'OK Without Delay' On Peace Site - Reds

WASHINGTON (AP) — South Vietnamese officials today said they are ready to accept a peace settlement "without delay" to Phnom Penh or Warsaw as the site for preliminary peace talks and also stop all attacks on North Vietnamese territory.

152s Hit Hardest Blows

SANFORD (AP) — Waves of American 152s hit South Vietnam's A Shau Valley with more than 1,000 tons of bombs Wednesday and today in the war's heaviest aerial blows for a 24-hour period.

At least 60 of the eight-engine Superfortresses streaked over the valley from bases in Thailand and Guam to bomb North Vietnamese truck parks, storage areas and troop concentrations.

The 25-mile-long valley has become the No. 1 target for the B-52 saturation bombing. Senior U.S. officers believe the North Vietnamese may be using the valley as a staging area for another major attack on Hue, 25 miles to the northeast.

The Communist command is believed to have 25 to 30 battalions in the Hue area, perhaps 15,000 to 20,000 men. The valley is used to funnel enemy troops and supplies from Laos eastward to the fringes of the old imperial capital on the coast where the enemy made his most determined stand during the lunar new year offensive in February.

London Bridge Falling

LONDON (AP) — London Bridge is finally falling down—and the Americans are picking up the pieces.

The City of London Corporation announced the sale of the bridge to an American bidder Tuesday night and said the purchaser would be revealed later this week.

In Lake Havasu City, Ariz., a spokesman for the McCulloch Corp., a bidder for the bridge, said a news conference was called to announce that the firm won the bid.

But the spokesman, Frederick Schumacher, director of McCulloch's Lake Havasu City development, said, "If we don't win the bid, we'll just all have breakfast" at the news conference.

The price was estimated unofficially at \$2.4 million. Schumacher said it would cost about \$24,000 to strip the 10,000 tons of granite to Arizona.

McCulloch planned to rebuild the bridge at Lake Havasu City, a resort on the Colorado River. The 130-year-old bridge joins the liners Queen Mary and Queen Elizabeth and sundry churches and castles on the transatlantic journey.

"How much for Buckingham Palace?" quipped one Briton of the monument's fate.

A London Bridge has spanned the Thames in one form or another since Roman times 2,000 years ago. It has been falling down for centuries in the popular nursery rhyme.

The present bridge, built in 1831 and one of 12 across the Thames in London, is too narrow for today's heavy traffic. A wider bridge will replace it.

Race Funds On Increase

TALLAHASSEE — (AP) — Comptroller Fred O. Dickinson Jr. announced today the release of \$5,618,000 in racing monies to Florida's 67 counties for use in April.

Dickinson said this brings the season's total amount distributed to \$16,961,000, an increase of \$1,149,000 over funds distributed last year.

An equal distribution of \$24,000 was sent to each county this month. Since the beginning of the racing season in November, the per-county share has been \$17,000 higher than it was for the same period last season, Dickinson said.

Eight-inch Snow Whips Rockies

BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS — A spring storm laced the central Rockies and adjacent plains today, blasting portions of Wyoming, Utah and Colorado with as much as eight inches of wind-whipped snow.

Highway crews worked throughout the night in southwestern Wyoming, but strong winds and blowing snow frustrated their efforts and made some roads impassable almost as soon as snowfalls left. Five-foot drifts clogged portions of Interstate in just east of Laramie.

Warnings to travelers and stockmen remained in effect for parts of Wyoming, Colorado, Nebraska, Utah and New Mexico. Much of the same region was hit by a major snowstorm last two weeks ago.

Eight inches of snow fell at Laramie and four inches at Rawlins, Wyo. Denver measured a three-inch accumulation.

Temperatures slid into the 20s from Montana and the Dakotas southward into Colorado. Thunderstorms rumbling a head of the snowstorm lashed portions of Nebraska with heavy rain, hail and strong winds.

Sen. McCarthy Urges Dean Rusk To Quit

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy, campaigning in Indiana, says he would get 21 per cent of the vote to 28 for President Johnson if the chief executive—who says he won't seek re-election—were to run in 1968.

McCarthy also wants Secretary of State Dean Rusk to resign because of his association with the Vietnam war.

McCarthy's challenge to Rusk was made during a speech to the Democratic caucus in the state capital of Indianapolis.

McCarthy said Rusk is "the only candidate" and that he is willing to debate all other White House contenders together, including Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, who is expected to be a candidate.

There was no comment from the Johnson administration regarding McCarthy's demand that Rusk leave.

On the Republican side, Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller, who says he won't run for the GOP nomination, but will accept a draft to the American Society of Newspaper Editors convention. He said he will make a series of speeches on major issues.

Some of Rockefeller's key associates are pressuring him to move toward active candidacy.

The State Poll in California reported Rockefeller would carry California if the presidential election were held today.

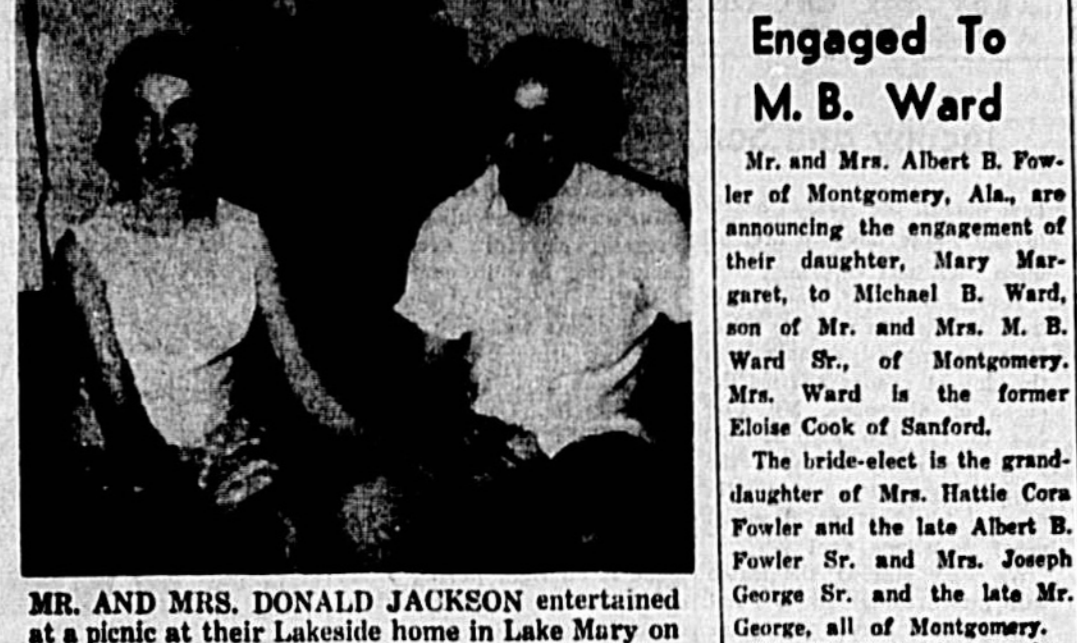
