LEGION MEN PLAN CELEBRATION FOR ARMISTICE DAY

Banquet Held Last Night Is Said Best One for Some Time; Clubhouse Work To Be Pushed to Completion

The American Legion Executive Committee banquet held last night at the Seminole Cafe was declared by everyone the best and most enjoyable one that has been held by the organization for some time. Enthusiasm and interest reigned throughout from the time First Commander Percy A. Mero called the gathering to order until the meeting was adjourned at 9:30 o'clock.

Several matters of importance were discussed and disposed of, the most important of which was arrangements made for the observance of Armistice Day by the Campbell-Lossing Post. Tentative plans for the day as announced last night call for a big parade in the morning, participation in every organization in the city; a football game in the afternoon between Sanford and Kissimmee High Schools, with a dinner and a big display of fireworks in the evening as a climax to the day's celebration.

In connection with the Armistice Day plans, the meeting went on record favoring a plan submitted for uniformly decorating the business section. The plan provides for flags to be placed on poles which will be installed at intervals on sidewalk edges on both sides of the street. The plan has already been adopted by several cities in the state and it is the plan to have it installed here before Armistice Day.

It was further announced that plans have been completed by the legion for securing the World War medals play by play which will be shown on a large electric scoreboard installed in the Army Club. These games will begin at 2 o'clock each day starting Saturday. An admission fee will be charged. KIANGSU SPIES EMPLOY TORCH AS A NEW ALLY

Set Fire to Town of Lotien, Ten Miles North Shanghai, But Are Shot by Chekiang Soldiers as They Flee

Orders Revealed In Search of Bodies

Were Instructed Start Fires In Shanghai; Refugees are Again Crowding this City

SHANGHAI, Oct. 2.—Kiangsu forces fighting to capture Shanghai employed the torch as an ally today when two of their spies fired the town of Lotien, 10 miles north of here. The spies were shot to death by Chekiang soldiers as they fled from the burning community. Search of their bodies revealed Kiangsu orders to start fires in Shanghai, according to an announcement at the Chekiang headquarters.

Shanghai is crowded again with refugees, this time fleeing into the city from the area around Sunkiang, a city of 50,000 inhabitants, 28 miles southward, where an attack by Kiangsu troops from the south is threatened.

Fighting already is reported started southwest of Sunkiang, where a contingent of Chekiang Shanghai troops is on the defensive. Chekiang Accessions. Further defense preparations for the fighting on the new front beyond Sunkiang were lightened by announcement that Gen. Ma Liang, former Anfu party (Pro Japanese) leader and one-time defense commissioner of Tsinan, Shantung, had raised 1,500 troops here and was departing for the south to assist the Chekiang soldiers. General Ma Liang since leaving Tsinan has been a resident of Shanghai.

Lotien, six miles north of Shanghai from Luohu, which is at the northern end of the nearby battle line, was on fire Wednesday morning. Headquarters of the Chekiang Shanghai forces at Lungshu, east of Shanghai, were responsible. Two of the spies had been taken prisoners, it was said.

Chang Takes Kienchen. TOKIO, Oct. 2.—Mukden forces of General Chang Tso-Lin, Manchurian leader, who claims authority for possession of the central government of China, today reported the capture of Kienchen, a town in Chihli province, 65 miles from Chihai. Manchurian leaders according to a dispatch from Mukden to the Kokusai news agency here.

General Engagement. TOKIO, Oct. 2.—A general engagement between the forces of Chang Tso-Lin, Manchurian leader, and Peking troops opposing Chang's attempts to take over the central government of China was in progress Wednesday on the Jehol front, according to announcements made from the Mukden headquarters of Chang's army and received here Wednesday. The same announcement took of the capture of Chonging, 120 miles north of Jehol by Mukden troops.

ROLLINS COLLEGE PRESIDENT TALKS TO KIWANIS CLUB

Dr. William C. Weir Gives Address on Subject of Christian Education as Foundation of American Strength

An address by Dr. William C. Weir, president of Rollins College, upon the subject of "Christian Education as a Foundation of American Strength," featured the weekly luncheon of the Kiwanis Club at the Montezuma Hotel Wednesday noon.

Dr. Weir, a scholar of note and an able speaker, stressed the necessity of developing the spiritual side of life as well as the bread side. "If any man have two loaves of bread let him trade one for a mite," declared the speaker. Here then is found food for both body and soul.

The text of Dr. Weir's talk, which was warmly received by the club, was as follows: "Personally I feel that the Christian college was never more necessary than now for the following reasons:

In the following statements I do not mean to attack any particular form of class institution, but rather point out a condition. "The thought that I have in mind is very aptly stated in that old Arab proverb: 'If any man have two loaves of bread, let him trade one for a mite.' Here we have our statement for the body and food for the soul.

For how many years we in America have been experimenting, talking, developing the broad school of education, this is especially true in the middle and western sections of our country, while we have allowed our education, in garden of nurseries to wither and die. We have too intimately concerned with the problems of domestic economy. As a consequence our national ideals have become blurred. We have come to believe that the more loaves of bread a man's schooling puts into his commodity, the better the schooling."

GENEVA, Oct. 2.—The league of nations assembly today unanimously adopted a resolution recommending that all states accept the protocol of arbitration and security. Fifty-seven delegates supported the resolution and all voted.

ROOSEVELT FOR CUTTING EXPENSE OF GOVERNMENT

Promises Clean and Economical Government if Chosen Chief Executive of New York State Over Al Smith

OYSTER BAY, Oct. 2.—Theodore Roosevelt, accepting the gubernatorial nomination last night, pledged himself to strive for a less expensive, better and clearer state government; reaffirmed his opposition to any organization "whether it be the Ku Klux Klan or some other group" when it endeavors to create "false distinctions between American and American" and asserted that as governor he would do everything in his power to secure legislation for enforcing the Volstead Act.

The nominee arranged for the Democratic party, both nationally and in New York state, as instance, and asserted that the Democratic National Convention had been guilty of "vote trucking" both in its foreign relations platform and in its selection of Gov. Bryan as the vice-presidential candidate. "To gain his brother's support for the ticket," he charged Gov. Smith's administration with extravagance and said he would endeavor to reorganize taxation on more scientific lines.

Gov. Roosevelt spoke on the veranda of his residence in the picturesque Cove Neck section of Oyster Bay, about a mile from historic Sagamore Hill, in father's home.

The nominee's address, which followed the official notification speech of Al William J. Donovan of Buffalo, commander of the 105th Infantry in the world war, recited the accomplishments of the national administration. "The Republican party," he said, had blocked the efforts of the Democrats to "deliver this country to the troubled diplomacy of war-racked Europe."

"How has the Republican party accomplished this great feat?" Roosevelt asked. "We have quarreled among ourselves in a mad race for the seat of our states. Our heads may be in the clouds but our feet are on the earth. We have stood for equality of opportunity for all our people in the full sense of the word. Our leaders at Washington personify these ideals of our party."

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GENEVA, Oct. 2.—A warning that was based on economic reasons must move the world in the future was issued by Aristide Briand, many times premier of France, Wednesday when with that same fire of eloquence and motion which stirred his auditors at the Washington naval conference he called upon all nations to approve the protocol for peaceful settlement of international disputes and pledged there and then, France's adhesion without reservations.

The amended protocol of arbitration and security occupied the attention of the assembly of the League and a general report by Dr. Heger and M. Politis, representing the two commissions which adjourned until 9:30 in the evening, but it was M. Briand who aroused the assembly with his words in behalf of France.

"Men may say," continued the former premier, "that economic wars are possible because the interests of nations may be swayed by the same considerations as the interests of selfish individuals and that under the influence of selfish interests the ideal and duty may be obscured. But, as Briand pointed a picture of France prostrated by a war which had been forced upon her and as a land yearning for eternal peace, and attacked "perfidious propagandists who have represented France as a nation bristling with bayonets and endeavoring to dominate the world and realize an unattainable dream of supremacy."

"So country is said, more ardently desired to get rid of the burden of armaments than France, and it stands ready as soon as for security was assured to run in the vanguard and help in the solution of the problems for the reduction of armaments. He was convinced that the protocol presented today meant a new era and he believed that the man in the street would hail it, rejoicing that the statesman had last made war seemingly impossible.

England, through Lord Parmoor, Lord President of the council, did not go as far as France, merely announcing her acceptance of the resolutions transmitting the protocol to the governments but promising to exert all the influence. (Continued on Page Six)

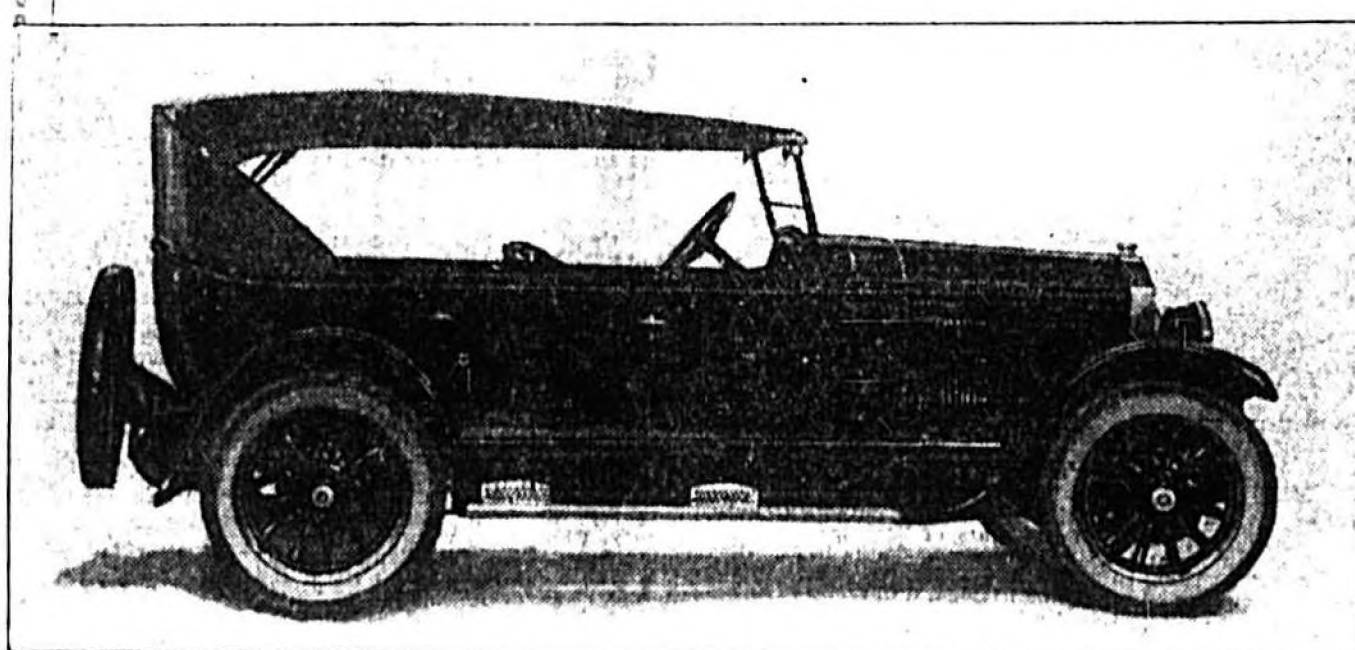

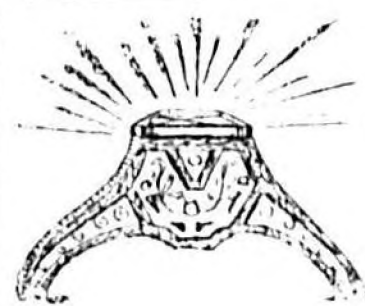

Out En Masse to Greet American Champions

King Baseball Crowned at Washington After Twenty-Three Years Spent in Exile

Coolidge and His Cabinet Gratified President Takes Part in Welcoming Ceremonies Wednesday

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—The wheels of government stopped Wednesday for the coronation ceremonies of King Baseball, a usurper who, after 23 years of exile, rode into the National Capital at the head of a wildly heralded cabinet—the Washington Senators, pennant winners of the American League.

High-ups in government life turned out to join with streeturchins in shouting a hearty welcome to the city's baseball heroes who were escorted in a colorful welcome home procession up Pennsylvania Avenue from the Peace monument to the Ellipse, south of the White House, where President Coolidge extended an official greeting to the players.

The keynote of the welcome home celebration was sounded by the President who, in presiding Manager Stanley Harris with a loving cup from the citizens of the district, assured him that his team had won "the affection of the 'Home town' constituency."

Thousands of shouting fans, some waving pennants, others waving hats, and still others too busy scrambling for seats to wave anything, swarmed around the Ellipse to hear the President.

"As the head of an enterprise have the double satisfaction in this town," Mr. Coolidge said, "I have the double satisfaction in welcoming home the victorious ball team."

Smiling as he spoke, the President said that the entire population reached the point of regarding the game to be described by play by play, I began to doubt whether the highest efficiency was being promoted. I contemplated action of a vigorous disciplinary character, but the outcome makes it impossible."

"We are somewhat demoralized community," he added, "but exceedingly happy over it."

The President, by leaving his desk to take part in the ceremonies set the fashion for the day, or all Washington apparently warmed to the Avenue.

A squadron of mounted police headed the procession. Next in line came the United States Cavalry Band from Ft. Meyer, Va., which was followed by a delegation from the Washington Redskins and Hunting Club, attired in scarlet riding coats.

Immediately preceding the players' automobiles was an escort of one of the city's most beautiful young women mounted on horseback. The festivities of the day were closed tonight with an informal banquet to the players.

Before the ceremonies of the afternoon the team took a snappy workout behind the closed gates of Griffith Stadium, while thousands of fans gathered about on the outside trying to obtain seats for the opening game of the world series with the New York Giants Saturday. Ten thousand people, it was estimated, were fighting for places in ticket lines when the booths were opened in the evening.

The players, returning to the city Tuesday morning from Boston were greeted at the station by a large crowd of fans who could not sit until the afternoon ceremonies to express their enthusiasm.

Commissioner Landis is on his way to Washington to be here for a series.

LANDIS BARS TWO OF M'GRAW'S MEN FROM BIG SERIES

O'Connell and Dolan Alleged to Have Attempted to Bribe Philadelphia in Throwing Recent Game to New York

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—Commissioner Landis, upon his arrival here today said he had nothing to add to his statement given out last night in New York concerning the bribery charges placed against the two players of the New York Giants.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—Commissioner K. M. Landis announced last night that Jimmy O'Connell and Coach Cozy Dolan of the New York National League baseball club has been declared ineligible for the world series after charges of bribery against them had been investigated.

The suspension was based upon a confession made by O'Connell and followed information furnished by Heinie Sand of the Philadelphia National League club. Sand stated that on September 27 O'Connell had offered \$100 to throw the game between the Giants and the Phillies, played in New York on that date.

Sand refused the offer and immediately gave his information to Manager Fletcher of the Phillies who brought it to the attention of Commissioner Landis. The investigation in which President Boydell of the National League and officials of the New York club also took part followed.

O'Connell's confession almost mentioned Capt. Frank Etchell, Ross Young and George Kelly of the Giants, but Commissioner Landis stated that the testimony of these men had convinced the investigating committee that they had no part in the scheme. O'Connell, a substitute outfielder, will be the only Giant player not eligible for the world series, as Dolan is a coach.

O'Connell, known as the "\$7,000" player, played a prominent part in New York's first victory over Pittsburgh in their important series last week by hitting a home run which scored what proved to be the winning run.

New York won the game in question from Philadelphia by a score of 5 to 1. The victory clinched the pennant for New York. Sand, Philadelphia short stop, scored the only run for his team which secured his four hits off Hendley. He also had two put outs and one assist but no errors.

O'Connell played center field for New York and made a two base hit.

Commissioner Landis' statement follows: "Player O'Connell and Coach Dolan of the New York National League baseball club have today been placed on the ineligible list. The action was taken by the Commissioner on evidence furnished by the confession of O'Connell and the testimony of Dolan."

"It appeared that on Saturday, September 23, O'Connell offered Player Sand of the Philadelphia Nationals \$500 to throw the ball game, which Sand refused and promptly reported to Manager Fletcher. This was followed by the Commissioner's investigation in cooperation with the officials of the New York club which resulted in O'Connell's confession, which placed the responsibility of instigating the scheme on Dolan, whose testimony in his own behalf was of such a character as to be unacceptable."

"O'Connell's confession sought to implicate Player Etchell, Young and Kelly of the New York club, but their testimony, in the Commissioner's opinion, was a clear refutation of the charge which standing alone, was exceedingly unreasonable."

"The Commissioner desires to express his heartfelt commendation to the action of Player Sand."

Pitching is Expected to Decide Coming Series with Johnson Doing brunt of work

Washington Hurler Much in Limelight After Eighteen Years in Majors Veteran Is in World Series

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—With Walter Johnson, veteran ace of Washington's sharp-shooting corps, as the outstanding figure, pitching may be the decisive factor in the 1924 world's series between the Senators and the New York Giants.

Until recent years twirling was usually the most potent factor in the diamond title struggle, but with the advent of the lively ball and the Babe Ruthian home run era, baseball strategy shifted. Pitching, of course, continued to figure largely but it has been the speed and power of attack that decided the last three world's champion battles between the Giants and the Yankees.

Whatever the merits of the rival twirling corps interest will center in the achievements of Johnson, probably the only ball player of all time who rivals in popular esteem the former Giant Max Baer, Christy Mathewson, Johnson, a public ad not only because of his brilliant playing record of an 18 year span, but also because of his sterling qualities as a sportsman, will pitch the first game for the Senators.

Outside of the most rabid of Giant's partisan fans throughout the country will root for him in unison that day. Even the tense rival struggle for team honors will be lost in the all vital question of what Johnson will do upon reaching the goal of his great career.

The Senators' chief hopes, too, will center around the big Walter Johnson, whose speed ball has far outdone more batters than any other pitcher in the game's history. If Johnson, after one of the most successful seasons he has ever had, can carry his old stomach and form into the series, Washington's chances will be in the ascendency.

Johnson, in his prime, has twice pitched world's series, on his consecutive playing days. He pitched a 1 and won three games on Oct. 1, 1903. It is a feat that could not stand such a feat, but if he is able to repeat the feat of the Senators' annual work, the Giants will find a difficult barrier to break down.

Johnson's major league record of 307 victories is topped with 200 in the National League. He pitched 100 consecutive games in the National League, a record which he held until 1912, when he was replaced by Walter Johnson.

He led the American League pitchers in this respect this year for the 100th time, and this time baseball players say that Johnson was in his prime when "smoke ball" was virtually unknown.

The "Kansas Cyclone" has won 359 games, only 13 less than Mathewson. With a tall and club body of the time, Johnson's winning record is all the more remarkable.

In 1911 he pitched a year in which he won 31 games, winning 26 and losing seven, putting his club almost singlehanded into second place, the highest position it ever held until this season. He won 16 consecutive games in 1912, an American League record which he shared with Joe Wood. He also is a three-time king of all time by a wide margin, having won his record up to 107 this year. In 1913, he was not scored on in 36 consecutive innings.

Only "Cy" Young has topped Johnson's record of service. Cy was in the majors 22 seasons, 12 in the National and 10 in the American, but Sir Walter holds the record for length of service in any one league, having spent all of his 33 seasons with Washington. Mathewson was 17 years in the National.

Johnson was born in Humbolt, Kansas, and will be 37 next November 9, two days before his young Manager Stanley Harris will teach his twenty eighth birthday. Johnson, who stands six feet, one inch, and weighs 196, was with the Tacoma, Wash. club for one season. The following year, 1907, he started with the Weiser, Idaho, club, but joined the Senators before the close of the season.

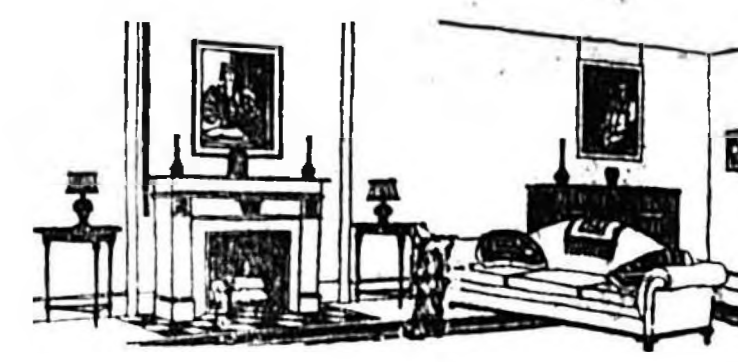
