'God Bless Old Folks' Passe In Palm Beach

PALM BEACH (AP) — If you are over 65 and living on Social Security or a small pension, Palm Beach County doesn't want you any more, according to the local development board. The Palm Beach County Development Board said it will attempt to reduce the number of elderly persons moving into the county.

"God bless the old folks but I think we've got enough of them down here," said board member Howard Ferrina, 47. "I think we should make sure that we don't have a county of 600,000 dependents."

The county, which includes some of the most expensive real estate in Florida, already has an over-65 population of 60,000-plus, according to board members. Outgoing Executive Director Monty Murphy, 33, said literature is being prepared to show the high cost of living in Palm Beach County.

He told a board meeting the literature could be distributed to retirees interested in moving to the county, informing them that they would not be able to live here if their only income is Social Security and a pension.

"And another thing that bugs me is that banks around here give free checking to people over 65," Ferrina said. "I'm really concerned that we don't end up with a welfare state."

Joseph Stancliffe, a former board chairman, said today's retirees is "no longer staggering into Florida in a bused-down jumbo" but are usually "pretty well-heeled individuals" compared to what they used to be.

Seminole Fights Orange Effluent

Officials of General Waterworks and builders in the South Seminole area were forced to accede to the wishes of the County Commission at the continuation of the public hearing sessions of the regular agenda, despite the objections of those proponents of the Waterworks Company, an adamant Commission chairman Greg Drummond, and his board members insisted that some action had to be taken to keep Orange County efficient out of Seminole County.

Drummond charged that the company had over-extended itself in the beginning of its operation and is now unable to handle its responsibilities in the matter of sewage treatment and control.

The land removed from certification is at the present time undeveloped and is located along the northern boundaries of the tract originally certified.

Drummond reassured the low residents in the six blocks of property which make up the area involved in decertification that the action of the board will not result in any loss of service for them.

The subdivisions of Eastbrook, Casa Atoms, Winter Woods, Goldenrod and apartment complexes in the neighboring developments are within the area still serviced by General Waterworks.

'Mystery Man' Obtains Papers Is Swofford Facing Opposition?

A "mystery man" candidate has picked up qualifying papers to oppose Altamonte Springs Mayor Lawrence Swofford in the Dec. 7 municipal election, according to a city hall spokesman.

City Clerk Jane Richards said the young man did not give his name. The candidate said he plans to run for the office of mayor.

Swofford was the first candidate to qualify in Altamonte Springs some two weeks ago when the qualification period opened. Mrs. Helen Keyser, completing her first term on City Council, also is seeking re-election.

The other incumbent member of the board who is expected to vie for re-election is Keith Nixon although he had not as yet qualified this morning.

In Casselberry, Owen Shepherd, unsuccessful candidate for a seat on the City Council last year, filed qualifying documents with the city clerk Wednesday afternoon to bring the number of candidates in the contest for two Council seats there to four.

Other candidates are incumbents, Dr. Edith Duerr and Bill Grier and political newcomer, Dr. John Zacco. Running for the office of mayor are Curtis Blaw, incumbent; David McCoy and former Councilman Richard Wirtz.

Kenneth Brown, veteran of 2 1/2 years past service as Longwood's mayor, will file qualifying papers Friday morning to have his name placed on the ballot there in the Dec. 7 municipal election. He will oppose Mrs. June Lormann, widow of former Mayor A. R. Lormann.

Nine candidates have qualified to run for the three open seats on the Council currently held by Mrs. Sandra Thompson, B. L. Helms and E. E. Williamson.

The candidates include William Berman, senior member of the Council, James Brown, Donald Schreiber, Richard Crenshaw, Edward Cundiff, Theodore Maxwell, William Klosky, H. A. Scott and H. H. Haynie.

Former Councilman B. H. Ferrell also has picked up qualifying papers to run for the Council but has not as yet formally qualified.

Deadline for candidate qualification in the three cities is Friday.

Persons who have not as yet registered to vote in the municipal elections may do so until 5 p.m. Friday at the offices of County Supervisor Elections, Camilla Bruce in Seminole Plaza or at the Masonic Temple, across from the courthouse.

Airport Lease Is Approved

Sanford Airport Authority this morning approved a 25-year lease of 45,000 square feet of airport property to Jungle Laboratories to permit expansion of its facility by constructing a 16,000 square foot building.

Approval of the lease by the authority leads to the construction of the first structure on the City airport. J. S. Cleveland, airport director, said the lease will amount to two cents a square foot or \$900 a year.

Because of the reluctance of the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) to approve leases any longer than five years at a time, the lease will be drawn to allow for the initial lease plus four options of five years each. After 25 years, the structure will become the property of the airport, Cleveland said.

The airport director said he will consult with FAA officials in Miami and Atlanta to seek an exception to a reverter clause to enable the facility to be constructed. He estimated it will require two weeks for the exception to be granted.

Cleveland said Jungle Laboratories wants an additional option on other property in the area.

On a motion by Dr. Robert Rosenwald, the authority approved the property lease without opposition, along with the option reverter.

Regarding other airport leases the authority approved, leases included a portion of building 77 to an Orlando banking firm to store equipment at \$100 a month; remaining portion expected to be leased by insurance supplier at \$100 a month rent.

Drummond continued his objection, saying, "Most department heads run their offices in a realistic manner. This shows lack of fiscal responsibility."

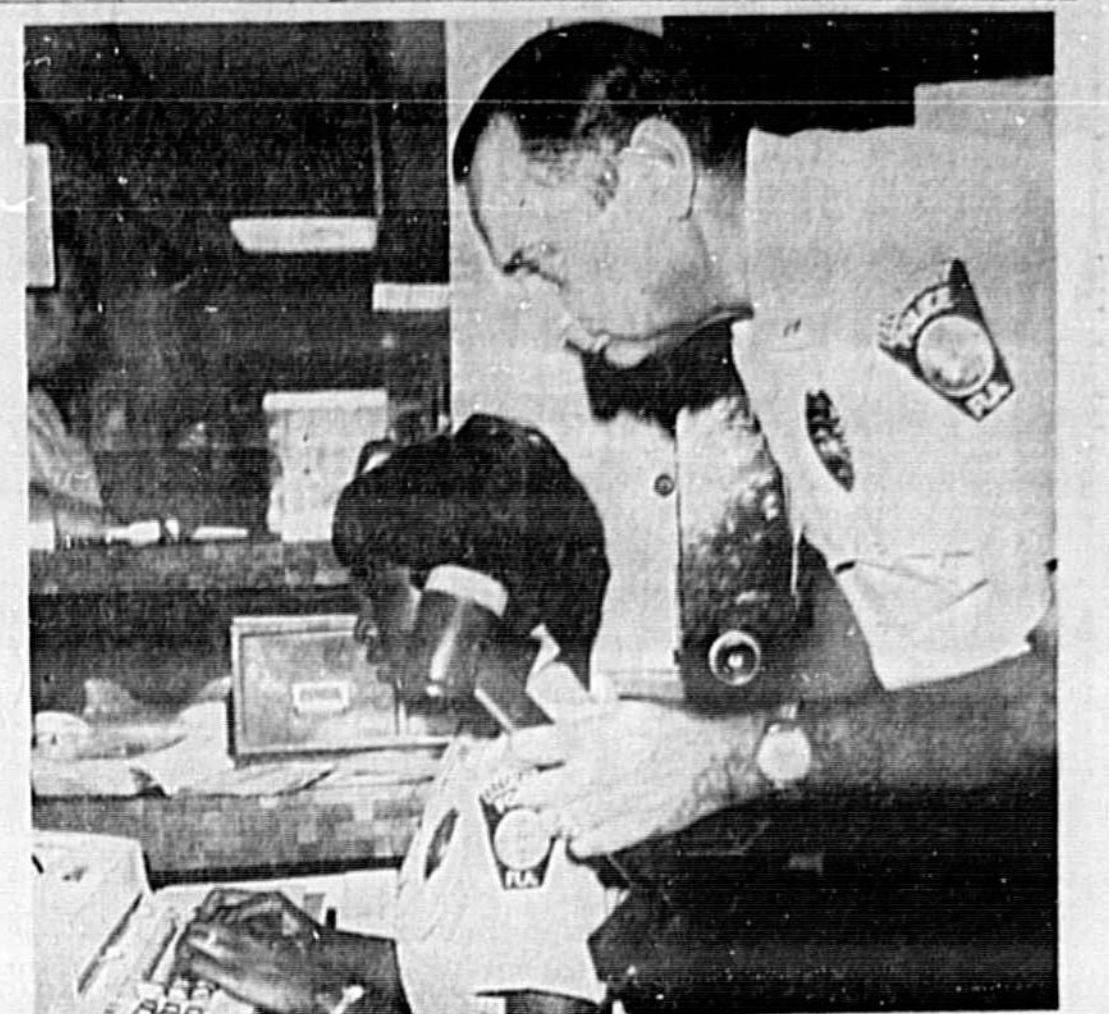
On motion of Vilhen to allow the extra hours with compensation, the motion carried with Ed Yarbrough and Drummond opposed.

New Chief Of Police Happy In His Post

CASSELBERRY — The hours are long, the job is demanding, but it is both interesting and challenging and the city's police chief of five months, George Karcher, is enjoying every minute of it.

Victor of 20 years service with the New York police department, Karcher said the "intense relationship with the men of the force is rewarding and so different from a huge department like New York City."

"There are similarities in administration and men are men no matter where you go," Karcher said, "but here there is a greater degree of face-to-face communication than with a large department."

The Casselberry police department is expanding at a fairly steady pace, the chief pointed out. With the new budget, two new patrolmen and two shift sergeants will be added to the ranks, permitting rotating shifts and reduction of weekly hours from 48 to 42.

The men will receive the same pay as for the 48-hour week with the addition of a three percent cost of living allowance. In addition state retirement for the men is to go into effect with the new budget year.

Recruiting of new patrolmen is somewhat a problem, he said, despite the securities of civil service which the department now has. He noted the civil service board recently closed applications for sergeants positions with eight persons applying.

However, five of the applicants are members of the department currently and if one is accepted which seems likely a new vacancy for patrolman will be seen in addition to the two new budgeted positions.

Karcher said there is a "fine spirit of cooperation among the police departments of the CALNO cities." He said the departments have been co-operating on small matters of sharing equipment for some months and this is "very heartening."

Some things have changed since Karcher took office. He said the jail is now used almost as a holding facility, mostly for drunk drivers and not as a correctional facility.

"We have had a successful experiment with our new radar and hope it has contributed to the traffic safety of the community," the chief said.

Karcher and his wife, Marjorie, and daughter, Valerie, still make their home in Brookfield, N. Y.

Their son, Tom, and daughter-in-law, Lynn, stationed with the Navy at Jacksonville, have one son, Travis, 16 months old.

County Bows To Salfi Judge Wins Aide Fight

During district commissioner reports at the County Commission meeting, John Kimbrough, requested the matter of the request by Judge Dominic Salfi for an increase for his secretary from 37 1/2 hours to 40 hours per week.

Marine Labs Rescued

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Bob Ingle, Florida's marine research chief, says \$10,000 in transferred funds will help him out financially during the year-end shut-down of his agency. Ingle, director of the Marine Science and Technology Division of the Department of Natural Resources, said the new money is part of a budget for other divisions and projects. It should keep his unit afloat at least until the end of the fiscal year in June, he said. "Then the Legislature will just have to find some other way of funding us," said Ingle. The emergency funds were sought after the division virtually ran out of money in the middle of the budget year. Three field laboratories were shut, five researchers laid off, and the possibility of closing the main St. Petersburg research lab discussed. Ed Joyce, director of the St. Petersburg lab, at one point estimated it might require shutting down the entire operation by the end of December. Ingle Wednesday said the main lab would be kept open if at all possible, but said field labs in Crystal River, Fort Walton Beach and Key West would remain closed. "We're not planning to close any more field labs," said Ingle. "We let our other employees go now that we've received the extra funds."

Other Cases On Docket Morals Trial Set Monday

A child assault case is among the 10 which are docketed for trial Monday before Circuit Judge Richard Moulder. Also included are two other cases which have figured prominently in the news in recent months. Clifford Milliken Jr., faces charges of lewd, lascivious and indecent assault on a girl. The 45-year-old Sanford man is alleged to have assaulted the seven-year-old girl on June 24. Authorities said at the time that Milliken was hospitalized the night of June 24. The parents of the girl didn't press charges until his later release from the hospital. Also facing trial are Essie James Hill, Charlie Chukes and Joseph Harris, charged with two counts of robbery and aggravated assault. The trio allegedly assaulted a 70-year-old Genoa man, the father of Deputy Sheriff Roy Hughey. They were the object of a massive dragnet by Sheriff's deputies, who utilized dogs, a helicopter and large posse in a cordoned area adjacent to SH 46 east, following occurrence of the incident on Aug. 16. Hill was captured at the scene and the others were arrested a few days later. All are residents of Orlando. The trio is alleged to have stolen from the elder Hughey \$18, a hearing aid and a .22 caliber pistol. They are alleged to have stolen goods in the amount of more than \$100 from Ralph Bulger. Zane Clark, charged in a myriad of crimes, faces trial on two charges next week. These include assault with intent to commit a felony and sale and possession of a narcotic. Others docketed for trial include Johnny Bush, charged with two counts of sale and possession of a narcotic; Edward Dreger, charged with breaking and entering with intent to commit petty larceny; Roger Mason, charged with breaking and entering with intent to commit petty larceny; David Miller, charged with breaking and entering with intent to commit petty larceny; and James Cochran, charged with larceny of an automobile.

Master Airport Plan Will Cost \$45,000

Sanford Airport Authority today heard a Cleveland airport manager, recommend the selection of an engineering firm to prepare a master airport plan for aviation and industrial functions. Cleveland said once paper work is completed, it will require from three to five months to complete the master plan and another two to three months on using a more detailed airport layout plan. A committee consisting of A. K. Bloomaker Jr., chairman; John Y. Mervier, vice chairman, and Cleveland was named to select the best three consultants out of the seven firms seeking the job. A decision is expected within 30-45 days in naming the firm. In another action, the authority approved connecting the airport's water and sewer to the City of Sanford's system. A \$45,000 cost estimate was made by Clark, Dietz and Associates some time ago for the project. The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) has approved expenditure of funds derived recently from the sale of airport electrical and telephone lines to private utility companies for the project. The engineering firm, expected to provide engineering, plans to complete the job. Costs for providing these services was estimated at \$5,000 to \$10,000. Job for the actual hook-up will be let to lowest bidder, according to a motion by John Fitzpatrick, member. In other actions, the authority authorized the chairman to approve a resolution to be drafted by Cleveland to the U.S. Customs that will ease Sanford Airport to be established as a port of entry for customs in Central Florida. Cleveland indicated he had made preliminary plans to have the Blue Angels, Navy air precision squadron, appear in early April at the airport. City Commission previously had asked the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce to work with the authority in having the Navy fliers here for a demonstration of acrobatic flying, and approved an expected \$25,000 cost for fuel and hotels for the team, who receive no compensation for the exhibition. Cleveland also advised that auto-gyros are now prohibited from using the airport except in cases of emergency landings. He said a change in the airport regulations was necessary since that type aircraft is dangerous. "They are too small to see and this is a matter of life preservation," he added.

Local offices of the Internal Revenue Service also are available to provide information on the freeze, Smithwick said. ASCS Offices will forward written complaints and reports of violations to regional offices of Smithwick added.

Mayor Brown was authorized to negotiate with J. C. Smolodny, DeLand, at an estimated cost of \$2,500. Mayor Brown told council the city has no present legal description to present to the Orange-Seminole legislature delegation or any zoning maps. Village Attorney Thomas Freeman remarked the village must have an accurate legal description and that the old charter is inaccurate. Mayor Brown disclosed the matter must be resolved by a Dec. 2 deadline for proposed local legislation to be considered by the Legislature. Councilman W. H. H. Hart

State Tax Reform Starts: Now To Keep It Up!

Overwhelming approval of Gov. Reubin Askew's "fair share" tax drive was put on the record when almost three to one ratio was reached and his "yes" vote for the constitutional referendum legalizing a corporate profits tax was a winner on Nov. 2.

With this victory under his belt, there is every indication that the governor will keep up this purposeful and vigorous pressure for tax reform.

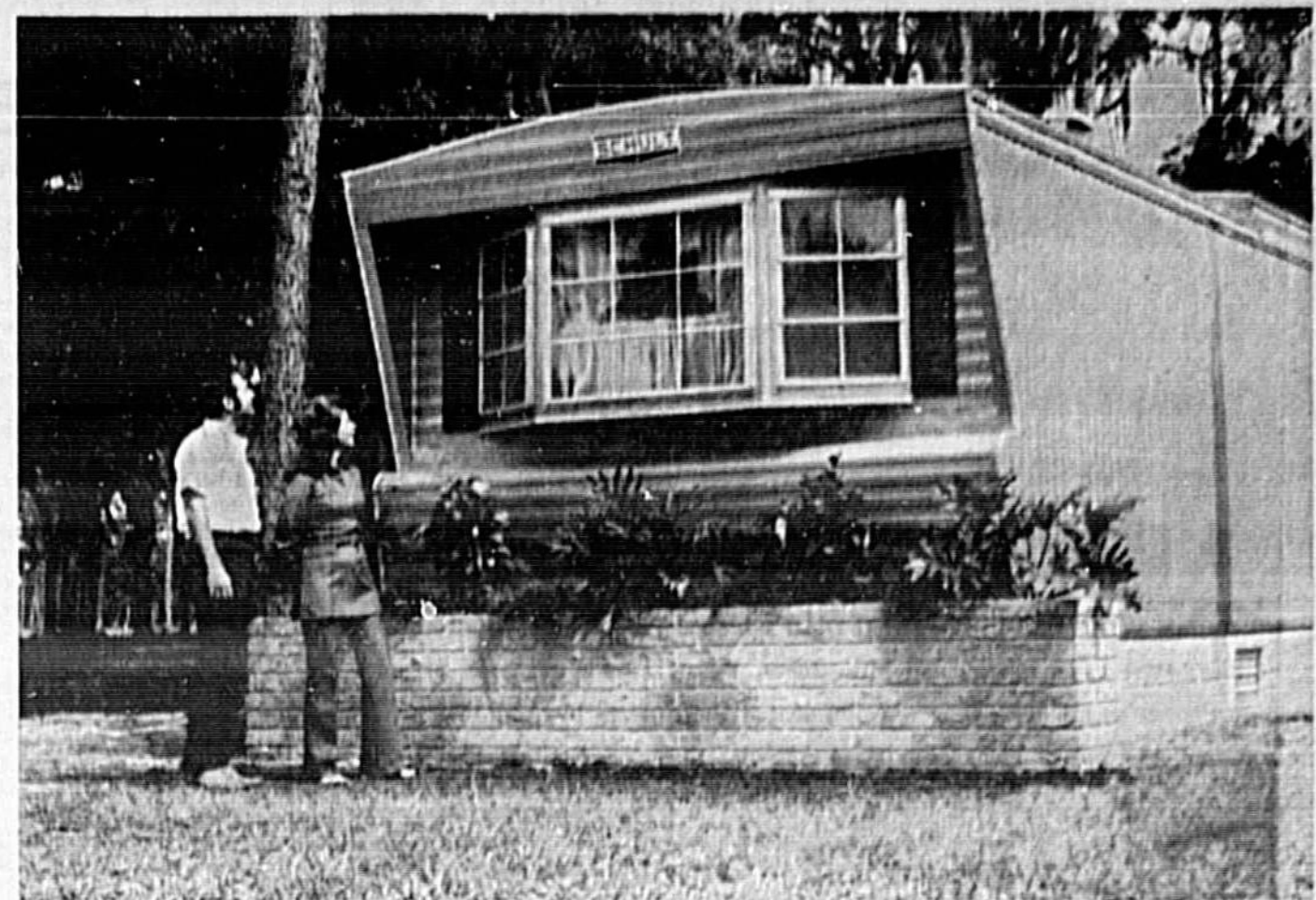
Key opposition came from big business. But now, as the Askew victory statement pointed out, he sees the vote as the beginning of tax reform and the dawn of a new day when "the people, not the big money interests will control the state."

The spotlight switches now on the state legislators. Shortly after Thanksgiving a special session is expected to convene and pass the legislation which will create the profits tax on corporations.

It will be the wise legislator who takes to heart the message which the voters of both parties have sent. Those who aligned themselves with the private interests and not the public interest need to reconsider.

Grand Opening Slated Sunday

"We're off to a good start, if pre-opening sales are any indication," reported Ben Wolkoff, president of Leisure World Park, Inc.

"Twenty-four sales, totalling \$34,000, already have been firm orders," he said. "And our salesmen are excited over the response we've had from the local residents in our neighboring towns."

The new mobile home development is located on the St. Johns River, equal distance between Walt Disney World and Daytona Beach on Port Florida Road off Highway 17-92, between Sanford and DelBary.

"Interested buyers have 22 models to choose from, built by the best companies in the industry," said the developer.

"Prices range from \$10,950 to \$17,950, for quality furnished mobile homes, one-half models up to a four-bedroom, two-bath home. All they have to do is pack their clothes and move right in," he added.

The homes will be nestled among oaks and pine stands on a 50 by 100 foot landscaped lot with underground utilities. Outside stucco skirting, planter, paved drive and patio add to the appeal of the well-planned homes.

For veterans with a certificate of eligibility there is a no down payment offer, with 15 year terms. Monthly payments would run about \$125 to \$156 a month, depending on the choice of model.

Conventional financing for the retiree or veteran also is offered. "Fifteen year terms are available now for the first time, instead of the usual 10 and 12 years," added Wolkoff.

A completed air conditioned recreational center equipped with a 90 foot long serving bar, billiard and card tables, an attraction for future home owners. A planned marina and Olympic size pool and picnic area will be available for the use of homeowners and their guests.

"Our grand opening is officially Sunday," added Wolkoff. "But everyday from now on is buyers' day as far as I'm concerned."

"I'm glad to see the park getting underway," said the developer. "It's a great start for a project which we believe will be a major contribution to the area's economic development."

When Sapp had finished his address to the Council, several of the councilmen replied to him, stating their "sympathy with the conditions which he had mentioned" and further stated that everything possible is being done to expedite the betterment of existing situations.

What Standards

The American Association of University Professors is exhibiting an appalling concept of professional standards in its attack against the University of California Board of Regents for dismissing Angela Davis from the UC faculty.

Miss Davis was fired last year on the principal grounds that her public speeches, in which she characterized university officials as murderers and policemen as pigs, were "so extreme, so antithetical to the protection of academic freedom and so obviously deliberately false" that she was a poor choice for a professor.

Not at all, according to an AAUP committee. Miss Davis was guilty of nothing but a breach of "good taste." If this view represents that of the 96,000 members of the AAUP, the decline of some of our great universities is easier to understand.

Motherhood View

Now it's the women's magazines that are catching the heat before a congressional committee. Ellen Peck, an author concerned with population problems, has testified to senators that magazine articles glorifying motherhood are making "maternity addicts" of their female readers.

There is something addictive about motherhood, all right, but Miss Peck may be off target when she blames it on McCall's and Good Housekeeping.

Birds and bees and all sorts of creatures have the same addiction, and they can't even read.

Motherhood hardly needs glorifying in print. The inclination to have babies seems to be passed down from one generation to another. Miss Peck and the rest of us can be grateful it is.

U. S. Short On Raw Materials

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — Not too many Americans realize it yet, but the joyride days of easy come, easy go may be ending.

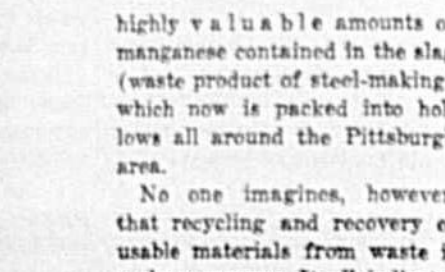
Embedded in President Nixon's newly restrictive foreign economic policy (viewed harshly by our principal trading partners, like Japan, Canada and West Germany) is this hard nut:

We are beginning to run out of some essential raw materials. It all came so easily for so long, we thought we were dealing from a bottomless pit. Not so. The toughest part of our worsening world trade equation is our rising dependence on raw materials imports.

Today we are taking in from abroad about 25 per cent of our annual petroleum consumption. With rising population and industrialization, our reserves (even counting the Alaska find), we may be importing anywhere from 45 per cent to 65 per cent of our yearly oil needs by 1980.

We have had to place rising reliance upon foreign sources of iron ore and bauxite, the raw materials for steel and aluminum. The alloy metals which harden steel for specialty uses have never been plentiful here.

To make all this worse from our viewpoint, our foreign suppliers are less and less content to sell us just plain raw materials.

highly valuable amounts of manganese contained in the slag (waste product of steel-making) which now is packed into hollows all around the Pittsburgh area.

No one imagines, however, that recycling and recovery of usable materials from waste is a cheap process. It all indicates a higher future price tag on things we have taken for granted.

The grand honeymoon, then, is nearly over. Chilling reality is beginning to make its imprint on an American nation which for almost two centuries has lived with the dreamy unreality of ever-flowing riches.

The thoughtful Daniel Roostin, director of the Smithsonian's National Museum of History and Technology, says: "We never felt we had to say a price for anything."

In fact, we have been paying a heavy charge. The wealth of this land has allowed us to be democratic in life as no other people has done, widening opportunities for basic good living, education, travel, etc. But in using these resources we have been wasteful and unthinking.

It is perhaps too early for thick gloom. Nixon's new commission on national materials policy is just getting under way and is not due to report until mid-1973. Its recommendations may include some ways to ease the growing materials pinch.

For instance, there may be a good prospect that fuller use of scrap metals, and other recycling techniques, may ease our mounting dependence on other nations. One minerals specialist says they very likely there are

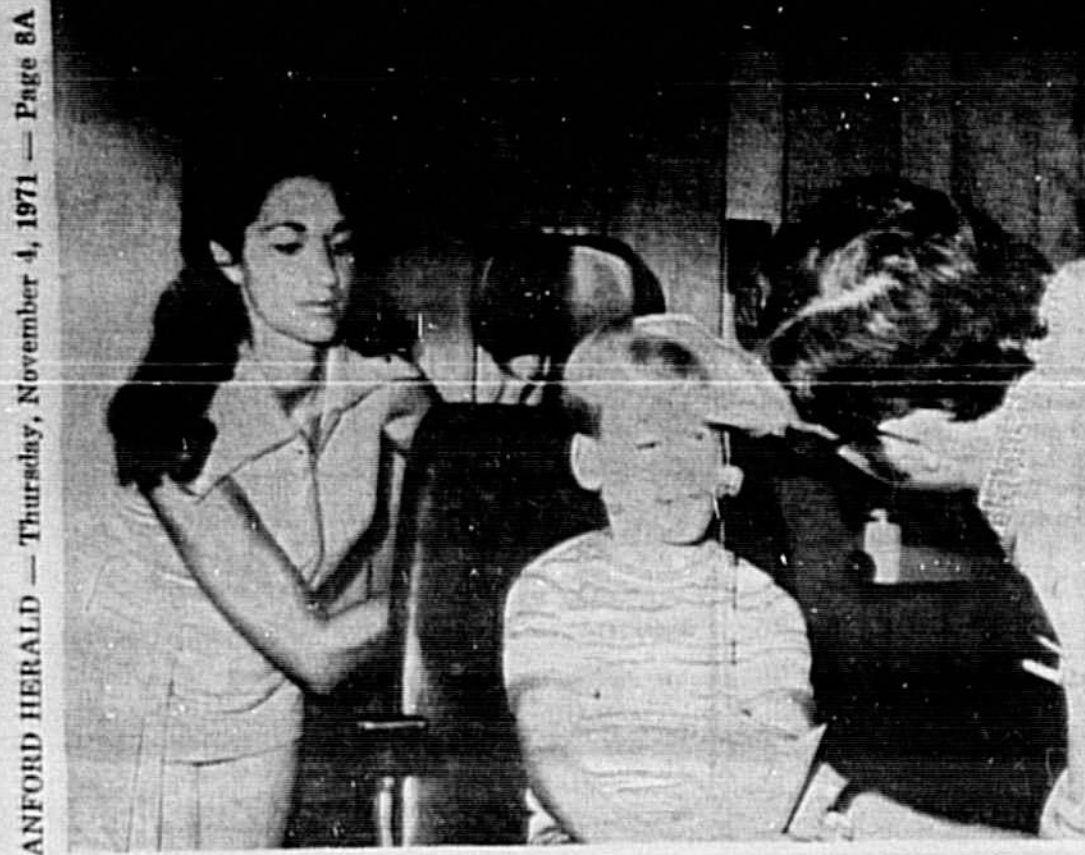

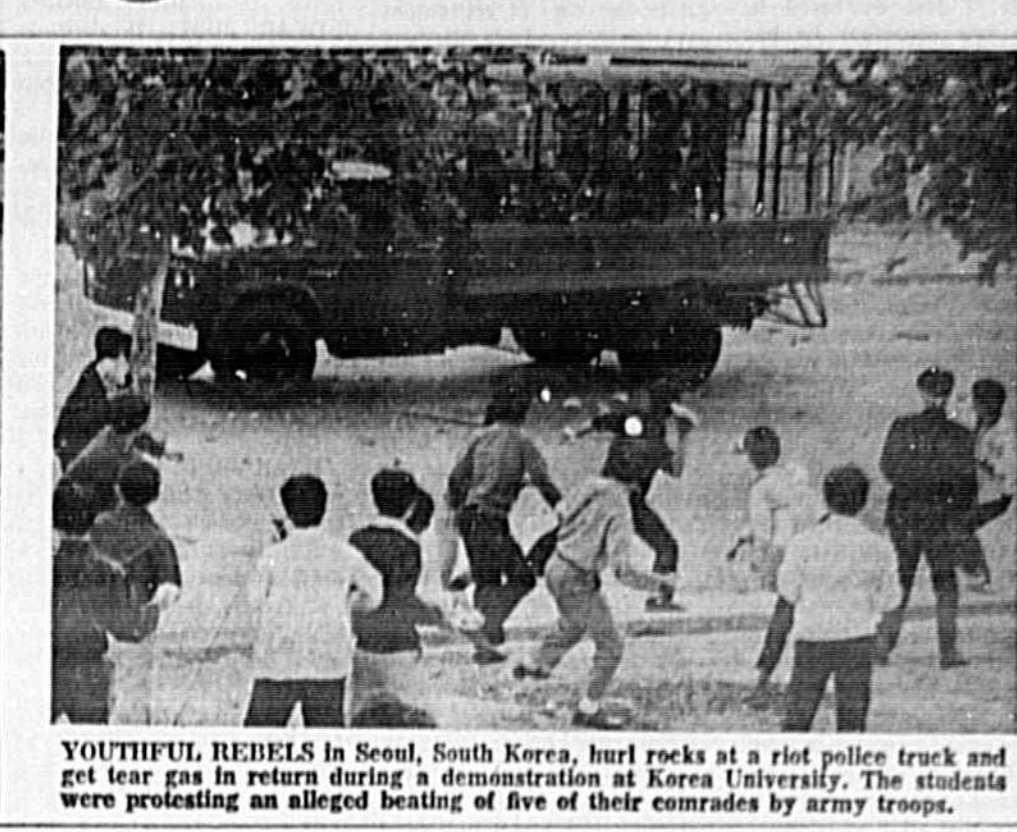

Rehnquist's Philosophies Questioned Court Nominees Facing Senators

WASHINGTON (AP) — Supreme Court nominee William H. Rehnquist faces more questioning by the Senate Judiciary Committee after liberal Democrats expressed concern about his conservative philosophy. But no challenge was raised at a 6 1/2-hour hearing Wednesday to the legal competence, integrity or judicial temperament of the 47-year-old Justice Department lawyer. Rehnquist was named to the vacancy on the Supreme Court by President Nixon after questioning by Rehnquist is completed. Rehnquist and Powell were named by President Nixon to fill the two vacancies on the high tribunal left by retirement of Justices John M. Harlan and the late Hugo L. Black.

Although Powell, 64, also is a conservative, little opposition has surfaced in and out of Congress to his nomination. Such organizations as Americans for Democratic Action and the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights are opposed to Rehnquist's nomination, but they have announced they do not intend to fight Senate confirmation of Powell. The American Bar Association's 12-member committee on the Federal Judiciary notified the Senate panel Wednesday of its unanimous opinion that both Rehnquist and Powell are qualified to serve on the Supreme Court. Such liberal Democrats as Philip A. Hart of Michigan, Edward M. Kennedy of Massachusetts, Birch Bayh of Indiana and John V. Tunney of California did most of the questioning at Wednesday's hearing.

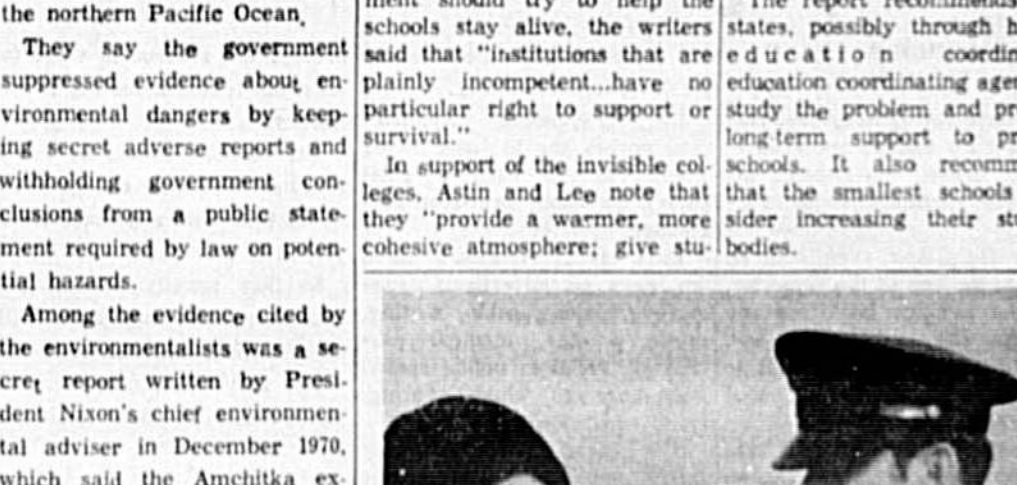

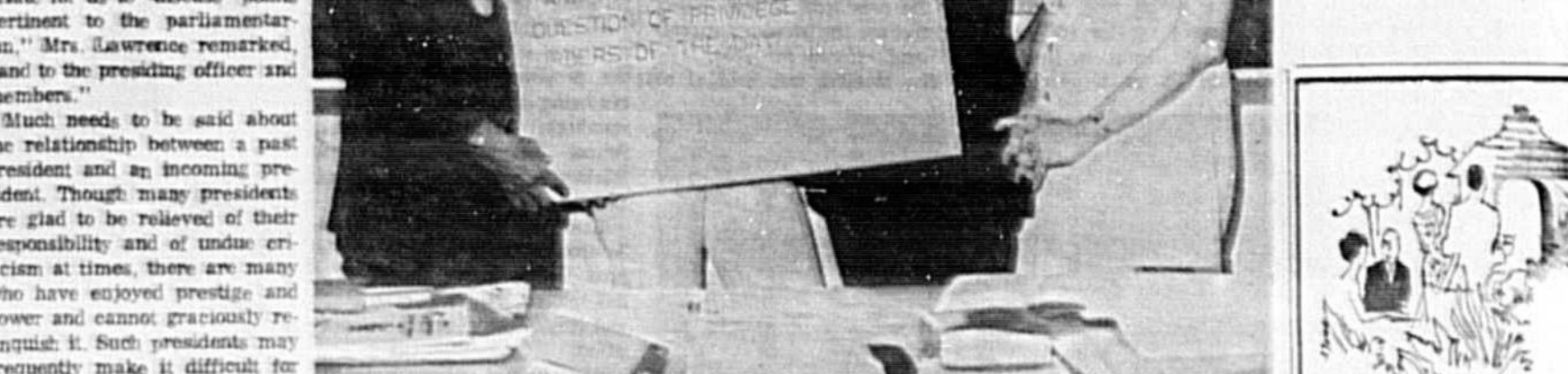

The elementary parliamentary course at Seminole Junior College, co-sponsored by the Seminole Parliamentary Club was completed recently.

A chairman should always be courteous and fair, but when the chair is convinced that members are using Parliamentary forms merely to obstruct business, she should either fail to recognize them or rule them out of order.
No member should use her knowledge of parliamentary law to hinder business by constantly raising points of order and insisting upon the strict observance of every rule at a meeting in which the majority has no knowledge of these rules. A parliamentarian of an organization should never be a member of a board with a vote, nor act on a committee where sides will be taken. She has no right to speak in assembly unless personal custody for any reason.

TRACK TAK with George Crossley

Some comments on activities on the day of the American 500. I was present during the drivers' meeting before the race and got the distinct impression that the carburetor base is more popular than the carburetor plate was. The base has dropped horsepower in most competitors but speeds have actually gone up because the drivers are going much deeper into the corners.

This is causing excessive tire wear and Goodyear as well as Firestone will be hard pressed to come up with a tire that will take the frantic driving in the corners. Every top competitor racing at the American 500 had serious tire problems during the race and had to come in for an unscheduled change of rubber. I do believe that given time the tire companies will come with the situation.

North Carolina Motor Speedway is a very fine facility located just across the border from South Carolina. The track facilities are ideal and the fans have a completely unobstructed view of the entire one mile track. The track is the fastest mile track in the world. The race was a real spectacle of sight and sound with early leader Charlie Gluckhach hitting a wall.

The winner, Grand National Points Leader Richard Petty drove his usual careful race as the other fellows had problems. Benny Parsons commented that short track racing is sometimes harder by far on cars and drivers than is super speedway racing. Parsons finished a fine sixth place by the way. A great race which was enjoyed by all.

Holman and Moody are preparing two American Motors Matadors for Grand National competition next year. Hopefully we will see the cars in action in the February Daytona 500 mile classic. American Motors has done well since its active racing program began. This year Mark Donohue captured the Trans-Am series in Japan. Jaye Javelin has been making themselves felt in Grand American Sedan competition for the past few years. Anything that is put together by Holman and Moody is going to be competitive, so you might be very surprised at what happens in next year's Grand National.

The Matadors will have the 40 cubic inch block probably destroyed to take advantage of carburetor restrictions. Moody next year Bobby Allison has been driving the #14 33 prepared Mercury this year and racked up an impressive record. This situation could be well worth watching.

It's extremely sad to report the loss of another really great auto-racing driver. Jo Siffert was killed just lately in an auto race in England. Jo was a fierce competitor who always raced right on the ragged edge. Born in 1936, Jo came from a peasant family background in Switzerland, started off racing motor-cycles and switched to cars while driving in Formula 1 competition where he stirred British team leader Bob Walker to sign him as driver in the factory British Formula 1 effort in 1963. Among his other accomplishments Siffert beat the great Jimmy Clark in the 1965 Sicily Grand Prix, who scored the world championship win in 1969 when he won the British Grand Prix. He had many other successes such as winning the Monza 1,000 Kilometer, The Spa 1,000 Kilometer, The Nurburgring 1,000 Kilometer and the Watkins Glen six hours as well as the Austrian 1,000 Kilometer for Porsche in 1969. A true sportsman and a great loss to auto racing.

The last Can-Am of the season took place at Riverside, California. The L. A. Times Grand Prix was won by Dennis Hulme of the McLaren team with his teammates Peter Revson finishing a second place. Revson's second place finish gave him the Canadian-American title. Hulme's win was exciting and resulted as high as the Formula 1 Championship in importance.

The Can-Am has now come of age and is on its way to become the most important road race in the world today. If national events are added to the Can-Am calendar then that will make the series even more international than it now is. A great series looks as if it will get even better.

Daytona International Speedway will host a number of events sponsored by the International Motor Sports Association Nov. 19-21. These events will include a 200 mile Grand Touring Race, a 150 mile Baby Grand Event, a 50 mile Formula 1000 race as well as Formula Vee and Super Vee events.

This will be the last event at Daytona until 1972 when our racing fans will be treated to another month of fantastic racing in February. Let's hope that the weather holds out and stays clear for the upcoming November racing events.

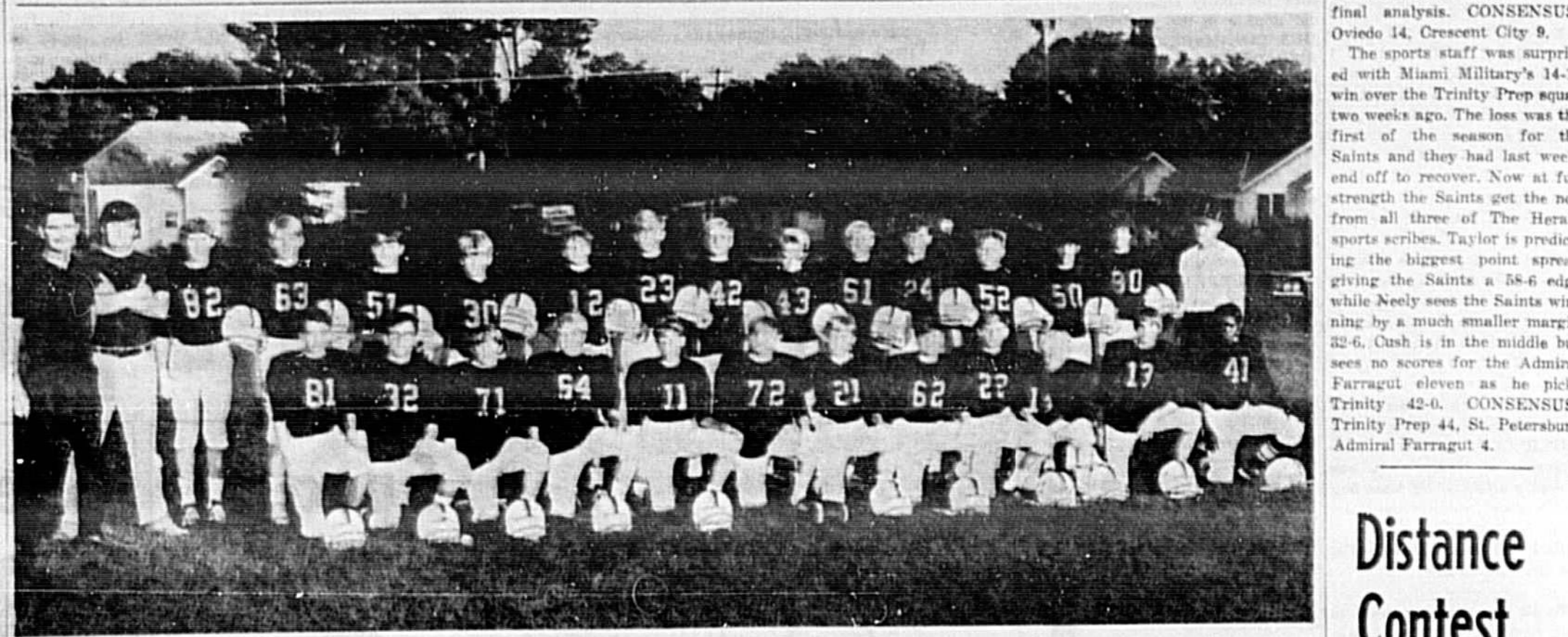
The Paris 1,000 Kilometer race was won by a Porsche 917 driven by Derek Bell and Gilles Villeneuve. This was probably the last race for the 917 since it is a 5 liter car and next year the limit will be three liters. The 917 Porsche almost completely dominated world road racing competition during its career. Ferrari tried, Alfa Romeo tried and to a lesser extent to halt the big Porsche's dominance but to no avail. The 917 simply was too fast and even more important it was too durable to be beaten.

Every year the 917 was a faster and better handling than the year before. The 917 was possibly the finest track race car ever built. It was certainly a sight to see one of these machines screaming around Daytona or Sebring at better than grand average over 200 miles per hour. We shall have to look long and hard to find a car like the 917 again. He might see one of these mighty five liter Porsche engines in the USAC championship series next year. The engine should be competitive with anything built in this country. The five liter engine has developed 680 horsepower and has lasted and lasted in intense competition. Keep an eye on it next year.

Gerry Glenn won top fuel at the NHRA World Championships which took place at Amarillo, Texas. Phil Castonovo won Funny Car with Mike Yon winning Pro-Stock to continue Chrysler dominance in these two areas of drag racing.

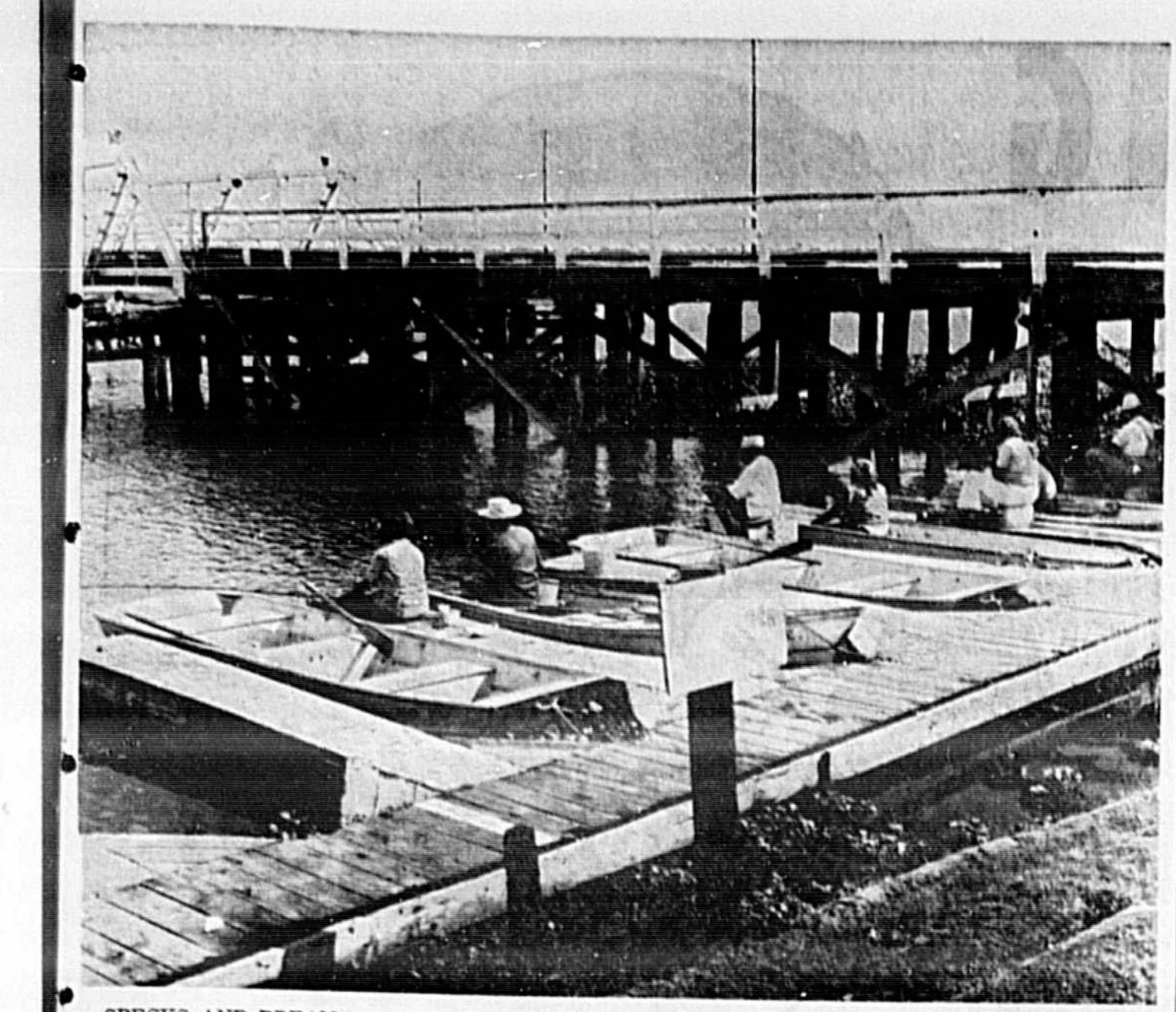

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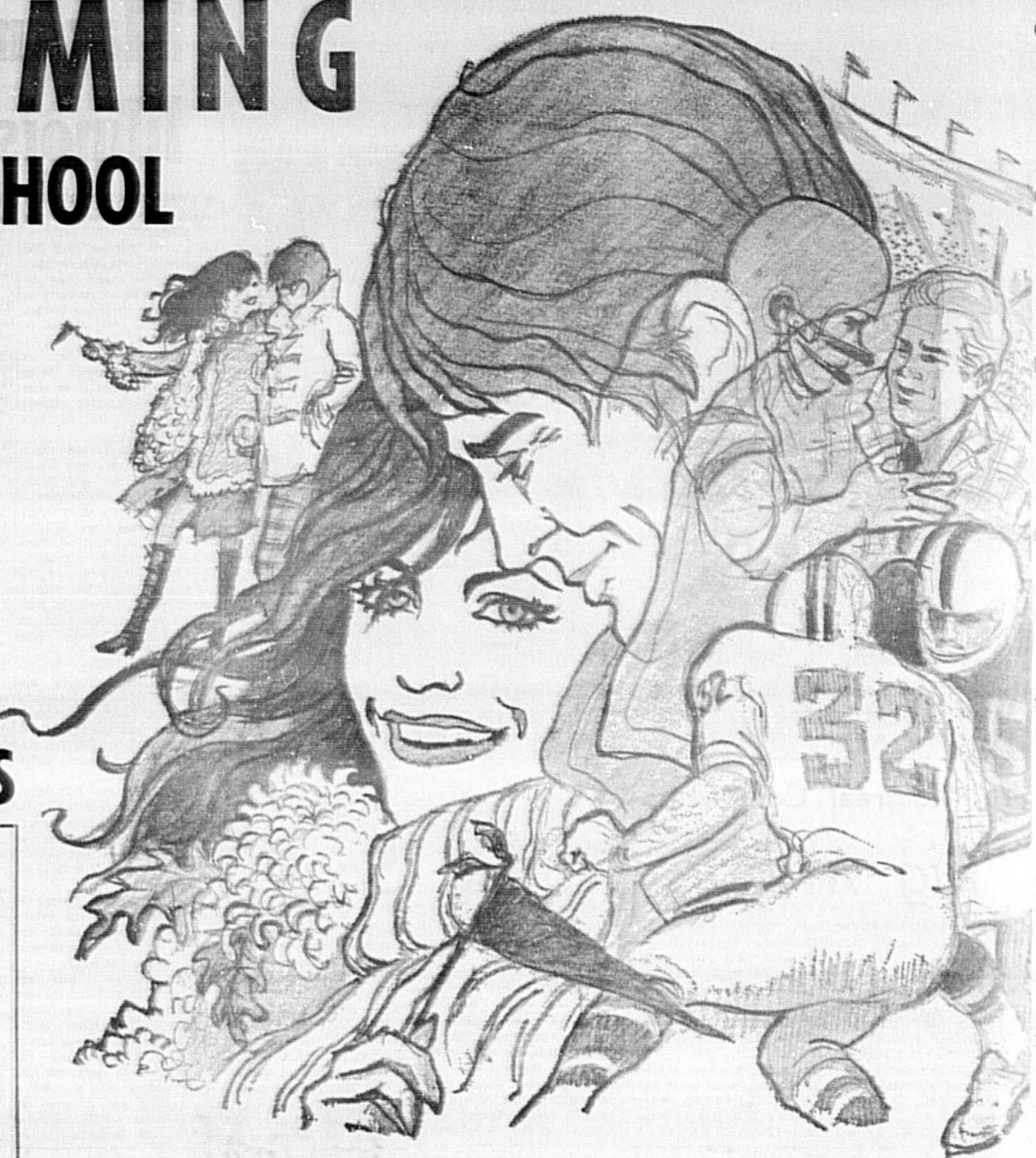

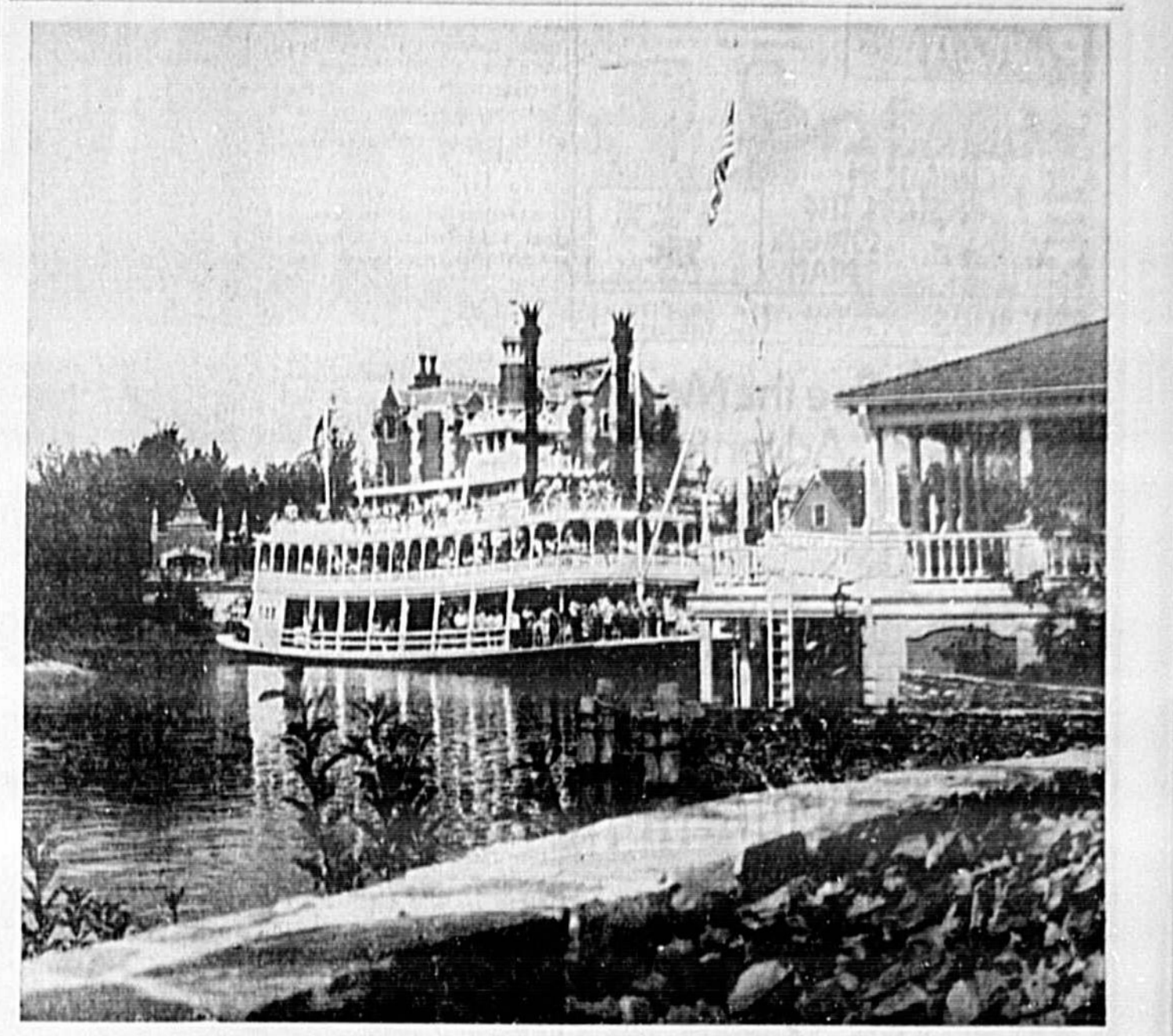

Quick-Fix Cakes Family Favorite

Every family has its favorite home-baked specialties from the oven. Many of them, these days, are quick-fix treats based on mixes.

New recipe, giving a novel twist to the familiar ways of preparing a mix, are always being developed. One of these is given here. It might become another of your family's favorites.

PEACHY CROWN CAKE
1 cup (1 pound can) sliced peaches (reserve syrup)
1 pkg. yellow cake mix
3 eggs
1 cup water
1/4 cup butter or margarine
1 cup peach syrup

2 tbsps. sugar
1 tsp. cornstarch
2 tps. butter
1/2 tsp. cinnamon

Generously grease and lightly flour a 10-inch Bundt or tube pan (Teflon, too). Drain peaches. Reserve syrup for glaze. Arrange peach slices in bottom of pan. In large mixer bowl, combine dry cake mix, eggs, butter and water. Blend and beat as directed on package. Pour batter over peach slices. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 to 50 minutes until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool cake upright in pan for five minutes. Invert onto serving plate; do not remove pan for 15 minutes. Cool completely. Combine glaze ingredients in a saucepan. Bring to a boil, simmer. Spoon over loaf.

DATE-APRICOT LOAF
1 egg
1 cup water
1 pkg. date bread mix
1/2 cup dried apricots, chopped
1/2 cup chopped walnuts

Glaze:
1/2 cup apricot preserves, if desired

Grease and flour bottom only of 9 x 5 or 8 x 4-inch loaf pan. In large mixing bowl, combine all ingredients except preserves. Stir until well mixed. Pour into prepared pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 to 50 minutes until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pan for 15 minutes; remove from pan. Cool completely. In small saucepan, bring preserves to a simmer. Spoon over loaf.
