LOUGHRAN IS SET TO DEFEND TITLE AGAINST WALKER

Important Fight Will Take Place In New-Y Completed Arena

CHICAGO, Mar. 27.—(INS)—An army of building craftsmen were working feverishly today putting the finishing touches on Pauly Harmon's spacious Chicago stadium that, it might be ready and comfortable for the 25,000 customer's expected to witness tomorrow night's opening spectacle—Tommy Loughran defending his light heavyweight championship against Micky Walker.

Installation of ring-side and main floor seats is about the only important task yet to be accomplished. Harmon says, the gigantic structure will be ready and that its size and beauty of design will be a revelation to the opening throng. Loughran and Walker, both are ready to go.

Walker, the ambitious middleweight champion who hopes to annex the next higher title, finished the strenuous part of his training yesterday. Loughran is spending with similar work the day before. Both are said by experts who watched the final workouts to be in "top" condition.

The bout will be 10 rounds to a decision with Loughran, light heavyweight crown at stake. Because he is so sure he can lift it, the heavy-handed challenger has agreed to take only \$10,000 if he succeeds—an amount that would barely cover his training expenses. Walker figures the difference can be more than made up later on with the title in his possession.

If he loses, Walker will receive \$40,000 to be paid out of Loughran's gross cut which will run in excess of 50 per cent of the total gate. There was little doubt today that Loughran will be able to make the weight—175 pounds. Walker will go in at close to 160, his best fighting weight.
