Altamonte Police Shoot 2 In Unrelated Incidents

Altamonte Springs police officers shot two men Friday in unrelated incidences of burglary and suspected burglary. One man was shot fleeing from police. The second man was shot at his home, apparently the innocent victim of a police mistake.

Elliott Brown, 32, was shot inside his home at 401 Alcazar, Altamonte Springs, when a policeman apparently mistook a Glock bottle in his hands for a weapon. Seminole County Sheriff's Department spokesman John Spolaki said.

Brown was listed in critical condition at Florida Hospital in Orlando Saturday morning.

The policeman was responding to a break-in call, Spolaki said.

He said the Seminole County Sheriff's Department and the State Attorney's office have been asked to investigate the incident.

Patrolman David Vendor and Richard Beary were sent to the Brown home in the San Sebastian subdivision at 4:45 p.m. after receiving a call from a neighbor who reported a burglar had broken past the house and reported seeing an open front door and someone inside, Spolaki said.

Beary went to the rear of the house and Vendor approached the front, he said. Vendor, looking through the open door, spotted Brown moving and saw that he was carrying a dark object, Spolaki said.

Then Vendor, about seven feet away, fired his revolver once through the open door, striking Brown in the right shoulder. The bullet passed through Brown's shoulder but apparently severed an artery, police said.

Vendor and Beary have been placed on administrative duties until after the investigation, Spolaki said.

Earlier Friday, at another Altamonte Springs address, what began as a burglary report ended with an Orlando man shot by a police officer, another man jailed and hundreds of dollars of property damage done following a high speed chase through an Altamonte Springs subdivision.

The incident began at 12:30 p.m. when Marty Turner, 41, of 201 Hickory Lane came home to find a man in her home with a hatchet in his hand.

Saudis And U.S. Facing Collision

UNITED NATIONS (UPI) — Saudi Arabia, America's biggest supplier of oil, is pushing for a course with Washington to call for the ouster of Israel from the U.S. General Assembly.

Addressing the General Assembly Friday, Saudi Foreign Minister Prince Saud al-Faisal also urged a "holy war" by Muslims and Christians to free Jerusalem from Israeli control.

In the harshest denunciation against Israel ever issued by a Saudi official, Saud blasted the Jewish state for annexing the holy city and building new settlements "on the usurped Palestinian and Arab territories."

Saud said Israel has ignored the U.N. Security Council's 1947 decision which declared Israel's decision to make Jerusalem its capital null and void and asked all nations to withdraw their diplomatic missions from that city.



'Fall For Art' Show Next Weekend

The streets and sidewalks of Downtown Sanford will come alive with color and excitement Oct. 11 and 12 when Sanford-Seminole Art Association holds its annual Fall For Art walk and craft show.

Approximately 160 artists and craftsmen are expected to have displays on First Street between Park Avenue and Palmatino Avenue and on Magnolia between First and Third streets.

The sidewalk show is free to the public and will be open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday and noon to 5 p.m. on Sunday.

Ministers Cautious About Mixing Politics, Religion

"The Moral Majority," the religious and political movement currently sweeping the nation.

The Moral Majority is not only having Washington, D.C., but Dallas, Indianapolis and Seminole County.

In 1979, more than 12,000 persons attended the Dallas Freedom Rally to protest against a television station which three evangelist James Robison of the air because he preached against homosexuality.

The rally raised \$100,000 for legal expenses which were used to put Robison back on the air.

In Indiana, Greg Dixon, pastor of the 7,000 member Indianapolis Baptist Temple forced by his preaching in Marion County Prosecutor James Kelly to not seek re-election.

In Virginia, legislation was passed denying state jurisdiction over Christian day care centers.

These are examples of fundamentalist Christians or "The New Right" which are getting involved with politics.

In a book about the Moral Majority, author Richard Viguerie describes fundamentalist Christians as "born-again Christians disturbed about sex on TV, hard-working citizens sick and tired of high taxes and ever-rising inflation and as prodigal citizens alarmed by unemployment and weakness in U.S. foreign policy."

The New Right membership will grow after Bible-believing Americans become better organized, says Viguerie.

The organization Evangelist Jerry Falwell has formed the Moral Majority, Inc., an organization which aims to mobilize Americans to work for pro-God and pro-family policies in government.

This organization and others have registered 2.5 million new voters. Their goal for Nov. 4 is registering five million new voters.

Book said as a citizen he has a right to support anyone he wants to.

"I'm going to wear my Reagan button on the pulpit," he said. "I'm sure the Christian Church wears their Carter buttons."

Another new conservative Christian organization is The Religious Roundtable.

One of the Roundtable's 56 Board of Directors is Herb Bowdoin of 294 Altamonte Springs Drive.

"Our main purpose is to get Christian leaders to Washington, D.C. to help them to better understand politics and the workings of the government," Rev. Bowdoin said.

"Why shouldn't Christians be involved?" Government is very much involved in our lives," he said.

Bowdoin, who is a Methodist evangelist, said he encourages people to study the issues, to register and to study candidates, but he opposes people who go to the pulpit and try to get their congregation to vote for one individual.

Is local government feeling the pressure of the new movement?

"As an individual, I don't think Church and State mixes go well," said Altamonte Mayor Norman Floyd.

Floyd said that there has always been some degree of involvement between the two institutions.

Floyd amusingly added that "a lot of politicians could egg it (religion)."

Cassberry Mayor Owen Sheppard said that on a local level, he does not object to the New Right.

"On the national level, sometimes people don't know all the facts involved," Mayor Sheppard said.

"People start making demands, when sometimes they really don't know what they're talking about."

Mayor Sheppard said churches are a part of the community and he doesn't object to preachers commenting on local political issues.

Sanford Mayor Lee P. Moore said it didn't matter to him whether a minister told his congregation to vote for a specific candidate.

Moore said he felt it was up to the individual whether to discuss politics.

"I do promote concern for the nation," said Rev. Leo King of First United Methodist Church on 419 Park Ave., "but I don't promote from the pulpit any individual candidates."

Rev. King said there is a freedom of choice, as the church should not dictate.

"I don't have the right to tell my people who to vote for, just like I don't have the right to tell them what to buy at the grocery store," said Father Clement Kubus of the Church of the Nativity at 603 W. County Road, Lake Mary.

Father Kubus also said that as leaders of the faith community, they have an obligation to speak out on the issues.

"But, I would not be permitted to speak out for specific candidates," he said.

Unusual Operation Allows Girl To Speak

NEW YORK (UPI) — To doctors, the operation on Adalita Bowie was perhaps the first of its kind. To the 7-year-old girl, it meant she could open her mouth and speak — for the first time.

"Mummy, it hurts," the child from Panama said Friday to her aunt and guardian, Lovinia Veira of Brooklyn.

Adalita, nicknamed Millie, represents what Dr. Stewart Sliper called "the only case that we know of" in which a child was born with extra jaw bones on both sides of her face that kept her from opening her mouth.

Adalita sat quietly clutching a nurse doll, her face puffy from Wednesday's delicate six-hour operation, but the second-grader apparently realized the significance of the surgery.

"This is a once-in-a-lifetime thing," she mumbled to her aunt. Adalita then opened her mouth painfully during a news conference at New York Infirmary-Bethuel Downtown Hospital, where the operation took place.

Ms. Veira said Millie, born in Panama City, has lived with her for the past year after her father died and her mother suffered a nervous breakdown because of

ZERÓ YEAR: Ever since 1848, every president elected in a year ending in zero has died in office — a fact that might pose a jinx for the candidate of 1980. But President Carter isn't spooked by it. The question was raised Thursday at a Dayton, Ohio, town meeting by high school senior Ken Day who asked the campaigning Carter what he thought of the statistic. Said Carter, "I'm willing to take the chance." That won a round of applause, and he added, "I don't say that in a silly way. Even if I knew I would die, I would still run for the office because I think it's the most exciting and challenging and important position in the free world. It's an office revered by the American people and for anyone in politics it's the ultimate achievement."

From Frisbees To Discoveries Of Early Explorers...

Floridiana Source Of Books On State

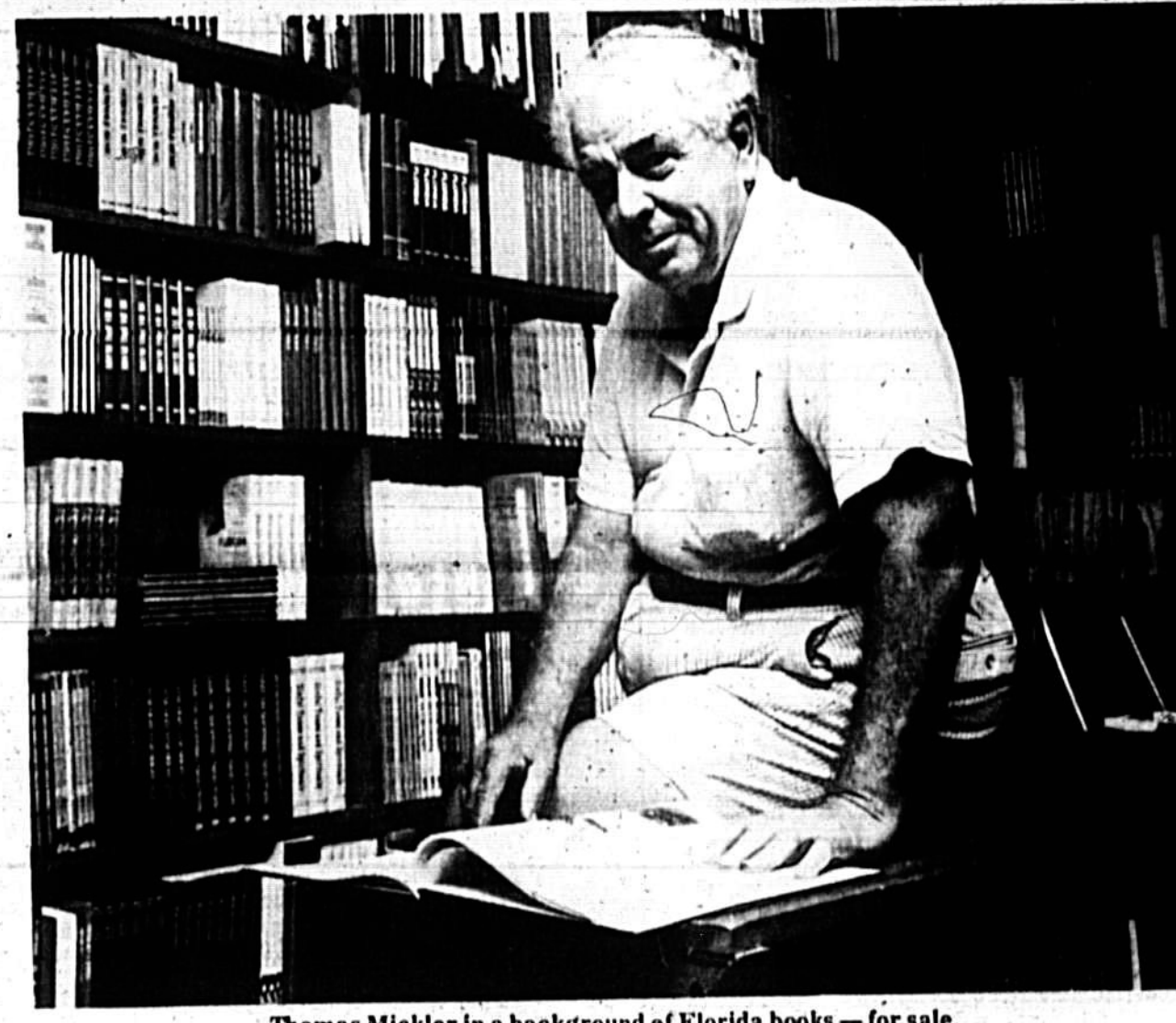

Just to drive by the house one would never think it contained 40,000 books. It looks like a fine example of an early twentieth century Florida home. Facing Lake Cabernet in Chuluota, the house has a wide front porch with several painted wooden chairs. It is the kind of porch families used to sit on after supper and have a good talk. But it is also the home of a man who has collected and read books on Florida history for 30 years. Thomas Mikler has built during the 17 years they have lived there.

The Miklers of Chuluota specialize in books that pertain to Florida. Maps, newspapers, documents and memorabilia, all of which have something to do with the Sunshine State are for sale. Mikler's Floridiana is the name of their business. It started almost 20 years ago with an interest of Mrs. Mikler for tracing out-of-print books. Searching for books and filling orders slowly grew into a business for the couple. "We only wanted enough business that two could handle," explained Mikler. He would go on the road for a week at a time taking orders, then drive back home and fill them. Back on the road he went delivering the books. All the traveling got to be more than he wanted, so they decided to cut down. In cutting down time on the road, the mail orders increased and additional help had to be hired to handle the orders and the growing stock of Florida-related publications.

In addition to dealing in books, the Miklers are also publishers. Two recent books published by them are "The Billy Hoel's War" by James Covington, a story of the third summer of the 1800s, and Alma Heberling's "Silver of the Long Water" which tells about the days when steamboats ran from Kissimmee south to Lake Okechobee. The Miklers do business mainly with schools and libraries, filling their needs for Floridiana, but individuals may also purchase items. Each year they put out a catalog listing Florida material they have acquired from hundreds of publishing companies. This year's catalog lists over 800 books, maps and other publications, many of which are now out-of-print. "And that's not 20 percent of what we have," Mikler said. These items listed in their catalog are books they expect to be able to supply for a full year which occupy only one room of the Miklers home. Subject matter runs the gamut from frisbees to the works and discoveries of early explorers. Cookbooks, guides to gardening, fishing, and raising reptiles can be found with the writings of Marjorie Kinman Rawlings, treasure maps of Florida and books on Florida law. Mikler is quick to stress however, that they do not have a store. People may visit their home and business — but by appointment only. In person, one may see thousands of items too limited to list in the catalog. Many are one-of-a-kind books, maps or documents from Florida's colorful past.

There is a treatise on slavery written in 1823 by a slave trader who specialized in training slaves for work as servants in the home or as farmhands. Another rare work is the Florida section of a 1865 German translation of an earlier work entitled "Voyages to America." The Miklers have over 3,000 newspapers dating from 1759 through 1828. All have at least one article pertaining to Florida though few are from Florida. Mikler explained that there exist very few Florida-related books. See FLORIDIANA, Page 1C

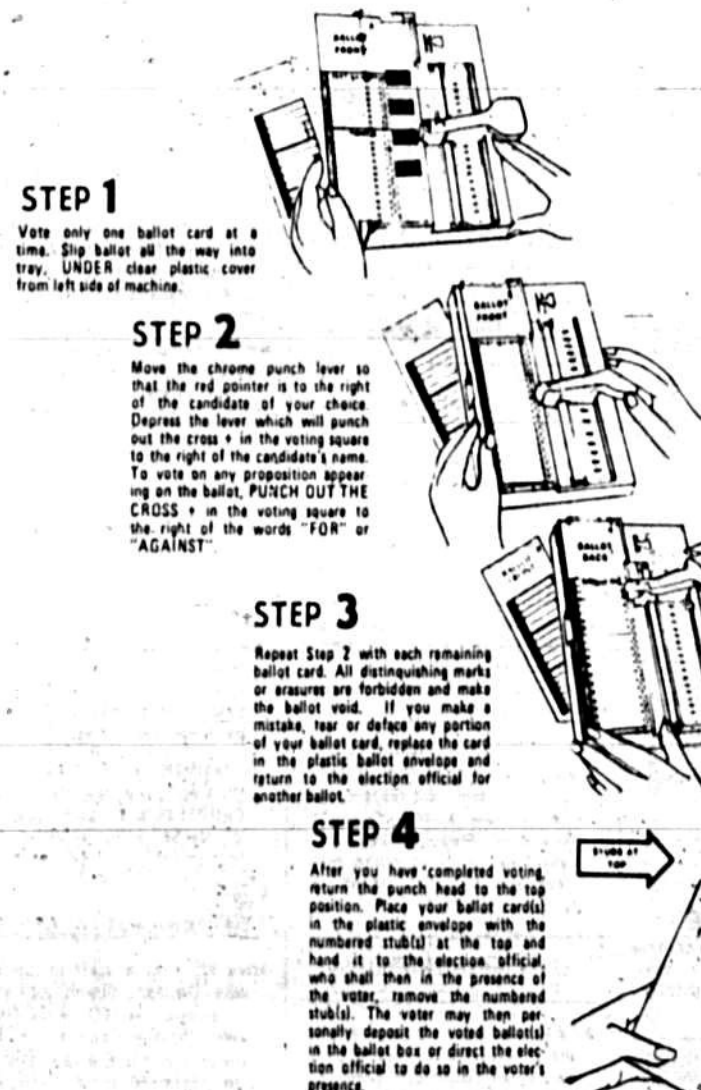

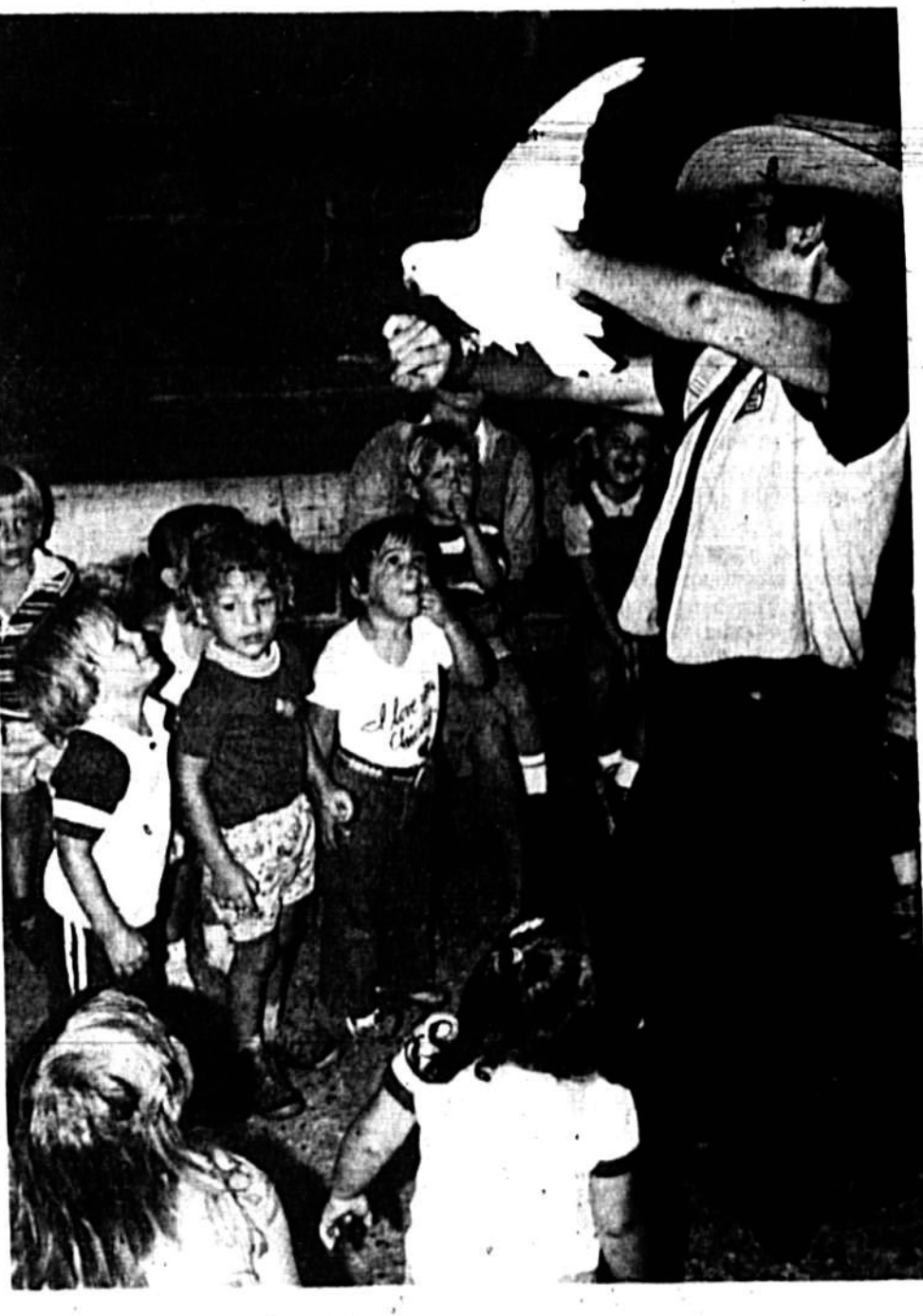

newspapers from the South from before the Civil War. During that war, newspapers were recycled in the South for other uses. "Anywhere in the South," Mickler said, "newspapers prior to the Civil War are extremely rare."

While the Micklers deal primarily with school libraries, they have had customers write for books from numerous foreign countries. Hong Kong, Australia, the Bahamas, Luxembourg, Spain, Denmark, Pago Pago and Israel are a few. "I don't really know how some of those people found out about us," Mickler said.

Another book in the Micklers' livingroom contains photos of life in early Florida but it isn't for sale. The photos show the original prints of Chulohota taken in the early 1900s.

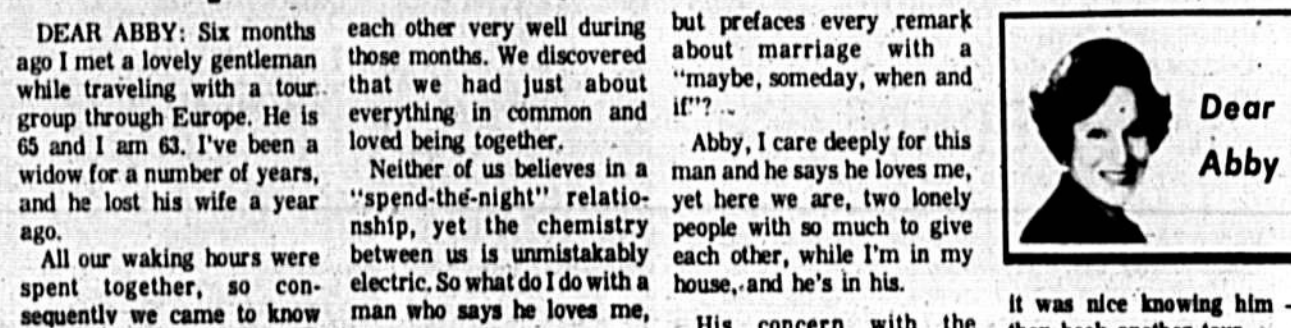
Their home was one of the first permanent structures built. It was built in 1913 by the Florida East Coast Railroad for their real estate agent. The agent's wife is reported to have refused moving to Chulohota without first having a decent house to live in.

Photos show the house on the lake with the train station across the street. Others show the hotel that was built a few years later. Mickler said Henry Flager built the railroad down through Maytown, Chulohota, Keansville and on to Lake Okechobee to take advantage of the good cattail business coming out of the lake.

The Micklers are in the process of putting out a new catalog and copies are available by writing to Mickler's Floridiana, Chulohota, Fla., 32696. They still trace out-of-print books and have scouts always searching. Should anyone come across any old books in his attic or wherever, the Micklers would be happy to talk with you about them. "We're always interested in picking up Florida books," she said.

And if you need anything dealing with Florida, get in touch. There is a good chance they have a copy in their unusual collection of Floridiana.

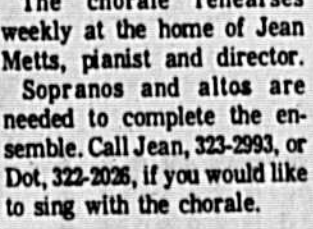

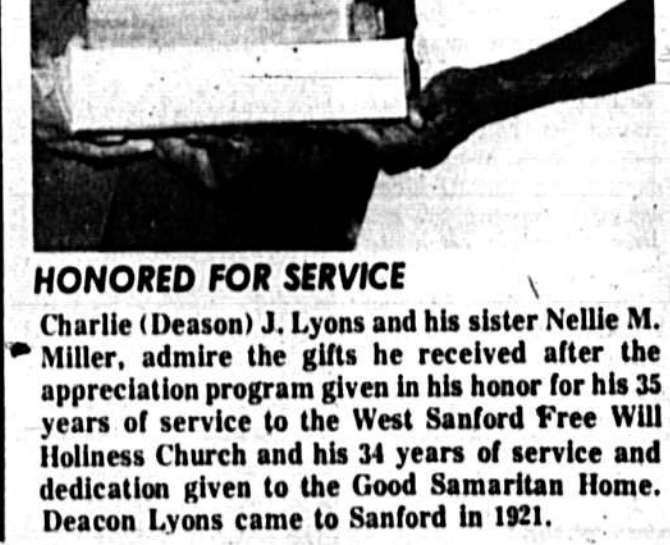

FSU Grant To Assist Statewide Libraries

Secretary of State George Firestone has announced that Florida State University has been awarded an \$8,887 grant to assist the State Library of Florida in conducting film workshops for librarians statewide.

The workshops - scheduled for Palm Beach, Manatee, Marion, Clay and Leon counties in January, 1981 - will open a new range of services for many public libraries in the state by making the State Library's film collection more accessible to library users.

The State Library of Florida, which is located in Tallahassee and is administered by the Department of State, currently has more than 3,300 films in its collection. Public and institutional libraries may draw from the State Library's collection for local viewing.

Librarians attending the workshops will be trained in using films from the collection to reach various audiences. Participants also will explore various public techniques, and will learn the technical aspects of film programming.

Florida State University's Center for Professional Development and Public Service will coordinate the series of five workshops, with State Library of Florida staff and a national film specialist conducting the sessions.

The \$8,887 grant for the project was approved by Firestone from funds made available through the Federal Library Services and Construction Act. The grant is administered by the Florida Department of State through the State Library of Florida.

County Employee Denies Making Threatening Call

The Seminole County Commission will be asked to rule Tuesday on the appeal of an employee who was fired for allegedly making a threatening phone call.

Mildred Long, a motor vehicle inspector at the Sanford station in the county's Department of Public Safety, was accused of making a threatening phone call to Milton Raw, Motor Vehicle Inspection supervisor at the Casselberry station.

The call was allegedly made at about 7 p.m. Aug. 29 according to a report in the county commission agenda for Tuesday made by Personnel Director Lois Martin.

Martin reported that the personnel board ruled that Ms. Long was in violation of county's Merit System Rules and Regulations and agreed her employment with the county should be terminated.

Ms. Long, Martin reported, maintains that her dismissal amounts to a "set-up," a "conspiracy," "sex discrimination" and "harassment." In an effort to oust her as a female motor vehicle inspector.

She also maintains, Martin said, that she never talked to Raw on the phone, that she wasn't furnished with a copy of any of the evidence against her or even told what she was supposed to have said to Raw. She also contends, Martin said, that she was fired without being given "due process of law" and feels the county should be made to prove its case against her rather than the other way around.

Martin requested that the commission uphold Ms. Long's termination and deny her appeal. —DIANE PETRYK

County To Hear Track Presentation

Marc Robinson, a principle in the harness racing track proposed for construction in Lake Mary, will be making a presentation before Seminole County commissioners at a 7 p.m. meeting today in the county commission chambers at the courthouse.

County Commission Chairman Bill Kirchhoff said today the meeting was called because some portions of the proposed track will have an impact on the county. He specifically pointed to an impact on roads and on water and sewer facilities.

Kirchhoff also mentioned the proposal by Robinson for future development on the west side of Interstate 4 into housing and commercial uses as another point of interest to the county.

The "public meeting" is for informational purposes for the county commissioners and the public, Kirchhoff said. He said the criterion for the meeting will be a presentation by Robinson, then questioning by county staff members and public comment.

Kirchhoff said he has been meeting with various groups of citizens whose homes are located around the proposed track location off Lake Emma Road and south of Lake Mary Boulevard.

Robinson has said his organization will pay for the construction of an interchange, 1 1/2 miles south of the Lake Mary interchange.

Robinson has said that the proposed \$100 million raceway will cost approximately \$11 million. He said the raceway will pay Lake Mary more than \$1.000 annually in property taxes at if the city levies \$150 per day tax on the track, the city will receive another \$10,000 annually.

At a meeting 10 days ago in Lake Mary, nearly 300 citizens attended to see Robinson's present, then those attending from Lake Mary as well as from subdivisions in the unincorporated area protested the location of the part-municipal watering facility.

Only one citizen at the meeting, Dorothy Harnes of Lake Mary indicated her support for the track. Another Lake Mary citizen, Mike Murray, noted her support for the facility in a conversation with Mayor Walter Sorenson, Sorenson said.

The Lake Mary City Council has instructed City Attorney Gary Massey to take whatever court action necessary to stop the raceway from being constructed. Massey has said he will seek injunctive relief in the courts.

At the same time, the city would set aside \$12,000 in the budget to pay the legal costs for court action.

Those who opposed the facility at the Lake Mary meeting said the track would cause noise pollution, increased traffic on unimproved roads, decrease the value of adjacent single-family homes and impact police and fire department services.

Robinson has said the track will provide its own security and fire protection within the facility.

Wally Pugh of the state Department of Transportation, office in Deland has said Robinson's chances of having an interchange constructed on Lake Mary Boulevard are dim.

7 Lawyers Seek Williams' Seat

Seven lawyers from Seminole and Brevard counties have filed applications seeking appointment to the 18th Judicial Circuit judgeship left vacant by the retirement of Judge Vole Williams.

Gary Massey, chairman of the judicial nominating committee for this judgeship, said those who have filed applications to date include: Seymour Benson, Arthur Friedman, Richard Leigh, O.H. Eaton and County Judge Wallace Hall of Seminole County and Perry West and Dean Masley of Brevard County.

West, four weeks ago, lost an election for a circuit judge seat.

for a circuit judgeship in Seminole and Brevard to Gil Gilchrist of Brevard. Benson and Leigh have law offices in Orange County, but live in Seminole. Masley is an assistant state attorney in Brevard.

Massey said the deadline for receiving applications is Oct. 10.

After the committee reviews the applications and speaks individually to the applicants, it will make a list of three recommendations to Gov. Bob Graham. Graham will choose one of the three recommended for the seat.

Fight Vowed For Hospital In Deltona

At least one of the agencies proposing to build a hospital in Deltona will appeal a Florida Office of Community Medical Facilities' decision Friday to deny all applications.

Larry Welch, administrator of West Volusia Memorial Hospital in Deland, said the hospital will appeal through the state and district court if necessary. West Volusia Memorial had proposed to build a 90-bed hospital in Deltona.

Spokesmen for both groups said this morning they are still considering whether to appeal.

Nat Ward, assistant administrator of the Office of Community Medical Facilities in Tallahassee said the groups have 30 days to notify the office of their intent to appeal. The first step in any appeal would be a hearing before a hearing examiner appointed by the state according to the state Administrative Procedures Act. The second step would be to take the matter to court.

"We are definitely appealing," Welch said. "We feel a hospital is needed in Deltona and the time to begin to meet that need is now."

But Ward said his agencies decision was based on the area-wide plan of the Health Systems Agency of north East Florida (HSA-NEF) which calls for a reduction of beds by 1985.

Northeast Florida has about 6 beds per 1,000 population, Ward said, while the plan calls for 4.3 beds per 1,000 in five years.

Some areas of Volusia County may be overbedded, Welch said, but west Volusia is not. He said there is a need in the Deltona area for 60 to 90 beds.

Welch blamed the approval of hospital expansion in Sanford as use of the reasons the Deltona proposals were denied.

He said promoters of the Sanford facility played a political game by calling the proposed new facility a replacement for Seminole Memorial Hospital.

"A true replacement wouldn't have affected us," Welch said. "But it isn't a replacement, it's an expansion."

Seminole Memorial Hospital has 196 beds. Its replacement will have 230 beds as approved by the Health Systems Agency of East Central Florida (HSA-EFCF).

Hospital Corporation of America, the Nashville firm that purchased Seminole Memorial and will build a new hospital in Sanford if granted a Certificate of Need by the state, has acknowledged that one-third of Seminole Memorial's patients come from Deltona and a hospital in Deltona would cut down on the number of patients that would utilize a hospital in Sanford.

Although Hospital Corporation of America has received approval from the

HSA-EFCF, the state Office of Community Medical Facilities remains a final hurdle for the project, Ward said the office must decide the matter before Nov. 9.

He said the decision is made by Office of Community Medical Facilities Administrator Art Forehand, following Forehand's consultations with several people in the department.

The office makes the final determination in such matters, Ward said, but is mandated to do so according to Health Systems Agencies plans.

Health Systems Agencies is a nationwide network of organizations charged with reviewing and making recommendations on medical projects to state agencies.

Welch said the HSA-NEF acknowledged that a hospital was needed in Deltona. But Ward said the HSA-NEF made a finding by resolution that did not follow their own health plan.

However, Ward did not rule out the possibility that a hospital in Deltona could be built by a transfer of beds from another area within the jurisdiction of the HSA-NEF.

Welch had hoped for a transfer of beds allocated to Sanford, but he said apparently the state would not consider a transfer across HSA boundary lines.

Sanford falls within the jurisdiction of the HSA-EFCF. The HSA-EFCF has had plans for about 20 additional beds by 1985, for the area that includes Sanford.

Southern Health Services had tried to purchase beds from a hospital in Holly Hill near Daytona Beach for transfer to Deltona but the deal fell through.

The Southern Health Services proposal for a 127-bed hospital was supported by about 6,000 Deltona area residents who signed a petition and the Deltona Chamber of Commerce.

Hospital Corporation of America spokesman said the patients of Deltona would be better served by a larger, full-service hospital in Sanford about 6 miles away than by a small hospital in Deltona.

Areas Lose Power

A power outage in the Spring Lake and Spring Oaks area occurred last night after a car hit a power pole on Montgomery Road in Altamonte Springs.

About 1,200 customers were out of power at 10:15 p.m. when the car hit the pole, but power was restored to most of the homes by 10:30 p.m., a Florida Power Corp. spokesman said.

The spokesman said a small minority did not have power until 1:30 a.m.

Officer To Do Paperwork

An Altamonte Springs motorcycle patrolman who shot an unarmed homeowner Friday will handle nothing but administrative paperwork until the State Attorney makes a ruling on what to do with the case, City Police Chief B.W. Cook said this morning.

Meanwhile, the man he shot remained in this morning, serious but stable condition in the Florida Hospital-Orlando Intensive Care Unit.

Patrolman David Vendor was placed on administrative duty following the shooting at 40 Alcazar Ave. in the San Sebastian subdivision, shortly before 9 p.m.

Vendor arrived at that address, the home of Elbert Brown, 32, along with Sgt. Richard Henry to investigate a report by a neighborhood youth that a burglar was inside. While Henry went to the rear of the home, Vendor, member of the police force for two and a half years, approached the front door.

Deputies say Vendor saw Brown standing inside the house holding a Coke bottle. Vendor, believing it was a weapon, fired one shot from his service revolver, hitting Brown in the right shoulder, severing an artery.

Cook said Fernandez had also been placed on administrative duty pending a State Attorney's investigation.

Cook said Vendor, 31, joined the force after working for a year as a part-time officer on the Edgewater police force.
