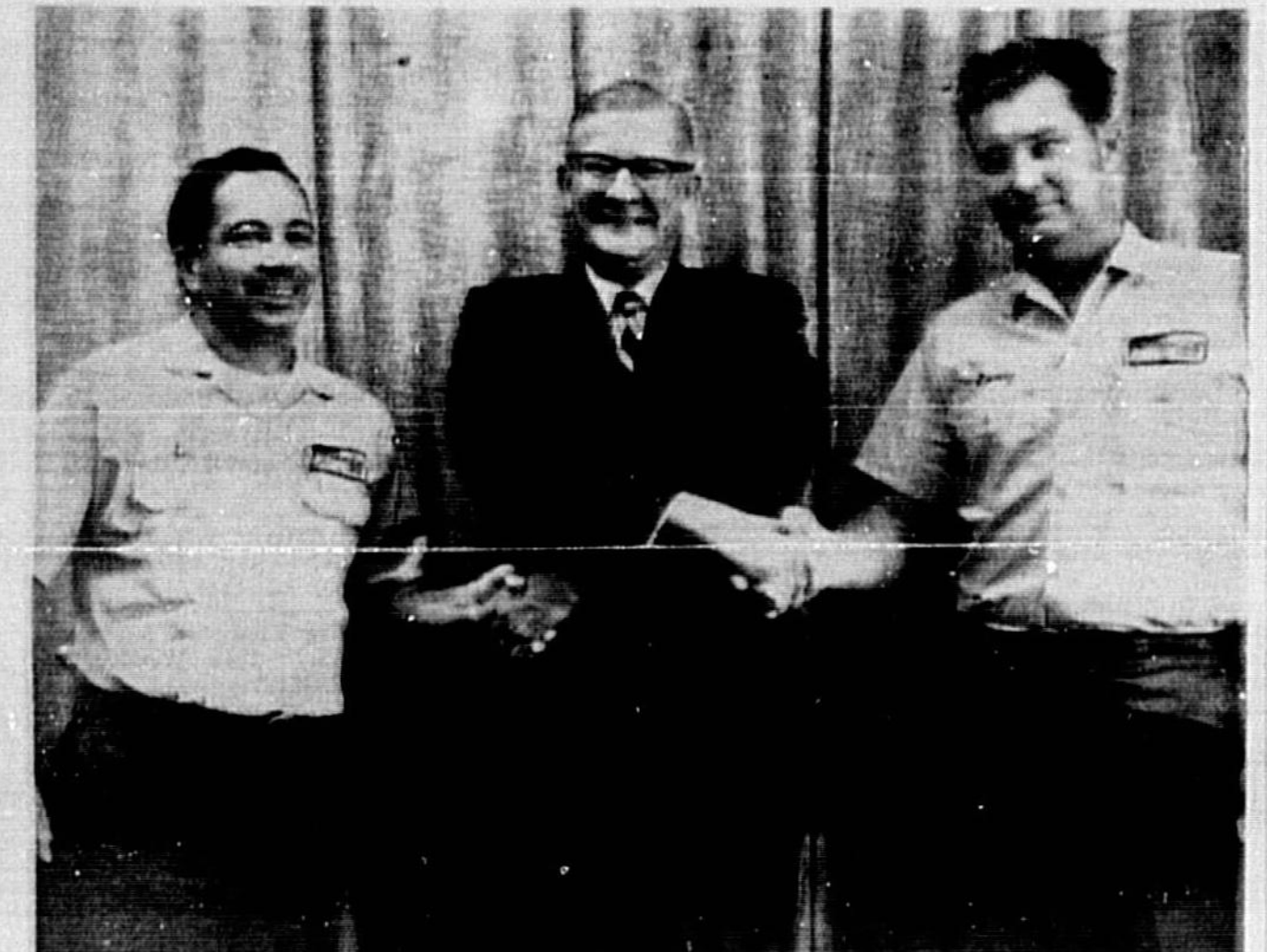

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## Most Far-Reaching New List Anti-Inflation Proposals

WASHINGTON (AP) — Picking up where President Nixon left off, Federal Reserve Board Chairman Arthur F. Burns says the government might have to use compulsory arbitration and a wage-price review board to battle inflation.

In the most far-reaching list of anti-inflation proposals by a government official in the Nixon administration, Burns suggested Monday night changes in minimum wage laws for teenagers and more liberal oil import quotas.

Organized labor immediately attacked his suggestions. AFL-CIO President George Meany said Burns "wants to roll America back to the 19th Century and its economic 'trick-down' theory."

"Dr. Burns' prescription is the wrong medicine for the wrong patient at the wrong time," Meany said. "His last lame plan for the administration puts America into the current recession. His new game plan would worsen it."

Although the Fed is an independent agency, Burns and Nixon frequently confer on economic strategy. But there was no indication the White House had seen Burns' plan, made in Los Angeles.

Last Friday, Nixon announced plans to increase oil production to try to roll back a 25-cent per barrel increase in crude oil prices, wanted by business and labor not to bet on future inflation, and called for reform of labor's bargaining in the construction industry.

Burns endorsed Nixon's move as "constructive," but said if inflation continues "numerous other measures might be taken to improve the functioning of our markets."

The wage-price review board, he said, would have no enforcement powers but would have "broad authority to investigate, advise and recommend on price and wage changes."

Compulsory arbitration might be needed in big labor disputes, "in industries that vitally involve the public interest," he said.

But while Burns was suggesting a review board, his successor as Nixon's chief economic adviser, Dr. Paul W. McCracken, rejected wage-and-price guidelines as an effective government policy.

McCracken told business editors meeting in Washington that guidelines in the United States and in other countries have failed to moderate wage increases.

Burns said, however, if the nation wants to reduce unemployment by stimulating the economy and at the same time prevent inflation from increasing, the government can't count on "classical remedies."

**Disney World Opens October**

WALT DISNEY WORLD — Construction is headed at high speed toward an opening day next October when this "Vacation Kingdom" will be ready for its first visitors.

More than 3,000 workers are now on the job as the project moves ahead at an ever-increasing pace.

Currently the nation's largest non-governmental construction project, the new destination vacation resort includes a theme park similar to California's Disneyland plus 2,500 acres of land and water recreation, resort hotels, camping and entertainment facilities of every kind.

Within the new "Magic Kingdom" theme park, Cinderella's Castle is past the 125-foot mark with turrets and battlements headed toward a 175-foot peak. An ornate Victorian railroad station and City Hall in Town Square are nearly finished.

Man-made waterfalls are nearing completion among imported tropical trees and shrubs which already line the banks of the Jungle River cruise.

Shops, restaurants, theaters, forests, a submarine lagoon and scores of other attractions are centers of construction activity.

At the heart of the "Vacation Kingdom" is the 100-acre site of the new resort, which will be built on a 27,000-acre site near Orlando.

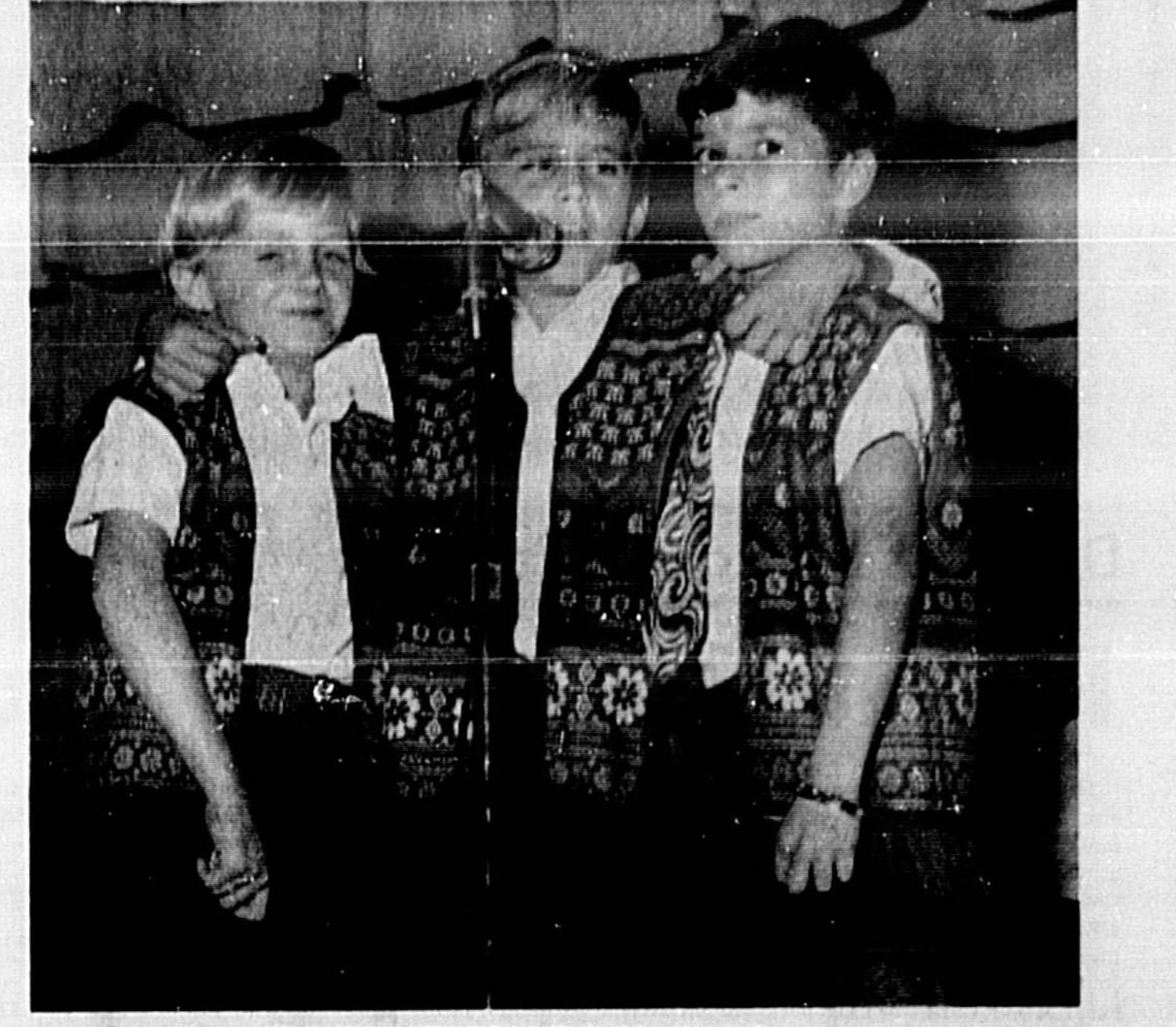

## Commissioner Avers Canal Report Denied

"In our rush to feather our nest, we may end up by fouling our nest."

This was the comment of Commissioner Greg Drummond yesterday to a letter written to the Commission by S. B. (Jim) Crowe relative to the St. Johns-Indian River Canal.

Crowe had requested that the Commission declare a moratorium on payments to the canal district and asked that the board be polled as to its opinion upon the matter.

Drummond, however, was the only commissioner offering an opinion, and he elucidated that the Cross State Canal and the St. Johns-Indian River Canal were both preoccupied with economic feasibility and had detracted from the ecological aspect. Drummond continued that he would like to see more studies of the ecological nature with the legislative delegation expanding more funding along these lines. In regard to the moratorium on payments, Drummond stated that "we cannot do anything at our level... we are directed by law on the funds."

Chairman John Alexander expressed that four counties contribute \$2,500 yearly to the district by a legislative act, and that the bulk of these funds had been expended in preliminary engineering studies and cost Alexander, "I'd like to know how the county ended up with two individuals like Crowe and Krier endorsing opposite sides of the issue."

Alexander replied, "I'd like to answer that but..."

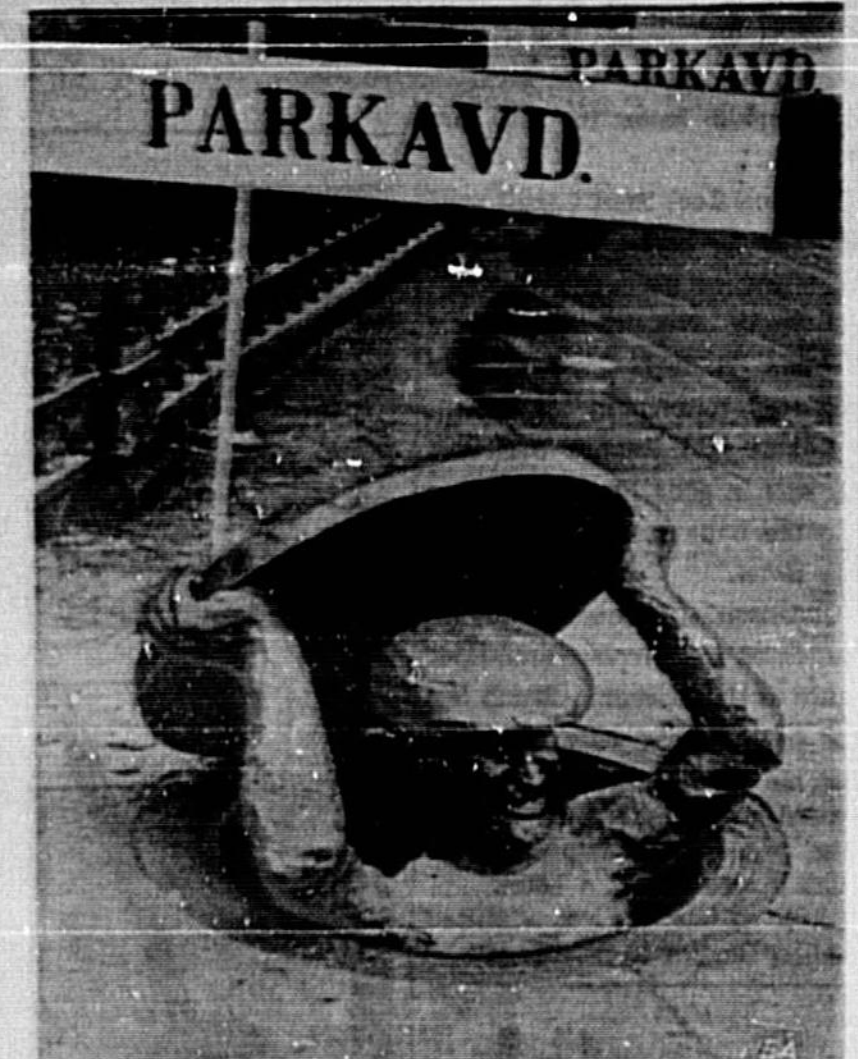

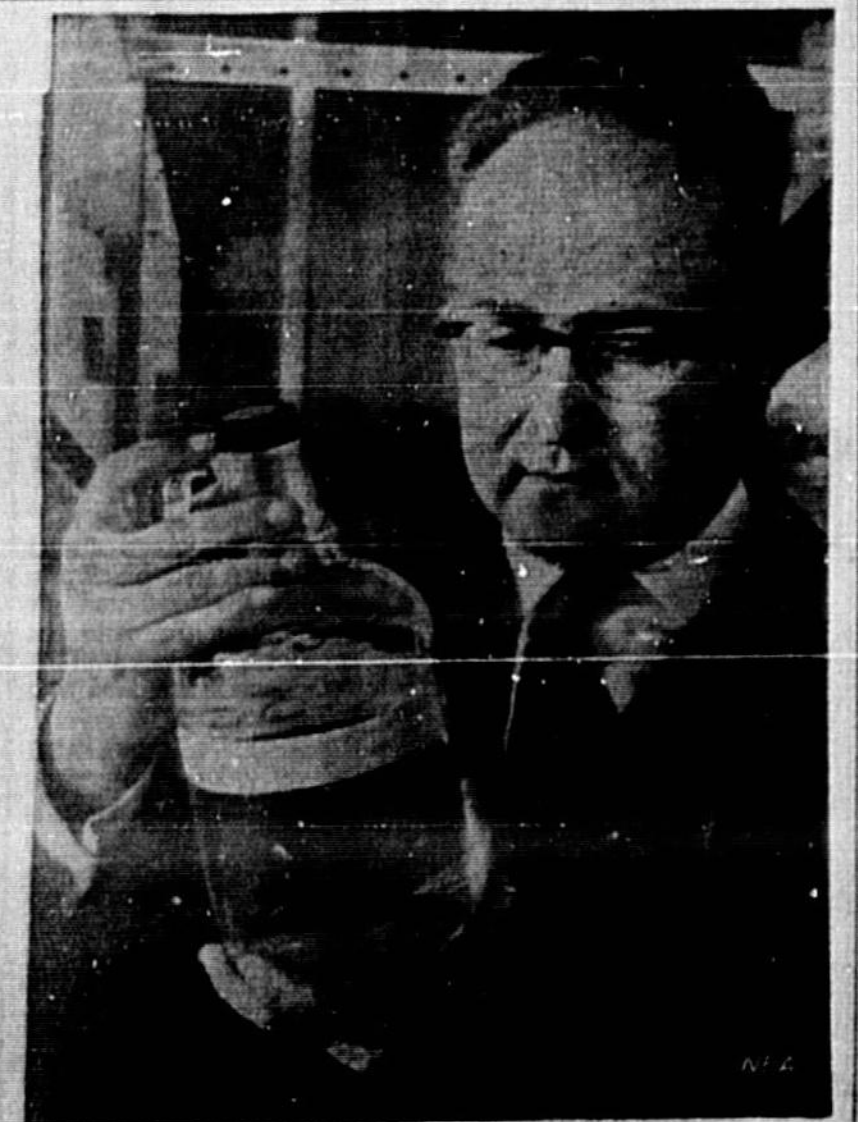
### Christmas Program Planned

## Every Disney Cartoon Feature Had Personal Stamp

 HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Starting with "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs," every cartoon feature from the Disney studio over a 36-year period bore the personal stamp of Walt Disney himself. "The Aristocats" is the first one that doesn't.

The Disney organization is releasing its latest full-length cartoon at Christmas time, helping parents with the increasing problem of how to find movies the kids can see. "The Aristocats" will be closely examined by critics for evidences of change; now that the master's hand no longer rules the product.

"Jungle Book" was the last animated feature to be supervised by Disney, who died four years ago this month.

The critics will find no major difference in "The Aristocats." It displays the meticulous animation, beguiling characters and robust humor that have marked precious Disney features. Plus the cuteness that seems to bug highbrow critics.

The Disney system continues. The man who now oversees the cartoons as producer is a long-time Disney hand, Wolfgang "Woolie" Reitherman. He admitted the loss that he and the other animation makers feel about Walt.

"During the production process, Walt saw what we were doing," said Reitherman. "He let us know if we were on the right track or not. He gave us the vote of confidence that we needed to go ahead."

"You need that at stages when you start to get tunnel vision and you can't get an overall view. Now, instead of Walt, we get our own feedback from the screen. We run what we have made thus far, and the screen tells us if we are on the right track."

"The Aristocats" is not of the few Disney cartoon features based on an original story. It is the first to feature cats as the main figures.

"The Aristocats" began as a live-action script, then Walt said, "I think it would play better as a cartoon." He saw some of the preliminary sketches and gave the project the go-ahead.

Shortly afterward he died.



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



### Glades Brigade Cleans Park

EVERGLADES NATIONAL Park, Fla. The canal is a popular fishing spot, especially at low tide, when the water table is low. 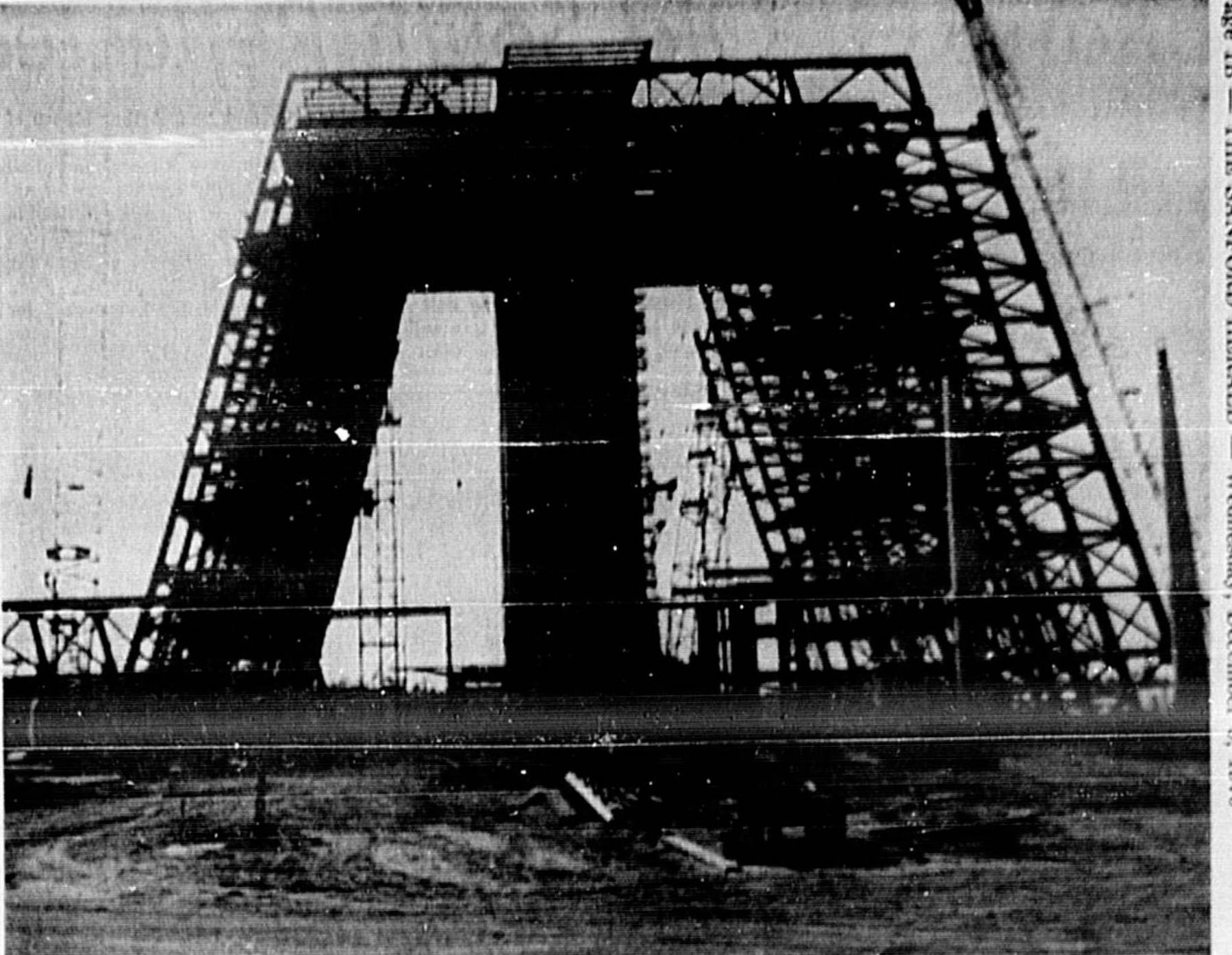

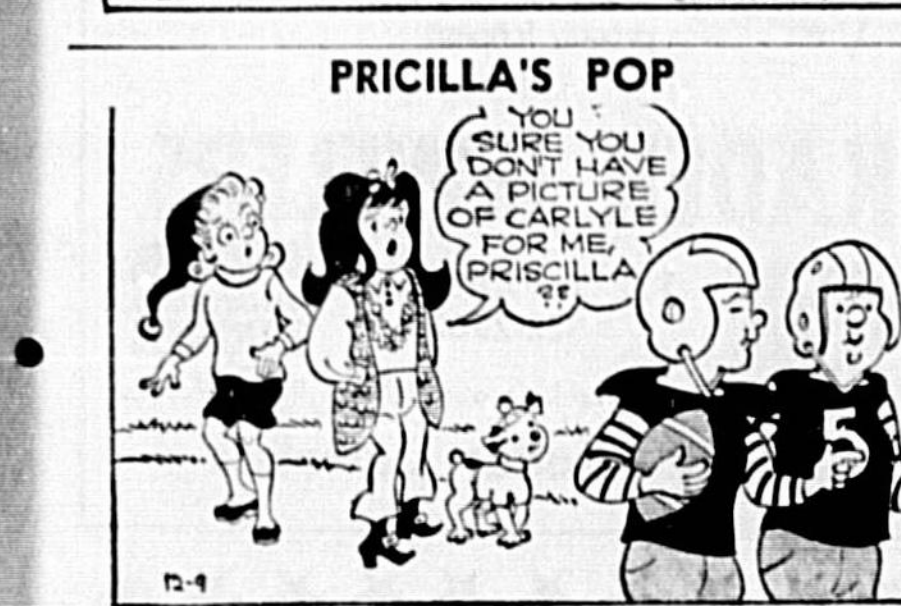

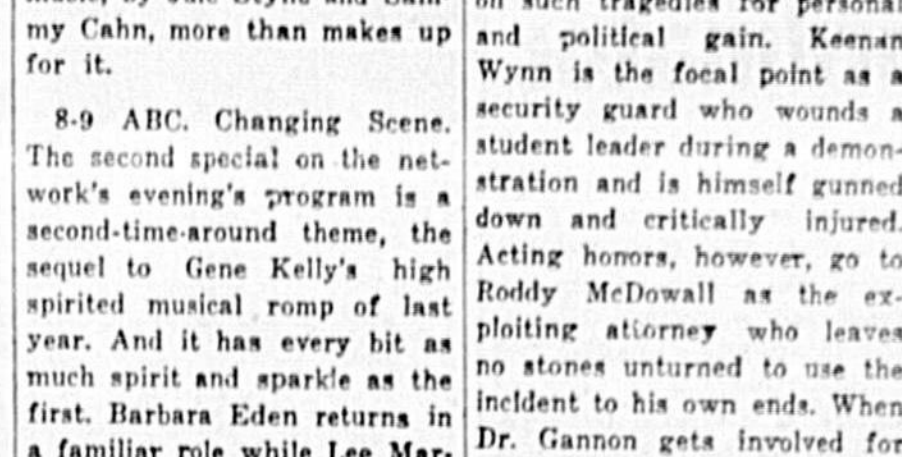

## Rearranges Calendar Castro Lowers 1971 Cane Quota

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Facing mounting economic difficulties Premier Fidel Castro has scaled down Cuba's 1971 sugar production quota to seven million tons and rearranged the calendar to achieve it. The bearded prime minister announced Monday night that next year's sugarcane harvest would start this month. As a consequence, Cubans will celebrate Christmas and New Year's holidays in July. Also put off until next summer is the observance of the 12th anniversary of Castro's assumption of power. This would normally have been celebrated Jan. 2. Castro, who staked the prestige of his revolution on an optimistic production of 10 million tons for the year's harvest and failed, called the 1971 goal the minimum necessary to alleviate the country's unfavorable balance of payments situation. "We have a large imbalance (in trade) with the Soviet Union," Castro told a workers' conference. "The necessities of the country call for seven million tons if we want to illuminate our houses, provide the necessities, our food. "Even with seven million, our favorable balance of payments is large. "We need seven million tons, and we are already late. We would like to celebrate the new year, who wouldn't. . . . But can we permit ourselves that luxury? "I do not think that we should go to any great trouble over traditions. And that business about Christmas trees—we are not in Belgium, nor Switzerland. We are here. "The occasion was the closing session of a three-day conference which created a union of workers in the metallurgical, hydro-electric and chemical fields. The union was organized along with Castro called democratic lines and utilized the democratic process to elect Agapito Figueroa as the union's national secretary. Figueroa, a Communist Party Central Committee member, is an old-guard Communist labor leader.

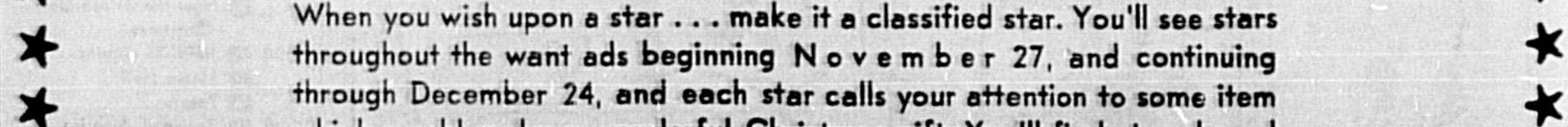
### Customs Bureau Seizes Drugs

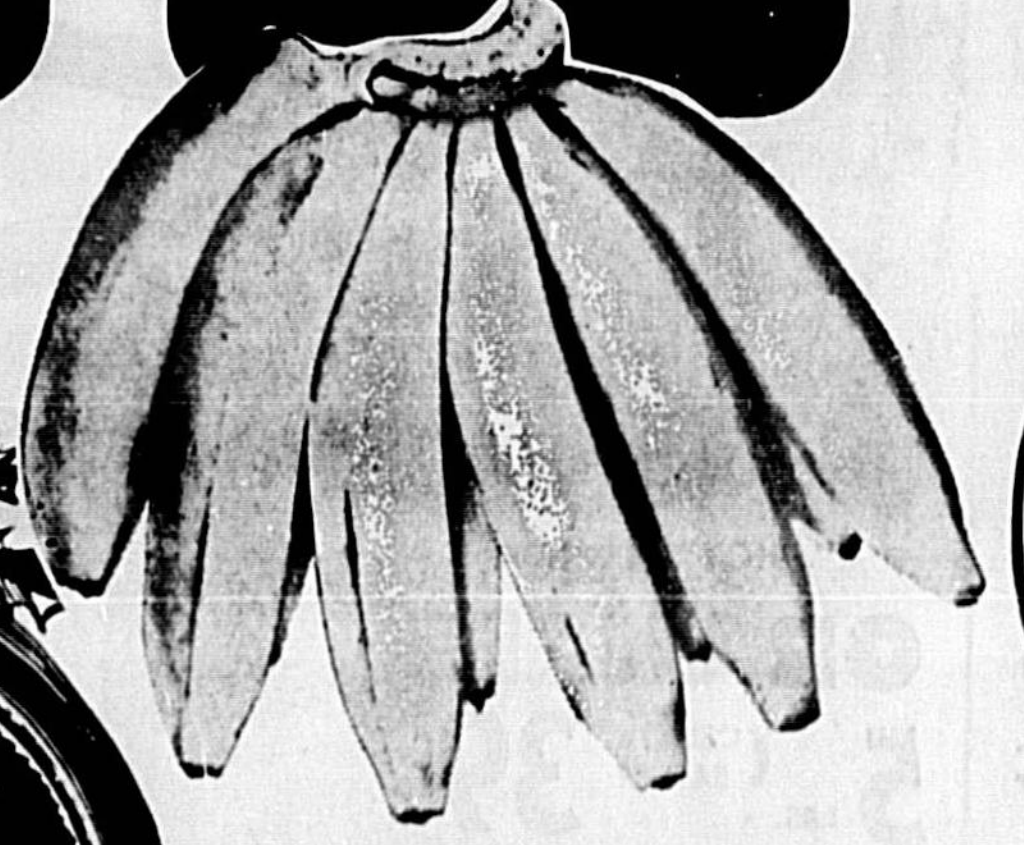

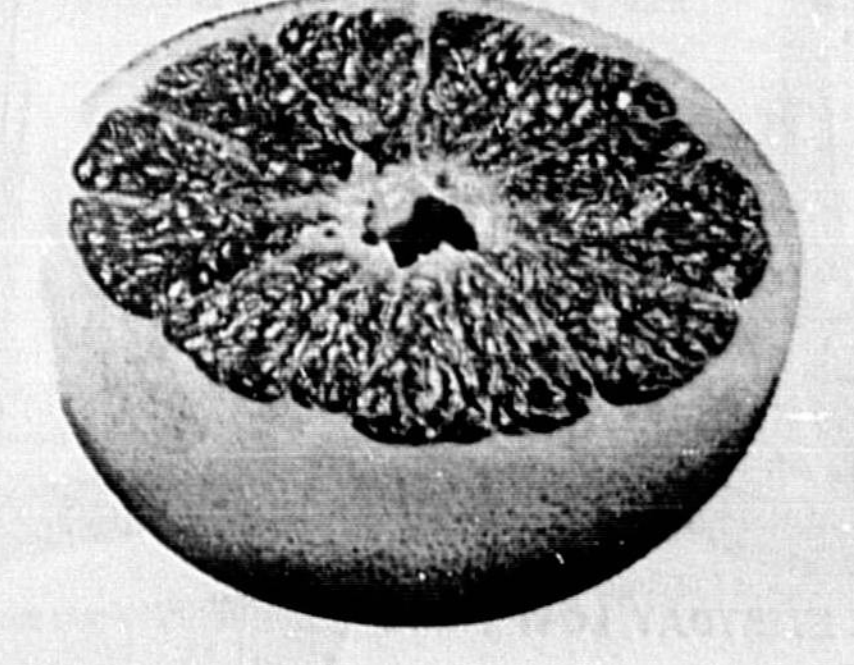

Let stand at room temperature about ¼ hour before serving so oil in marinade will flow. If used sprinkle with parsley. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

Melt remaining 1/4 cup of the margarine in Dutch oven. Brown veal well on all sides, about 15 minutes, turning carefully so as not to lose stuffing. Reduce heat, slowly add 1 cup water. Simmer, covered, for about 1 hour and 35 minutes or until veal is fork-tender. Add water as necessary to maintain original level. Turn roll occasionally to prevent sticking. Strain drippings and use to make gravy. Slice veal; cut into crosswise slices; serve with gravy. Makes 6 servings.

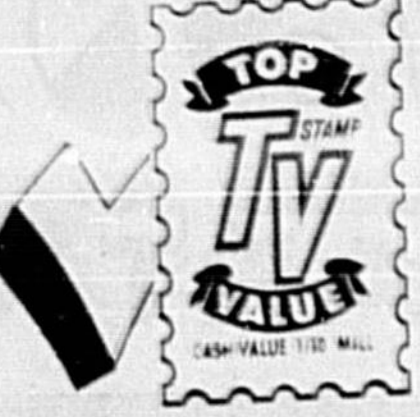

# Try Chef's Recipe For A Superb Chicken Dish

 A classic chicken recipe that is a tested people-pleaser comes from Ernle's, a San Francisco restaurant known for its consistently good cuisine. The dish is favorite of chef Paul Quirod. For a buffet he recommends keeping it hot in a stay-warm server. Serve with rice, marinated cold string bean salad, crusty bread and a fruit dessert.

**CHICKEN SUPREME**  
 Stock  
 1/2 lb. chicken (with giblets), without liver  
 1 medium carrot, cut in half  
 1 celery stem  
 1 leek or scallion  
 1 small bay leaf  
 1/2 teaspoon thyme  
 4 cloves unpeeled garlic  
 4 pepper corns  
 1 tsp. salt or rock salt  
**Supreme Sauce**  
 4 tablespoons butter  
 2 1/2 tsping tablespoon all-purpose flour  
 1/2 cup heavy cream  
 1 tablespoon lemon juice  
 2 cups chicken broth

**Rice**  
 2 tablespoons butter  
 1 tablespoon finely chopped onions  
 1 small bay leaf  
 2 1/2 cup raw rice  
 1 1/2 cups cold water  
 Salt  
 Ground pepper  
 Place chicken in pot with stock ingredients and just cover with cold water. Cover and simmer over moderate heat for 1 hour. Skim off scum, if any. Meanwhile, in a quart sauce pan, soften onions in butter without coloring. Stirring with a wooden spoon, add rice, mix well, add water, bay leaf, season lightly, bring to a boil and lower heat to a simmer. Cover and let cook 17 minutes without stirring. Remove from heat, keep covered and put aside.  
 After 1 hour of simmering, check the chicken to see if it is cooked. If tender, remove from pot and strain broth into another container.  
**Supreme Sauce:** Blend flour and butter in sauce pan over low heat so as not to color it.

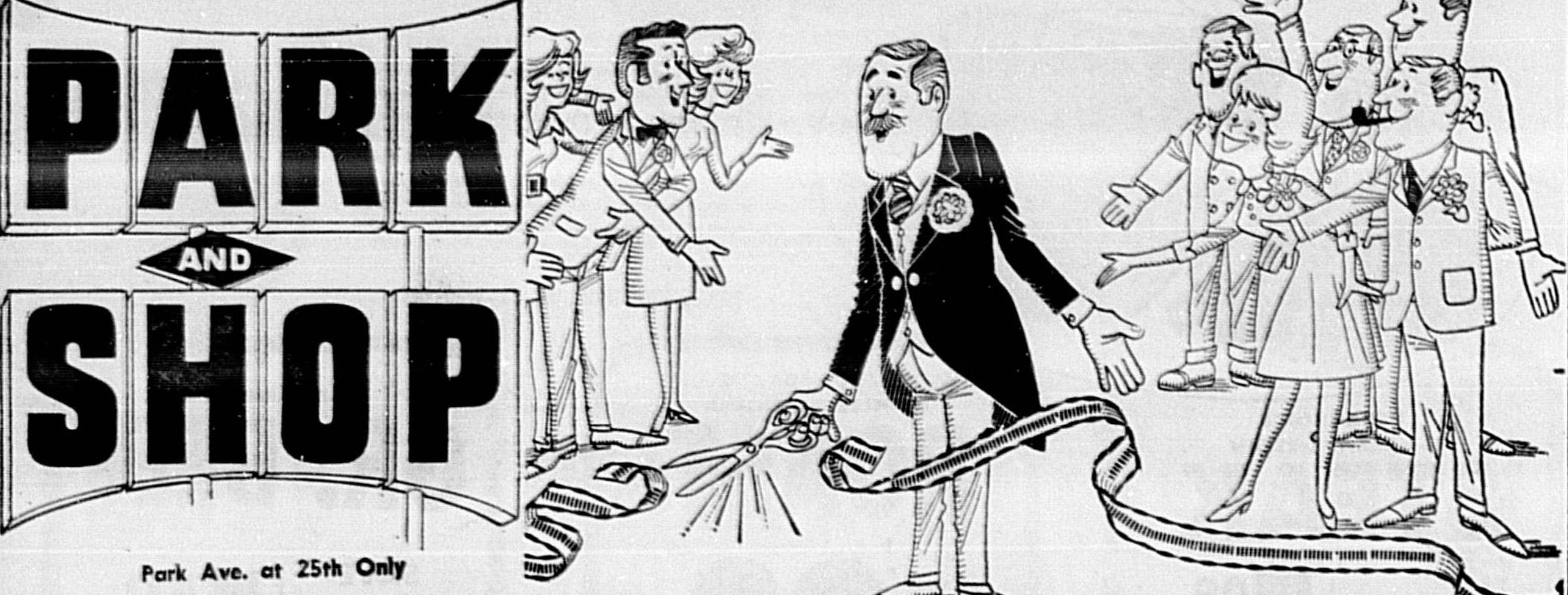
Pour in 2 cups broth, stirring constantly with a soft whip until it boils. Lower heat and simmer uncovered for 15 minutes. Add cream and lemon juice and let boil gently for 5 more minutes. Season to taste.  
 Remove skin and carve chicken into serving sized pieces. Remove bay leaf from rice. Put rice in dish. Place the carved chicken pieces on rice and cover with part of the sauce. Serve remainder of sauce in a sauce boat. Makes 4 servings.

## Norma's Real Plum Pudding

 Several weeks before Christmas a lady named Norma, who lives in New Jersey, makes her famous plum pudding to serve at her holiday dinner. Now we follow suit because Norma's is one of the best steamed puddings we've ever eaten. Stored in the refrigerator until Christmas, the pudding seems to gain both in flavor and texture.  
 If you decide to try this recipe, please do serve the pudding with Lemon Sauce. When Norma insisted on this accompaniment, we were a little skeptical because it's nontraditional. But after following her advice, we're convinced that she's so right!

**NORMA'S REAL PLUM PUDDING**  
 1/2 cup (4 ounces) red slice cherries, coarsely chopped  
 1/2 cup dried currants  
 1/2 cup seedless raisins  
 1/2 cup chopped dried figs, stems clipped before chopping  
 1/2 cup (2 ounces) dried candied citron  
 1/2 cup (2 ounces) sliced candied orange peel  
 2 cups (about 1/2 pound) ground suet, packed down  
 1 cup milk  
 1 1/2 cups finely ground dry white bread crumbs (home made)  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg  
 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon  
 1/2 teaspoon cloves  
 1/2 cup firmly packed dark brown sugar  
 4 large eggs  
 2 tablespoons dry red wine  
 2 tablespoons brandy  
 Granulated sugar  
 Holly sprigs and extra whole red glaze cherries for garnish  
 Extra brandy  
 Lemon Sauce, see recipe  
 In a large mixing bowl toss the fruits with the suet until well mixed.  
 In a small saucepan add the milk, remove from heat; stir in the brandy, salt, nutmeg, cinnamon, cloves and brown sugar; set aside to cool.  
 In a medium mixing bowl beat eggs until thick and buoyant; stir in the cooled cream mixture; add to fruit-suet mixture with the wine and 2 tablespoons brandy and mix well.  
 Turn into 2 ungreased 1-pound tall coffee cans. Cover cans with foil held taut with string.  
 Place a rack in the bottom of a large deep enamel that has a cover; fill with enough boiling water to cover 2 1/2 of cans. Add cans; cover enamel and steam puddings—water should boil gently.

 NORTH ORLANDO — Village Council has been told by Councilman Richard Allen that he had spoken with members of the Orange-Seminole legislative delegation relative to amending the Village charter, and that it was the consensus of this body that "they wouldn't touch a charter."  
 Allen has contended that the charter should be drawn in the form of an ordinance and submitted to the electors for referendum. He further contended that the charter may be amended without any legislative action, pursuant to home rule provisions.

## Offer Made For Several Buildings State Prison For City Airport?

 Preliminary negotiations over a lease by the Florida Bureau of Prisons of Sanford Airport property to locate a minimum security prison have been underway between local and state officials.  
 This was confirmed today by David Bachman, Florida Bureau of Prisons deputy director, in a telephone conversation from Tallahassee.  
 Bachman revealed that a team of state prison officials, including himself, had toured airport building 310, along with other facilities at the former Navy base, pursuant to possible lease of the facilities pending the outcome of the decision of the State Cabinet to lease the building for a police training academy.  
 The prison official, who works directly under Louis Wainwright, state prisons director, said nothing could be definite until the academy location question is cleared up. That question has been delayed after a group of Dade County police officials appeared at a State Cabinet hearing to request that instead of having one site for training lawmen, each state area be allotted a set amount of state funds to train lawmen with problems peculiar to that locale.  
 Bachman stated he was "much impressed with the airport facility" but could make no announcements yet and he further stressed that any words along these lines would have to come from Wainwright, who was away from Tallahassee at the time The Herald called.  
 When approached by The Herald concerning the negotiations involving the city and the prison officials, Sanford Industrial director David F. Kelley admitted that Mayor Lee P. Moore, Sheriff John Polk and himself had discussed the lease of airport property for use as a prison with Prison Bureau officials in a Tallahassee visit. Kelley revealed that the prison officials had sought to lease five airport buildings, including building 310, and had envisioned the employment of 150 persons with an annual payroll of \$1 million.  
 Kelley said the City Commission had been polled and turned out to be in favor of the proposal. (Continued on Page 2A, Col. D)

## Federal \$\$ Sought For Park Sites

Should the county receive the grants and funds from HUD, it would not be necessary for the County Commission to issue the full bond issue.  
 The trio is scheduled a conference with HUD officials in Atlanta, and following preliminary information to formalize the application. They also will ascertain if any funds are available from HUD for a planning study in the county relative to mass transportation as concerns county-wide bus service, routes, population, etc.  
 Commissioner Chairman John Alexander said that such a service would be beneficial in three capacities: That there would be less use of individual vehicles upon the highways, that this would be a convenience to certain economic and age brackets who are limited in available transportation, and further that many individuals are interested in having mass transit available.  
 Commissioner Greg Drummond said that there was a growing need for the service and that congested highways were a problem. He stressed that the county should consider this program before a dire need is reached.  
 Drummond also told the commission that he felt that "we should pursue the thinking of HUD relative to federal funding for the Juvenile Detention and Mental Institutions facilities."  
 Alexander retorted that while his thinking upon the matter was "personal" that there should be no delay upon the construction of these facilities, also recently approved by Public referendum. Alexander noted that the board should proceed with the construction without the consideration of federal funds, and concluded that "if we can't build our county buildings without federal funds we better fold up."  
 The matter has been placed upon the agenda for next Tuesday, at which time an architect will be selected for the facilities.  
 Vihlen expressed that the county should "Net hold up responsibility." However, he said, it might be prudent to check the matter with HUD since the program might be expedited through the federal government.  
 Drummond stated that he still felt that federal funding should be explored and that "we owe it to the taxpayer."
