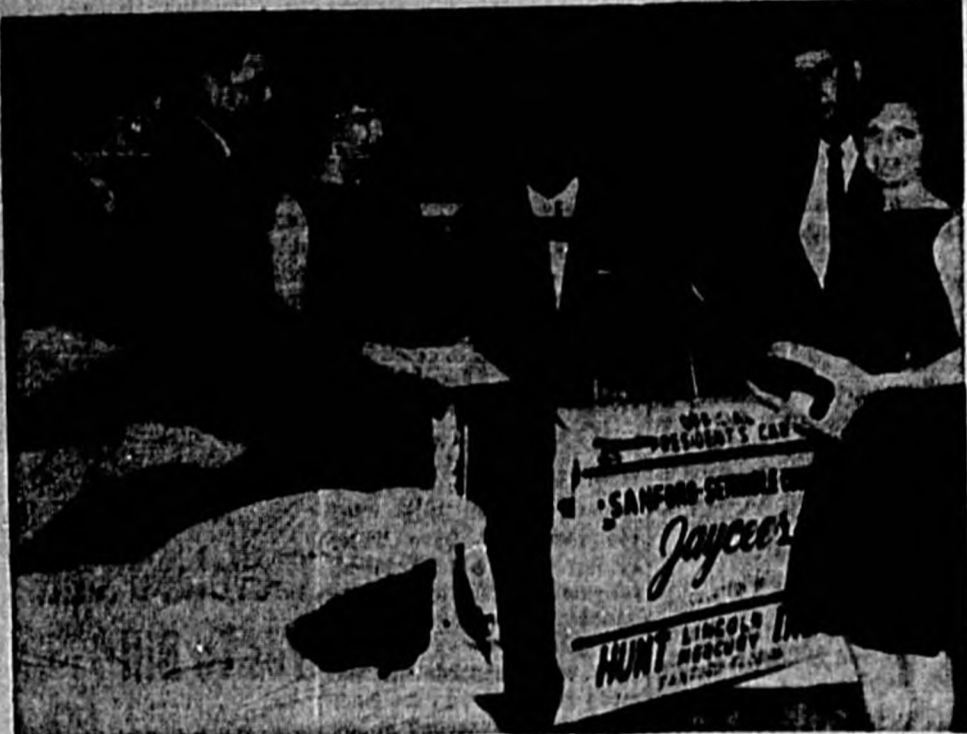

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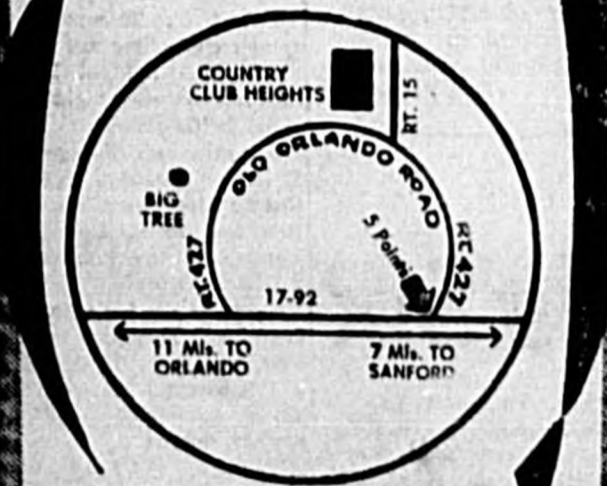

Detachment Eight Cops Bomb Prize

A six-plane detachment of Sanford's Heavy Attack Squadron Eleven has nosed out its parent squadron—and all other NAS units—for its second straight monthly bombing championship, the Navy announced today. Detachment Eight, flying the Douglas A3B Skywarrior twin-jet attack bomber, also won seven of the top ten places in both pilot and bombardier-navigator competitions. The Detachment—using half the normal 12-plane squadron complement—edged Heavy Attack Squadron Five (VAH-5) by a 160-point margin in accumulative squadron points. Points are awarded on the basis of bombing accuracy, proficiency in simulated low level strike missions and number of missions flown during a month. Following VAH-5 were VAH-9, VAH-7, VAH-4, VAH-11 and VAH-3 in that order. Individual honors went to Detachment Eight's Lt. Cdr. Bill Winberg III in pilot standings, and his bombardier-navigator, James L. Allyn, an aviation ordnance

man first class. While pacing skipper Cdr. Robert de Lorenzi's unit to its second straight monthly championship, Winberg and Allyn have been compiling an enviable record of their own: Each has recorded 15 "shacks," direct hits on local area practice bombing targets. This is an unofficial Heavy Attack Wing One record, at least for the period of time involved. Allyn has been a bombardier for a scant year's time. His first "shack" did not come until this January. They've been coming in bunches ever since.

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Everest Climbers Okay

KATMANDU, Nepal (UPI) — Two American mountain climbers with frostbitten feet landed here today after an emergency helicopter flight from the slopes of Mt. Everest and limped into a hospital aided by their wives. William Unsoeld, 36, of Corvallis, Ore., and Barry C. Bishop, 30, of Washington, D. C., tired but smiling and in good spirits, turned down an offered stretcher ride when the helicopter set down in a field near the United Mission Hospital. The waiting crowd cheered. The two men, who had participated in an unprecedented double conquest of the 29,028-foot mountain Wednesday, went into the hospital emergency room. A team of doctors under hospital director Dr. Robert Berry immediately began examination of their feet. Unsoeld and Bishop were frostbitten Wednesday night on the way down from the peak when they were unable to find their tents, and spent the night sleeping in the field.

Stetson Gets Huge Grant For Science

A grant of \$20,000 in support of Stetson University's instructional scientific equipment program has been made by the National Science Foundation, Stetson President J. Ollie Edmunds announced today.

The grant, which will be matched by the University's own funds, will be used for the purchase of equipment to be used in undergraduate instructional work in chemistry. The program is under the direction of Dr. John F. Conn, chairman of Stetson's chemistry department.

The new equipment for Stetson's chemistry department will include such items as specialized analytical balances, a recording titrator, spectrophotometers, a potentiometric recorder, an analog computer, an emission spectrograph, an oscilloscope, an arc and spark stand, a microdensitometer, a decade scaler, a flame photometer, a pen recording polarograph, and other items.

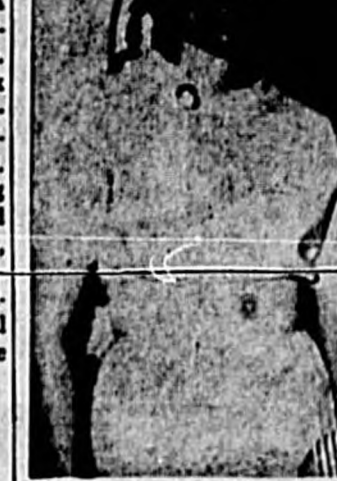

City Okays Terms For Prep School



The City Commission Monday night voted to accept the terms and conditions negotiated with the MacFadden Foundation officials in New York last week to locate a 250 cadet military prep school in Sanford.

City Commissioners agreed to terms of the talks conditioned upon the County Commission's favorable action to clear the county reverter from a certain portion of the city land that is for the school.

The County Commission is expected to act on this request at its meeting Wednesday.

Last week, Mayor Tom MacDonald and Commissioner J. H. (Jimmy) Crapps went to New York to talk over negotiations with J. P. Wieggers, chairman of the foundation. The Foundation agreed to purchase from the city 18 plus acres of the recreation area at Mellonville and Celery Aves. for \$100,000, payable \$28,500 down and the balance in deferred payments over a period of 10 years.

City Tells Engineers: 'Go' On Water Plans

With no hope of boosting Sanford's dwindling water supply for peak period days this summer, the City Commission Monday night authorized Engineers Clark, Dailey and Dietz to complete plans for some \$800,000 worth of water improvements "aimed for next summer."

City Manager W. E. Knowles estimated that getting the improvements off the drawing board into the construction stage would take at least six months.

Commissioners approved plans which include the idea of moving the present treatment facility to the existing well field site on Hwy. 17-92 together with construction of the main well field at the county club with a treatment plant and transmission lines totaling \$790,000.

Sanford To Cape Four Lane Highway Proposed

Planning experts of the six-county East Central Florida Regional Planning Council today recommended long range plans for the four-lane highway from Sanford to Cape Canaveral through Mims at a meeting of the group in Daytona Beach today.

John Bramley, Sanford member of the St. Johns-Indian River Navigating Committee, last Jan. 11 advocated that a four-lane highway be constructed along the proposed St. Johns-Indian River canal, using the spoil from the canal dredging as a bed for the road.

Another new, bold concept recommended by the "experts" was a scenic route from Daytona Beach into Osceola County, coming through Seminole from the vicinity of Osteen and then west of Lake Harney to Geneva on Oviedo and south through this county.

The experts joined with the council in reviewing proposals for the future expansion of the area which includes the

nation's spaceport at Cape Canaveral.

The group met in closed session with members of the boards of the various county commissions as a two-day meeting of the council drew to an end with policy discussions.

Chairman William Wallace, who introduced representatives of Volusia, Seminole, Osceola, Indian River, Brevard and Orange Counties to about 125 business, industrial and civic leaders, said major development plans probably would be drawn up as a result of the meetings.

Wallace said the committee recommended to the commissioners that plans be drawn up on the anticipated growth to the area to about 1.2 million population in the next decade; that a network of road and other transportation facilities be designed, and that the St. Johns River water area be turned into a general recreation area.

Teacher Pay Upped

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The Legislature completed action today on bills providing \$350-4550 annual pay raises for school teachers and directing establishment of a branch engineering college in East-Central Florida.

The House bills, implementing funds provided in the general appropriations bill, were cleared by the Senate and sent to the Governor.

The general spending bill, which cleared Monday, provides \$1.5 million for the branch of the University of Florida Engineering School and \$15 million for teacher pay raises.

The Senate refused to accept a House amendment to

a bill shifting part of the county school expenses to the state.

The amendment, tacked on by Rep. Robert Mann, of Hillsborough, requires that state payments for schools, effective in 1965, must be based on current enrollment rather than enrollment for the previous year. It would

add another \$15 million to state school costs in the 1965-67 biennium.

Sen. Ed Pries, of Bradenton, said he favored the amendment but felt it might endanger gubernatorial approval of the formula freezing county school payments at 25

Derailment, Fire Sabotage Racks FEC

OAK HILL (UPI) — Fire razed the old wooden station owned by the strike-bound Florida East Coast Railway here Monday night and a few hours later, three cars of an FEC freight train derailed near Titusville, 22 miles further south.

Fire Chief Fred Garlick of New Smyrna Beach said fire burned through the long station so fiercely "There was nothing we could do but watch it burn and see the flames didn't spread."

No one was injured in the blaze, the cause of which was not immediately determined. Authorities began an investigation into the possibility of arson.

Early this morning, a few hours after the fire, FEC officials re-routed a freight train around the burned station to avoid rails buckled by the intense heat.

On a crossing on the Mims branch line, three cars jumped the rails but remained upright.

Titusville Police Chief W. T. Brown said investigators were sent to the scene to determine what caused the derailment.

In Jacksonville, FEC board chairman Edward Ball commented he believed the fire was sabotage but the derailment "probably accidental."

"A station just doesn't set itself on fire for no reason," he said.

The Senate is holding back on proposals for tax increases until the House decides if it will go along with borrowing part of the estimated \$200 million or more in new revenue.
