Editor, An Ex-Blond, Probes Dye-Namic Hair Color Boom

"Sooner or later nowadays, most American women dye, tint, or bleach their hair. What does it cost them? Here are the answers by an expert member of the 'I became a bleached blond' set."

NEW YORK (UPI)—Time was when a woman would rather dye than let her hair go gray.

Today she tappers wildly with her hand to her hair and usually talks about it just like in a feminine conversation at a lunch counter, the bridge table, or the common room in the house of the states.

The National Association of Hairdressers and Cosmetologists estimated that today 75 per cent of the nation's women are dyeing to improve on nature.

Rosy Glow Chicken

Lots of people keep foods in dishes chicken in a delicious, chicken in a pie. But the people who really enjoy good eating are the ones who experiment once in a while and thereby discover the exciting variations which keep their meals sparkling. Chicken is one of the most versatile of meats. It is a staple of children, steeped in a savory, tangy sauce, adding a sweet sour accent and a note hue to a favorite meal.

Nobody is surprised at chicken and vegetables saute or at roast duckling with a cherry sauce. But long chicken with a cherry sauce will be equally favored. Start with a favorite platter of a broiler fryer, cut in pieces and browned. Then use a one pound can of red hot cherries to make a spicy cherry sauce in which to simmer the chicken. Simmer with a rice ring for an elegant main dish.

Chicken Casserole

1 pound of round red meat
1 pound of round red meat
1 broiler fryer chicken, cut in pieces
3 tablespoons butter or margarine

1 tablespoon flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon sugar
1/2 teaspoon onion
1/8 teaspoon each allspice, cinnamon and dry mustard
1 can of crushed crushed pineapple

1 chicken broiler, cut
1/2 teaspoon red food coloring
3 cups hot cooked rice
Drain cherries, reserve liquid
Sprinkle chicken with salt, pepper and paprika. Melt butter in skillet and add chicken and brown well on all sides. Remove chicken. Blend flour, salt, sugar and spices in drippings in skillet. Gradually stir in cherry liquid, all spices and pineapple, bouillon cube and red food coloring. Add chicken. Cook, simmer 10 minutes, or until chicken is tender. Add drained cherries last 5 minutes cooking. To serve, place chicken in center of serving platter, spoon some of the sauce over chicken, surround with hot cooked rice. If desired, sprinkle rice with finely chopped parsley and toasted sliced almonds. Serve with remaining sauce. YIELD 4 servings.

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Turley Halts Brave Rally To Put Yanks Even Again

MILWAUKEE (UPI)—The World Series may have a different corpse after all because of a big Yankee inning and the three-pitch relief pitching of bullet Bob Turley.

Turley came out of the bullpen for only one out Wednesday to save a 4-3 victory for New York over the Milwaukee Braves and even the series at three games each.

The Yankees had given relief ace Rube Duran for the 10th, but the fireballer from Catawissa, Wis., had lost one of the runs and Braves were on first and third when Turley, who kept the Yankees alive with a 7-0 victory Monday, was summoned from the bullpen.

Pop Up Ends Game

The Braves substituted left-handed Frank Torre for Red Crandall at the plate. Turley whipped in two strikes, in came another and Torre banged a looping liner that looked like a sure hit. But Yankee second baseman Gil McDougald made a running catch to end the game.

Thus the Yankees were even with the defending world champion Braves after being down three games to one. Only one club in baseball's long history has ever come back from that deficit to win the title.

Most of the game's big moments occurred in the 10th.

It was 2:22 when the inning started, with the Braves' veteran left-hander Warren Spahn bidding for his third victory with only two days rest. His 37-year-old arm had tired visibly in the late innings, but he was still out there.

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (UPI)—The Milwaukee Braves called on Lew Burdette to do it again today.

The betting was 11 to 10 that he wouldn't.

Three times last year he beat the New York Yankees in an iron man performance which hadn't been accomplished in 37 years of grand old World Series play. He did by winning the seventh and deciding game to give the Braves their first world championship.

Now they're asking him again to do the same thing with the classic all squared away at three games each. On the other side of the fence were the comeback Yankees who had traded all this away and finally managed to square the series. And they were confident—as well as the betting choices—that they would elude their comeback by turning the tables on the casual man from the West Virginia mountains.

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India's Commies Start Terror Reign

NEW DELHI (UPI) — India's Communists, who won the southern Kerala state in a peaceful election 18 months ago, now are trying to consolidate their control with a reign of terror.
 This is the disturbing conclusion reached by top-level officials of the Congress Party, the majority party in India.
 Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru himself has declared that "an atmosphere of fear" grips the 12,000,000 inhabitants of the state. He has called for an impartial probe into Kerala's affairs to determine whether the state government is responsible.
Complex To Blame
 As far as some of the top men in Nehru's own Congress Party are concerned, however, there is no question that the Communist government of the tropical state bears full responsibility.
 U. N. Dhoobar and Srikanth Narayan, president and secretary of the party respectively, warned after a recent on-the-spot inquiry in Kerala that non-Communist leaders would be wiped out or forced to flee if the terrorism continued.
 The Communists marked into the 15,000-square-mile state in March, 1957, after ousting both the Congress Party and the Praja Socialist Party (PSP) in an election.
 They had promised sweeping reforms under a "non-violent democratic policy."
 But opposition was intense during the Communists' rule and a crackdown followed. There was a wave of political murders, assault or threats on Congress and Socialist party members. Non-Communist members in several trade union organizations were beaten or threatened.
Terrorism In Kerala
 Several officials who did not toe the Communist line found themselves out of jobs. A judge was sacked after he issued a ruling against a Communist law-breaker. A magistrate was transferred because his decisions were a bit too impartial.
 India's parliament has rung during the last few months with charges of misuse and terrorism in Kerala. The Communists, however, insist that the Congress and Socialist parties are deliberately inciting violence to discredit their regime.
 Chief Minister E. M. S. Namboodripad maintains that the state is functioning normally. But congressmen charge that Namboodripad's recent release of 1,360 prisoners and his commutation of death sentences for another 220—mostly Communists or pro-Communists—is not designed to insure normalcy.

Sainthood Is Possibility For Pope Due To Visions

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — Pope Pius XII may someday become a saint.

An unprecedented vision of Christ and a vision of the "Fatima miracle" of the revolving sun have been the only supernatural events in the Pope's life announced by the Vatican. However, there has been insistent mention of the Pope bringing about two miraculous healings as well.

Visions do not in themselves enter the cause of canonization, but they often speed the cause. Vatican circles believed that the cause of beatification of the Pope might be introduced shortly. Unofficial Catholic quarters said a dossier of "miracles" attributed to Pius XII had already been collected.

Beatification is the first step toward sainthood, and both beatification and canonization can take centuries before completed.

The Pope's first vision came on three successive days in the Holy Year 1950.

Federico Cardinal Tedeschini told a crowd of pilgrims in Fatima in 1951 that the Pope saw the sun revolve on three separate occasions — Oct. 30, 31, and Nov. 1, 1950. He said the vision came on each occasion while the Pope was walking in the Vatican gardens, each time at 4 p.m.

The vision was the same which three little shepherds had in Fatima, Portugal, on Oct. 13, 1917. The vision of the shepherd children climaxed a series of apparitions of the Virgin Mary they had seen earlier, starting May 13, 1917 — the day Eugenio Pacelli was consecrated archbishop in the

St. Peter's Basilica in Rome. A vision of Christ came to the Pope at dawn on Dec. 2, 1954, just 12 hours before an attack of gastritis and hernia raised fears for his life, the Vatican City newspaper *Osservatore Romano* said.
 In addition to these officially announced visions, the Pope has been credited by Italian newspapers and magazines with bringing about the miraculous cure of a girl stricken with tuberculosis and giving sight to a blind child.
