

Cdr. Knight Takes **Command Of Unit** In Ceremony Today





Fair, Equitable Tax Structure **Necessary For Seminole** County

Citizens of today in urban rural communities demand modern living.

Wherever homes may be built there are electrical conveniences, modern sewage, water facilities, transportation must be the latest contrived by automotive engineers, roads must be built to take rare of modern speeds, and freight must move by way of last minute creations for hauling.

Yet-it is apparent that many of those same citizens who demand the very latest conveniences and the most modern living accomodations believe that their government can operate with an antiquated and outmoded tax system that fails to provide the necessary revenue.

This has been brought out from time to time as tax inequities are brought to light and as our county government attempts to meet the demands of an ever increasing load of requests for modorn maintenance and facilities.

The businessmen of the county have been forced to pay the tax load in recent years because of the peculiar position in the eyes of the tax assessor. Others have found themselves paying in dribbles as far as a "fair share' is concerned.

Some of our civic leaders are open with their statements that they do not pay enough taxes to support schools, road building, right of way purchases, and other necessary tools

to keep the county "safe, sane, and healthy." Antiquated tax systems must be relegated to the junk heap and brought up to the standands vaguined to produce the funds public spirited citizens demand for the operation of the government.

Citizens do not mind forming a line as they approach the Board of Seminole County Commissioners for road improvements, drainage corrections, maintenance of existing highways, and equipment needed to accomplish many of the jobs demanded.

But when they are asked "how much taxes do you pay" they sometimes must say \$2.50 or some other meager figure, amounts that will never provide the revenue necessary for building even one tiny road in a remote section of the community.

When you ask for improvements, when you demand more roads, and when you need additional protection—remember to also ask for a recvaluation of taxable property in Seminole County so that everyone will be paying their fair and just portion of the tax
