## Berbers Reject Ben Bella Bid

ALGIERS (UPI) — Berber mountain fighters who have rebelled against President Ahmed Ben Bella's one-man rule rejected his offer of negotiations to end their uprising today and began building up their defenses.

They moved armor plate and barbed wire to their hideouts in the Kabylia Mountains 60 miles east of Algiers. Rebel trucks moved freely within the area, although Ben Bella's troops have cut it off from the rest of Algeria.

## Colonel Heads Honduran Junta

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras (UPI) — The armed forces which deposed and deported President Ramon Villeda Morales today named Col. Osvaldo Lopez Arellano as a one-man junta to run the country through executive decree. He was the former chief of staff.

Lopez put the country under a state of siege — partial martial law — and dissolved the chamber of deputies.

He called on all government workers to return immediately to their jobs.

## Goulart Asks State Of Siege In Argentina

BRASILIA (UPI) — President Joao Goulart will ask congress today to put Brazil under a state of siege — limited martial law — for the next 30 days, members of his cabinet said today.

The government is plagued by strikes throughout the country, bitter wrangling between the army and leftists and charges by anti-Communist leaders of Communist plots to seize the government.

Goulart arrived here from Rio de Janeiro and Mines and Energy Minister Oliveira Brito said he was authorized to ask congress for the emergency measure "in the face of the Brazilian family."

The reference was to Goulart's failure in recent days to end a nationwide bank workers' strike, which has drawn threats of a shutdown by industrial leaders unless it is quickly solved.

Army leaders were reported last month as having asked Goulart to impose a state of siege to enable them to handle more effectively the spreading strikes, but Goulart rejected the idea at that time because Yugoslavia's President Tito was a state visitor.

## 2 Bandits Loot Bank Of \$15,000

MIAMI (UPI) — Two gun-toting bandits, wearing bandana masks and straw hats, held up the bank of Kendall Thursday and escaped with about \$15,000.

"I thought it was a joke," cashier Judy McIntyre said of the wild west style hold-up, "but when he pointed the gun at me and told me he'd shoot, I knew it wasn't."

Police said the men changed their shirts as they jumped into a getaway car and escaped.

## Flora Hits Cuba Near U. S. Base

### Castro Defies Soviet On Pact, Say Diplomats

LONDON (UPI) — Cuban Premier Fidel Castro is defying Moscow and withholding his signature from the partial nuclear test ban treaty, according to diplomatic dispatches reaching here.

The dispatches said Castro was believed to be using the test ban issue as a bargaining element. Among his demands is believed to be stronger Russian pressure on the United States to ease its restrictions on Cuba.

Castro's loyalty to the Kremlin was showing signs of wavering, the reports said, and he appeared to be renewing a flirtation with Communist China.

The test ban is one of the major arguments in Peking's latest anti-Moscow campaign, which charges Russia is selling out to the West. It would be a sharp blow to the prestige of Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev if Castro refused to sign the treaty, thus giving tacit support to China on a key issue in the Sino-Soviet dispute.

Castro's reluctance to support Khrushchev was based on increasing Russian indifference to Cuban complaints against American pressures and raids by anti-Castro Cuban exiles, the reports said.

Moscow radio and the Soviet press have played down the raids recently and Cuba's spokesmen in the United Nations do not seem to be getting the strong Russian backing they had used to enjoy.

## Protestants OK New Paper

But some of these observers expressed disappointment because the current draft falls considerably short of what many had hoped for, particularly in terms of an explicit recognition of the churchly

status of non-Catholic bodies. "We had hoped that the council fathers would come right out and say that other Christian communions are also truly part of the Church Universal," said one Protestant observer.

"The present draft doesn't go nearly that far. And if it were approved as it now stands, I'd frankly be very disappointed."

The observers, who met as a body Thursday night for a private discussion of the council's progress to date, have communicated their feelings to the Secretariat for Christian Unity, headed by German Jesuit Augustin Cardinal Bea. This is the established procedure for registering their views with the council.

The "separated brethren" are pinning their hopes on the fact that the document, entitled "De Ecclesia" (About

## Big 3 Agree On Nuclear Ban

NEW YORK (UPI) — The Big Three foreign ministers ended current talks here with an announcement Thursday night that they agreed in principle on banning nuclear weapons in space orbit.

Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko who will confer in Washington with President Kennedy, said he believed the understanding could be put in formal shape very soon.

American officials said it probably would take the form of a joint declaration and undoubtedly would be discussed with Gromyko during his call at the White House.

"Agreement on policy" was announced by Secretary of State Dean Rusk, Gromyko and British Foreign Secretary Lord Home at the conclusion of a two-hour discussion of East-West problems at the Third Avenue headquarters of the British dele-

gation to the United Nations. Britain is not directly involved in the problem, since the United States and Russia are the only countries now having the capacity to orbit space vehicles. However, Home wanted to endorse the

agreement as a further indication of East-West progress in easing tension following the nuclear test ban agreement.

U. S. officials acknowledged that the principal benefit of the Soviet-American agreement would be psychological, since military experts agree there are much cheaper and more efficient ways of launching nuclear weapons than from a platform in space.

## Improvement Seen In Dollar Outflow

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The secretary said he expected "a substantial improvement" in the nation's dollar position in 1963 and hoped the deficit would be erased "shortly thereafter."

A deficit occurs when the United States government, tourists, businessmen and other spend more dollars overseas than foreigners spend in this country.

The Treasury secretary said the third-quarter improvement was caused by a reduction in the outflow of short-term funds.

He also said that President Kennedy's proposed tax on foreign stocks and bonds has put the damper on the loss of dollars to foreigners who borrowed here to spend overseas.

The three ministers reported they had been unable, in three sessions here, to make any "conclusive" progress on critical issues such as general disarmament and measures to guard against surprise attack. ## Sugar Prices Continue To Rise

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sugar prices have been rising in recent weeks in spite of "more than ample" supplies

and prospects for record year-end stocks in this country, the Agriculture Department said today.

The department said most of the U. S. price rise came after Sept. 16 when the Soviet Union announced it would purchase \$500 million worth of wheat from Canada.

"This news spurred the advance in sugar values on the theory that if the grain crop was damaged, the Soviet sugar beet crop also may have suffered," the department said.

Government experts noted, however, in a sugar market review that on Sept. 25 a Soviet sugar industry journal reported that Russian beet sugar factories would have greater supplies than a year ago.

The department said that sugar inventories at the end of the year may reach 3.5 million tons, and will be swelled by domestic production of another 250,000 tons shortly after next Jan. 1.

Stocks on hand at the beginning of 1963 were 2.75 million tons, the highest on record for the date up to that time.

In the face of this supply situation, the department said, prices for raw sugar have risen from 6.5 cents a pound a month ago to 8.02 cents Sept. 25 and 8.5 cents Oct. 2.

## Cuban Commie Praises Self

MIAMI (UPI)—Fidel Castro pictured himself to an international conference of architects Thursday night as the "architect of a new society and a new world," but restrained himself with difficulty from tongue-lashing the United States.

Admitting it was "not easy," the Cuban premier deferred to the "non-political" rule of the conference and limited himself to only a couple of quick whacks at the U. S.

Immediate effect of the presidential order is to exempt from the draft 840,000 married men. That leaves a national pool of some 1.7 million single 1As from which Selective Service can choose.

If the mental wheels of this latter group are meshing well, great jobs of them may choose what to them will seem the lesser of two evils—ways of life: Army service or marriage.

Consequently, the nuptial-minded gals may have better odds going for them. Ministers and florists will become more prosperous. House and apartment builders will be busier.

Two slight cautions to the 1A who chooses marriage: He must "maintain bona fide family relations" with a wife. And he shouldn't attempt the marital leap after the postman drops a letter which begins: "Greetings. You are hereby ordered for induction"...

• To develop ability to think rationally, to express themselves clearly and to read with understanding.

## Lyle C. Wilson Says:

### France Spurning U.S.

The GIs who hit the Normandy beaches and fought their way cross-country to help liberate Paris would have trouble now recognizing the petulant voice of LeBelle France.

The word now is that France has little time for the United States and, more specifically, feels no need for U. S. protection. The French don't want any direction, either from the American.

"Haram, boys," says LeBelle France to Uncle Sam, "beat it!"

Or, anyway, that is what

President Charles de Gaulle is saying in the series of speeches he is delivering now. Le Grand Charles spurned further U. S. protection in a speech delivered in the last week of September in Belle France. Only this week de Gaulle's representatives at the International Monetary conference in Washington, D. C., opposed policies designed to help the United States and other countries with balance of payments problems.

Recently, too, De Gaulle happily volunteered to interfere with U. S. efforts to hold the anti-Communist line

in Viet Nam. De Gaulle, in short, is conducting himself as though he were a majority stockholder in Western civilization and not merely "the president of a weak sister who would have flunked both 20th century tests of nationhood but for the armed assistance of the British, their dominions and the United States."

The last time the French went it alone and triumphed was during the Napoleonic wars. Even Napoleon's magic finally ran out of white rabbits. In 1817-71, the French tried to handle Prussia, a small kingdom that became the core of the German empire. Soon Paris was besieged and the defeated Parisians were eating rats. They had better luck in 1914-18 when British and American arms helped fend off the Germans.

In 1940 the French collapsed politically, morally and militarily under pressure. They got their country back again courtesy of British and American young manhood and the Allied taxpayers.

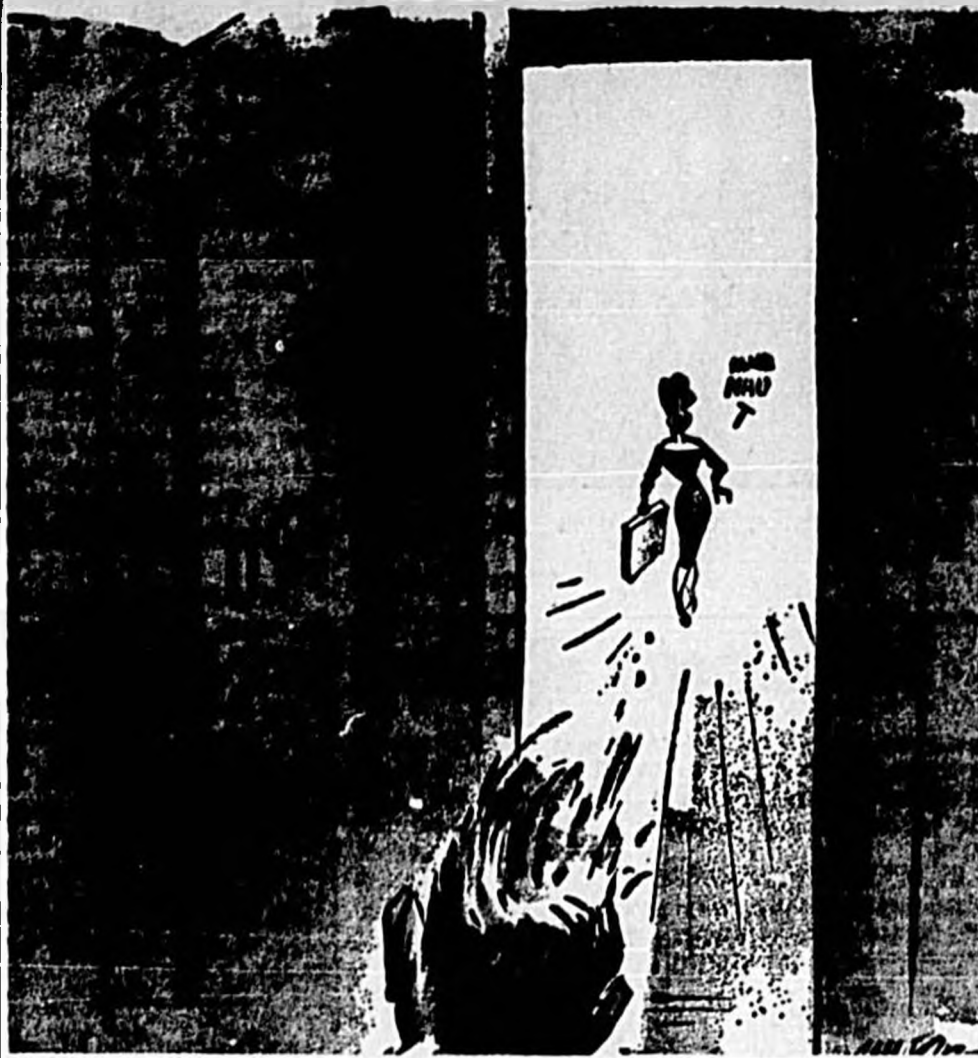
De Gaulle stalls on cooperation within the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. His predecessors contributed mightily to the chaos in Southeast Asia thereby compelling the United States now to engage in a nasty little jungle war. The French genius for messy colonial operations helped to charge North Africa with explosive instability.

Americans might be forgiven if they decided that France and De Gaulle are not good neighbors even at a trans-Atlantic distance of 3,000 miles. Given due allowance for his efforts to rally French resistance during World War II, it is a fact that the Allied high command, military and political, rated De Gaulle as pretty much a nuisance during the war and thereafter. He seems not much to have changed.

Le Grand Charles' bold spurning of U. S. protection should be had in writing, if possible. And thereafter, the United States should seek some system of collective security in which De Gaulle and France would be left as once proposed to "stew in her own juices."

The trouble is that no such collective security without France could be devised. French geography and natural endowments being what they are. But if there is any isolationist sentiment in the United States, De Gaulle will keep it alive and growing.

### Reds' Dispute Deep-Rooted

One hundred years and more ago when European powers busily were carving up Imperial China, Czarist Russia was taking its share.

Maps published by the Red Chinese since they took over the mainland in 1949 show that they do not recognize these conquests and intend to get them back.

And so to India has been added the Soviet Union as a nation having a border dispute with Communist China, and to the ideological quarrel between the two Communist giants has been added a new and, potentially, even more explosive issue.

For outsiders attempting to assess the depth, probable duration and cause of the quarrel, the latest turn taking up space in Moscow and Peking newspapers and in the propaganda airwaves has given new food for thought.

Last week end the Soviet government charged the Chinese with 5,000 border violations in 1962. The Soviets said the Chinese had attempted to reclaim isolated parts of Soviet territory "without preliminary permission."

Specifically, it cited the case of a fisherman on the Amur River which separates Siberia from Manchuria. It said documents taken from the fisherman demanded that fishermen tell Soviet border guards that river islands belong to China.

It said that Russian attempts to negotiate border disputes had been ignored by Red China, and from this India's Jawaharlal Nehru could draw a wry smile.

Two weeks earlier, the Red Chinese had accused Russia of luring tens of thousands of Mongol nomads across the border of Sinkiang Province into the Soviet Union and of trying to engineer an anti-Chinese coup in the region.

Both areas, Sinkiang and the Amur and Ussuri River borders with Siberia, are historic scenes of conflict between the Russians and the Chinese.

Sinkiang, China's largest province, far back beyond the days of Marco Polo, has been a highway of civilization. An ancient silk route linked it with India. It is marked by extremes of hot and cold, ferocious winds, mountains, green forests and pastures and rivers that end in salt marshes and arid deserts.

And while it belongs to China, it borders on the Soviet Union and its communications and trade traditionally look toward the U.S.S.R.

But as Chinese confidence grows so apparently do Chinese ambitions. The root of the Soviet-Chinese quarrel either Khrushchev or Mao may be a challenge for leadership.

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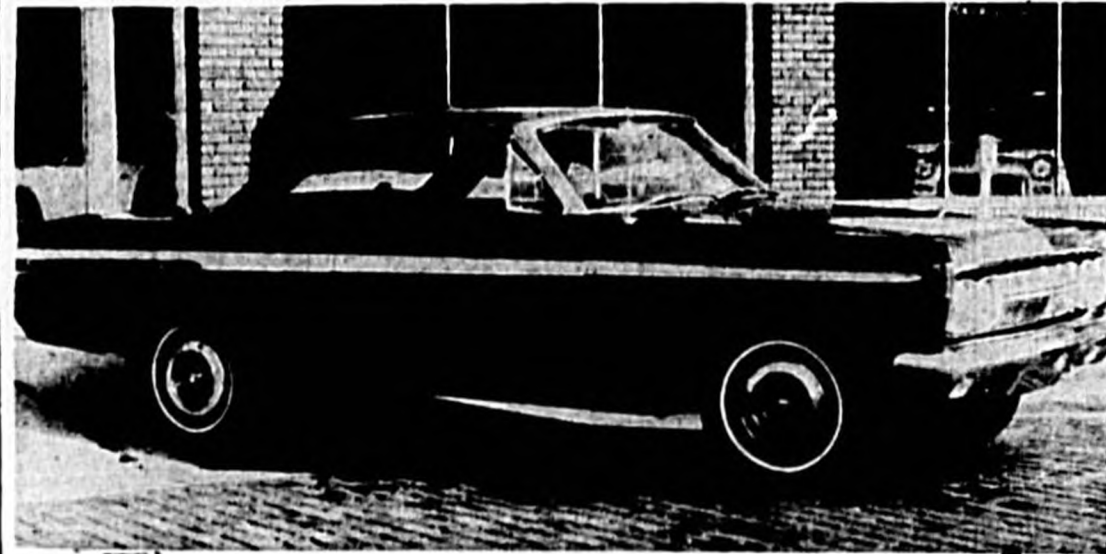

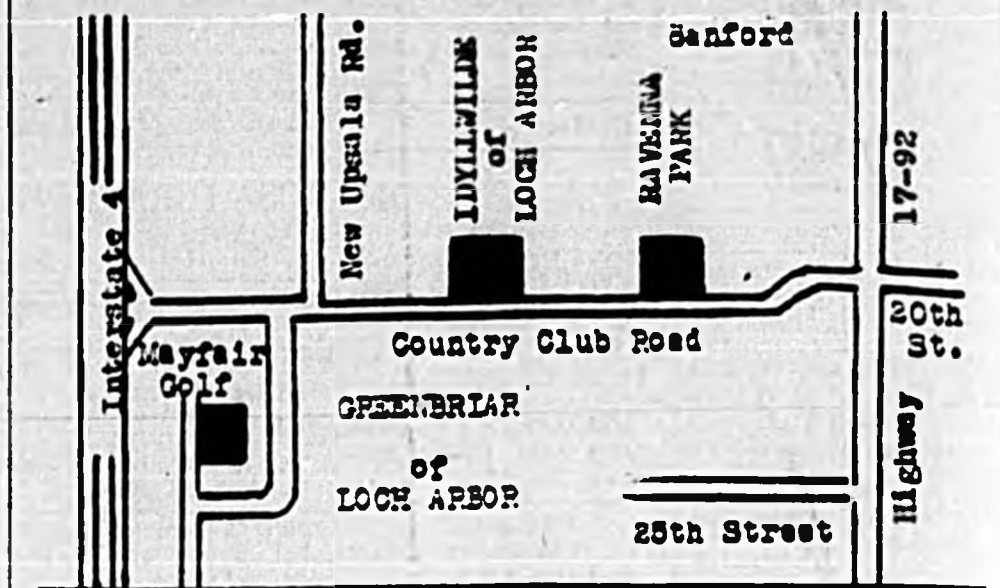

### Moonshot Chief Raps Industry

HOUSTON (UPI) — America's moonshot chief said today industry must improve its standards before U. S. astronauts can make a successful lunar mission.

Walter Williams, deputy director for mission requirements and flight operations for the U. S. Space Agency, blamed poor industrial testing for the failure of Astronaut Gordon Cooper's Mercury capsule to make an automatic re-entry into earth's atmosphere.

John C. French, an assistant space reliability and safety chief, said the tests failed to adjust for handling and shipping of the delicate equipment.

Williams and French spoke at the start of a two-day conference on project Mercury that will detail everything about the highly successful venture from astronaut training to man's reactions in outer space.

Cooper, who made a 22-orbit flight, complained of crowded conditions in the space capsule and said the long countdowns sapped an astronaut's energy. He said the countdowns could be accomplished with the backup pilot.

Cooper said these bugs could be eliminated with little effort to make space flights more comfortable for astronauts.

**Wage Hikes Drop In 6-Year Period**

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Union-negotiated wage increases in major collective bargaining agreements have been getting smaller ever since 1957, Labor Department figures showed today.

A new study by the Bureau of Labor Statistics indicated that the average wage boost in 1962 was eight cents an hour compared with a minimum of 10 cents an hour in the 1955-57 period.

**Fatter Dividend Checks Seen If Tax Cut Legislation OK'd**

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Members of Congress got a report from the Treasury today designed to convince them that the tax cut bill will bring fatter dividend checks to corporation stockholders.

The Treasury said in its report that the extra payments could easily total \$1.5 billion a year.

The report was aimed at persuading the lawmakers that every stockholder would wind up with higher after-tax income even though tougher tax treatment would be imposed on dividend income of big stockholders.

The Treasury's report was made available as the Senate Finance Committee adjourned until Monday its pre-hearing briefings on the \$11 billion tax cut bill, already passed by the House.

The slow pace at which the Senate group moved Thursday at its first session on the measure increased doubts the administration would succeed in getting the tax cut enacted this year.

Other congressional news: Automation: A Senate manpower subcommittee called Ralph L. Vaughn, of the Kaiser Steel Co., and Marvin Miller, of the United Steelworkers Union (AFL-CIO), to testify on the employment impact of automation.

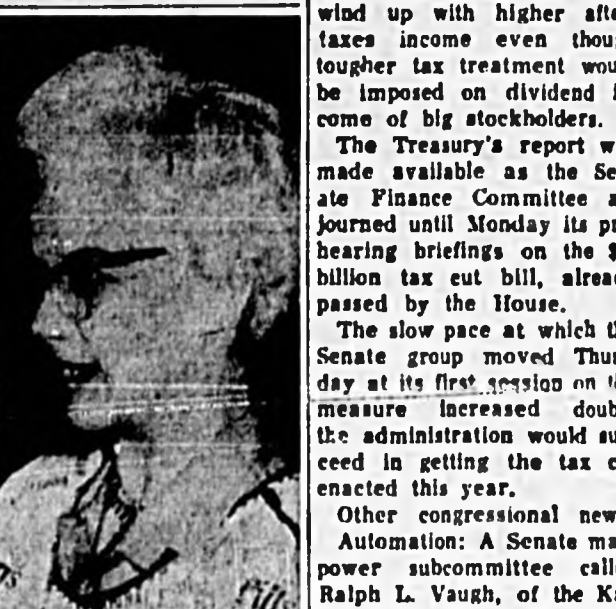

## Seminole County On 'Hurricane Watch'

Sanford and Seminole County were on a "hurricane watch" over the last week, because of Hurricane Flora, it was reported today by A. B. Peterson Jr., disaster chairman of the American Red Cross, who issued the following warnings:

During "Hurricane Alert" it is advisable to keep yourself informed at all times of the actual threat of the storm to your community. In the event the weather bureau indicates the storm as a major threat to your area, it would be wise to check food supplies, water supplies, first aid kits, flashlights, batteries. If necessary, board up or protect the interior of your home from glass, such as picture windows or wide expansion windows. Remember that you are better off at home. The best policy is to remain there. However, should you feel it necessary to seek safety in a hurricane shelter, familiarize yourself with the locations and the procedures for entering a shelter. Remember, the workers helping you during these storms are volunteer workers of your community. All that you can do for yourself lessens their burden and allows them to more effectively care for those in real need.

Hurricane Preparation Check List:

- Radio and television in working order.
- Flashlight batteries and candles on hand.
- Water stored in clean containers.
- Bath tubs filled.
- Food supply on hand.
- First Aid kit available.
- Windows secured.
- Amusement for children (books, games, crayons, etc.).
- Automobile in operating condition with gas tank filled.
- Loose objects in vicinity of house collected.
- Emergency telephone numbers available.

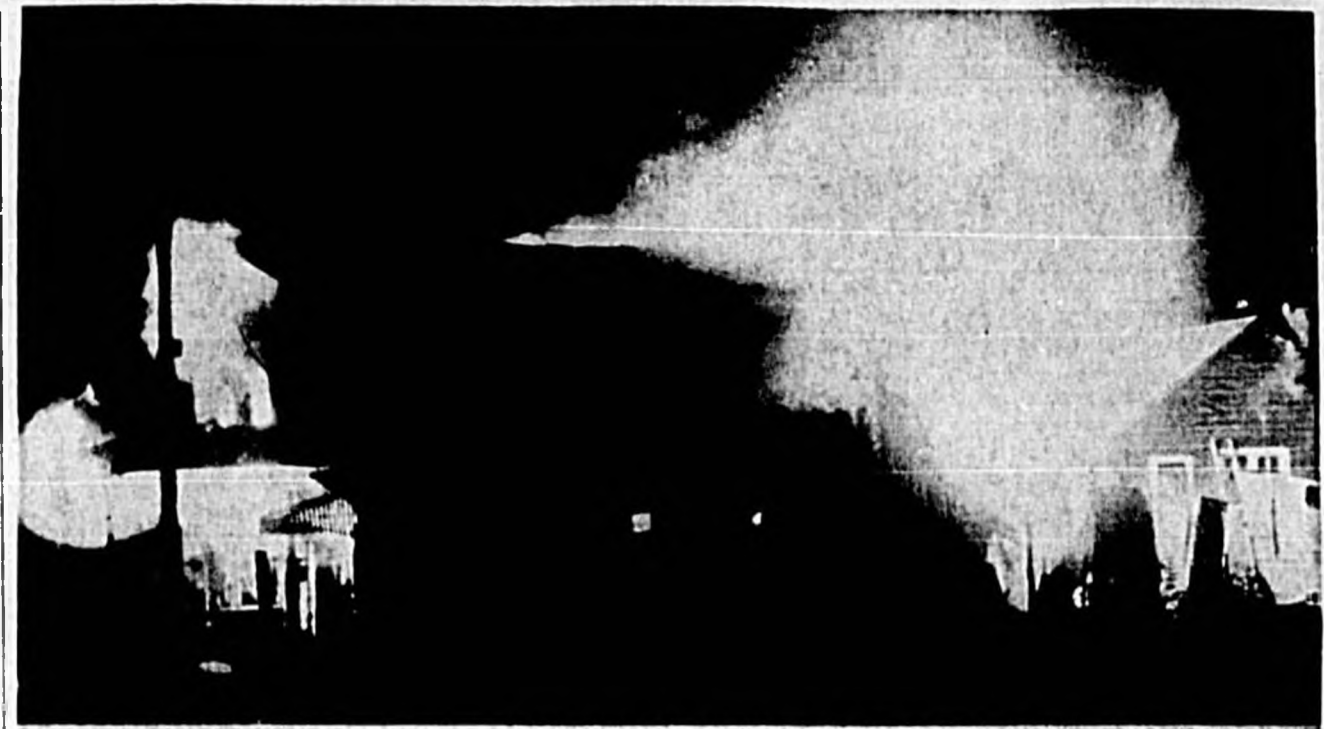
**May OK Observers**

## House Panel OKs Space Funds

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Appropriations Committee voted a record \$5.1 billion today to push space exploration despite a Republican warning that Russia may orbit a 100-megaton bomb while this country concentrates on sending a man to the moon.

The total space allowance was \$251 million less than was authorized by Congress in separate legislation earlier this year and \$612 million less than President Kennedy originally wanted.

The appropriations committee also dropped its annual blockbuster on Kennedy's continuing drive to build fallout shelters not only in federal structures but also in schools, hospitals and other non-profit institutions over the nation.

It voted funds to continue location and marking of potential shelter spaces in existing buildings, public and private, but banned further funds for stocking these spaces and denied every cent sought for new shelter construction.

The actions highlighted committee approval of a \$13 billion appropriation bill carrying funds to finance 26 so-called "independent offices" and agencies of the government in the 12 months that started July 1.

**Mathews Files First Report**  
TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — State Sen. John E. Mathews Jr., only officially announced candidate for governor, filed his first weekly financial accounting today.

The Jacksonville senator reported no expenditures on the campaign since he formally announced a week ago. But he said he has received contributions totaling \$1,075 from 16 persons.

## Cuba Battered For Fourth Straight Day

MIAMI (UPI) — Deadly hurricane Flora made a slow turn northward today, then stalled once again over flooded eastern Cuba to inflict a fourth day of punishment on the region that produces most of the island's food.

Cuban Premier Fidel Castro arrived at Santiago, capital of Oriente, to take personal command of relief operations which appeared from radio reports to be blocked by the continued pounding of torrential rains.

Radio reports of crop and livestock losses, monitored here, began to reach disaster proportions.

At 11 a. m. EST, the Miami Weather Bureau located the hurricane's center near latitude 21.0 north, longitude 78.0 west, south of Camaguey, about halfway between the city and the southern coast. This was about the same location the storm took up early today after it drifted slightly northward out of the bay of Guacanayabo.

"The steering currents surrounding the hurricane remain quite weak and variable so movement will be very slow," the Weather Bureau said. "However, there are some indications of a trend to a slow northward drift at not more than five miles per hour beginning late today or tonight."

The Weather Bureau warned all interests north of the storm, "particularly the Bahamas," to maintain vigilance.

Forecasters refused to speculate whether the storm would offer a threat to the United States after crossing Cuba but said if it continued in a northerly course it would pass east of the Florida coast.

On Havana radio, Carlos Rafael Rodriguez, president of Cuba's Agrarian Reform Institute, reported this morning that half of Cuba's rice crop had been destroyed, 28 to 30 per cent of the cotton crop and 40 million pounds of corn had been lost.

Rodriguez also said poultry farms of central and eastern Cuba had suffered "enormous damage." Chicken and rice are the main staples of the Cuban diet.

Unofficial radio reports estimated 90 per cent of Cuba's coffee crop, which had just reached maturity in the Oriente mountains, had been destroyed.

Flora's highest winds, which reached 140 m.p.h. when it hit Haiti last Thursday and caused at least 400 deaths, decreased to 85 m.p.h. today when the center moved back over land.

The Cuban radio reports carefully avoided any mention of casualties but gave plentiful indication that the two million persons in the ravaged areas were suffering.

## Hunt For Girl's Killer Pushed

JOHNSON CITY, Tenn. (UPI) — Police pushed a round-the-clock search today for the killer of a dark-haired 4-year-old girl who was strangled with her father's necktie.

Funeral services for Theresa Ann Neal will be held Tuesday afternoon. She would have been five years old this month.

The child was found about 9 p. m. Saturday — still alive — in a garbage can on the porch of her parents' home about two feet from the kitchen door. She was rushed to the hospital while police tried mouth-to-mouth resuscitation, but she died in the ambulance.

## Fires Hit In Three Areas In Seminole

Fire struck at three points in Seminole County last weekend, razing five buildings, placing one man in the hospital and threatening the entire Negro community of Midway on Highway 46 east.

Credit for saving the community early Sunday was given to volunteer firemen of the Longwood and Lake Mary departments and members of the Florida Forestry Service, who fought the stubborn blaze for two hours before bringing it under control.

Chief Ralph Abell, of the Lake Mary department, said the blaze started at about 1:30 a. m. in a home occupied by Lula Reid and quickly spread to a house owned by Lila Mae Bell, a warehouse owned by Lester Veno and a two-story store building owned by a Mr. Harvey.

Melvin King, Negro occupant of one of the houses, was reported in "fair" condition this morning by Seminole Memorial Hospital attaches. King suffered from smoke inhalation and burns about the face and arms.

Sheriff's deputies and highway troopers regulated traffic, compelling hundreds of persons attracted by the fire to keep moving. Florida Power and Light employees cleared the roads of falling utility lines.

Home of C. D. Thompson on South Lake Jessup Ave., Oviedo, was destroyed by fire at 4:30 p. m. Friday.

Fire Chief T. L. Lingo Jr. said the blaze was started when a gas truck driver connected a hose to the tank of the house. A safety valve exploded and shot flames, which ignited the house.

Sanford firemen answered a call at 3:15 a. m. Sunday to the home of Miss Margaret Roberts at 116 South Laurel Avenue. Fire damaged a downstairs bedroom and hallway and smoke and heat damaged two upstairs rooms.

## Boykin Draws \$40,000 Fine

BALTIMORE, Md. (UPI) — Federal Judge Roszel C. Thomsen today fined former Alabama Congressman Frank W. Boykin \$40,000 and placed him on probation for six months in connection with conflict of interest and conspiracy charges.

Former Maryland Congressman Thomas F. Johnson was given a six-month prison term and fined \$5,000 in the same case.

J. Kenneth Eillin, a former Maryland savings and loan operator, received a one-year prison term and a fine of \$18,000. Miami attorney William Robinson received a prison term of six months.

Boykin's fine was in lieu of a prison sentence. The 78-year-old Boykin is currently in Georgetown University Hospital in Washington, recovering from a heart attack. His attorney presented an affidavit asking that the sentencing be delayed.

## Father Assails Mme. Nhu

NEW YORK (UPI) — Mme. Ngo Dinh Nhu Sunday sharply criticized U. S. officials in South Viet Nam Sunday and was, in turn, sharply criticized by her father, their country's former ambassador to the United States.

Mme. Nhu and the father, Tran Van Chuong, spoke in separate television interviews about the troubled political situation in the Southeast Asian nation.

The controversial Mme. Nhu, sister-in-law of South Viet Nam President Ngo Dinh Diem, charged that U. S. officials in the country gave the impression of being merely "spectators of a show."

## Diem Says Army Now Can Win

SAIGON (UPI) — President Ngo Dinh Diem said today his U. S.-supported army now has the strength to take the offensive against the Communist Viet Cong guerrillas "on all fronts."

Diem's speech to the newly elected national assembly was made as a U. S. congressional investigation team began probing the political situation and war effort of this Southeast Asian nation.

The mission's leader, Rep. Clement Zablocki, (D-Wis.), said the results of the investigation might affect aid appropriations to this and other nations.

Diem predicted "certain victory" in the war against the guerrillas.

"At this same date last year, we were able to say that we had stopped being on the defensive and that we had been able to seize the initiative from the enemy's hands," he said. "Today we have gone one step further."

"We are capable of taking the offensive on all fronts. It has become obvious to all observers that the war has taken an important turn toward a certain and meaningful victory."

## Parole Chairman

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Veteran State Parole Board member Raymond Marsh will take over as chairman of the board for the fourth time today. Marsh replaces Roy Russell, another board member, at the post of chairman.
