**LIGHT WITH LIME**  
Lime peel and juice lend a Caribbean flavor to this low-calorie seafood salad. A motorcade led in a convertible by High, Swafford and Longwood Mayor Percy White will proceed through Altamonte Springs, Longwood and Lake Mary escorted by the police departments of the various cities.

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## How Long: How Long? When Will We Learn?

The police report said: "Officer wanted in Supt. of Schools R. T. Milwee's office. There is trouble there."

When are we going to learn? Haven't we learned from Watts, Chicago and Harlem? Do we want Sanford splattered across the front pages and magazines of every city in the United States?

Yesterday a prominent resident walked into a public official's office and punched him in the nose because he apparently didn't like the way he was running our schools. Two years ago we integrated our schools quietly without any violence or trouble. The Herald was proud of the way the people of the county bent to federal pressures and resigned themselves to the fact of 20th century politics. We were a model community.

That was until yesterday. And then the Supt. of Schools R. T. Milwee was punched in the face because a resident didn't want his child taught by a Negro teacher. We realize it is too late that we cannot go around punching officials in the jaw every time we disagree with them. If we don't want a Negro teacher for our sick child, would we punch A. B. Peterson in the face? Or Bob Bassett? Would we go looking for County Commission Chairman John Alexander because we don't like the way he's handling county affairs.

## More Funds Sought For Indigent Care

Rep-nominee Tom McDonald said today that the county currently in his office with requests monetary aid for the care of indigent patients. He said he would work toward an answer to the problem during the next biennium. (McDonald evidently was referring to remarks by John Alexander, county commission chairman, at the final budget hearing that "we do not want assistance from the state in local problems which we should handle; that is what we have local government for.")

### You And Your Duty

Some shocking figures have been revealed out of the Supervisor of elections office that should make us all sit up and take notice.

As of July 20, 1966 we had 20,600 registered electors in Seminole County. This is 50.5 per cent of those eligible to vote.

Yes we repeat 50.5 per cent of those eligible to vote.

In the first primary 9,600 persons voted out of 19,821 Democrats and Republicans eligible. This was 48.4 per cent. However, it was only 20 per cent of those eligible.

Why?

Supervisor of elections Camilla Bruce says so many are not registered.

How many?

Mrs. Bruce says at least 40,000.

Why?

We say they are just too busy—too busy to take an interest in their community and county affairs.

That is exactly the trouble.

In November of 1966 the total registered was 12,692. How many voted the same year? Well, it was 70.65 per cent or 8,967.

Now lets go to 1960. The total registered was 15,734. That year 13,827 voted for a percentage of 87.87 per cent.

In 1964—23,600 registered but only 19,511 voted for a percentage of 78.2.

Now through 1965 we had 23,737 registered voters but we lost close to 4,000 due to persons moving out of the county, being disqualified and other reasons.

Surely there must be at least another 10,000 persons in the county eligible to vote.

Where are they?

The deadline for registering is Oct. 8. We urge every eligible voter to contact Mrs. Bruce at the courthouse. We won't go into all the clichés about sacred duty but YOU KNOW...it really is.

### Political Notebook

WASHINGTON (NEA) — As U.S. planes fly record numbers of missions over North and South Viet Nam, homefront critics of these assaults keep up their own drumfire of argument.

Their fundamental contention is that such bombings are inevitably indiscriminate and hence so-called civilian life. Secondly they argue that the attacks stiffen enemy resolve and drive him further from the peace table.

Since this latter point has become a staple article of faith in the critics' catchment, it deserves a fresh look against the background of modern military history.

Nearly three-fourths of all the Allied bombing tonnage dropped on Germany in World War II was dropped in the final 10 months, though the European war lasted 68 months. The bombing concentration was particularly heavy in the closing offensives from January to May of 1945. Through four days in March more Allied missions were flown than in the whole year 1942.

Historians of the final phase do not find, however, that the unprecedented air attacks which leveled the hearts of 21 German cities—stiffened the German resolve to fight on.

To begin with, in very high German quarters that resolve did not exist by February of 1945. From that time on, various top Nazi officials were engaged more or less continuously in trying to sue for peace with the United States and Britain.

To the extent that those peace efforts wavered, they were affected not by shattering Allied air raids but by Nazi leaders' fears of the wrath of Adolf Hitler, who stubbornly clung to hopes of victory until the very end.

In those fateful days, the alling Hitler's outlook ranged from occasional despair to mystical belief in total victory over all his enemies to periodically revived hope that America and

#### DeGaulle The Peacemaker?

PARIS (UPI) — French President Charles de Gaulle is squaring away for a possible new pitch at playing peacemaker in Viet Nam.

French officials emphasize he will do nothing unless and until he feels the moment is ripe.

But he is known to share the fears of United Nations Secretary General Thant that the Viet Nam conflict could explode into a general world war.

French officials say de Gaulle is watching closely for any chance to intervene in the role of possible peacemaker.

This is said to be one of the main purposes of his round-the-world grand tour starting last Thursday which will take him among other places on a state visit to Cambodia, only a few hundred miles from the Viet Nam war.

Rumors that he might take the opportunity to meet secretly or even openly with North Viet Nam President Ho Chi Minh have been denied firmly in both Paris and Hanoi.

It now seems most unlikely any such meeting will take place.

But de Gaulle will take the opportunity to sit up the Viet Nam situation at close hand in talks with Cambodia's monarch chief of state Prince Norodom Sihanouk and other leaders of the Little Southeast Asian kingdom bordering on Viet Nam.

He also will make what has been billed as a major speech on the Viet Nam situation during his three-day visit to Phnom Penh.

French officials do not expect any startlingly new proposals. They say de Gaulle will reiterate earlier statements that the Viet Nam conflict can only be settled at the peace table and not on the battlefield. He is likely, they say, also to reiterate earlier calls for reconvening of the 1954 Geneva Far Eastern peace conference.

French officials predict de Gaulle will insist that any peace settlement must involve withdrawal of United States and all other foreign troops and ultimate neutralization of all Southeast Asia.

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# 'Cross And Sword' Applauded By Herald Scribe

I guess this thing called wanderlust sooner or later gets to the best of us and even to the best of our kind.

Exactly Joe and I decided to go up to St. Augustine to see the play "The Cross and the Sword." It truly was a trip well taken and time well spent and if I may, I should like to report a little about the play.

It opens in the city of Seville in Spain in the year 1565. It is an evening in early spring and a religious procession is making its way to the old cathedral but the hero of our play, Pedro Menendez de Aviles, is not in the procession — he is in the prison cell.

Described as a skillful blending of acting, singing, lighting, dancing and scenic design, "Cross and Sword" tells of the first two years of settlement of our nation's oldest city, centering around the character of Pedro Menendez, founder of St. Augustine. Set in Spain, Florida, and Cuba, scenes range from the glitter and intrigue of the Court of Phillip II to the hostile and forbidding Florida wilderness, showing the treachery and hardships Menendez must endure to establish a permanent settlement for Spain in the New World.

Playing opposite Menendez is the lovely Indian maiden, Notina, sister of Oriba, great chief of the Timucuan Indians. Oriba, the strong yet compassionate Indian leader, epitomizes the nobleness of the Indian, while Domingo de Florida, drama, and valued at \$256,000, boasts over 2,000 armchair seats, a snack bar, parking spaces for 600 cars, and a large main auditorium in case of showers.

Located approximately two and one-half miles from the center of St. Augustine, the theatre is situated on a 40-acre tract of Anastasia State Park, site of the Royal Quarries where coquina was once cut for construction of Castillo de San Marcos National Monument.

More than 250 colorful costumes are worn during the course of the production by the cast of almost 100, and the costumes range from the rich, regal court costumes to the unique Spanish moss skirts worn by the Indian maidens.

All of the dances in the show are original and choreographed by the author, Paul Green, from the libraries and archives of Madrid and Seville. To say that Joe and I thoroughly enjoyed this magnificent play would be an understatement. It was an evening of entertainment and a history lesson that we shall never forget and I certainly urge anyone who is interested in Florida's formative years to see this play before the 4th of September, the final presentation of the season.

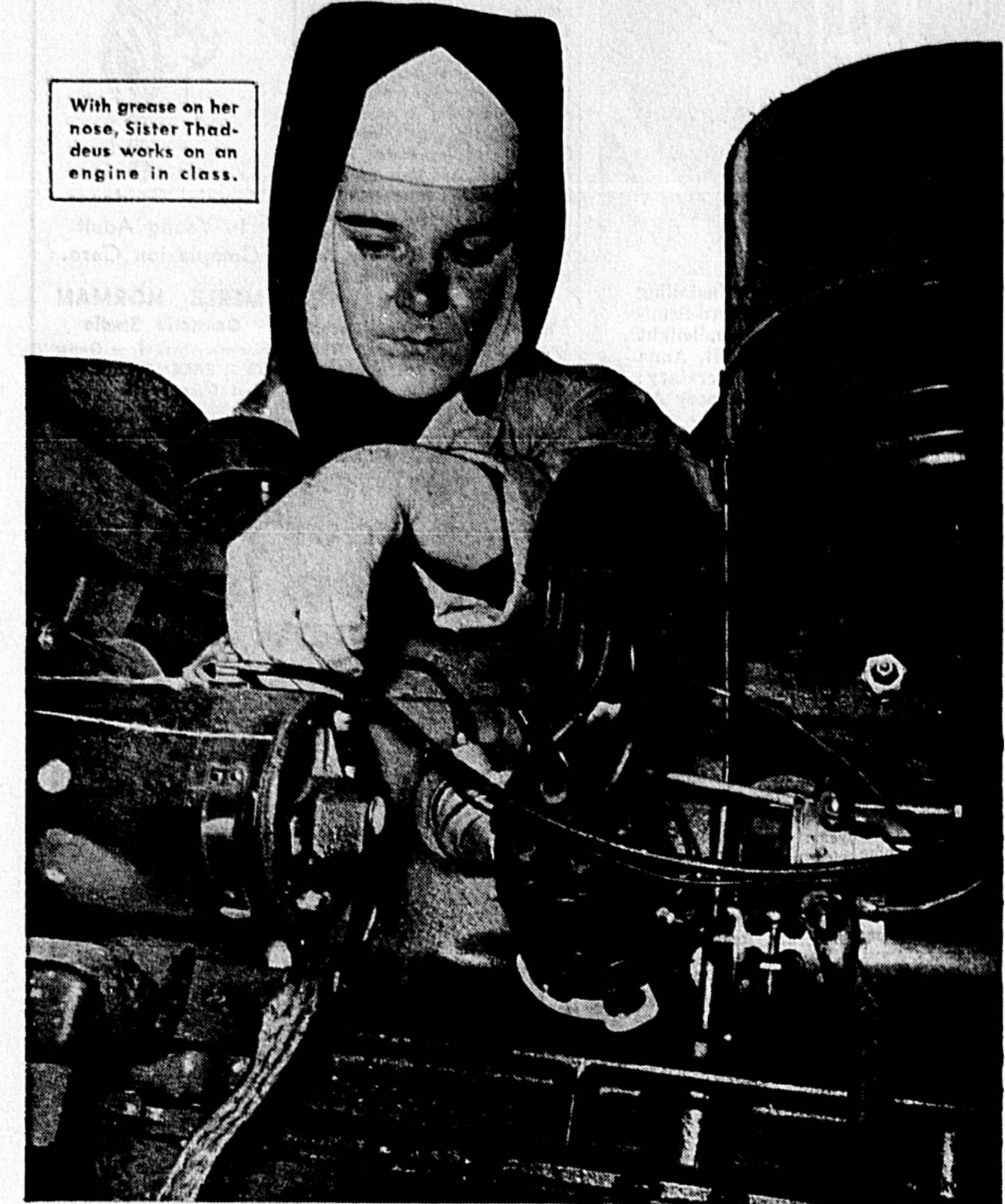

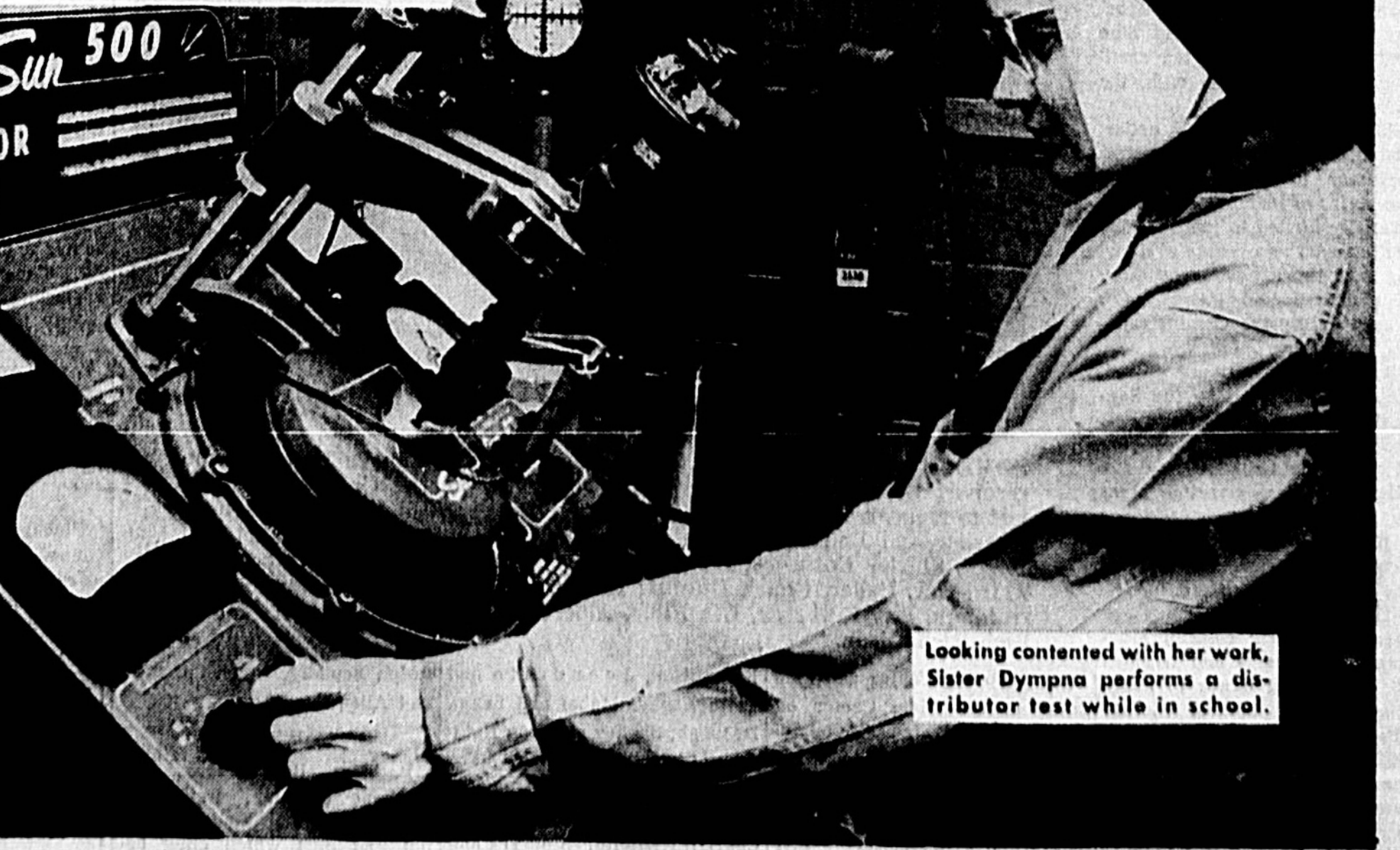
