## It's Official -- Reedy, Bryant, Keeth Triumph

W. H. (Bill) Reedy won reelection to the State House of Representatives for the group one seat representing Lake and Seminole Counties in a nip and tuck cliff-hanger until the official tally of absentee votes in the two counties were announced today.

While Reedy lost Seminole County by 321 votes, he carried his home county of Lake with 671 votes to spare. Lake County totals are Reedy 5,823 while Beals received 5,852.

Official tally of the absentee ballots assured victory for the two Republican candidates for the school board marking the first time in the history of Seminole County that Republicans have won local office.

Official results gave Allan F. Keeth (R) 6,428 for the district 5 seat on the Board of Public Instruction while his opponent, Donald J. Baker (D) incumbent, received 6,084.

The race for the district 1 seat was slightly closer with Mrs. Jean Bryant (D) garnering 6,470 votes to Dr. John Darby (D) 6,287.

In other official results, Sherman N. Smith Jr. (D) did carry the county, despite the fact that he lost the remaining counties in the district for the Fourth Congressional District with 8,419.

Final results in the fire district elections showed both districts were approved. Forest City-Lake District (precincts 9, 12 and 16) voters were 757 for and 199 against while the electorate in the Suburban Fire Control District (Fern Park, precincts 4, 11, 23 and 25) were 925 for and 147 against.

**Rap At Burns**  
MIAMI (AP) — Gov. Haydon Burns' refusal to support defeated Democratic gubernatorial candidate Robert King High has prompted harsh criticism from the University of Miami's young Democrats. The group adopted a resolution yesterday censuring Burns for "his conspicuous disloyalty to the democratic party."

**Draft Slowdown**  
WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon's reduced draft quota for January is the first in its planned 1967 slowdown of the draft, but manpower experts believe the lower rate may be difficult to maintain through 1968.

**New Avalanche?**  
ROME (UPI) — Drenching rains in the northern Italian Alps and Dolomites brought new avalanche threats to dozens of mountain villages today as Italy geared to repair an estimated \$2.4 billion in damage wrought by the most devastating flood in its history.

**Gemini Set**  
After two frustrating days because of a faulty autopilot system in the astronauts' Titan 2 rocket, the Gemini 12 mission today resumed a green light to blast off Friday on the final flight in the Gemini series.

Formal application for a permit to construct a new 4,000-foot bridge on State Road 415 over the St. Johns River has been submitted to the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers by the State Road Department.

Willard Peebles, district Road Board member, informed The Sanford Herald today that the SRD at Tallahassee has requested the Army Engineers at Jacksonville for the permit.

The new Osteen bridge would have a horizontal measure of 30 feet and a vertical measure of 45 feet. This would eliminate a draw, in conformity with Engineers' desires.

# No Money Available After Nov.

Seminole Community Action, Inc., is fast running out of money and promised October appropriations now are not expected before "the end of November."

"We are presently funded through Nov. 18 and possibly through Nov. 25. After that we will be without funds," E. D. Kirchoff told members of the board of directors today.

"If the approval comes on Nov. 30, Seminole Community Action, Inc., will be without funds for at least several days and any additional delay will create serious administrative problems," Kirchoff warned.

Funding was originally promised "by the end of October" by the Office of Economic Opportunity in Atlanta but recent communications with Roland Blending advised against a supplemental application to "bridge the gap."

"A grant application was submitted in September, 77 days in advance of Nov. 15, but when I did not hear from them I called and asked about the advisability of submitting a supplemental application. They advised against this and Blending said he thought the supplemental application grant could be processed by the end of October.

"I talked with Blending by telephone on Oct. 31 and again on Nov. 8 and he advised me that our C and A application was in process and would hopefully be approved and funded by Nov. 30," Kirchoff informed the board.

"I don't want to be an alarmist but want the board to know the situation. Blending sounded encouraging, but it looks like we may run out of funds before the next appropriation is received," Kirchoff concluded.

# GOP Breakthrough Seen Threat To LBJ

WASHINGTON (AP) — The rolling impact of a midterm Republican breakthrough offered a fresh threat today not only to President Johnson's legislative program but possibly to his reelection in 1968.

While the GOP was surging to above-average gains in Tuesday's nonpresidential year balloting, it also was netting gains from the Democrats' eight errors' mistakes.

As final ballot counts stretched out the measuring tape, it became apparent that Johnson and his Democratic administration had suffered a crippling, though not necessarily lasting, defeat in contests where the President had thought Democrats might do very well.

- 1. BUY THE BEST BULBS.** Flower-bulbs should be sound and firm. Also, the larger the tulip bulb, the larger the bloom next Spring.
- 2. ORDER EARLY.** By ordering or purchasing early, you are certain of the best selection of varieties. Plant immediately after bulbs arrive.
- 3. PLANT IN WELL-DRAIN ED SOIL.** Bulbs like a loose soil. Hard soils can be improved by adding sand, peat or other soil conditioner.
- 4. PLANT BEFORE FROST HARDENS THE GROUND.** The planting period for Spring-flowering bulbs extends from September to December. In the South, plant one month later — after cool weather arrives.
- 5. PLANT AT RIGHT DEPTH AND SPACING.** Daffodils, tulips and hyacinths should be set 3 to 6 inches deep and apart. Crocuses, Muscari and most other small bulbs should be planted 2 to 4 inches deep and apart.
- 6. BULBS CAN BE GROWN ANYWHERE.** Don't overlook shady locations for bulbs. Flowerers will often last longer when in shade or semi-shade.
- 7. PLANT IN GROUPS.** Plant bulbs in clumps of 12 to 24 for the most colorful effect. A separation between clumps will enhance their appearance.
- 8. WATER WELL.** Water all planted areas after planting and throughout the Fall should there be insufficient rainfall.
- 9. MULCH HEAVY.** Cover bulb beds with a mulch of peat-moss, dry leaves, salt hay, wood chips or other material to prevent soil from heaving during late Winter.
- 10. LOOSEN THE SOIL IN SPRING.** If the soil becomes compact over Winter, loosen in the Spring so rain will not drain away.

By following these ten suggestions, you will be assured of good results from your bulbs planted this Fall.

## Homemaker's Corner

Mrs. "Bill" (Walker) Gistow gave me this recipe of hers. Sounds very good and with the hunting season coming up you can use this with venison or other kinds of wild meat. So hurry up and try it. And we thank you very much, Mrs. Gistow, for it.

**BARLEY CASSEROLE**  
Most people think of barley as something that goes into soup. Fine pearl barley makes an excellent casserole dish. 1 cup of pearl barley 1 large onion, sliced 1/2 lb. mushrooms 4 to 5 tbsps. butter 2 cups broth (meat or chicken) Peel onion and chop it. Wipe the mushrooms with a damp cloth and slice them. Melt butter and saute onions and mushrooms until soft. Add the barley and brown slightly. Pour into

buttered casserole. Before you pour the broth over the barley, taste it for seasoning. If it is enough, the seasoning it is not need additional salt or pepper. For broth use any stock from meat or chicken or use canned meat broth, consommé or chicken broth. Or make broth with hot water and bouillon cubes. (You will need about 3 cups for the 2 cups of liquid.) Pour 1 cup of broth over the barley in the casserole and cover. Bake in a 350-degree oven for 25-30 minutes and then uncover and add the second cup of broth. Continue cooking until the liquid is absorbed and the barley done.

NOTE: This varied from the recipe as follows:

1. Use one large can of chopped mushrooms, instead of fresh.
2. Did not brown barley.
3. Mixed the entire casserole about 8 hours before cooking and let stand in the refrigerator. This softened the barley somewhat.
4. Added at least 1 extra cup of broth.
5. Cooked approximately 1 1/2 hours.

This recipe will serve 4.

Children are the easiest to please when it comes to sandwiches, but there are nevertheless several important pointers to remember. Some apply only to the lunch carried to school, while others are equally applicable to the sandwich lunch eaten at home. For example: Youngsters usually prefer familiar foods and mild flavors rather than heavy or exotic food combinations.

Sandwiches should be made of bread slices that are not too thick, then cut into small sections which are easy to handle. Keep servings of all foods small.

Fruits (particularly in the carried lunch) are best prepared for eating out of hand. Milk is essential in any child's lunch. If not available at school, it must be sent from home in a small vacuum bottle.

Very few sweets should be included in the carried lunch since children may eat these instead of the important foods.

### Bear Lake Group Hits Overcrowding Of School Buses

Protesting of overcrowding on school buses was brought before members of the Board of Public Instruction Thursday by a group of mothers from the Bear Lake area.

Mrs. Betty Williams, spokesman for the group asked for an extra bus to be put on to relieve overcrowding on Bus 68. She presented a petition bearing 65 names.

"The situation is inexcusable. We cannot allow it to continue. Three high school boys cannot sit on a bus and even three slinky girls can hardly make it. There is not room to stand up in the aisles, hold an armload of books and try to hold on. Some of these children have to ride 12 to 15 miles," she said.

"We have no bus to put on that route, or say other route," Mason Wharton, school board chairman, said.

"I intend to put one of the new buses there just as soon as they arrive," Herbert Mose, school transportation director told the parents.

"In the meantime, what do you want us to do? The buses are not here yet—we have no more—we are running every bus we have," he added.

"If you were in our shoes, sitting here on this board, what would you do?" asked Donald Bates, board member.

"I'll tell you what I would do," Bates answered his own question.

"If I were really terribly worried about my children's safety, I would put them in my car and drive them to school, or organize a car pool. And I have four children riding the bus," Bates declared.

## Hart Lied On Bribe Charge - Turlington

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — According to House speaker-designate Ralph Turlington, an allegation that three legislators were bribed by a lobbyist is "absurd, false and cannot be proven."

Turlington said Thursday he personally investigated testimony by Clyde E. Hart in which the Sumatra ranch-lobbyist said he bribed present House Speaker E. C. Rowell, Sen. Mack Cleveland and Rep. Gordon Frederick to influence race track legislation.

"It is my opinion that the charges were absurd, false and cannot be proven," Turlington said in a UPI interview. "I simply found that the basic premises of the allegations by Hart were not true."

Turlington said he talked to Hart, Rowell, Cleveland and others in his investigation, and said he expects no challenges against either man when they arrive to be sworn into the House. Cleveland is currently in the Senate but has been elected to the House this year.

Hart made the charges in an Orlando bankruptcy hearing last week. He said he gave Rowell 25,000 shares in the Seminole Raceway to influence a measure in 1963 to move a racing permit from Key West to Pompano Beach, Cleveland and Frederick were given \$12,500 each in 1961 for passage of a bill that would reroute the Seminole Raceway to open, he said.

Rowell and Cleveland flatly denied receiving any money, and Frederick said he received \$12,500 from Hart for services as an attorney from 1956 to 1960 but had to go to court to collect it.

Turlington said Hart told him he did not give the racing company stock directly to Rowell, but sent it through Fred Nelson in the name of Nelson's brother.

"The stock at that time was virtually worthless," Turlington said. "The track had just completed a season that was in debt for close to \$1 million."

"I am satisfied in my mind that I have made a good faith effort on behalf of the House to determine the validity of these charges, and that they are false and baseless," he said.
