

Spray Adhesives Banned

WASHINGTON (AP) - The U.S. Consumer Products Safety Commission today called for a halt in the sale of three spray adhesives it claims may be linked to birth defects. Commission Chairman Richard O. Simpson identified the products as: "Foil Art Spray Adhesive" and "Scotch Brand

> Minn., and "Krylon Spray Adhesive" manufactured by the Borden Co. of Columbus, Ohio. Company spokesmen were not available for immediate

> Spray-Ment," both manufactured by the 3M Co. of St. Paul,

The sprays are generally sold for home arts and crafts purposes, the commission said.

In a statement, the federal agency said the three aerosol adhesives "have been possibly linked to chromosome breaks which could cause multiple birth defects in some offspring." A commission spokesman said it was hoped the manufac-

turers would voluntarily recall their products and that court

action would not be necessary to stop sale of the products. The spokesman, Ron Eisenberg, director of public affairs for the commission, said the findings are not related to the recent recall by the Food and Drug Administration of certain

He said the commission's findings were based on independent research on the products conducted by Dr. J. Rodman Seely, associate professor of biochemistry at the University of Oklahoma's Health Sciences Center.

"Dr. Seely's investigation linked these spray adhesives to chromosomal breaks in two severely deformed Oklahoma City infants, their parents and four other individuals in the area," the statement said.


The commission also said its investigators had met with Seely, reviewed his research and concluded "his findings strongly suggest a causal relationship between exposure to these spray adhesives and findings of chromosome damage and birth defects in a group of subjects he has studied."



The Bread Of Life

By REV. JAMES MARTINEZ St. Augustine Church

In many churches in our area this weekend and in the previous few weeks the principal Bible reading has been taken from the sixth chapter of St. John. The message brought to our attention is Jesus concern to feed the hungry and His word that He is our food, the Bread of Life.

There are many hungry people in the world. So hungry are they that some of them will die of starvation while we are praying at our own church service. At this very time a vast number of people in West Africa are threatened with death by famine. Desperate hunger is the constant companion of

many members of the human family throughout the globe. The Eucharist, The Bread of Life, shows us God at work feeding people. It makes no difference that only a small number, relative to the world's total population, actually receive this Bread of Life. Most of the world, not being Christian, does not have access to the sacred bread of the Lord's Supper. Rut still, God feeds them too. In more ways than we can recognize, God nourishes all the members of the human family

In creating a universe of color, for instance, he feeds our need for beauty. The Bread of Life stands as a sign of God's action in the world. It tells what he is doing always and everywhere: nourishing people. It should remind us that God is both nourisher and nourishment for all people, whether they recognize him or not.

But the Bread of Life is not merely a sign of what God is doing. It is also a call for us to do what God is doing. It means that we ought to be nourishers like God. Receiving sacred food for curselves does not suffice: To be or become food givers, breadwinners, for others should be one of our aims. Like Jesus who "gives" himself, sacrifices himself in love, we can ourselves become bread in a certain sense. That is, other people can find in us nourishment insofar as we are giving of ourselves to them

The words of Jesus in the sixth chapter of St. John's gospel pre-suppose this concern. At the beginning of this chapter Jesus feeds five thousand people who had followed him because they were in need. It is in response to their need that Jesus promises the food that is himself. This food, he says, brings a life which lasts forever. It leads to an intimacy with him, so that Jesus shares with believers the same vital community. Something more than the diet of wisdom is involved: A new life, that of Jesus with all of his love and care.

Jesus contrasts the bread of which he speaks with perishable bread like the manna of exodus times. But this does not give us any handle for minimizing the importance of the daily bread that is needed for human survival. Even though this earthly bread leads to new hunger, it still is life, part of God's gift of life. A Christian cannot justifiably tell hungry people to look upward to the bread of heaven. Rather, we Chrisitans can make the Bread of Life vital only when we see its connection with the basic human needs of the world. This is what Daniel Berrigan says with beautiful poetic

When I hear bread breaking, I see something else; it seems almost as if God never meant us to do anything else. So beautiful a sound, the crust breaks up like manna and falls all over everything, and then we eat; bread gets inside humans. Sometime in your life hope you might see one starved man, the look on his face when the bread finall arrives. Hope you might have baked it or bought it-or even kneaded it yourself. For that look on his face, for your hands meeting his across a piece of bread, you might be willing to lose a lot or suffer a lot-or die a little, even.

That is the risk to which belief in the Bread of Life exposes us: Losing a lot, suffering a lot or even dying a little.

Churches Take Stock

NEW YORK - The annual tax-taking and soul-searching of the nation's major religious bodies is under way. From spring to fall, denominations are meeting to discuss their internal problems. principally declining income or national and international good works and demands of

women for ordination. Bodies large and small, conservative and liberal, are coming face to face with such diverse issues as the Watergate scandal, the bombing in Cambodia, Cesar Chavez labor struggles, the right of the terminally ill to die with dignity, and homosexuality. Expressions of moral indig-

nation over Watergate have been almost universal, but the usual heated debates over issues were absent from most of the meetings held so far. The Alabama Baptist, a periodical, attributed the unusually peaceful convention of the Southern Baptist Convention at least in part to the attrition of the daily televised Watergate hearings and "a weariness of debate and scandal on the part of the people." The Southern Baptists,


had their smallest convention in 22 years, with fewer than 9,000 in attendance to approve a record \$35 million national budget. The denomination, the largest Protestant body in the United States, reported more than 12 million members and announced that giving by local congregations passed the \$1 billion mark last

year for the first time. They also resolved that all Christians should become more actively involved in the American political process.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Retail gasoline prices will remain frozen at present levels until Sept. 1, the result of a second extension of the administration's price freeze on gasoline, the director of the Cost of Living Council has announced. Except for retailers of gasoline and diesel fuel, the price freeze will be lifted from the petroleum industry at midnight

The freeze on the petroleum industry was scheduled to go

Americans Buy Foreign Beef

The scarcity and high price of beef is driving some Americans right out of the country - on shopping trips to butcher

shops in Mexico and Canada. It's hardly the practical approach for most Americans and an idea that probably never occurred to residents of Kansas City or Omaha. But to residents of Mexican border states in the southwest and some cities near the Canadian border, it's a practical way to save money.

The biggest beef bargains are south of the border in Mexico, a fact long-known to many Texas and Southern California residents. Meat prices are also lower in Canada, but the saving can be only minimal.

Officials at border points from El Paso to Brownsville, Tex., have reported 20 to 80 per cent increases in Americans returning with Mexican beef. Butcher shops in Tijuana, near San Diego, Calif., have reported lines of Am to make large purchases.

Carrier Battle

This One Between Congress, Navy

Old admirals never die. They just fight for new U.S. nuclear-powered aircraft carriers, and usually win.

Such a battle is going on in congress now over whether the Navy will get a third atomicpowered Nimitz-class flattop (CVN-70). Some members of Congress want to scrap the project on grounds it is too costly and that the time of the supercarrier, like that of the battleship, has

The Navy argues, however, that it must have the new carrier to meet the threat of the constantly growing Soviet sea force. So far the admirals are winning. Before it adjourned the House overwhelmingly rejected an attempt to chop \$657 million earmarked for carrier work from the fiscal 1974 weapons authorization bill.

The Senate can be expected to follow suit when Congress returns from a summer recess in September. But the anticarrier forces still have one remaining hole card. Authorization bills must be followed by appropriation legislation before the money actually is there to spend.

Carrier foes like Reps. Jonathan Bingham, D-N.Y., and Patricia Schroeder, D-Colo., expect to stage a new fight over the Nimitz project when the military appropriations bill hits the House floor later this year. Should Congress agree to eliminate the \$657 million for carrier work, the action in effect would kill the project, at a time when the Navy says it is vital to the modernization of America's naval air arm.

What are the issues in this battle between the admirals and Members of Congress For Peace Through Law, a 6-year-old bipartisan organization of House and Senate members?

CUBANS STILL SUFFER

Historically, the people of Cuba never really have had an easy time of it. They have been victims of the slave trade. They have suffered from piracy. They have endured Spanish colonialism and even American militarism in the 19th Century.

All of that was supposed to change when Fidel Castro emerged from the Sierra Maestra nearly 20 years ago and marched to Havana to overthrow the Batista regime.

On July 26 the people of Cuba flocked to Santiago to note the anniversary of the revolutionary movement. The centerpiece was a 52-foot-high floodlit statue of Fidel Castro which depicts how he is supposed to have looked when it all began in 1953.



Guerrilla Warfare In L. America

BOGOTA - Is guerrilla warfare finsihed in Latin America?

The view from the mountain certainly looks that way. Ever since Ernesto (Che) Guevara was killed trying to start "another Vietnam" in Bolivia in 1967, rural guerrilla warfare has been on the decline in Latin America.

While a few diehards still operate out of isolated rain forests in Colombia and Venezuela, most Latin Marxists now are convinced that it is impossible to seize power from a rural base. The conservative, illiterate and suspicious peasant simply does not provide the sort of support needed to carry a revolution from the farm to the city. But what about the urban worker'

City-bred and more combative than the peasant, the Latin American worker has always seemed a more likely candidate for a classic Marxist revolution. As a former Bolivian guerrilla points out, "It is almost impossible for a revolution to succeed today without the support of the urban population."

The nasty terrorist campaigns in Argentina and Mexico tend to support the theory that urban guerrilla warfare can wreak more damage and enfure much longer than mountainbased sedition. On the other hand, the rise and decline of Latin America's most famous urban terrorists, Uruguay's

Tupamaros, pose the question of whether worker-oriented revolutions are any more successful than peasant uprisings in Latin America.

Founded in 1960 by a dissident Socialist called Raul Sendic, the Tupamaros started from a rural base with landiess sugarcane cutters.

By 1963, however, the expanding movement had shifted emphasis from the countryside to the cities because 70 per cent of Uruguay's population is concentrated in urban areas. The Tupamaros achieved a spectacular record, kidnaping diplomats and prominent businessmen, robbing

banks and casinos and publicizing some of the most glaring cases of corruption in the civilian government. After 115 Tupainaros tunneled their way out of the country's maximum security prison, many Uruguayans were convinced that nothing could stop them. Since 1971, however, when the terrorists reached the peak of their power, the Tupamaros have undergone a steady decline. Armed with state of siege powers pranted by the

Uruguayan congress, the armed forces have imprisoned or killed most of the Tupamaro leadership and dismantled the terrorists' network of "people's jails" and supply depots. Uruguay has paid a high price for the terrorists' defeas the once fiercely democratic country now is governed by quasi-military dictatorship. Nevertheless, it is uestionab. whether the Tupamaro revolution would have succeeded even had the military been limited to its former secondary

City of Altamonte Springs comptroller Dick Baxter will soon determine whether his hunch is correct that the city needs an updated management system.

Baxter convinced council Tuesday the current system is under definite strain, and council approved contracting Price, Waterhouse and Co. to conduct a management study at a cost not to exceed \$19,750, and to come from the 1973-74

The purpose of the study will be to determine whether a move away from manual systems to computorized data processing is in order. More significantly, a thorough study will belp council avoid costly mistakes, if they decide to institute a new

management system. Some cities which changed their systems found costs far exceeded expectation, and efficiency was considerably lower than anticipated. The Price, Waterhouse study is expected to indicate whether changes are necessary, and if so, whether they can

"We don't promise Utopia," said a Price, Waterhouse representative, "But we'll give you a good, workable Baxter said the firm will first conduct a management information study of paper work flow; legal requirements

They will then audit management techniques to see how well department heads are planning, organizing, executing and controlling the various functions of city government. "If we go through this second proceedure, we can assure our-

selves whether we're doing a good job," said Baxter. Altamonte Springs' phenomenal growth is straining the current system to the utmost limit. The complexity of dealing with state and federal programs is also growing daily. Baxter said there are many worthwhile state and federal programs; the city should be properly equipped to

"There is a need for a uniform management system throughout the state. Two-thirds of our finances comes from revenue sharing money. If our accounting system is efficient we may be better off getting federal funds," said Baxter.

A classic cost accounting problem will arise in 15 months' time when Altamonte starts treating sewerage for Longwood and Eatonville. Sewer and water costs, presently accounted together, will have to be separated. "We could do this manually," admitted Baxter, "But I wonder if it's wise, considering the extra personnel we'll have to hire. Overall I don't think a new system will add to the city's costs; we may even make a profit. I believe the study will be the greatest thing that can be done for the city in the management area.

The biggest consideration is: will we be using the taxpayers' money efficiently?" Nice to know that's being considered.







POLLY'S POINTERS Models Don't Come In Larger Sizes

DEAR POLLY - My Pet Peeve is that most clothes shown on dummy figures or pictured in magazines and advertisements are always on a slim (sizes not more than 10 or 12) model. How can we larger women (I am a 20 and onehalf) know how a certain garment will look on a fuller figure? Thanks for letting my pot boil over. - CAROL

Polly's Problem DEAR POLLY - I hope someone can tell me how to clean a white vinyl porch awning. Ours is sloping, all in one piece and has ridges running from top to bottom. Dirt collects in the ridges and hosing will not dis-

DEAR POLLY - and Virginia who wanted to know how to make square pillows with pompoms on top - Make a wood frame (two-inch strips) that is the size you want the pillow to be. Drive finishing nails, about two inches apart, all around the square. Wind a dark-colored yarn from one nail to the one opposite all the way across one way and then do the same thing going across the other way, which will form squares. Repeat this at least six times and then, with lightr-colored wool, repeat the same procedure at least twenty times or even more. Tie where threads cross and then clip the lighter-colored thread shaping it into pompoms. This leaves the dark part as a base to be sewn over the top of the pillow. - GAYLE

DEAR GIRLS - Ann from Canada has a few extra suggestions. Be sure to have a nail at each corner and that the nails on each side he an odd number. When starting and ending the work be sure to tie wool to the nails so work does not ravel. When tieing the places where the wool crosses (to make the pompoms) tie securely and with the knots on the back. Trim if necessary for balls to have a really round look. Curiosity finally got the better of me. So when Lew asked me which movie I'd like to see, I replied casually, "How" about 'Deep Throat'?"

This was my first pornographic film and I was embarrassed and shocked, repulsed and fascinated. It seemed like such a private experience to share with total strangers. Instead of creating a human bond as great film and theater can, it makes one want to slink out of the theater, avoiding the eyes of fellow voveurs.

Films like Deep Throat make one wonder where this society is headed. Are we on a continuum of disintegrating morals that leads from Jonathan Edwards and the Puritan forefathers at one end straight to the Marquis de Sade at the other? Particularly we wonder if liberalized sexual attitudes are going to do in the family altogether.

Dr. Clark E. Vincent, writing in Medical Aspects of Human Sexuality is more concerned about the swing to the exact opposite of permissiveness and less about a continuing increase in permissiveness.

'Individuals who were very liberal in their sexual attitudes at college age tend to develop far more conservative attitudes when they become parents of teen-agers." (Fathers of daughters who have contemplated building moats around their homes to keep out scruffy, sneakered suitors will understand this reaction).

The current exhortations to swing, develop affairs, choose films with nudity and explicit sex scenes may prove an unbearable strain on a marriage where one partner is liberal and the other conservative in sexual attitudes.

But liberal sex attitudes may also have a salutary effect on marriage, possibly increasing its longevity. Dr. Vincent cites three reasons for his optimistic conclusions:

1. With the freedom to "live together" young people are

marrying at an older age and thereby avoiding the high divorce rate of very young marriages.

2. Couples with a wider range of sexual experience may be less likely to misinterpret sexual attraction as enduring love, and thereby less apt to rush into marriage on the basis of

3. Few couples with liberalized sexual attitudes (as compared with couples having very conservative sexual attitudes) will seek a divorce as a reaction to an extra-marital

Change itself, even in the sensitive area of sexual attitudes, is not as dangerous to marriage or the society as what Dr. Vincent calls the "tyranny of the new." If we truly favor a pluralistic society with many different life styles, states-Vincent, "there should be as much respect for the old as for the new, as much dignity accorded traditional sex attitudes as is granted very liberal sex attitudes."

CHICAGO - (NEA) Two black men had been convicted. possibly unjustly, of the rape and armed robbery of a white nun. None now were in this small, staid Cook County Appeals courtroom before these three bleak and black-robed

The convicted were behind bars serving 25 to 35 years each. But they were ably - powerfully - represented here by Ian Levin, a public defender for the indigent in Cook County criminal matters, whom I vividly remember used to slide - slide! - into the second base manhole cover in longago games of street stickball. (In those days, lan's claim to decorum was, "At least I don't slide headfirst," Sustained,

lan is my first cousin and has been my closest friend for nearly as far back as we can remember. We are in our early 30s. I now listened to him in well-reasoned but passionate argument. He had discovered possible evidence which he felt the state had suppressed in the jury trial. This was the last chance for those black men.

I noticed Ian's broad back, and his red hair darker than in youth; I smiled at his staunch nose and full red mustache as he turned a little into view to make a point. And, as he stood there before the court. I looked at his still-funny concave left leg, a remnant from high school basketball injuries, as he And I found myself in a crisis of my personal worth. I am a sportswriter. He was dealing with the most monu-

mental and noble of issues, a man's freedom. I wondered if I had proceeded so little from those grime and game-filled days, days of laughter but also of pettiness and fights. (We once had a serious brawl in a passageway which ended quickly because I had a bad shoulder and be cause lan was winning.)

I do write about people involved in games that children play. Must I then be stunted? Legal jargon and the citing of past cases thickened the air in this small courtroom.

I recalled that I once wanted to be like Clarence Darrow. a great lawyer for the defense and, like Ian and me, a Chicagoan. But some quirk of Fate led me to writing. In college I would lie awake nights searching for a more precise word, a juicier word than the one I had used in a certain sentence in ny article in that day's school paper.

Somewhat before that I came under the magical influence of Red Smith, whose sports columns knocked me out. He made me laugh or brought me near tears, depending on the occasion. Regardless, the one emotion I always gained from his perceptions and his prose was joy.

Cost Of Justice May Soon Soar



Extra \$1 Million Possible

A New Orleans Federal District Court ruling is expected to cost taxpayers more than \$1 million for additional personnel to immediately beef up Seminole County's criminal

This doesn't count more office and courtroom space that will be needed and worried law enforcement officials are urging State Atty. General Robert Shevin to appeal the ederal court ruling to the U.S. Supreme Court seeking a

The ruling affects courts throughout Florida and is expected to have far-reaching ramifications in Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi, Tennessee, Arkansas and Texas. The Federal District Court has upheld a Miami Federal Court ruling that prisoners must be given a preliminary

was probable cause for their arrests. Local judges say they will try to give a prisoner a hearing within 24 hours of his arrest.

Florida state judges have consistently held that no such hearing was required where the prosecuting attorney filed and "information" certifying cause for arrest. Thus, throughout the state preliminary hearings before committing magistrates have been scheduled but then canceled

when prosecutors filed informations before the preliminary

hearing time. Seminole County Court judges Harold Johnson and Wallace Hall said Friday they will begin Monday holding

preliminary hearings the day after arrest for persons charged with misdemeanors, except traffic charges. Johnson said "first appearances" in county court will continue daily at 9 a.m. and preliminary hearings for persons arrested for criminal misdemeanors on Saturdays and Sundays will be held on Mondays. Preliminary hearings for persons accused of felonies will continue to be held on

Tuesdays and Fridays. Struck down Wednesday by the New Orleans panel was a section of the Florida Amended Rules of Criminal Procedure which authorized preliminary hearings only on a felony charge. The federal appeals court said the plight of persons accused of misdemeanors (punishable by a year or less in jail) incarcerated without a hearing is just as serious as that of accused felons.


