**State Agencies Seek
\$2 Billion Budget**

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — State agencies begin pleading today for appropriations totaling nearly \$2 billion to run their 102 departments in the 1967-68 biennium.

Two years ago, the requests totaled \$1.5 billion and the Florida Legislature chopped \$400,000 off that when it passed the appropriations.

The State Budget Commission — Gov. Claude Kirk and members of the cabinet — and house and senate appropriations committee members sitting with them made up the panel which major department heads must convene during this week of hearings on general revenue fund requests.

The big Florida Development Commission and Florida Industrial Commission were among 24 agencies leading off the testimony.

Some cuts are expected, both by the Budget Commission and the Legislature. But some additions may have to be made to pay for proposed new programs.

Budget director Wallace Henderson said some costly new programs are not included in the present total, estimated at \$1,750,000,000 to \$1,967,000,000.

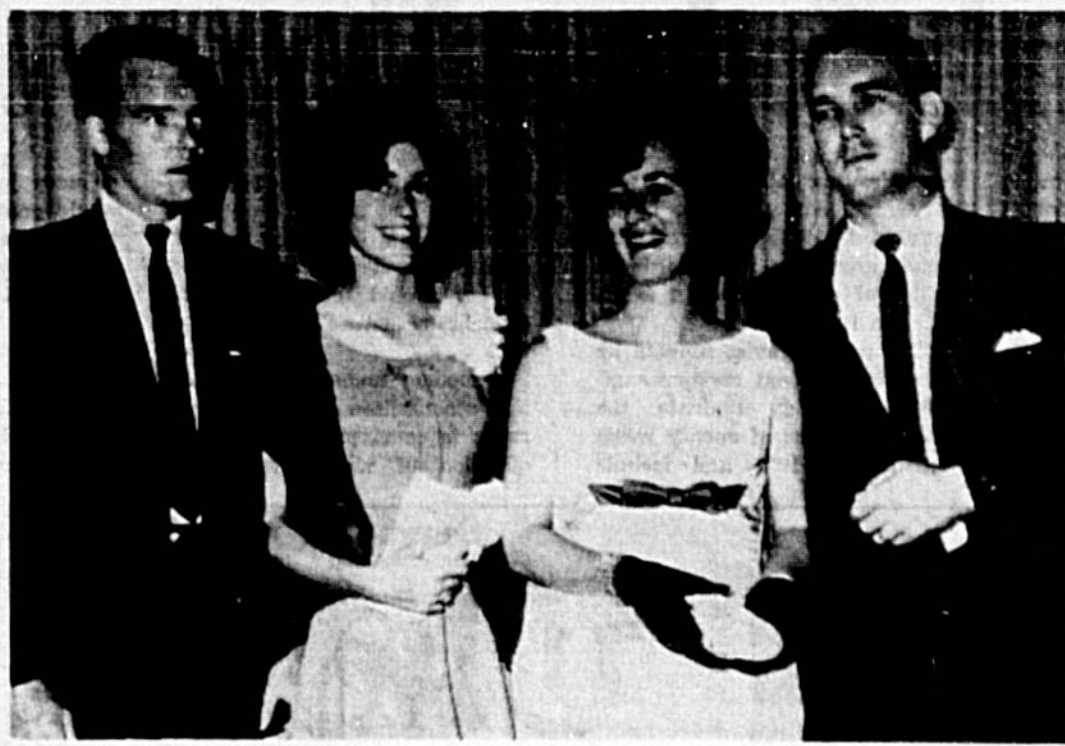
Among them is the proposal to establish a \$5,000 yearly minimum for teachers' salaries, a \$125 million project.

The budget requests include pay boosts averaging 5 per cent for state employees. These raise recommendations came from a 1966 private firm's study of pay and job classifications.

**Income Tax
Quirk: Who
Is Dependent?**

Your 17-year-old son, a junior in high school, earned \$750 last year by working after school and during his summer vacation. With his earnings he clothed himself, supported his own spending money and bought school supplies. It cost you, as his father, an additional \$500 to maintain him.

Your 17-year-old daughter, a senior in high school, worked in an office after school, on Saturdays and throughout the summer vacation. She earned \$1,800 and banked it all for her college tuition. You paid all her expenses.

You furnished the chief support for your mother, a widow over 65, who lived in your home last year. Her only income was \$50 a month rent she collected from her former residence.

Question: Which ones can you claim as dependents on your income tax return for 1966?

Answer: Only your daughter. Every year taxpayers seem to have more trouble over the question of dependency than any other item on their returns. Here are the five conditions which must be met before a dependency exemption may be claimed:

1. The person being claimed must have received less than \$600 in gross income. (This qualification does not apply to your children under 19 or who are full-time students.) This ruled out the possibility of claiming your mother in the example above, however.

2. The taxpayer must have furnished more than half of the total support for the year. (This ruled out your son.)

3. The person claimed did not file a joint return with his wife or her husband.

4. A nationality requirement must be met.

5. The claimed dependent must be related to you, or, if not a relative, must have lived in your home for the entire taxable year. The parent tax-exempt year of the year of death.

And your daughter for whom you furnished chief support all year but who married on Thanksgiving Day may be still claimed as a dependent on your return but only if she does not file a joint return with her husband or is not listed as an exemption on his return.

Lawmakers Look Forward To Wednesday Adjournment

TALLHASSEE (AP)—A 48-senator, 118-representative adjournment plan was emerging as Florida's Legislature today headed for a hoped-for Wednesday adjournment.

With constitution revision temporarily a moot question, reapportionment committees labored over the weekend to ready seating plans so lawmakers could act on them and adjourn.

The strain of last week's confusion was indicated by House Speaker pro-tem James L. Walker's comments that "freshmen legislators were about to panic" and "many veterans be crying for adjournment."

Emphasis of adjournment strategy was to, first, convince present district court that the present 48-117 plan was fair and population variances justifiable.

Second, have a substitute plan ready should the court reject the 48-117, but plea that it not be put into effect until November 1968. Otherwise, it would mean special elections.

A senate seating plan was given preliminary approval by a 17-4 vote of the Reapportionment Committee. It would take away single-county districts or Orange and Brevard.

Orange would be joined with Osceola for a three-senator district and Brevard would join Indian River, Okeechobee, St. Lucie and Martin counties in a two-senator district.

It would also mean shuffling Washington, Jackson and Gulf counties in north Florida. Eight seats would be up for election in Washington counties (2nd district), with three senators running throughout the six-county area.

Another, proposed by Sen. John McCarry of Fort Pierce, would modify Askew's to avoid joining Brevard with Indian River, Okeechobee, St. Lucie and Martin. Instead Gladie would be thrown in with the latter four.

Each of three proposed house plans would add one seat, with the net effect being a gain in representation for Polk County. Proposals called for adding one representative to the four-representative, single-county district or joining Polk with Pasco (one representative) to make a six-representative district.

The Senate appeared to be a little further ahead of the House in its work. Sen. John Mathews of Jacksonville said there was a possibility of floor consideration of the present plan in a Jan. 25 hearing before the three-judge court in Miami.

The resolution, authored by former speaker William Chappel of Ocala, also would ask that the federal court allow the Legislature to apportion itself rather than putting a court-selected plan into effect. In the meantime, to allow the Legislature to consider constitution revision.

It's been estimated that the Naval Air Station is worth some \$15 million dollars... City Hears Chamber Presentation Industrial Board Proposed

A greater Sanford area Industrial Commission was proposed to the City Commission at an informal meeting last night.

Although no figure was given indications are that from \$40,000 to \$50,000 will be requested at the next City Commission to establish the commission.

Chamber of Commerce President DeWitt Mathews said he will appear before the Commission Monday night asking the board to "expedite" establishing the commission.

Clifford McKibbin, chairman of the industrial committee of the Chamber of Commerce listed a five point program to push industrial potential not only at the Sanford Naval Air Station when the base is phased out but for the entire Sanford area.

Among his recommendations were:

1. That an industrial commission be established and that the city commission be used as a guide.
2. That the charter and by-laws of the Orlando Utilities Commission be used as a guide. Their operation has been so successful, free of charges of "politics", that it appears to be a good model.
3. That the original members of the Industrial Commission be appointed by the City Commission on staggered terms — replacements to be selected by the Industrial Commission, subject to the approval of the city fathers.
4. An executive manager or administrator be appointed by the Industrial Commission, subject to approval of the city commission, "in-charge" for his proven ability as an active promoter of industrial enterprises.
5. McKibbin stressed that no local man had been considered for the post.

Hint Base May Stay Here Until 1970

Rumors were rife between Sanford and Washington this morning that the Pentagon had decided to delay the closing of Sanford Naval Air Station until July 1, 1970, if not longer.

Congressman A. S. Herlong Jr., by telephone from Washington, informed The Herald just before noon that he had received word from the Navy Department early today an announcement of the delay on the phase-out would be forthcoming later in the morning.

However, just before noon, Herlong said the Defense Department said it was holding up any announcement.

It was first brought out by the Sanford City Commission meeting last night that a "possible" announcement might be forthcoming that the Navy had decided to delay closing of SNAS for two years, if not longer.

Commissioner Earl Higginbotham reported that he had received "reliable information" the base would not be closed in 1968. He would not elaborate on his source of information but his statement led The Herald to query Washington this morning.

Sen. Spessard Holland's office said they would check out the report, as did Congressman Herlong's aides. There was no further information from Holland's office.

However, Herlong indicated there appears to be some basis for the rumors in Washington. Navy said an "announcement" would soon be forthcoming.

When the announcement was made by Defense Secretary McNamara more than a year ago that Sanford Naval Air Station was to be phased out, the announcement was met by a "strong" reaction from Wing One who moved to Turner AFB, Albany, Ga. It was believed this was strictly an economic move. McNamara and President Johnson, however, it developed later that top Navy officers in the Pentagon recommended a \$4 million overexpenditure out of next year's moneys) to straighten out and improve SNAS.
