Wallace For Senator

Will Henry Wallace run for senator in New York? Rumors, chiefly Republican, say that he will. The G. O. P. prophets obviously hope for a repetition of last year's national election in New York, when Wallace's half million votes were enough to nose President Truman out and give the state to Dewey.

Michigan and Maryland were the other states in which Wallace was able to accomplish the feat of winning states for Dewey. He thus brought down the President's electoral vote from 375 to 303, raising the Dewey total from 117 to 193.

Whether Wallace would run better, or as well, in a special senatorial election may be doubted. The poor showing of the Progressive Party in the nation generally has rather cooled off his supporters. The party organization is inactive in some places, certainly with a candidate less well known than Wallace, its showing presumably would be impressive.

In some ways Wallace would be an interesting and exciting senator. He would have a platform from which to expound his views and he would have to listen to criticism. But old political hands think the chances are that New York's next senator, whether Democrat or Republican, will be more orthodox than Wallace.

Rev. Kircher Is Injured In Grade Crossing Accident

On their way to Altamonte Springs on a fund raising campaign for Stafford Memorial Church in Volusia county, Mr. Kircher, as a precaution had stopped at the railroad crossing, but hearing the train and judging that he had stopped too near the track, he attempted to back the car, which instead jumped ahead, stalled and would not start. He then jumped out and tried to get Kenny out of the automobile.

X-rays of Mr. Kircher's shoulder were taken yesterday afternoon at Fernald-Laughton Memorial Hospital. He was attended by Dr. Leonard Munson, who stated that he did not believe the injury to be serious.

"I just think it is inexcusable," the Wisconsin Senator declared, adding that it should create a "big market for deep freezers."

McCarthy's reference was to the committee's disclosure that officials of the Albert J. Varley Perfume Co., Chicago, gave Vaughan seven home freezers for himself and friends in 1945.

One of the freezers was turned over to Mrs. Truman for the little White House in Independence, Mo.

Later, McCarthy spoke out against Vaughan's retention at a meeting of the Senate investigations subcommittee.

He reported that he thinks Mr. Truman's effect is saying to all government employees that "what Mr. Vaughan has done is perfectly proper and go on and do likewise."

Then he added he was in McGranary's office, and that while he was there Vaughan telephoned McGranary "asking some interesting questions."

McGranary, Pearson continued, told him about it. Pearson added: "McGranary made the statement he was darned if he was going to stand for any political influence in the case."

Pearson said that in November or December of 1946, "rumors cropped up in Louisiana that large contributions had been made in the Kansas city primaries in order to prevent a conviction in the Burton case."

Pearson had asked the committee to hear him. He said he wanted to deny that he promoted an FBI investigation of a report that Vaughan had accepted a bribe in an ethics question.

Vaughan about the FBI investigation yesterday. He told them it was initiated by a member of the press, but did not name Pearson as the man.

Later, Col. C. J. Mara, assistant to Vaughan, said that at the time the investigation was launched, Pearson was conducting a "vicious campaign" against Vaughan. Mara also testified that the FBI "completely exonerated" Vaughan.

Pearson said the Kansas City primaries resulted in a Department of Justice investigation of alleged irregularities. He asked the FBI, Pearson said, "if their investigation of the alleged Kansas City irregularities also included campaign contributions which reportedly had been given to General Vaughan."

He himself, the columnist told the committee, had learned of one contribution which had not been reported as required by law.

Three or four weeks later, Pearson went on, he had a call from Edward Tamm, then assistant director of the FBI, telling him the FBI was investigating.

"That was my first knowledge they were investigating General Vaughan," Pearson said. "I got the impression from Mr. Tamm that the investigation was probably for the protection of the White House."

About this time, Pearson testified, he heard talk of the Burton affair as the "third Louisiana purchase."

At this point, Pearson observed that Army regulations forbid officers and military personnel from accepting campaign contributions for engaging in politics.

"At any rate," he resumed, "the FBI did investigate, and it may be true as testified yesterday that the emphasis was placed on the question of a bribe. I know there was no great emphasis on campaign contributions."

No details were brought out about the contribution Pearson said he knew was made but not reported.

Mr. Truman said some oil companies which he did not name are trying to block negotiations for an American oil loan to Mexico.

He predicted the negotiations, in which he and the President of Mexico have taken a part, will end successfully.

In response to a question he said the oil interests of Edwin W. Pauley, former Democratic national committee officer, have no connection with the current negotiations.

Mr. Truman said he is pleased over the decision of former Governor Herbert Lehman to run for the Senate from New York. He said he wrote Lehman a week ago expressing the hope he would run in the November special election.

Asked whether he would recommend an extension of the troop in the steel dispute, he said it is not up to him yet.

The election of a new command was the main item of business on the last day of the four-day convention. Nominations were slated this morning with the vote probably this afternoon.

Four candidates all World War veterans are in the race for the \$15,000-a-year job now held by Perry Brown of Beaumont, Tex., headed by World War two veterans. The Legion never before has been elected.

Other major resolutions approved by the convention today included:

- Calling on the Secretary of Labor to meet to restore the field staff of the veterans employment service to the former complement of 300.
- Urging that the government give special citations to firms "outstanding in the employment of physically handicapped veterans."
- Endorsing the veterans pension bill before the Senate and commended House members who supported the measure.
- Called for Congress to pass the Elliotts-Hodge bill to declare picketing of U. S. courts a criminal offense.
- The Legionnaires bowed down with a laudatory chorus of "Gods" a proposal by George Nicholas of Miami that the Legion to on record as opposing a federal bonus for World War two veterans at this time.
- Only a scattering of the veterans of World War two veterans at this proposal.
- The convention did not receive a formal resolution approving a federal bonus.
- The Legion also demanded that the United States "cancel as far as possible any further immigration at this time."
- The federal government should strictly adhere to the existing laws and quotas allowing immigration to the United States," the resolution said.
- Particularly, the U. S. should adhere to the laws now in force applying to displaced persons rather than place additional burden on the people of America.
- The Legion's Americanism Committee also won convention backing of a resolution under which even seminars would be set up at Birmingham, Ala., Indianapolis, Ind., New York and San Francisco to study Russian fifth column activities.
- Another provision asked that applicants for U. S. citizenship be required to answer to local agents for the U. S. whenever the necessity arises.

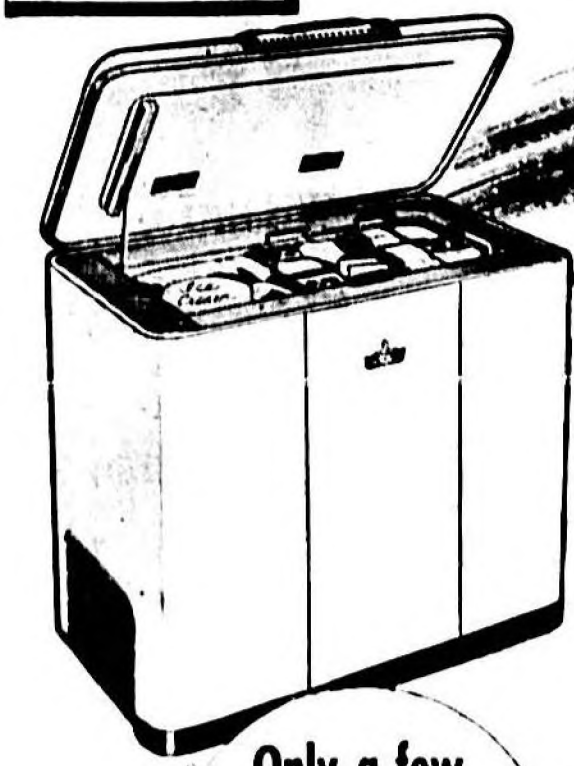

Slot Machine King May Get Quiz At Probe

Frank Costello, New York Gangster, Is Called Important 5 Percent Witness

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—(AP)—Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.) said today he will insist on a quiz of Frank Costello, New York, reputed "slot machine king," as called as a witness in the senate investigation of "five percenters."

"I think Costello is a very necessary and important witness," McCarthy told a reporter today.

McCarthy is a member of the Senate investigations subcommittee which has been digging into the question of whether there has been improper influence in letting of federal contracts. He has mentioned Costello's name several times during the hearings.

On one occasion, McCarthy asked Maj. General Harry H. Vaughan, president Truman's military aide, whether Vaughan got any campaign funds from Costello.

At that time, McCarthy called Costello "The Gangster."

Vaughan had testified that in 1948 he received "probably \$2,000 from John Maragon for use in the Missouri Democratic campaign. He said he was under the impression that Maragon, man-about-town, Washington, had received the money from others.

McCarthy wanted to know if any of it came from Costello. Vaughan said he had never heard of Costello and that he was sure none of the money came from him.

Later, McCarthy by questions linked Costello with Phil Kastel and William Hella as partners in a liquor firm. He pressed Vaughan as to any contacts with or campaign donations from them.

Vaughan said he knew nothing about any such liquor firm. He said he got \$2,000 or \$3,000 in contributions from Hella in 1948 but that he understood the money from Hella had come from the Democratic cause.

Hella is a New Orleans oil man and racing figure.

Today, McCarthy said he wants to ask Costello "boots" who are in the investigation but I can't disclose them now or it would foul things up."

The Senate hearings are in recess now, probably for about a month. Meantime, the staff and investigators are running down a number of tips and data that may be disclosed later at public sessions.

If Americans Would Buy British They Could Solve Dollar Crisis

NEW YORK, Sept. 1.—(AP)—The British dollar crisis could be solved if we would buy a lot more British goods. Then why don't we?

The simple fact is: You can't make an American buy a British product if he doesn't want to.

Very few persons buy a product in the spirit of doing good, or to use the international lingo, "helping to free world trade of its shackles." They buy because they like the product, like the price, or need it and can't get it anywhere else.

There are things which could be done about these points by the top British officials on their part here now to discuss their lack of dollars. And there are things which could be done by the Washington officials who will confer with them.

Taking the last reason first, there are some products which the British effectively control for which there is a good market here: natural rubber, tin, rice, fine wool, and Scotch whiskey. The British would like to see our tariffs lowered on these, and all other of their products saleable here. Neither the American wool industry nor the domestic liquor industry, nor any other American manufacturer who makes goods in competition with the British, is likely to champion the British idea.

As for tin, rubber, cocoa and wool, the British would like to have Washington committed to buy fixed quantities at fixed prices for several years. American consumers and taxpayers might be dubious about shackling themselves to such a deal.

Americans have been very vocal in recent months in their opinion of British products and prices. From highest official to lowliest backseat driver, they have told Britain what it should do.

First, it should learn more about American likes and dislikes, distributing, advertising and selling methods. Just how the resulting competition in our domestic market would set with American business men has generally been ignored.

Second, British prices must come down. Many Americans contend that the British machinery is out of date and factory methods hide-bound and inefficient. They think the output per manhour is much too low in England. They contend that the British nationalization program is wasteful and uneconomic. And the three combine to make British prices too high.

And some Americans contend that the British must cheapen their money in terms of ours. This would make British goods lower priced for us to buy with our dollars. However, it would also make just that much higher the price Britons must pay for American goods they must buy. And, since in July they bought four times as much from the United States as they sold here, the British contend they could only lose in the deal.

What are the things the British sell us? Our business slump has changed the pattern a little.

Last year United Kingdom exports to the United States found whiskey bringing the British most dollars—\$38 million. Tin, rubber and woolens were next with \$29 million; automobiles third with \$22 million; and woollens and worsteds fourth with \$19 million; and machinery and agricultural tractors fifth with \$12 million each.

This year, the April and May figures, latest available, show whiskey is still the number one dollar earner; but woollens and worsteds are now second; and machinery and linen piece goods tie for third; with raw materials down in fourth place. In every case, except linen, our imports of these British products are at a much lower annual rate than last year.

That is why the British are clamoring for us to lower our tariffs even more, to pledge to take sizeable amounts of their goods, and to give them more credit or dollars.

Many Americans reply that sooner or later the British must improve their methods, lower their production costs and meet changing world trade conditions. Those things—no matter how much we help them financially from time to time—are things, many say, which the British must do for themselves.

2 New School Awards Given P.M. Campbell

Contractor To Build High School And Midway Additions To Cost \$74,041.00

Contracts for construction of a Seminole High School physical education building, and for a six-room addition to the Midway School for colored pupils were yesterday awarded to P. M. Campbell at \$36,476 and \$38,565 respectively, by the School Board at its meeting yesterday. Elton J. Moughtin is architect for both projects.

Nearest to Mr. Campbell's bid on the high school building was that of Mann Construction Co., Orlando, which bid \$39,950 while Emerald Brown Co., Bradenton, bid \$40,010. The latter company bid \$42,005 on the Midway project, and the Mann Co. bid \$48,400.

The physical education building will be located 50 feet north of the High School auditorium, will be 88 feet wide and 62 feet deep with concrete floors, concrete block side walls, precast concrete roof joists and slabs. It should be completed by Christmas vacation, said Mr. Moughtin.

The building will contain boys' and girls' locker rooms, shower rooms, two offices and two first-aid rooms and a boiler room. Hot water from the boiler room will be used for both showers and heating. Shower rooms will be finished in colored tile.

Stucco matching the high school building will be applied on the outside. There will be four covered entrances. Each section of the building will be ventilated on four sides.

The six-room Midway addition will include an office toilet for pupils and teachers, and a reading room. The concrete floors will be covered with asphalt tile. Side walls will be of concrete block, and roof joists and slabs will be of precast concrete. The built up pitched slag roof is intended for 20 or more years of service.

A new style of school room design with windows on opposite sides will allow cross ventilation and better distribution of daylight.

Plans for the projects and plumbing have been approved by both the State Board of Education and State Board of Health.

Rutledge Nears Death In Maine; Goes Into Coma

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—(AP)—The death of the late Justice Robert H. Rutledge was reported today from a hospital in Portland, Maine.

"Everything has been and is being done for Justice Rutledge that could be done anywhere," said Dr. Geier.

The jurist entered the hospital last Saturday. He was stricken at Ogunquit seashore resort in recent years.

Patients in the little re-circulated 22-bed hospital spoke in the nearby town of Wells. The Rutledges have vacationed there in recent years.
