

Marriage Rates

The soaring marriage rates which followed World War throughout much of the world have now declined to approximately pre-war levels, according to the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company.

In reporting upon the extent to which World War II has influenced marriage rates during the past decade, the Metropolitan notes that the changes varied from country to country, with the most pronounced effects felt in the occupied nations and in those belligerents actively engaged in hostilities. In the neutrals, on the other hand, there was relatively little change.

In 1939-1942 the English-speaking nations experienced a high point in the number of marriages which was followed by a decline for two or three years. Termination of the conflict, however, brought a new high, the peak occurring in 1945 in the British Isles, and the following year in the United States, Canada, Australia, and New Zealand.

"In this country," says the Metropolitan, "the rate of 10.2 marriages per 1,000 population attained in 1946 was not only the highest in the nation's history but also higher than that of any other country in the postwar period." The rate of marriages fell off greatly in the occupied

Full Utilization Of Space Is Help In Modern Kitchen

Before modernizing a kitchen-floor and wall space and sizes of cabincts and other equipment should be accurately measured so as to utilize all available space for as to utilize all available space for work center and storage. Location of work centers should be planned so that work will flow from one center to another without wasts motion, A great improvement will be effected in most old kitchens merely by re-location of work centers and using color liberally.

Space should be fully utilized for supposeds and floor cabinets. In re-arranging the work centers. n re-arranging the work centers, space can usually be found for many additional cubic feet of

torage.

Studies show these minimum square feet of shelf space for each adult in the family; base or floor cabinets, not including range and refrigerator, 2 lineal feet for each adult. Additional space can be found on walls above refrigerator. range, sink and other equipment A harmonious color plan for valls, floor and cabinets should be chosen. Since all-white kitchens are now obsolete, colorful grease-proof floors are recommended by interior designers, together with brightly-hued harmonizing walls, cupboards and cabinet tops. A black cove base of the material at the juncture of walls and floor helps add a contrasting note of color. The cove base is curved, making it easy to clean in corners. A variation in heights of work surfaces makes a more comfort-able kitchen. The average woman finds a 32" height for the mixing a 38" height for the range, and the bottom of the sink 32" above the floor. This means that sink drainboards and side counters, at least 2" x 36" in size, will be about 38" in height. Some home makers may object to these height variations for a continuous work sur-face slong one or two walls of the ditchen, but the comfort attained deserves consideration. No shelf in the kitchen should be higher than 72" above the floor.



1. Keep windows closed when hot winds are blowing.

2. Draw the shades on the sunny side of the house.

3. Replace heavy draperies with materials having a large open-

mesh weave.

4. Use light-colored linen or cretone slip-covers on upholstered furniture.

5. Use light colors for walls and floors, including smooth, cool

flooring.

6. Ventilate the attic throughout the day and night, either with an exhaust fan or by opening windows in opposite gables.

7. Open all doors and windows as soon as the sun sets and place two or three electric fans in wininward, to draw in cool night air

quickly.

8. Replace high wattage electric bulbs with lamps of less intensity and use electric lights sparingly. 9. Avoid top-of-stove cooking as much as possible and use the insulated oven for preparing hot

meals.

10 Keep the kitchen-dining-room door closed while cooking, and pen kitchen windows wide, to expel heat rapidly.
