Airport: A good day and bad day

\$1.7 million OK'd for ILS

SANFORD - U.S. Congressman John Mica was at the Orlando-Sanford Airport Tuesday morning to spread the good news. Congress has approved \$1.7 million for the construction of the ILS (Instrument Landing System) for the airport.

"I'm thrilled," said Sanford Mayor Larry Dale. "It's been the number one safety and noise abatement issue we've had, even before I became mayor." Dale said it was the biggest news he could get. "This is really going to help us resolve some of the problems."

The new system will be on runway 27-R, which will allow the large aircraft requiring instrument landing capabilities, to land from the east. "Coming in from the east, over a less-populated area," Mica said, "will go a long way toward helping reduce aircraft noise over Sanford and Lake Mary."

"We have been working on this for two and a half years now," he continued, "but the matter was stopped several times due to changes at the Sanford Airport Executive Director Steve Cooke. It started with the happy announcement of a \$1.7 million grant from the FAA for a new ILS system, and ended with Cooke getting fired."

The firing came Tuesday night following a joint official meeting between the Sanford Airport Authority and Sanford City Commission. The published reason for the meeting was "Discussion of items regarding mitigation and design for new (short) runway." Also listed was "Other Items."

Director fired

SANFORD - Yesterday was a good and bad day for Orlando-Sanford Airport Executive Director Steve Cooke. It started with the happy announcement of a \$1.7 million grant from the FAA for a new ILS system, and ended with Cooke getting fired.

There was no early indication that Cooke's job would be on the line at the meeting. On April 7, the Airport Authority voted 6 to 2 to give Cooke an extension of his contract as executive director at the airport. Last night, the Authority voted 5 to 3 on a motion calling for Cooke's resignation.

Cooke is to be temporarily replaced by Steve Coover, who has been serving as attorney Please See Cooke, Page 3A

Shortly after 10 a.m., Stoll testified for a few minutes, telling the jury that he "accepted" the first degree murder verdict that already had been rendered. "I appreciate your time," he said. "The thing that bothers me is that the man who brutally murdered my wife is going free. That really bothers me."

Jury calls for Stoll's death, judge could reject decision

SANFORD - Michael Stoll watched a jury of six men and six women return to Courtroom "D" at 3:58 Tuesday afternoon.

They took seats in two rows. Stoll, 37, years old on this very day, would either be sentenced to life in prison without parole or to death in the electric chair.

The punishment for being found guilty of the first degree murder of his wife stunned Stoll - death in the electric chair. Seven of the 12 decided his fate. Had it been a 6-6 vote, his life would have been spared. The jury deliberated for nearly two hours.

Defense attorney Jack Edmund pleaded for the life in prison sentence but was unable to convince the jury that Stoll should not be executed for the strangulation death of 35-year-old Julie Stoll - a death that prosecutor Steve Plotnick called, "cold, calculated, premeditated murder."

Stoll's only chance at escaping the death penalty depends on a decision that Circuit Judge Seymour Benson will make at a hearing tentatively scheduled for May 12. Benson can either accept or reject the jury's recommendation.

Stewart, a live-in coworker, said that the murder which occurred on Nov. 3, 1994 was Stoll's idea, that he was the one who hatched the plot. He was the one who had the motive to kill Julie Stoll.

"We felt that it was important to get to the true murderer by giving a break to someone less culpable," Plotnick said.

Weathering the storm: What's up this summer?

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Most weather scientists believe the current El Nino, which wreaked havoc through the spring, is about to weaken and allow for a normal summer.

But there are skeptics in the southern regions, where 48 percent of those recently polled by the National Science Foundation believe the summer weather will continue to be affected by El Nino.

Terry Schenk, Seminole County Fire Chief and Meteorologist, said Monday he does not anticipate any threatening storms in the area through the rest of April and May. "There may be a severe thundershower but the chances for the violent storms is lessening," he said.

Science said he agreed with many of the scientific predictions in the National Science Foundation survey. "Their feeling that there has been a dramatic increase by the public in weather issues is one I certainly agree with," he said.

The El Nino and extreme weather events of the past few months and increased media coverage of these events was responsible for the public's increased efforts.

As El Nino diminishes, there is the possibility of a La Nina weather condition that would affect the hurricane season in Florida.

Because of El Nino, 1997 was a mild hurricane season here. There were only 7 names storms, 3 hurricanes (Bill, Danny and Erica) and only Erica was considered intense.

In a normal hurricane season there are 11 names storms, 6 hurricanes and 3 intense hurricanes.

The prediction this year from Dr. William Gray at Colorado State University is that there will be 10 named storms, 6 hurricanes and 2 intense hurricanes. This could change if there was a La Nina effect.

An overwhelming majority of scientists (93 percent) believe scientific and technological advances have played a critical role in predicting the length and severity of the current El Nino.

Increasingly, public perceptions differ from the opinions of the scientists polled on the issue of global warming's possible impact on El Nino. The American public (67 percent) feels more strongly than scientists (46 percent) that global warming is contributing to more frequent and more severe El Nino events.

Homicide declared

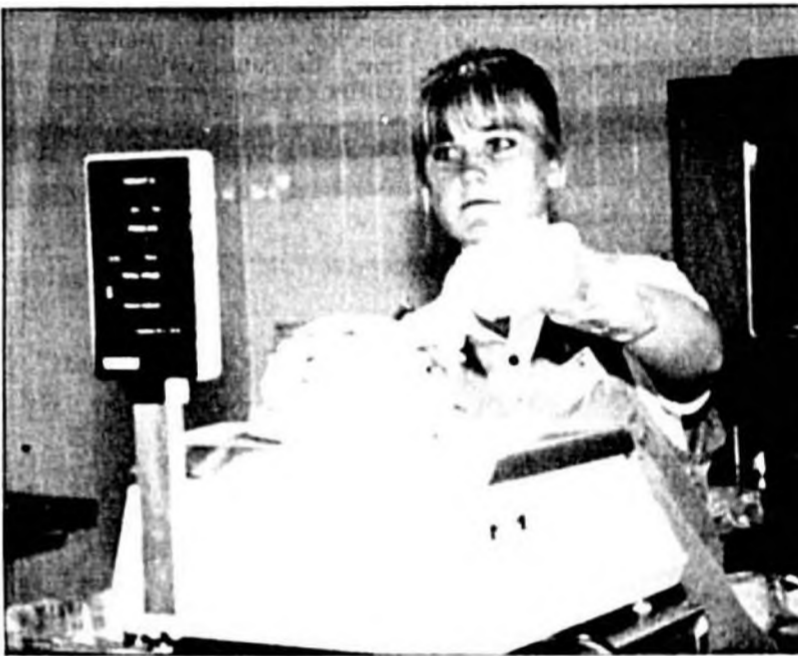

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Destructive fruit flies have flown Briefs

CENTRAL FLORIDA - Central Florida can be happy that some of last year's visitors have finally left Florida Agriculture Commissioner Bob Crawford has announced that the Mediterranean fruit fly has officially been declared as gone.

"We have not trapped any wild Medflies in the Tampa area since August 28, 1997," Crawford said. "I'm pleased that our cooperative effort with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, as well as the assistance of thousands of citizens and businesses across the state have allowed us to declare

eradication of this devastating pest from Central Florida."

There are no longer restrictions on the sale or movement of fruit anywhere in the state except for certain portions of Dade and Manatee counties under quarantine for citrus canker, and a 10-square mile area of Miami Springs under quarantine due to the detection of two Medflies early this month.

Before today, the last area under quarantine for Medflies was the 274-square mile area of western Hillsborough County where billions of sterile Medflies were released between July and November of last year. Three months of inten-

sive trapping in that area have revealed no more wild Medflies.

The 89-square mile Highlands City area of Polk County was released from quarantine in November. Orange, Sarasota and Manatee counties and the rest of Polk County were released from quarantine in October.

While there had been suspicions that two Medflies had been found in Seminole County during the major infestation last year, the reports were proven false and no quarantine was found necessary.

In all, a total of 749 Medflies were trapped from the time the first one was detected on May 28, 1997 until the last one was

found in August of 1997.

The Agriculture Department said last year's Medfly infestation in Central Florida was the largest in the state since 1956. The eradication program cost has been estimated at \$22 million with joint financing through state and federal authorities.

Now, in the area where the infestation was found to be most severe in Central Florida, fruit fly investigation has been increased from four traps per square mile to ten. Legislation is being considered that calls for the state and federal departments of agriculture jointly to hire an additional 90 inspectors statewide.

for the Airport Authority as well as the Port of Sanford. Coover said that while he isn't an aviation expert, "I'll try to help wherever I can and do my best until a permanent director can be found."

Lake Mary City Commissioner Thom Greene, who has been an avid spokesman regarding the need for aircraft noise reduction at the airport commented, "We don't know who may be hired by the Authority to replace Steve Cooke yet, but whoever it is, we hope it's someone who will be more concerned about the noise problem and the effect it has on our citizens."

Airport Authority member Lon Howell made the motion to fire Cooke based on a lack of confidence. A long time Cooke supporter, Howell said he now understands what has, or rather, has not been transpiring at the airport. "Mayor Dale has told me for a long time

that there were things going on at the airport, that things simply weren't happening," he said. "But I've been considering it just a political move. But I've checked into things and the mayor was right. So I urged that the matter be brought out into the open and placed on the table for discussion."

"I'm not only the Mayor of Sanford," Dale said, "but I'm a developer and a pilot. I've seen for years the problems out at the airport. I've tried, time after time, to convince Steve Cooke that the airport was doing a lot of things that were wrong, but he just smoothed everything over and said there weren't problems."

Dale continued, "As an elected official, I have a constitutional duty to obey state laws and as such, I feel something needed to be done. That's why I called the meeting."

Howell said he has apologized to Dale for doubting him in regard to the problems at the airport.

"One thing that has happened," Howell said, "is that we've learned there has been a cease and desist order on construction of the new fire house and roadway at the airport." The order reportedly came from St. Johns River Water Management District, saying that proper permits have not been pulled.

Dale added that the city had received two cease and desist orders about work at the airport in the past few months. "I cannot allow the airport to get us into trouble," he said.

As a result, work on the fire-house on airport property came to a screeching halt this morning. Workers arrived at the site as scheduled but were turned away.

Mayor Dale said one of the problems has been the fire-house. "We told Steve Cooke that the permit we were issuing said nothing could be done but land clearing, but he went ahead anyway and now we're faced with problems."

Bobby Von Herbulis, with McKee Construction, builder of the new fire station at the airport said his company is not at fault in this situation. "We had the proper permits, building permits, issued by the City of Sanford, so McKee wasn't at fault. We assumed that if the city granted us the building permit that they had gone through all of the requirements."

Structural steel is already in place at the new fire station, and the concrete walls were to be put into place today, but work is now at a standstill.

Coover said the next step toward obtaining a new director would probably come at the next meeting of the Airport Authority. "Whether they advertise for the position or make the selection themselves is entirely up to them," he said.

Steve Cooke could not be reached for comment on the situation by press time this morning.

Plotnick said that Stoll was angry at his wife for running up credit cards, berating him to friends and threatening to divorce him.

Perhaps, the most harmful testimony in Stoll Tuesday came from his first wife, Linda Wise who accused him of having beaten her on numerous occasions in an eight-year relationship. On one occasion, Wise said she was seven months pregnant when beaten by her husband.

Wise did report one of the beatings but held back on all other occasions because she said she feared for her life. "If I had done anything about it, I'd be in the same place Julie is right now," Wise said.

When Plotnick cross-examined Stoll's mother, Linda Stoll - he closed by asking, "Is it fair to say he's a wife beater?"

"No," Linda Stoll answered. Linda Stoll described her son as a "hard-working, caring, giving loving person." She said he was born with a cleft palate and harelip and that as a

youngster he was mauled by a German shepherd.

She said that one day he asked her, "Why do I look different than everyone else" and she told him, "God made you that way."

Stoll said, her son wasn't a good student but he did very well with his floor covering business.

Edmund had no other witnesses to call other than his client's mother.

Plotnick also produced a half dozen graphic slides that showed Julie Stoll with swollen and blackened eyes, a bloody lip and mean scrapes across her neck. Michael Stoll stared in another direction as they flashed on a screen near him.

In his closing statement, Edmund held up the photographs for the jury and said, "Stewart did this - not Stoll." He repeated this for each of the six pictures.

At the conclusion of the day, Stoll embraced attorneys Edmund and Steve Kackley. His mother and father stood outside the courtroom for nearly half an hour, trying to gather strength and hope.

Federal Aviation Authority (FAA). Now however, we have finally pushed it through, thanks to a great deal of work by the Aviation Subcommittee."

James Duncan, chairman of the subcommittee, was on hand as Mica made his announcement, along with Congresswoman Pat Danner (D-Kansas City) and Central Florida's Representative Corrine Brown, who is also a member of the aviation subcommittee.

Mica said at one time there was an attempt made to change the ILS to a global satellite positioning system. "But that would be more expensive, and require the incoming flights, which are mostly European, to install equipment in the aircraft, which would be costly and take a great deal of time," Mica explained.

Airport Director Steve Cooke said Tuesday morning that the next step is for the airport to officially be issued the grant. "The total amount will require that the state pay 5 percent and the Aviation Authority pay an additional 5 percent. That would be added to the 90 percent paid by the federal gov-

ernment/FAA, for the total amount," Cooke explained.

While Mica said there is no schedule for the installation, pending putting the matter out for bids, Cooke said he expects, with no unforeseen problems, that the new eastern ILS could be installed and operational within 9 months to a year.

The installation of the eastern approach ILS has been one of the objectives of individuals seeking to reduce aircraft noise, especially over the western sector of the city and portions of Lake Mary.

Lake Mary City Commissioner Thom Greene said he was pleased with the announcement. "I believe this will be a temporary first step toward helping reduce the noise problem for the people in Lake Mary as well as the entire area," he commented.

There are places in Florida like no other on the planet and Preservation 2000 has allowed us to save tropical hardwood hammocks in the Keys, sawgrass of the Everglades, crystal clear springs, longleaf pine forests, and corridors along rivers with exotic names like Suwannee, Wekiva, and Withlacoochee and Myakka. Even though 700 people per day still move to new subdivisions and high-rises in Florida, we con-

tinue to preserve the best of Florida's landscape.

The restoration of the Kissimmee River, Ocklawaha River and the Florida Keys demonstrate that we can repair what has been damaged.

Floridians can join in the celebration of the birthday of our national wildlife refuge system. Ninety five years ago, Florida Audubon Society pushed for the designation of Pelican Island in the Indian River Lagoon as America's first refuge, and President Theodore

Roosevelt signed it into law. Now Florida has nearly three dozen such refuges protecting habitat for a diverse population of migratory birds, plus other endangered life like the Key Deer, crocodile, Florida panther and rare plants along the Lake Wales Ridge. Every day that we see a Bald Eagle flying in our Florida sky is a reminder of our most famous success story of the Endangered Species Act.

The best news is that Floridians will get a once in a lifetime opportunity this fall to place a commitment to conservation into our Constitution. The 'Forever Florida' ballot initiative will allow us to elude into the foundation of Florida law the tools to permanently protect our environment. Forever Florida will do several things. It will require adequate laws for the conservation and protection of our natural resources. It will authorize bonds for continuing our land acquisition and environmental restoration efforts. It will protect our conservation lands for future generations. It will provide incentives to good stewards of the land to protect habitat. Lastly, it will create a Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commis-

sion to protect Florida's wildlife.

HEATHROW - Florida motorists are facing slightly higher prices at the pump this month, AAA Auto Club South reported. AAA's April Fuel Gauge Report shows that the average price for Self-Serve Regular Unleaded is up nine-tenths of a cent from last month to \$1.058 per gallon.

SANFORD - The Human Rights Advocacy Committee (HRAC) for Seminole, Orange and Osceola counties is seeking Seminole County residents to fill several vacant positions. The HRAC says it will provide an opportunity for citizens who want to work actively to protect the rights of people served by Central Florida's social service system.

According to Wendy Jordan, staff liaison, the committee acts as an objective third-party council with a goal of protecting consumer rights. It investigates allegations of human rights violations generating from inquiries and complaints about services provided by the Department of Children and Families.

HRAC members are appointed officially by the governor, following a local application and interview process. Members serve four-year terms and usually meet once monthly.

Currently, the state has 31 HRACs with some focusing particularly on serving the developmentally disabled and recipients of substance abuse and mental health treatment.

Formed in 1972, there are over 300 HRAC volunteers presently, advocating for better treatment of individuals under the care or custody of Children and Families, or private vendors and service providers under contract to the department.

SANFORD - The Seminole High School softball team may have won the battle, but lost the war Tuesday evening.

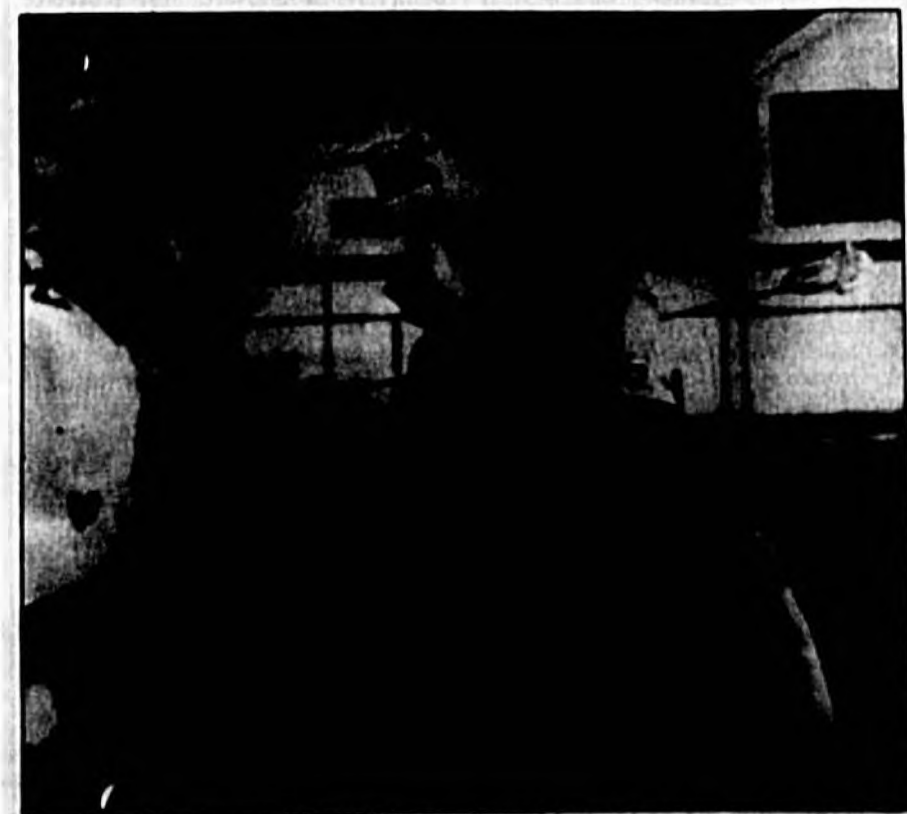

DOUBLE LAYER BAKED OMELET WITH HOLLANDAISE SAUCE

If you are one of the people who believes that eating an egg will cause you to drop dead on the spot from the cholesterol, this recipe is not for you. Some folks have a cholesterol problem and should use common sense in their diet. Most of the rest of the human race can enjoy eggs and any other food they enjoy in moderation. Eggs are an excellent source of iron, protein, vitamin A, riboflavin and are one of the few natural sources of vitamin D. In addition a large egg has only about 80 calories (about 60 calories are in the yolk) so they certainly fit the weight watchers of the crowd.

This recipe makes a great dinner or brunch entree and will feed four with the addition of some toast or biscuits as a side dish.

Ingredients:
15 large eggs
1/2 cup each chopped onions, green peppers, ham, shredded sharp cheddar cheese, and skinned seeded tomatoes
1 tsp. Chervil
2 cups fresh spinach
pinch of cayenne salt, white pepper
4 tbs. heavy cream

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Completely coat the inside of two 8 or 9 inch glass pie pans (metal pie pans work also but the cooking times can be shorter) with butter or non-stick vegetable spray.

Layer one: lightly saute onions, green pepper and ham in a fry pan with olive oil until peppers are just tender. In a bowl mix 6 eggs and 2 tbs. heavy cream, 1/2 tsp. Chervil, sprinkle with salt and pepper. Blend with mixer until foamy. Add sauteed ingredients and pour into pie pan.

Layer two: Mix 6 eggs plus 3 egg whites (save the yolks for the sauce) Chervil, salt, pepper, cream as above. Stir in cheese and tomatoes and pour into second pie pan.



Bake both layers at 350 degrees for 20 to 30 minutes. Check often after the first 15 minutes by lightly pressing on the center of the pie. When the center springs back it is done. Be careful not to over cook the pies. While omelets are baking, blanch fresh spinach leaves in boiling water for 1 minutes, drain and place aside. When omelet is fully cooked remove from oven and set aside for 2 or 3 minutes to set up. To remove from pan, carefully run a knife around the edge of the omelet. Place a plate or flat sheet pan over the pie plate. In one quick move flip the pan over and bang gently down on the counter to loosen if necessary.

Slide the first layer onto your serving platter. Cover top evenly with blanched spinach and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Carefully slide layer two on top of the first layer and spinach. Lightly sprinkle a pinch of cayenne and shredded cheese over the top. To serve cut into wedges like a cake and pour Hollandaise sauce over the slice. Garnish with fresh chopped chives or parsley.

Hollandaise Sauce 'Blender Method'
If you own a double boiler you can make the Hollandaise sauce in the traditional manner. The standard recipe can be found in any general cookbook. There are package sauces available, however, I am yet to find one that does not have the powdered egg

after taste and they all lack the rich full flavor of the real thing.

Here is a quick easy way to make a good quality Hollandaise sauce in your blender without owning a double boiler.

Ingredients:
1/2 cup butter (1/4 pound)
3 egg yolks at room temperature
2 lbs. Lemon juice
1/4 tsp. Cayenne pepper
1/4 tsp. salt

Melt butter in a sauce pan until it just bubbles. DO NOT ALLOW BUTTER TO BROWN. In a blender mix yolks, lemon juice, salt and pepper on medium speed for 1 minute. Set blender to low speed and slowly add hot butter. Continue blending at low speed until sauce thickens (about 2 minutes). Serve immediately. This recipe makes about 1 cup.

SOUFFLE STYLE FLUFFY OMELETS

This method of cooking an omelet produces a thick puffy light omelet. The basic recipe is the same for any filling that you like to use. I am including a seafood filling that is perfect for serving with the Hollandaise sauce from the above recipe. You can serve two people from each omelet unless they are big eaters like me. I personally go for the whole thing!

Ingredients:
4 eggs, separate yolks and whites
4 tbs. milk
1/4 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. white pepper

Mix egg yolks, milk, salt and pepper until foamy. In a separate clean bowl whip whites until soft peaks form. BE SURE THAT YOUR BOWL IS CLEAN AND DRY AND THAT THERE IS NO YOLK IN THE WHITES. Gently fold whites into the yolk mix until evenly mixed together, do not over mix this step or your omelet will not be as fluffy.

In a heated well buttered non-stick 9 or 10 inch skillet pour omelet mix and cook at medium heat until bottom sets and omelet starts to puff up.

Remove skillet from the burner and place into a 350 degree preheated oven and bake for an additional 5 minutes. Check often to avoid over cooking. When done, the top will be slightly dry and spring back when lightly pressed down. Remove omelet from the skillet to your serving plate. Cut across the center half way through the thickness, place filling on one side and fold over with a spatula.

Seafood Filling
1/2 cup chopped lobster meat
1/4 cup chopped shrimp
1 tbs. fine chopped green onions
1 tsp. lemon juice
1 tbs. butter

Sautee meat and onions in melted butter and lemon juice until meat starts to take on a light gold tint. While hot fill the omelet, pour sauce over center and garnish with lemon wedge and chopped chives.

May all your meals be a festive occasion.

Tip of the Week

Eggs are best if they are very fresh. Always store them in the package they come in in the coldest area of your refrigerator. Do not store them on the egg holder shelf uncovered or they will absorb smells and taste from the other foods in your frig. Eggs have a light sweet smell or no smell at all when opened. The yolk should be firm, well rounded and stand high on the white. The white should be firm and well formed. If the white is watery or the yolk is soft, flat and/or discolored, the egg is not good. Any smell or cloudiness indicates the egg is rotting. A bad egg can cause a number of quick trips to the bathroom or worse, so make sure they are always as fresh as possible.

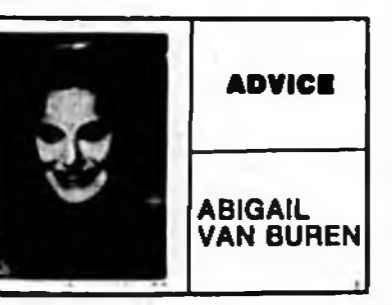

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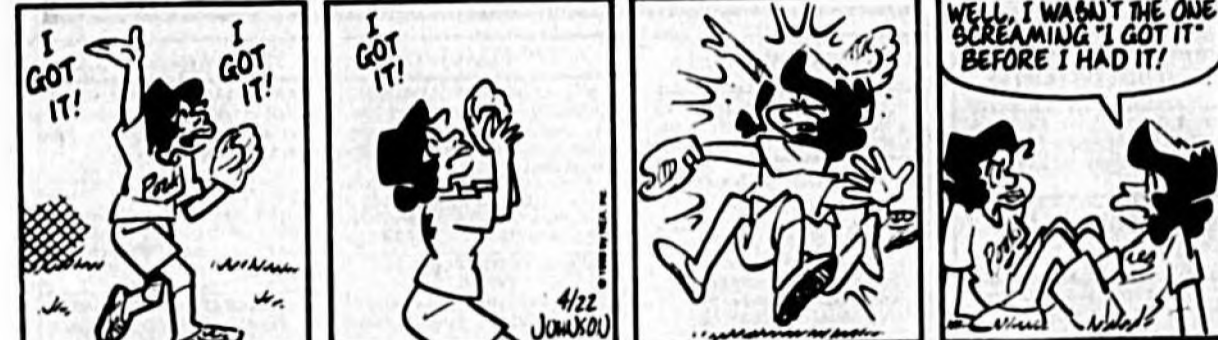

Second opinion can't hurt

DEAR DR. GOTT: About three months ago, at age 54, I had a mastectomy for breast cancer. The lymph nodes were free of malignancy and my general doctor assured me that no further treatment was necessary. He said that I don't need to see an oncologist. However, my daughter thinks that I need a second opinion. Do I?

DEAR READER: This is a difficult question. Not knowing the details of your case, I hesitate to give an answer that may seem critical of your primary care physician. Nonetheless, the accepted standard of care would include an oncology consultation, in my view.

First of all, breast cancer is a serious disease that can be frustratingly unpredictable. After many years of apparent inactivity, breast malignancies may suddenly reappear.

Here is a personal anecdote that proves my point. Last week, I saw a new patient in the office. She was a middle-aged woman with vertigo who had a breast removed seven years ago because of cancer. At that time, she refused hormone treatment, chemotherapy or radiation. Her exam was normal and she had no other symptoms.

My otolaryngologist colleague and I hospitalized her because her dizziness was so pronounced. As part of her testing, we were horrified to discover that her original breast cancer had spread to her lungs and brain. This was not a single metastasis; there were literally hundreds of lesions. The cancer had attacked like wildfire, unpredictably, after seven years. In hopes of a miracle, we transferred her to a teaching hospital for radiation treatments.

On the other hand, I have several female patients who are free of cancer 10, 12, even 20 years following treatment for breast malignancies.

Consequently, I have a deep respect for breast cancer, because the disease can fool the most astute physician.

You have much to be thankful for. The cancer was removed before it had spread to the lymph nodes. Nonetheless, most experts would recommend continued therapy, either with a course of radiation or hormone treatment with drugs such as tamoxifen.

Therefore, I agree with your daughter that you need a second opinion from an oncologist. If no further therapy is appropriate, fine; you're out a couple of hundred dollars but no harm has been done. However, if additional therapy is warranted, the consultation could well save your life.

Perhaps your primary care physician feels entirely comfortable monitoring your course himself with fre-

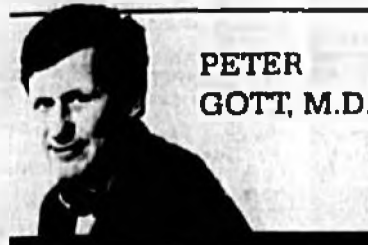
quent examinations and periodic mammograms. But in my opinion, this isn't enough. If you were my patient — or my sister — I'd darn well want to be certain that there were no unpleasant surprises months or years down the road. Get that consultation.

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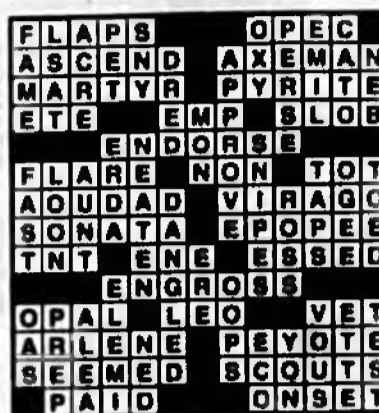

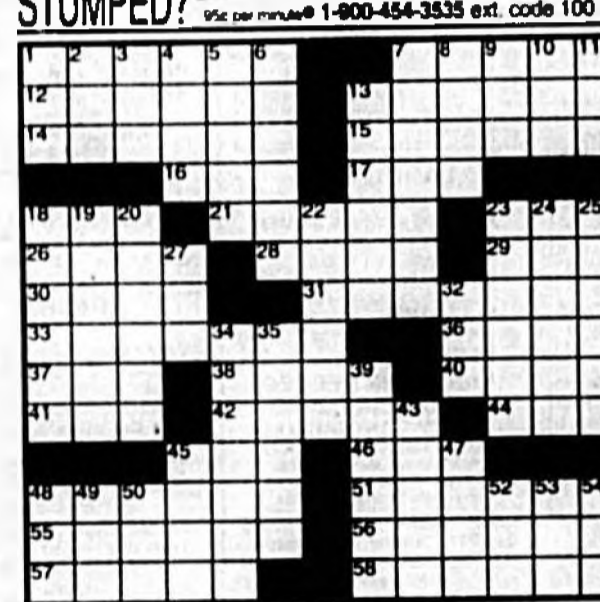

WIN AT BRIDGE

Count those losers

By Phillip Alder

This week, let's look at avoiding losers in suit contracts.

When the dummy comes down, an expert goes through a routine. If it's a suit contract, he gives priority to counting losers and winners. (In no-trump, he counts top tricks, but let's leave that until next week.) Less good players usually do neither, so they play much worse than they might. And if you find the counting takes an hour or two to do, don't quit! Even an expert was once a struggling beginner. Yet the more you practice, the easier it gets. And if you will only check losers or winners, count those losers. They will be more important on most deals.

How do you count losers? By looking at your hand and taking dummy's

high cards into account. In today's deal, you are in four hearts. West leads the spade five. How many losers do you have? What's your line of play? Yes, South's four-heart rebid was aggressive, but he bought a good dummy.

Did you find three losers (two clubs and one diamond)? If so, you forgot the spade four. All right, you saw how to deal with that loser, but you should count it.

There are two common ways of eliminating a loser: ruff it in the shorter trump hand (usually the dummy) or discard it on a winner in the other hand. Here, the former applies.

After winning trick one, cash the heart ace, play off the second top spade, and ruff the spade four with dummy's heart queen. Always ruff high when you can afford to do so.

Finally, draw trumps and concede the three minor-suit losers.
