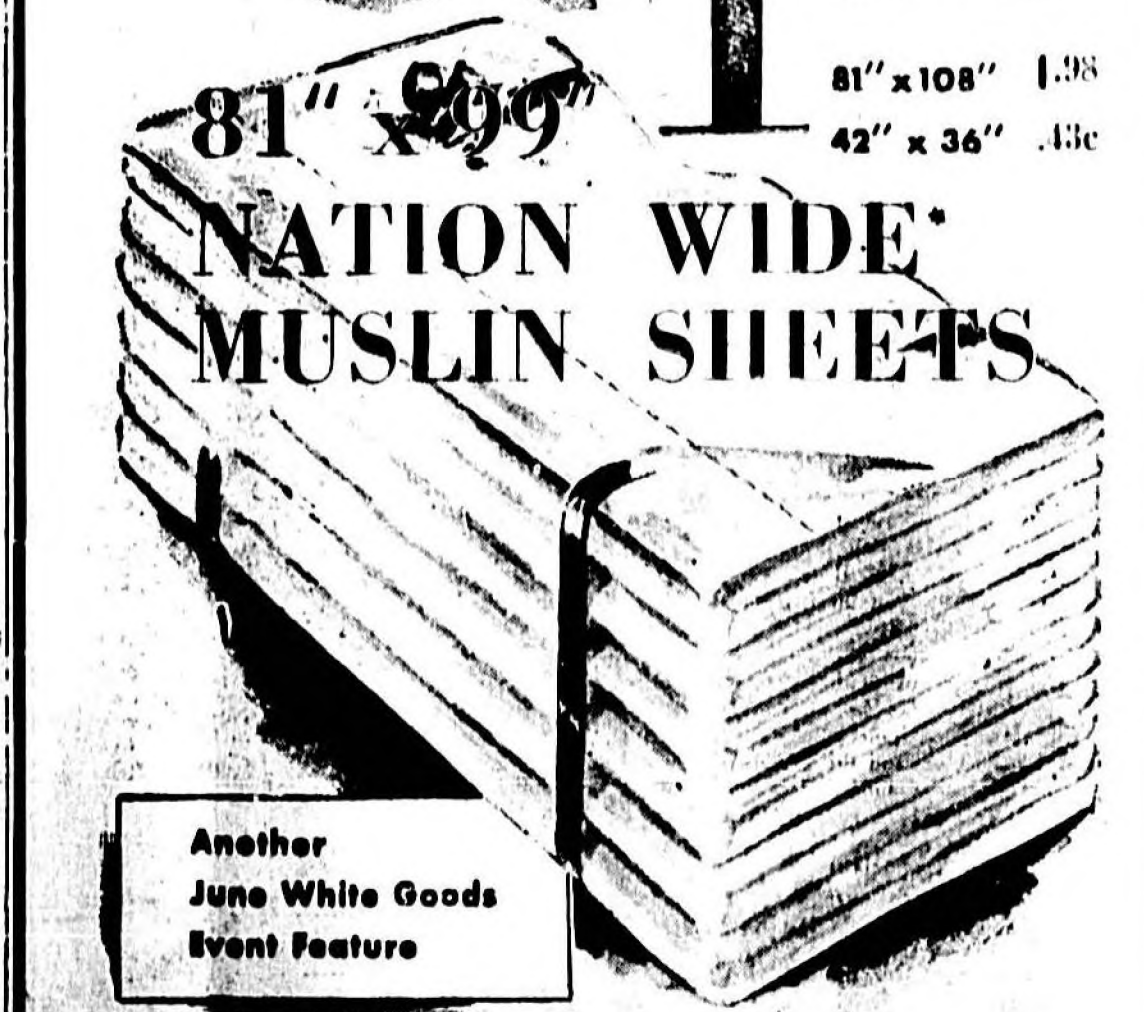

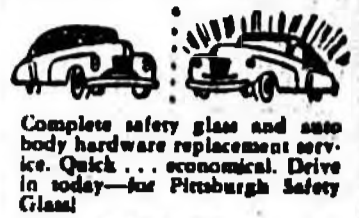
