Air Force Flexes Muscles; Viewers Awed By Display

EGIN AIR FORCE BASE, Fla. (UPI) — The Air Force flexed its muscles in a spectacular display of air power before generals, Congressmen and hundreds of other awed spectators here Wednesday.

More than 6,000 watched as the Strategic Air Command's massive B52 nuclear bombers struck the show from the nation's favorite fighters in simulated combat strikes.

A formation of six bombers, the world's largest, winged over the Northwest Florida base on a 2,500-mile non-stop round trip from Westover Air Force Base, Mass., and made a simulated attack on the Eglin target range.

They made mock nuclear attacks on Atlanta, and Raleigh on the return route.

The B52 is the nation's No. 1 answer to the threat of war by potential of virtually complete retaliatory destruction with nuclear bombs.

Among those watching the big show were the governors-elect of Georgia and Alabama, Democrats Ernest Vandiver and John Patterson, along with former Alabama Gov. Gordon Persons.

Five southern congressmen, all Democrats, also were present: Frank Boykin of Alabama, William Colmer of Mississippi, Rob Sikes of Florida, Jim E. Miller of South Carolina, and F. Edward Hebert of Louisiana.

NAUGATUCK, Conn. (UPI) — The Air Force will try to send a rocket around the moon Saturday, a congressman disclosed today.

Rep. James T. Patterson (R-Conn.) said in a statement the attempt will be made at 4:44 a.m. s.t. He described the rocket as a Thor-Able missile equipped with infra-red cameras that will photograph the other side of the moon and transmit photo back to earth by coded signals.

"Air Force scientists tell me that chances of a successful shot are about 50-50," said Patterson, a member of the House Armed Services Committee.



Turley came out of the bullpen for only one out Wednesday to save a 4-3 victory for New York over the Milwaukee Braves and even the series at three games each.

The Yankees had given relief ace Ryne Duren a 4-2 lead with two runs in their half of the 10th, but the fireballer from Cazenovia, Wis., had lost one of the runs and Braves were up first and third when Turley, who kept the Yankees alive with a 7-0 victory Monday, was summoned from the bullpen.

Pop Up Ends Game

The Braves substituted left handed Frank Torre for Del Crandall at the plate. Turley whizzed in two strikes. In came another and Torre bopped a looping liner that looked like a sure hit. But Yankee second baseman Gil McDougald made a running catch to end his victory-saving job.

Thus the Yankees were even with the defending world champion Braves after being down three games to one. Only one club in baseball's long history has ever come back from that deficit to win the title.

Most of the game's big moments occurred in the 10th.

It was 2-2 when the inning started, with the Braves' veteran left-hander Warren Spahn bunting for his third victory with only two days rest. His 37-year-old arm had turned visibly in the late innings, but he was still out there.

McDougald opened with a homer over the left field screen. The Yankees southpaw got the next two batters and it appeared he would finish out the inning.

But Elston Howard and Yogi Berra singled in succession to put runners on first and third. Manager Fred Haney walked to the mound and took the ball from Spahn, who bridged to the dugout amidst a standing ovation.

McMahon Yields Single

In came chunky Don McMahon, in Brant's answer to Duren. He got one pitch past Bill Skowron before the Yankee first baseman rifled one of his fast balls into right field, scoring Howard with what proved to be the winning run.

'Never Tried So Hard,' Duren Says

MILWAUKEE (UPI) — I never worked so hard in my life and my only regret is that I couldn't finish.

Much as I would have liked to, though, I'll go with Casey Stengel's decision any time. I simply kept firing away until I got tired. When I started to lose it in the 10th inning, I and Casey knew it.

Striking out Wes Covington, Bill Bruton and Warren Spahn in the ninth must have taken more out of me than I thought.

Casey came out to the mound in the 10th for the first time after Hank Aaron had singled home Johnny Logan. I had thrown Aaron one of the best pitches and he really tomahawked it.

Anyway, Case asked me how I intended to pitch to Joe Adcock. I told him I was going to try to keep the ball low on him. That's what I did and Adcock singled.

Adcock's base hit finished me and brought on Bob Turley, who wound it all up by getting pitcher Frank Torre.

Although I gave up only one hit until the 10th, it was a very rough day for me. The humidity along with the perspiration from

my forehead clouded my eye glasses all the time I was pitching. You may have seen me wipe my glasses once or twice. That was the reason.

They asked me about some gesture I made to plate umpire Charley Berry when he called a fourth ball on Johnny Logan in the 10th. Frankly, I don't remember doing it. But I do know that I told him I thought the pitch was a strike, not a ball.

Some people already are asking me whether I could pitch tomorrow (Thursday). I really don't know. The only time I will know is after I throw a little more before the game. Generally, though, I could always come back the next day—for a few innings, anyway.

But the thing that keeps turning over in my mind is that we're back in the series again.

Getting credit for today's (Wed-

nesday's) victory is about the biggest thing that's ever happened to me.

When you're down in the minors, you dream about something like this. But you never figure it will happen.

You can bet I'll never forget this one.

Sainthood Is Possibility For Pope Due To Visions

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — Pope Paul XII may someday become a saint.

An unprecedent vision of Christ and a vision of the "Fatima miracle" of the revolving sun have been the only supernatural events in the Pope's life announced by the Vatican. However, there has been insistent mention of the Pope bringing about two miraculous healings as well.

Visions do not in themselves enter the cause of canonization, but they often speed the cause.

Vatican circles believed that the cause of beatification of the Pope might be introduced shortly. Official Catholic quarters said a dossier of "miracles" attributed to Paul XII had already been collected.

Beatification is the first step toward sainthood, and both beatification and canonization can take centuries before completed.

The Pope's first vision came on three successive days in the Holy Year 1950.

Federico Cardenal Tedeschini told a crowd of pilgrims in Fatima in 1951 that the Pope saw the sun revolve on three separate occasions — Oct. 30, 31, and Nov. 1, 1950. He said the vision came on each occasion while the Pope was walking in the Vatican gardens, each time at 4 p.m.

The vision was the same which three little shepherds had in Fatima, Portugal, on Oct. 13, 1917. The vision of the shepherd children climaxed a series of appearances of the Virgin Mary they had seen earlier, starting May 13, 1917 — the day Eugenio Pacelli was consecrated archbishop in the

India's Commies Start Terror Reign

By B. K. TIWARI

NEW DELHI (UPI) — India's Communists, who won the southernmost Kerala state in a peaceful election 18 months ago, now are trying to consolidate their control with a reign of terror.

This is the disturbing conclusion reached by top-level officials of the Congress Party, the majority party in India.

Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru himself has declared that "an atmosphere of fear" grips the 13,000,000 inhabitants of the state. He has called for an impartial probe into Kerala's affairs to determine whether the state government is responsible.

Commies To Blame

As far as some of the top men in Nehru's own Congress Party are concerned, however, there is no question that the Communist government of the tropical state bears full responsibility.

U. N. Dhebar and Sriman Narayan, president and secretary of the party respectively, warned after a recent on-the-spot inquiry in Kerala that non-Communist leaders would be wiped out or forced to flee if the terrorism continued.

The Communists walked into the 15,000-square-mile state in March, 1957, after upsetting both the Congress Party, and the Praja

Socialist Party (PSP) in an election.

They had promised sweeping reforms under a "non-violent democratic policy."

But opposition was intense during the Communists' rule and a crackdown followed. There was a wave of political murders, assault or threats on Congress and Socialist party members. Non-Communists in several trade union organizations were beaten or threatened.

Inciting violence to discredit their regime.

Chief Minister E. M. S. Namboodripad maintains that the state is functioning normally. But congressmen charge that Namboodripad's recent release of 1,360 prisoners and his commutation of death sentences for another 250—mostly Communists or pro-Communists—is not designed to insure normalcy.

Terrorism In Kerala

Several officials who did not leave the Communist line found themselves out of jobs. A judge was sacked after he issued a ruling against a Communist law-breaker. A magistrate was transferred because his decisions were a bit too impartial.

India's parliament has rung during the last few months with charges of militancy and terrorism in Kerala. The Communists, however, insist that the Congress and Socialist parties are deliberately
