

TURKS SIGN ARMISTICE; AUSTRIANS ASK GEN. DIAZ TO STOP FIGHTING

GERMANY'S ALLIES ARE FORSAKING HER

London, Oct. 31.—(via Montreal.) Turkey has surrendered unconditionally. The British government, Reuter's limited says, today received definite proposals of peace from Turkey. The actual terms of Turkey's peace proposals had not yet reached London in the early afternoon.

London, Oct. 31.—The Austrian commander on the Italian front has applied to Gen. Diaz, the Italian commander, for an armistice, the Exchange Telegraph Co. states.

The application, the dispatch adds has been forwarded to the Versailles conference.

Blasler threatens the Austrians as they retreat all about the line in Italy. The allies are advancing rapidly along the entire front from Lake Garda to the Adriatic.

The fighting activity on the western front, at several points, has been of a more serious nature than at several points.

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SCHOOLS WILL NOT OPEN ON NEXT MONDAY

CHURCHES OPEN SUNDAY AND SHOWS MONDAY

AMENDMENT PROHIBITING SALE OF LIQUOR

The legislature of 1917 by joint resolution has submitted to the people for ratification an amendment to the Constitution of Florida, which if carried by the vote of the people will forever prohibit the manufacture, sale, barter or exchange of intoxicating liquors and beverages, whether spirituous, vinous or malt, except of course a little alcohol for medicinal purposes.

The people of Seminole county should array themselves before the polls next Tuesday and vote for this amendment to our constitution. Seminole county has always been with the dry element and it is the purpose of the Seminole citizens to help their brothers in more unfortunate counties to pick up a big majority for this amendment next Tuesday. Therefore, don't stay away from the polls just because you know the amendment will carry.

The joint resolution and full information how to vote for it is submitted herewith.

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CITY COUNCIL MEETS

Marshall, to report their findings to the mayor.

The matter of placing the city of Sanford on Eastern time instead of Central time was discussed at length, and voting in the affirmative it would make by having two different times in the city, and to that effect the city was to be changed to Central time on January 1, 1919 it was decided to postpone the change at this time. Mr. Lane and Mr. Weather were present and gave their views of the proposed change.

On motion G. F. Smith, seconded by J. H. Adams and carried, the city council adjourned.

THE TWO AMENDMENTS

At the general election to be held in Florida next Tuesday there will be submitted for ratification by the people of the great state of Florida two amendments to the Constitution of Florida. One of these amendments provides that the county school levy maximum shall be increased from seven to ten mills. At the present time the maximum of county school tax that may be levied is seven mills. In many counties where they do not have full attendance in their schools and do not have full terms this amount is sufficient, in other counties where the county school system has been established and where the school houses and equipment were built and furnished some years ago they do not need an increase in the millage, but in the majority of the counties of the state the school board has its hands tied behind its back because they haven't sufficient funds to properly carry on the work of education. Seminole county is in the fortunate that the amendment to the Constitution be carried in order to afford itself, in order to afford a better and more thorough system of education whereby young Americans may be properly educated.

ever prohibit the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors, except for medicinal purposes. The need for the ratification of this amendment is so imperative that argument would seem unnecessary. It follows, however, that the two amendments are consistent and to come at this time is noteworthy. The amendment to better the schools and thereby better our men and women and the amendment to take away from those same men and women the thing that has credit for causing more sorrow and the downfall of more men and women should go hand in hand and be ratified by all the people of the state. To vote for one amendment and not for the other would show inconsistency. To vote against either would be a vote against the fair name of Florida. To vote against the school amendment would be a stroke against the young boys and girls who are unable to strike back. To vote against the liquor amendment would be a stroke at the home and at the very foundation of the things that the schools teach. To vote neither amendment would show a lack of manhood to express one's own conviction. To vote for the two amendments would help Seminole county and Florida stand out paramount for the progressive and for the right.

HERE, THERE AND EVERYWHERE

Short Items of Interest Culled From the State Press.

The government at Washington is in need of large numbers of women clerks and is calling upon Florida to furnish her share of them.

Information comes from the Pensacola section that a Chicago man has purchased a tract of land on Galvez peninsula and will plant it in sugar cane.

Hon. J. Emmott Wolfe has been appointed by Governor Catts judge of the criminal court of record for Dade county, to succeed Judge J. T. Sanders, deceased.

Alachua county commissioners have offered the state of Florida a site for the state hospital for the insane to be erected south. The site is right near Gainesville.

Great plans are under way for the West Florida Fair to be held at Marianna, Nov. 15th to 25th. Every body is invited to send exhibits to the fair. The grounds will extend several miles.

A concern, the style of which will be the Peanut Products Company, will establish a peanut butter factory at Fort Lauderdale. The establishment of a factory of this kind will encourage the production of peanuts.

The county commissioners of Bradford county are letting no grass grow under their feet as regards the movement to rid the county of the dread cattle tick. They are advertising for bids for the construction of a large number of dipping vats.

Hunters throughout the state are given warning that the open season for shooting quail and deer opens November 20th. The penalty for shooting game out of season is quite severe, hence it behooves all with sportsmanlike proclivities to go slow with their shooting.

Improved stock farms are becoming very popular over Moore Haven way. The Graming farm near that city is the latest to be turned into a farm of this kind. Preparations have already begun for new buildings and winter crops and improved breeds will be secured to stock the farm.

Owing to the prevailing epidemic of influenza throughout the entire country, the joint convention of National and Northern Nut Growers' Associations that were to have met in Albany, Ga., Oct. 30th have been postponed indefinitely. The nut growers of northern Florida are interested in these conventions and many expected to have attended.

Another chapter has been written in the J. W. Rast case, suspended tax collector of Duval county, in an opinion rendered by Attorney General Swearingin, in which he says the county commissioners of that county had no authority to place his name on the ticket as a candidate to succeed himself. Rumor has it that Mr. Rast will resort to mandamus proceedings.

fact that the soil and climate of the state are favorable to the production of-forage adapted to economical production of pork. In this connection it is very gratifying to note that in a great many sections of the state the farmers are waking up to the importance of this industry, by increasing their output and improving their breeds.

Talking about sorghum cane, the Melbourne Times says: John Michels has been raising some fine sorghum cane on his farm near Tillman for the past two or three years, mostly for feed; but this year he hauled a good part of the product for two acres over to his neighbor's cane mill and had it ground and the juice converted into molasses. The result was 170 gallons of fine sorghum molasses which he has been selling at \$1 a gallon, besides he had the seed and strappings for his chickens and stock on the farm. The shortage of sugar will not bother Mr. Michels and his family during the time that his three sons are fighting to win the war.

Heavy rain, the past month have damaged strawberry growers not a little. The crop will probably be set back some weeks because of this.

The semi has furnished the appointment of C. D. Lamont, postmaster at Loma, James R. Poiner, at Stuart, and Nelson A. Stump, at Palatka.

Tomato shipments will begin from the Moore Haven section in a few days. The growers are preparing better prices than those received for the previous year.

A writer from the Hastings section says: Hastings potato growers have tasted the sweets of cooperation and it and every grower sees that this method of marketing crops will win out for him in the end. At a recent meeting which was well attended the charter and by-laws were amended and a form of contract adopted. Many new members were adopted. The meeting was presided over by President Gagny.

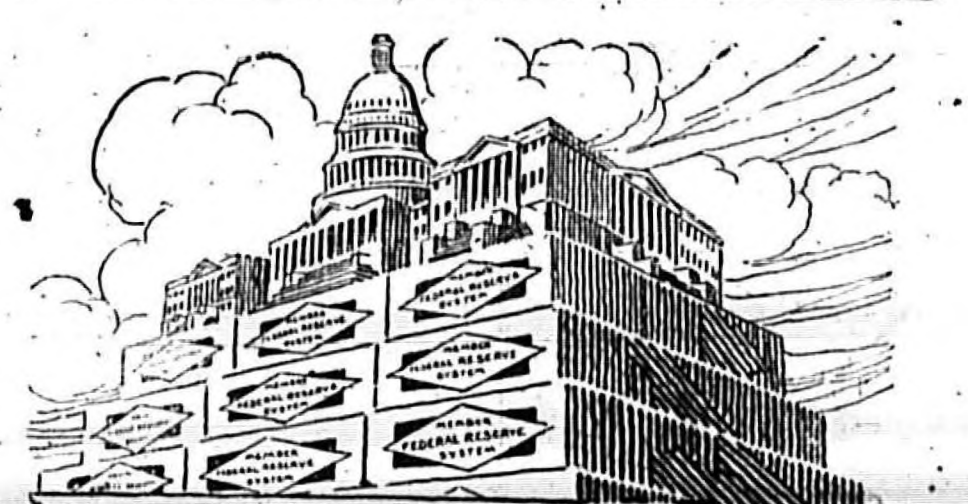
