










Vatican sources said the Pope urged the release of political prisoners of all creeds now held in jail in South Vietnam and inquired about peace conditions in the area.

Catholic groups, including many priests, had sent a letter to the Pope asking him to avoid meeting Thieu to keep the Church "clean from the contamination of a cruel dictator." The Vatican replied that Pope Paul welcomed a chance to plead for the political leader.

The Pope received the chief of the North Vietnamese delegation, Xuan

Thuy, in February. Shortly before Thieu's helicopter touched down in the Vatican gardens. dozens of high school youths marched down Via Della Conciliazione toward St. Peter's shaking clenched fists and carrying posters that read "Down with Thieu" and "Thieu assassin."

A brief fight broke out when they tried to cross through hundreds of police who, with clubs and tear gas were cordoning off the square.

## Agnew's Chances For Top Job Are Slim Dim POW Accounts

The odds are against Vice President Spiro T. Agnew ever becoming president. Aside from the matter of capability, which seldom has had much to do with selection of a candidate for our highest office, this is rather too bad.

But, it is a truth historically, politically, personally and perhaps practically-all despite Agnew's unswerving loyalty (so far) to Richard Nixon and to the Republican Party. It is an even more bitter pill for him to swallow considering that the apparent favorite among the White House would-be kingmakers is the likely political turncoat, Democrat John Connally of Texas.

The odds that Agnew must overcome include

1. History. Not since 1836, in the election of Martin Van Buren, has a vice president moved from that office by election directly into the presidency.

2. Political. For a vice president to succeed in election to the presidency he must have the full support of the outgoing president. Humphrey got very little help from retiring President Lyndon B. Johnson - and lost. The Nixon people often have blamed the lukewarm support of outgoing President Dwight Eisenhower for their man's defeat at the hnads of young John F. Kennedy. Now, reports are frequent that Agnew is on the White House "gray," if not the black

3. Personal. Agnew comes out in small group semi-private discussions much better than he does in his public speeches denouncing certain newsmen, newspapers, Vietnam deserters and others who plague the administration.

4. Practical. With Mr. Nixon thinking so highly of Connally (the President once said Connally was capable of filling any job in the world-despite the Texan's launching of the

Of the 10 listed on the bureau's current list of most sought after fugitives, seven are openly described as active in some type of political activity counter to the best interests of

the United States. Three of the seven are women, an all-time high for the bureau's "ten most wanted"



## Gray Brought End Unto Himself

WASHINGTON (AP) - A key Senate supporter of L. Patrick Gray III was sitting at his desk on March 15 when an aide brought in a report from President Nixon's news con-

The senator read through the account, looked up, and said: "That's the end of Gray."

The President had said that the furnishing of raw FBI files to all members of congressional committees must stop, and had reiterated that he would not allow his White House lawyer, John W. Dean III, to be called for questioning by Both of these presidential decisions, which Gray later

testified he accepted without question, were major factors in the sequence of events that led to the withdrawal Thursday night of his nomination to succeed the late J. Edgar Hoover as director of the FBI. Some senators say the decisions doomed Gray's chances of

being confirmed by the Senate. Others say Gray contributed to his own downfall by insisting on quarterbacking his fight for confirmation and rejecting offers of help.

A couple of days before the Senate Judiciary Committee opened its hearings on Feb. 28, sources reported, Gray told a Justice Department meeting that he was going to handle the nomination himself. In what was described as a heated discussion, he said he didn't want the White House or the Justice Department meddling with it.

Gray later testified at the committee hearings that he had rejected offers by others to lobby with senators on his behalf. He said he felt he had to sit in "this pit," as he called the witness chair, and try to persuade senators on his own that they

should vote for him. He spent nine days in the "pit". And his chances for confirmation, seemingly good at the start, steadily slipped as his nomination became entangled with the controversy over last year's bugging of Democratic headquarters in the Watergate

Gray had the misfortune to take over as acting director of the FBI last May 3, a few weeks before the Watergate arrests, and as a presidential election campaign was war-

His handling of the FBI's investigation of the politically explosive Watergate case became a major issue and, to a lesser extent, so did the question of whether the many speeches he made around the country were designed to help Nixon's re-

Gray testified he had ordered an all-out Watergate investigation, but he acknowledged he had supplied Dean with 82 of 186 FBI investigative reports in the case. He said he did so at the request of Dean, the White House counsel, who was conducting a separate inquiry for Nixon or whether any

presidential aide was implicated. At one point in the hearings, Gray said Dean "probably lied" when he told FBI agents he was not sure whether one of the Watergate wiretappers had had an office in the White

Wounded Knee Histrionics

### Indians Cannot Turn Back Time

America who are concerned with justice and fair play can sympathize with the bedrock complaints of

responsible American Indians. National apathy over the years, failure of bureaucracies and a suffocating federal paternalism have combined to result in harsh treatment of the early Americans. As a result we do consider the implications of the histrionics at Wounded Knee, S. D.

At the outset, we are forced to conclude that the principal intellectual thrust by the Indian antaxonists at Wounded Knee is unacceptable. Reduced to its least denominator it is that we should turn the hands of the national clock back to the 19th Century and "give" Indians back their land. It is a flawed concept, quite apart from the fact that a duly elected Oglala Sioux ministering Wounded Knee and thousands of other acres of the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation.

It is flawed philosophically because the largest single failure in achieving equity for American Indians has been the reservation system which segregates them from Mainstream, U.S.A. Expanding the reservation geographically, say to include all of South Dakota, would not help the Indians very much or for very king if the rest of the faulty

system stayed the same. The concept also is flawed in terms of equity because if land is to be "returned" to its original owners, we should follow the thread of ownership back to the beginning. The Sioux are, after all, mere tourists in South Dakota on the anthropological scale. They were

from Wisconsin and Minnesota several centuries ago by the Chippewa, in turn displacing the

The truth is that some 25,000 years ago Indians began migrating to what is now the United States of America in three or more successive waves from the Asian land mass, This immigration now is represented by more than 100 tribes - seven among the Lakota Sioux themselves - and by more than 60 linguistic stocks.

Unintentionally, Washington Irving once described how the Sioux gained their eminence in their own culture during the last century when he said: "A man who bestrides a horse must be essentially different from the man who cowers in a

## Atrocities by VC

What is amazing is that so many are surprised by the tortures inflicted on American prisoners of war by the

North Vietnamese and Viet Cong. Yet perhaps that surprise is not so strange after all. For some reason news reports have, by and large, underplayed the systematic atrocities in this war committed by the VC and the troops from Hanoi, except for major sensations as the mass murders and burials alive, as at Hue. This reporter has looked over hundreds of photographs of the most horrible Communist atrocities, many with messages from the VC attached. He has seen few in print

Associates who have lived in contested territories blanch at what they have seen. The atrocities are made no less horrible by the knowledge that torture is as common throughout Southeast Asia as in Europe in the Middle

There is the small girl, about four, who came walking home one day with both hands cut off and a sign around her neck warning her father, a hamlet chief, and his assoiates they could expect more of this if they persisted in

pposing the Viet Cong. There are the children of one village in the Mekong Delta who, friends of mine discovered with horror, had their fingers cut off to the stubs because their parents would not permit them to attend a Communist school. The grotesque nature of these atrocities is that they were committed as a part of policy directed at political aims-selective killings and tortures aimed at achieving certain goals. They were not people accidentally killed in

products, is the No. 1 public concern at this time. Housewives are finding it difficult, if not impossible, to stay within food budgets. Everyone says: "Something has to be done." But overnight solutions aren't in sight.

Certainly, a food price ceiling or farm price controls aren't valid answers to the problems of higher costs at the supermarket. Cat'lemen point out-and rightly too-that their costs have soared. Soybeans (used as livestock feed) have doubled in cost in the last year. Farmers are bitter about the meat boycott, saying that people don't boycott manufactured goods because unions have won huge wage

As for the ceiling on meat prices, the effect of that may be to cause cattlemen to hold their animals off the market. It is unfortunate that many Americans don't understand the absurdity of applying price controls at one level of the food production and distribution system and leaving the other levels uncontrolled. And the American people aren't about to accept overall controls, which means a food rationing system. Even in the midst of World War II - a war with massive popular support, food rationing and price controls weren't really accepted.

The true need is to increase the supply of food reaching the marketplace. When supply exceeds demand, prices will fall. But the United States still has absurd 1930s-era farm legislation on the books, legislation which is aimed at restricting food production. The entire farm subsidy program which costs \$5 billion a year should have been system. Perhaps the upsurge of prices will cause the restrictive and financially burdensome subsidy system to be abolished. For the moment, however, politicians are busy demanding price controls while they ignore the root question


America's sale of vast quantities of wheat to the Soviet Union is having bad effects all around. Independent wholesale bakers are especially hard hit. The general manager of such a baking concern recently wrote to me,

"The U.S. government has caused the price of wheat and of flour to rise. The impact upon the baker of this increased cost has been direct, immediate, and substantial. It is becoming more so. At the same time, the government, under Phase III, makes it impossible for the baker to pass along this added cost. In effect, it says: 'For the good of the country, you, Mr. Baker, must pay for flour; for the good of the country, your particular industry must carry the burden.' Responsible government officials should have anticipated this situation last June and July when they negotiated with the Russians and they should have taken steps to prevent it. The government should not force a single industry to sustain the cost of a policy which may be in the interest of the people as a whole."

What the independent bakers are concerned about is the 75 cents a bushel "tax" paid for wheat converted into flour under the Wheat Certificate Program of the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture. This levy on wheat is but one of innumerable examples of legislative interference with agricultural supply and demand. It is a prop for wheat growers which threatens the economic survival of other groups of Americans and adds unnecessarily to the cost of a basic food.

The Congress is at work on an Omnibus Farm Bill. It is imperative that Congress scrap farm legislation derived from conditions of 40 years ago, including the wheat tax, and once again give farmers and consumers the benefit of a free,

Only when subsidies and controls are removed from U.S. agriculture will the pressure on food prices cease to be serious. A substantial gain in farm productivity is the practical way to normalize food prices.



Alfred Hanover was one of the few horses to hit the two minute mark while Artie Hanover's best time was 2:03. Later in the 1060's Cliff moved to New York State and in 1966 was the leading driver at Monticello, N.Y. And although he is scheduled to race in New York within the next two





## Wounded Knee Hearings Open

WASHINGTON (AP) - Congressional hearings on the Wounded Knee affair open today. Militant Indians refused over the weekend to surrender their arms and peace talks were broken off between protest leaders and

The House Indian affairs subcommittee has scheduled three days of hearings on the seizure of the historic South Dakota reservation village by members of the American Indian Movement


(AIM). Hearings also will cover occupation of the Bureau of Indian affairs building in Washington last year.

Russell Means, leader of the Wounded Knee group, was to be the main witness today. Rep. Lloyd Meeds, D-Wash., chairman of the panel, said the hearings will be the prelude to a lengthy investigation of the relationship between Indians and the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

Means arrived Friday for what was scheduled to be a negotiating session with Leonard Garment, special consultant to the President. But telephoned Wounded Knee to tell his followers to lay down their arms. Means refused.

The government contends that under an agreement reached at Wounded Knee last Thursday, Means was to have made the call once his meeting with Garment began. Means said no such agreement was reached.

A six-point agreement negotiated by the Justice Department with Means and others was supposed to have cleared the way for disar-

## Israel Pierces Heart Of Lebanon

Associated Press Writer

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - Israeli commandos invaded the heart of the Lebanese capital early today, killing three Palestinian guerrilla leaders in their apartments and attacking refugee camps.

It was thought at first that the raid was in retaliation for Arab attacks Monday in Cyprus on the residence of the Israeli ambassador and an Israeli airliner. But an authoritative Lebanese source said there were indications that preparations had been made by an advance

Al Fatah, the biggest Palestinian guerrilla organization, said the victims included its No. 2 man, Mohammed Yussef Najjar, known as Abu Yussef. He was one of the founders of Al Fatah. The Lebanese Defense Ministry said 11 persons were killed and more than a dozen wounded in the strike that began shortly after midnight.

The Israeli military command said the raiders' only casualties were four wounded. Another group of Israeli commandos blew up a




