## Honoring our troops: Kuykendall deployed to Iraq

Marine Corps 1st Lt. Robert L. Kuykendall, son of Cathy O. Kuykendall of Winter Park and James R. Kuykendall, Jr. of Orlando, is currently deployed in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom.

He is assigned to the 26th Marine Expeditionary Unit, based in Camp Lejeune, N.C. Kuykendall is one of more than 4,000 Pacific Fleet Sailors and Marines who stop aboard the ships of the USS Iwo Jima Amphibious Ready Group.

The majority of Marines and Sailors in Kuykendall's unit have safely returned to the ships of the USS Iwo Jima Amphibious Ready Group from Mosul, Iraq, as Operation Iraqi Freedom continues to transition to humanitarian missions.

Kuykendall's unit is an expeditionary intervention force with the ability to rapidly organize for combat operations in virtually any environment. MEUs are composed of more than 2,000 personnel and are divided into an infantry battalion, aircraft squadron, support group and command element. With this combination, Kuykendall's unit supplies and sustains itself for quick mission accomplishment and for clearing the way for follow-on forces.

Kuykendall is a 1994 graduate of Winter Park High School in Winter Park. He joined the Marine Corps in February 1999.

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# City grants incentives to local business

**SANFORD** — Sanford Commissioners voted Monday to award one of the largest incentive packages in the city's history to Florida Extruders International, Inc.

The incentive package with the manufacturing firm will be in the amount of \$150,000. This amount is comprised of a cash incentive of \$94,510, plus up to \$55,490 in waived permit and review fees such as site and engineering plan reviews, and site development and building permits.

The Commission will delegate \$39,000 of the funds from the Economic Development

Trust during this fiscal year. In order to forego transferring \$60,000 from the General Fund Reserve to accommodate the incentive package, the remaining \$55,510 will be subject to the availability of funds in the coming year.

"We don't want to go into the general funds," said Commissioner Kevin Hipes.

In order to receive the funds, Florida Extruders must build its new location within Sanford city limits and must enter into a

Jobs Growth Incentive Agreement with the city. However, Commission still holds the right to forego the additional \$55,510 if funds are not available in next year's budget.

"We can't obligate next year's funds," said Mayor Brady Lassard.

Another stipulation to the distribution of money is that the Seminole County Board of County Commission approves a resolution on May 27 to match the funds.

The company, which manufactures extruded aluminum products for outdoor pool enclosures, screened porches and window frames, is currently located in Sanford. However, the group is looking to build a 224,000 square-foot manufacturing and distribution facility, with the possibility of a 200,000 square-foot add-on.

The group is currently evaluating sites within Sanford and the rest of the southeast to accommodate this project. The capital investment by the company for this project is estimated at \$11.5 million.

If the company chooses a site in Sanford,

## City OKS townhouse project

**SANFORD** — Attorney and developer Berry J. Walker is one step closer to making his dream of Magnolia Club, a residential townhome community in Sanford, a reality.

Monday, during the first of two public hearings regarding the proposed 25.5-acre site, Sanford City Commission voted unanimously to allow construction of the 114-unit townhome community.

"I'm convinced Commissioner Woodruff then I feel I have accomplished something," said Walker. "He is a good man who votes his heart and conscience. He tends to be conservative on wetland issues."

"I was happy and pleased with the Commission's vote," he added. "There is no reason this project shouldn't be built and I look forward to developing it. I hope the city and neighbors will embrace it."

The Commission's decision came after months of debate on the issue.

"City commissioners did their homework and made an informed decision based on asking the right questions," said Walker.

The property, located west of Mellonville Avenue and east of Sanford Avenue on Andrews Road, is currently owned by Rebecca and Ken Burke and is the site of two single-family homes.

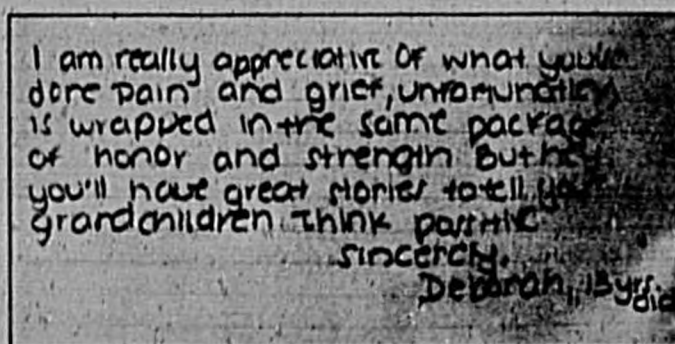
The Burke's neighbors, which include residents of Rose Hill and Baker's Crossing communities, were concerned that the development would hinder their way of life, specifically causing drainage and traffic problems.

Based on the resident's concerns, the city hired an outside consultant, Orlando-based Civil Engineering Group, Inc., to analyze these issues.

The CEG engineers found that Magnolia Club would not cause adverse impacts on water drainage or roadways in the area. In fact, the community of Rose Hill is currently having drainage problems and Walker has agreed to development Magnolia Club in such a way that will reduce the existing problem by 78 percent.

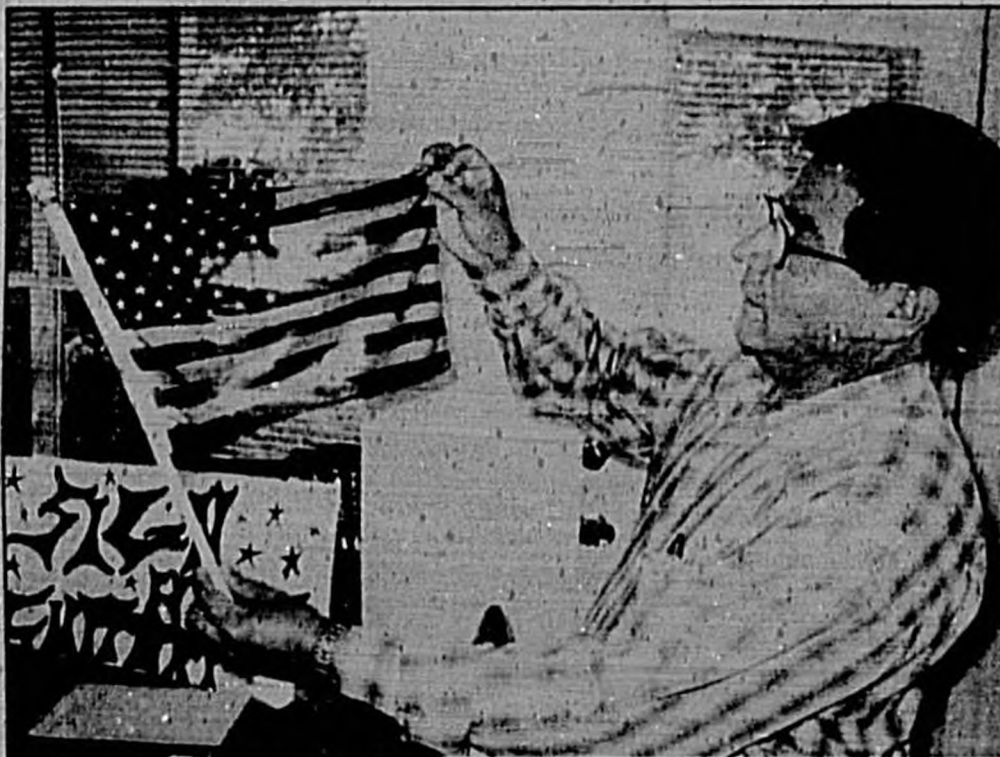
City staff also found the development to be consistent

## After 8,000 miles, Gabil returns to Lake Mary

Last month, Sergio Gabil left Lake Mary on a mission. His goal was to meet as many people as possible and have them sign a petition in support of the men and women sent to the Middle East for Operation Iraqi Freedom.

Last week, the Lake Mary resident returned from his journey. After traveling more than 8,000 miles and collecting thousands of signatures, Gabil said he is now ready to meet President George Bush and present him with his petition.

"Once I have organized a group, I am going to ask the president for an appointment," Gabil said. "I can't see him saying no to this. He will be receiving something from thousands of people — from teachers to policemen and firemen to children."

Gabil, an immigrant from Costa Rica, came up with the idea for the petition while watching the events in Iraq unfold on television. As a veteran, he wanted to do something to show his support for the troops.

## Office of Elections relocation approved

**SANFORD** — Seminole County Commissioners voted 4-1 Tuesday to approve a lease agreement that will relocate the supervisor of Elections office to the Orlando Sanford International Airport.

"I'm very pleased," said Sandra Sandy, board supervisor of elections. "I feel like I did when I recommended that we go from using a punch card system to an optical card system. I'm very thankful that they [the commissioners] see the need to provide space for conduct the elections in a proper manner in Seminole County."

The new location would provide board and her staff with approximately 18,000 square feet of office and warehouse space. This is more than double their current location in downtown Sanford.

Commissioner Carlton D. Henley, however, voted against the lease agreement, stating, "I believe the size could be reduced. We're not dealing with rocket science. We could get by with less. Furthermore, we're taking people out of downtown Sanford."

According to board, although the original floor plan was an estimated 20,000 square feet, she was able to review the space allocations and reduce that by nearly 3,000 square feet.

"I've worked in this office for many years and with the new things that are approaching we do have a need for the extra space," said Gabil.

"I'd go back and reduced it as much as I could in order to have the space to stage an election. We just can't reduce it any more."

The lease agreement between the county and the Sanford Airport Authority is for 30 years.

## Paulucci inducted to Hall of Fame for devotion to family and community

Lois Mae Inepamer Paulucci was recently inducted into the city of Duluth, Minnesota's Hall of Fame for her devotion to family values and a determination to improve community resources to better serve families.

Paulucci, wife of local businessman Jeno Paulucci, is the 78th person selected for induction into the Hall of Fame. Each year, only one person is selected for the Hall based on that person's lifetime volunteer service to the community.

Jeno Paulucci was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1962.

"She deserves it more than I ever did then," Jeno Paulucci said of his wife's induction.

Lois Paulucci was nominated for the honor by Ronald DeGrio of the Duluth Planning Commission. DeGrio cited Paulucci's "dedication to creating opportunities to help protect families from danger, abuse and hunger, recognizing the family as the foundation of a progressive, compassionate and secure society."

"She has consistently dedicated herself to helping an extended family of Duluthians from all walks of life, most of whom have never known about the wonderful deeds she has done on their behalf," DeGrio added.

One of the examples cited included the recently completed Bayfront Festival Park in downtown Duluth, which Paulucci encouraged for the community with a \$3 million contribution and insisted that Duluthians receive what they wanted in their park.

Lois Paulucci provided the motivation and the means to establish Festival Park to create an accessible family-oriented recreation/entertainment complex. DeGrio said

Through Lugano's (she owned by the Paulucci family) she also conceived and established a "Free Food for the Needy" program, specifically dedicated to Duluth area families, similar to an ongoing program conducted over the past decade in Sanford and Seminole County.

For years, the name Inepamer Hall (her still honoring her parents) on the Duluth YWCA residence hall has been the only visible example of her commitment to helping others. She served for several years on the Board of Directors of Woodland Hills Home and a school executive for the Northland

## Seminole housing values are the highest in nine county region

A Seminole County developer told members of the Lake Mary Seminole Regional Chamber of Commerce recently that housing values in Seminole County are the highest in the nine county Orlando Metropolitan Statistical area (MSA) that encompasses Seminole, Orange, Osceola, Polk, Sumter, Lake, Marion, Brevard and Volusia Counties.

Rick Bayec, vice president and general manager at Lake Forest, the luxury community NTS Corp., is developing on SR 46 in north Seminole County, told chamber members that the average sales price of a home in Seminole County during the first quarter of this year — \$180,000 — was almost seven percent higher than the average in Orange County, three times the average in Brevard County and higher than 75 percent of

the homes sold in the region. Bayec told the group that upscale community developers have helped to shape Seminole County as Central Florida's most desirable place to live, and that has drawn employers.

Quality residential development attracted affluent, well-educated hard working people to Seminole County who demanded superior schools, shopping, recreation and health care facilities and — surprise — those are the same elements employers look for when they relocate," Bayec said. The end result is that we enjoy the best of all worlds here in Seminole County, an excellent place to live, work, learn and play.

As a developer of what I consider to be the finest residential community in Seminole County, I am admittedly a little

biased but as a careful, professional observer of the evolution of this county, quality residential development here, in my opinion, has been Seminole County's leading industry for most of the past 30 years.

Bayec said he foresees changes in residential community and development in this county.

"We probably could not maintain the numbers of new homes built for another three decades," Bayec said. "Within the next 10 to 12 years we will approach the point of population density that is ideal for a county our size, in a region like Central Florida, and as our property values keep vectoring upwards, it will become more expensive to move here and buy a new home and that will slow our growth rate."

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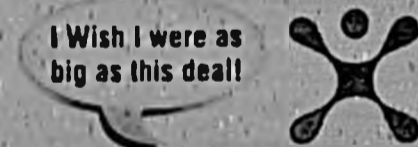

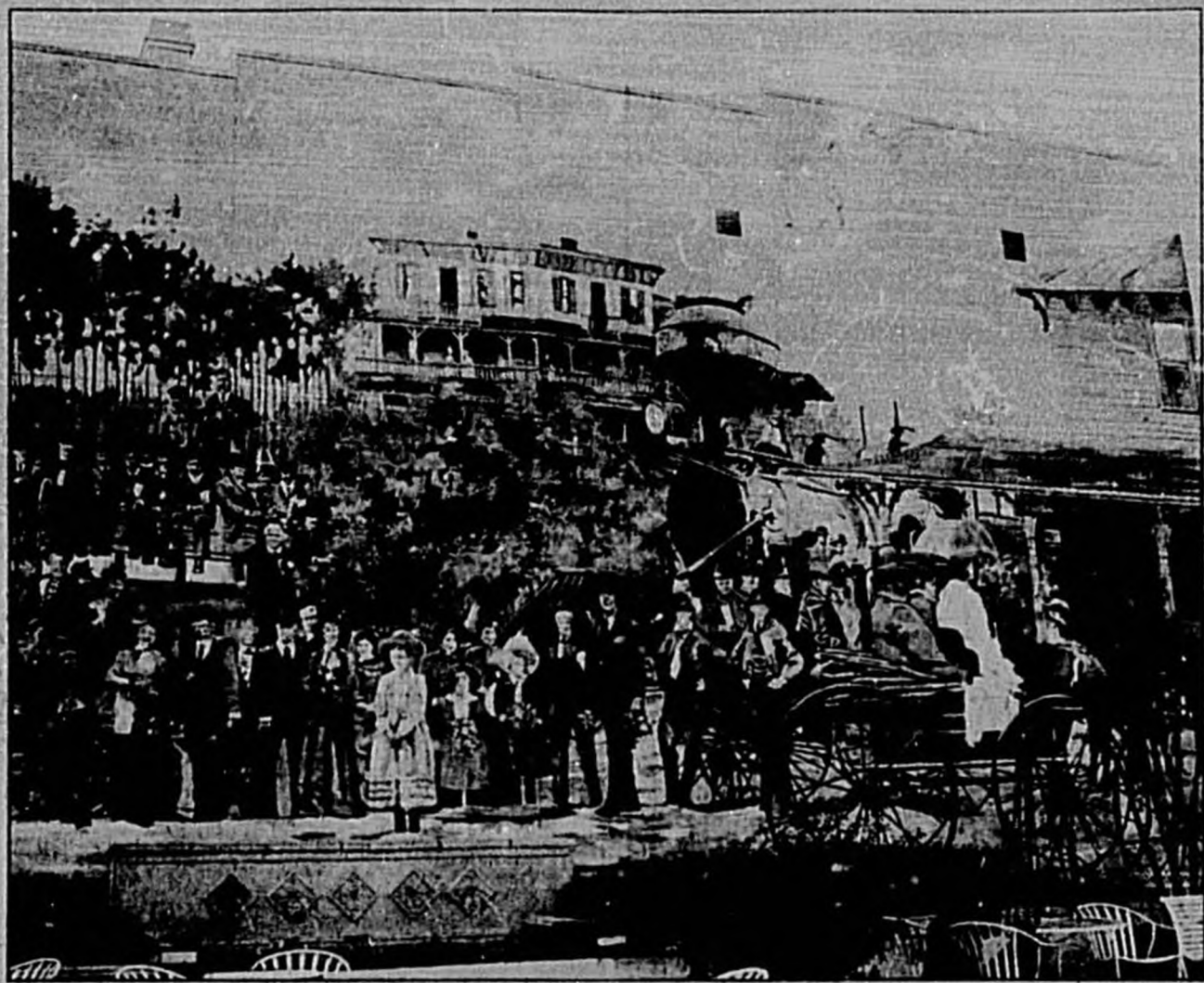

with two five-year renewals. The total cost per year is \$146,980 at \$8.00 per square foot. This rate includes custodial service, HVAC maintenance, pest control and landscape/lawn maintenance. The lease rate will remain the same for the first five years and will increase by three percent in years six through 10.

County staff has asked Larry Dale, president and CEO of the Sanford Airport Authority, to research the discount possibility if the county makes an annual payment, instead of a monthly one.

The election office staff plans to fulfill their duties in the current office through March 2004, which will include the presidential preference primary election. They will resume duties at the airport location during the second week in April, giving them ample time to move in and be settled before candidate qualifying begins. This move will allow them to conduct the presidential elections in the new office.

"We're tickled to death to have the office up here," Dale said. "This will get more people out here to see our airport. The airport will have a lot of synergy to it."

Construction should begin on the building in July. The airport authority received 10 applications from contractors and have narrowed the field to include CPH, Wharton-Smith Inc., McKee Construction Company and Spolski Construction, Inc. The four companies must submit their proposal packets no later than June 6.

The airport authority has also requested a permit from the St. Johns River Water Management District for a storm water system.

Other news to note, Commission:

- Passed a resolution proclaiming Saturday-May 23 as "Safe Boating Week" in Seminole County.

- Authorized staff to proceed with the development of a non-exclusive franchise for commercial solid waste collection in unincorporated Seminole County. This item will be brought before the board for approval at a later date.

- Was briefed by Seminole County Environmental Services Department regarding the challenge of providing adequate water supplies to a growing population while meeting the regulatory requirements of the St. Johns River Water Management District. Current and projected per capita consumption in the Northwest service area far exceeds the SJRWMD allotted water.

- Instructed staff to move forward with negotiations for an

interagency agreement with the University of Central Florida for the development of the Seminole County Integrated Government Services Systems. This system would make all records on school capacity, special projects, roads and other items accessible to Seminole County residents.

and more than 334 new jobs and maintained 114 existing jobs.

"We've planted a lot of seeds, now we need to shepherd the deals," said Lassard. "This will be the last one for a while. We need to bring the other items to the finish line."

The estimated return on the city's tax roll is more than \$37 million, making the ratio of incentive to private dollar capital investment \$1 to \$106.

"The payback is great," said Jones.

During the course of these six projects, the city has leveraged more than \$497,000 in state and county funds to complement its city dollars.

After the withdrawal of \$39,000 from the Florida Extruders project, a balance of \$219.86 will remain. The city plans to review the possibility of replenishing this account for future use.

Walker has also said he will place buffers between the Rose Hill and Magnolia Club subdivisions to lessen the impact on the surrounding communities.

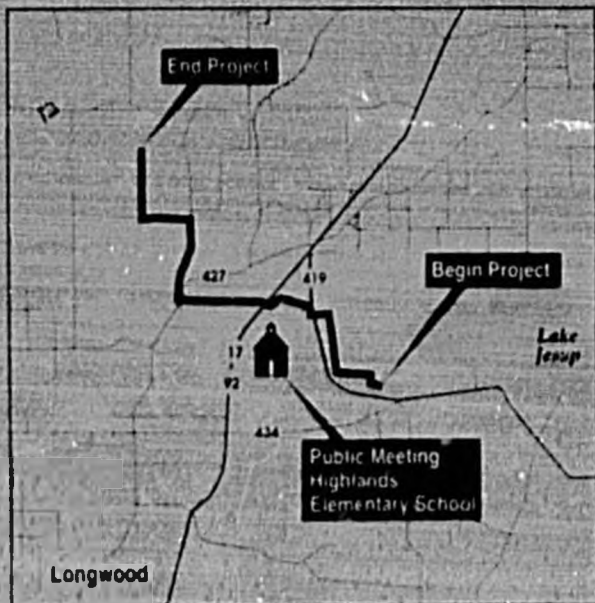
According to Walker, by the end of the week final engineering plans for Magnolia Club will be submitted to the city and a permit request from the St. Johns River Water Management District will be made.

since he was unable to be with them in Iraq.

The 60-year-old began his mission on April 6 when he began collecting signatures in front of Lake Mary City Hall. From there, he traveled to Orlando, Miami and West Palm Beach. The final stage of his journey began in Tallahassee, where he met with many state officials, as well as Betty Hampton, who is the executive assistant to Gov. Jeb Bush. The governor later sent Gabil a card thanking him for a copy of the petition and apologizing for not being able to meet the Lake Mary resident while he was in the state capital.

Gabil's next stop was El Paso, Texas.

"I promised myself that I would take a copy of the petition to Fort Bliss," he said. "I took into consideration the large number of soldiers sent to Iraq from there, and I wanted to show them how much Americans supported what they were doing."

"I didn't realize how far El Paso was from Tallahassee," he said. "When I reached San Antonio, they told me I still had six more hours to go. But, I wasn't going to stop until I got there."

When Gabil reached Fort Bliss, the soldiers held a reception for him. Some of the troops even added their names to the petition of support. While at the base, Gabil also participated in a broadcast that was sent to military personnel still deployed in Iraq.

"All of this brought tears to my eyes, I was so moved," Gabil said. "But, I let them

know, this wasn't just my task. It was the task of the people. I was just their messenger."

Now back in Lake Mary, Gabil is preparing to make a booklet of the signatures and messages he collected during his journey. He wants to give a copy to every soldier who participated in Operation Iraq Freedom.

The booklet, however, will have to wait until he can raise enough money to get it printed.

A poet by trade, Gabil said he doesn't earn a lot of money and the cost of his recent journey was between \$7,000 and \$8,000.

With the war in Iraq over and much of his savings gone, Gabil said he doesn't have any regrets about his mission of support.

"The troops need to know they still have our support and that they are not alone," he said. "And, no, I have no regrets. A soldier is always a soldier, and I've never felt more proud of being a veteran."

Gabil said he has been asked to discuss his journey during Lake Mary City Commission's Thursday meeting, which begins at 7 p.m. in City Hall.

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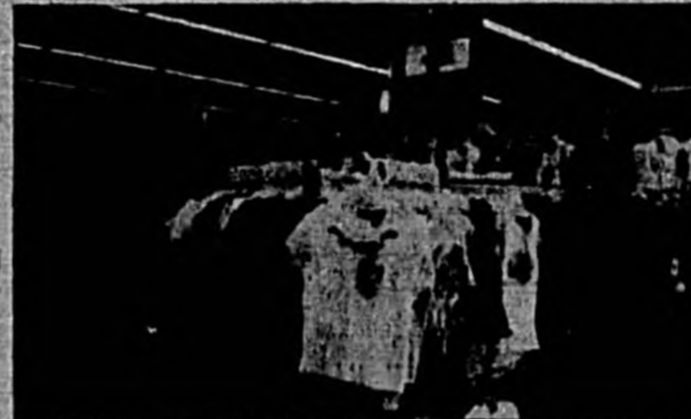
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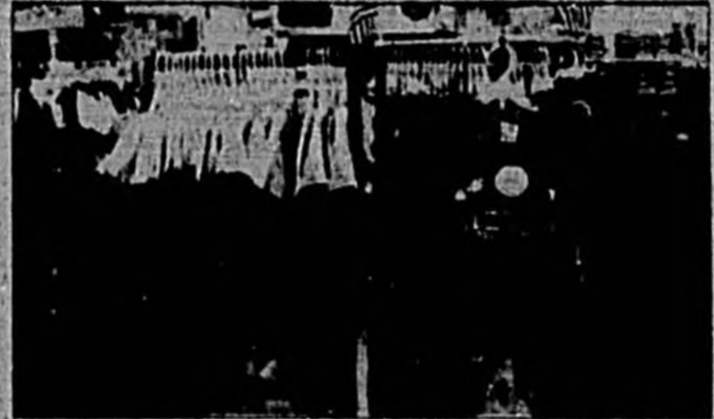

"But the Raiders came out to play every inning like it was the last. And that's what we did. I couldn't be happier."

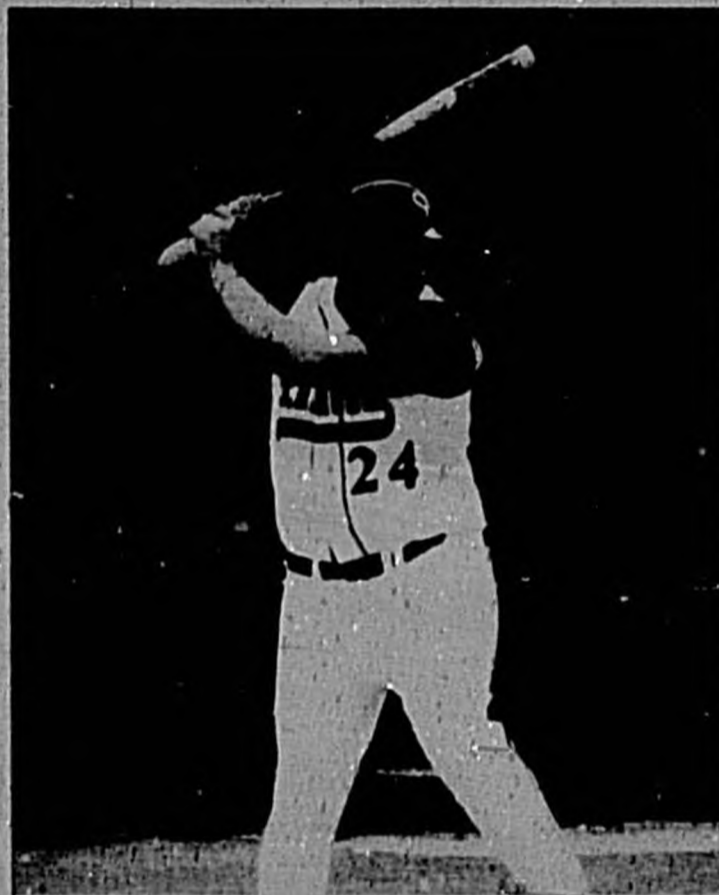
Seminole High School graduate Victor Gilbert was the winner in relief, with fellow former Tribesman Uriah

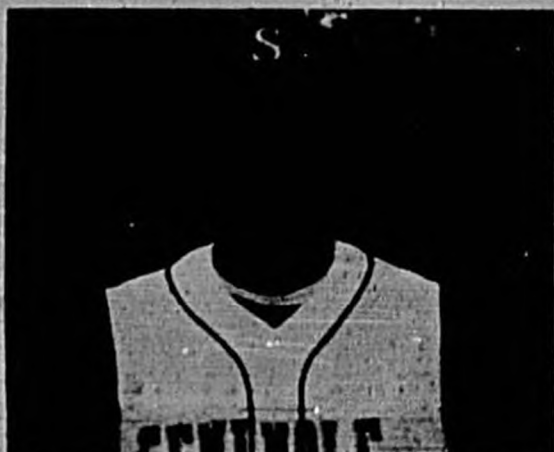
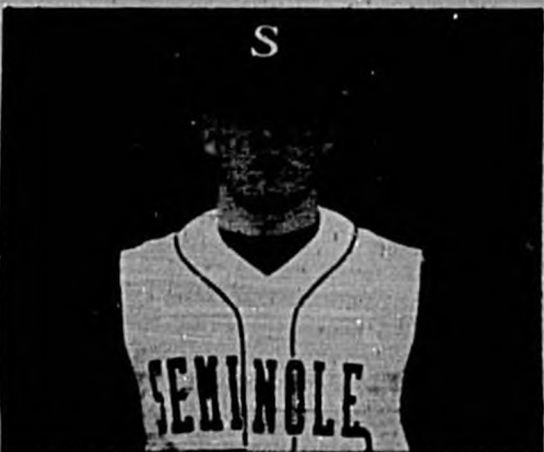

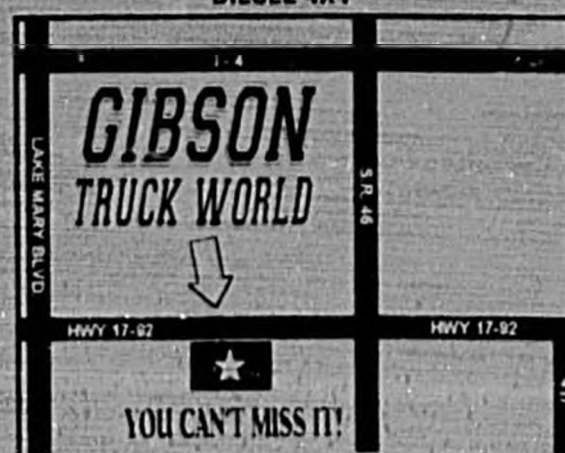
