

Colts Blank Feds In Series Opener To Increase Lead

ORLANDO, June 1.—Orlando firmly entrenched itself in the league lead yesterday afternoon and ran a string of consecutive victories to four, by shutting out the Sanford Federates, 3 to 0. Culbreath was in the shape to keep six safeties widely scattered while the Colts bunched hits with bases on balls to Barron in the first and seventh of the first.

The Feds staged their lone threat in the opening inning, and only fast yielding saved Culbreath from losing a shutout victory. Frisbie, leading off worked himself to first base via the free ticket route and went to second on Hewell's nicely placed sacrifice bunt. Wade fouled out to Skipper Wells but along came Barnes with a fast grounder down to Vian. Barnes beat the throw to first and Wade rounded third only to get caught at the plate for the third out.

Orlando put over two in their half of the session and the fans thought they were going to see another runaway victory. Chaney, who was shifted to the lead off position, worked Barron for a walk and went to third on Cox's double. Abrams rolled to short and Chaney was held on third. Kirby drew a pass to load the bases. Chaney scored on Edmondson's sacrifice fly to right field and Cox took third. On an attempted double steal, Kirby made second and as Park's throw was high and wide Cox trickled over with the second runner. Vian fouled out to end the parade.

After that both Culbreath and Barron tightened up and there wasn't a hit in until the seventh, when the Colts put across tally number 3 with one away Abrams and Kirby drew walks. Edmondson hoisted out to center but Lehmann cracked a single to send Abrams in from second. Vian whiffed and the scoring was over.

Loughran Three To One Favorite Over Pete Latzo Tonight

NEW YORK, June 1.—(INS)—While promoters were battling over his services today at the boxing commission offices, Tommy Loughran was preparing to weigh in for the second time after a two-day postponement of his title match with Pete Latzo. The lightweight champion is a three to one favorite to defeat Latzo in their 15 round bout tonight at Ebbets field, Brooklyn.

Both boxers held their fighting edges by exercising in gymnasiums yesterday. Neither did any boxing after his final workout. Loughran weighed 173-1/2 pounds. Latzo is several pounds below the light heavyweight limit. He scaled 169-1/2 last Wednesday.

The possibility of the Loughran-Lomski title bout being shifted to Philadelphia in the event of a request by the New York Boxing Commission to postpone the June 13 date at Ebbets Field is scouted by Tex Rickard, who is claiming the champion for a fight with Jimmy Slattery on June 14.

Babe Ruth Seems Headed For Establishing Another Home Run Mark This Year

NEW YORK, June 1.—(INS)—Among the many things I find I can do nothing about today is the fact that George H. Ruth, the prominent right fielder, will establish a home run record before the end of the 1928 season that will leave the populace quite agape.

It was freely predicted in some of our best circles this morning that the great man would amass a total of 72 for the year and, while I dislike to take issue with intellects so staunch as to approach a column of figures without feeling a sinking sensation in the middle of the ante-room, I still can do no less than point out that such a total would call for a home run every second game. You can call all you want for that kind of thing but it isn't compelled to hear you.

Barring accidents and if he maintains his present pace through the remaining 113 games of the Yankee schedule, the boy friend figures to close the books with 68 home runs, eight more than the record he made last year and 14 more than he compiled in 1921, his first great year. If that isn't enough to make you drink without moderation and grow old disgracefully permit me to add that his potential 1928 total is 39 more than George scored in 1919 when he hit the Major League record for the first time and everybody thought he was using a load-

shot or his own dice or some thing.
No, there is nothing I can say against George H. Ruth today even if I wanted to, which of course I do. There is nothing like a good old fashioned attack on George to relieve that pent-up feeling, soften the finger tips and take the ink spots out of white chevils.
I was about due to give him his bi-monthly reviling today but all I can do about it is point out that he hit his eighteenth home run on May 29 and that he didn't get his eighteenth in 1927 until June 1. Also that, even with the fact he hit none at all last year, George's total of eighteenth year shows only 41 games played whereas last year he didn't play eighteenth until the forty-eighth game. And as long as I am in a beatific mood, I might as well point out the fact that George only 14 home runs by May 29 last year, after which I plan to play in the garden and eat flies in the valley with the rest of the bachelors.

We heard one fine old lady saying the other day, "Now who do you think will be elected county commissioner, Doyle Carlton or Charlie Hand?"

Many a politician is a brilliant orator because his memory is just good enough to remember famous epigrams but not quite good enough to recall who said them.

We do not believe we have ever seen a political campaign in which the newspaper support was so solidly behind one candidate as it is in the case of Ruth Bryan Owen's congressional race.

Gilbert Freeman says on Way-bright's first visit to Tampa his clients were bank robbers; on his second, bootleggers and gamblers; on his third, Hathaway.—Tampa Tribune. A highwayman.

Carlton's wonderful meeting in Miami and Hathaway's complete failure in Tampa are just additional indications that the gubernatorial race is over and that the victor is the gentleman from Tampa.

In the heat of the campaign, readers scarcely noticed that the "Southern Cross" had carried four men and radio equipment across the Pacific to Honolulu, a feat which had never been done before.

A telegram from Crestview says that Carlton will have a plurality in Okaloosa county of two hundred and that Catts will be second high man. This we take as good example of what all of west Florida will do.

After attending some of these political meetings and listening to whole volumes of more or less oratory, we are moved to wonder what has become of that old sentimental conception that "the office seeks the man."

The flower show yesterday was a welcome interlude in a hot political campaign. Sometimes it is well to consider gardenias, zinnias, phlox and petunias when things begin to get too warm for comfort. And then too it is possible that some of the lilies can be handed to unfortunate candidates on June 5.

For delegates from this district, The Herald suggests Jefferson B. Browne, and Gilchrist Stockton, and from the state at large we recommend Redmond B. Gaultier, M. O. Harrison, Bryan Mack, and S. C. Pencock; also Mrs. Lena Bird, Mrs. Alvin Craig, Mrs. Fred Nooney, and Mrs. Dwight H. Reed.

A vote for Senator Parrish may be a vote for a future governor of Florida. As president of the senate, a position for which he now holds the caucus nomination, he would be equivalent to lieutenant governor, and in case of a vacancy in the governor's chair, he would fill it. We think it would be the height of folly not to vote for Senator Parrish.

For Governor

In a campaign as warm as any ever waged in Florida, charges and counter-charges have been hurled about with such reckless abandon that even the impartial citizen is fortunate who has not had his vision dimmed by mud-clogs in the eye. We are glad that this campaign is nearing its close, and we hope that present animosities will be promptly dropped with the announcement that the polls have been closed.

Through it all, it seems to us, two outstanding facts remain untouched and unclouded by the smoke screen sent out by the opposition. After hearing all the charges and carefully analyzing the denials, no doubt remains in our mind that Carlton has proved his case against Hathaway and that Carson has definitely shown that Catts is appealing for the gamblers' vote on the one hand with his local option platform and on the other hand to the church people with his prayers and benediction.

Against Carson and Carlton the very worst that has been said is that the Miami man used to drink liquor, a fact which he does not deny, and the Tampa candidate is in this campaign slinging mud. The very fact that a man could have been in public life as long as Carlton, and could then participate in so strenuous a campaign, with no more serious charge being brought against him than that he is throwing mud, is sufficient proof that his record must be pretty clean.

As far as this "mud-slinging" goes, that is a very common expression artfully employed by politicians seeking to cover up something which will not appear to their advantage when exposed to public gaze. Carlton has merely been discussing the public life of the chairman of the State Road Department and basing his arguments on Dr. Hathaway's own records. If there is any mud-slinging in what Carlton has said, then the mud came from the very records which Dr. Hathaway himself has made.

In our opinion Mr. Carlton has been very considerate of Dr. Hathaway. He has not charged the chairman-candidate with graft and corruption, a condition which everyone knows actually exists, but he has simply accused him of being wasteful and extravagant with the people's money. And in all of his speeches, Mr. Carlton has never mentioned the private life of Dr. Hathaway, or indulged in any personalities whatsoever, but has confined himself entirely to the auditors' report on the road department's books.

In view of the facts revealed it would without question be utterly folly to place in the governor's chair a man who has already squandered countless thousands of the people's money and who is seeking the new office in order to cover up and to continue his regime of waste and extravagance. And we believe that the people of Florida are sufficiently informed concerning this governor's race to cast their first choice votes for Doyle Carlton and their second choice votes for James M. Carson.

Our County Commissioners

Earlier in this campaign The Herald expressed the desire to maintain an attitude of strict neutrality in so far as any of the local candidates were concerned. We did not wish to become embroiled in local politics and preferred to leave the selection of public office holders entirely in the hands of the people. In the interest of fairplay we have been forced, however, to come to the aid of one of the candidates who has been attacked in a most underhanded manner.

We refer, of course, to the race between Frank Evans and W. B. Ballard for county commissioner. Mr. Ballard is, we believe, a man of character, who would not for one instance countenance the tactics employed against Mr. Evans. Some of his supporters, however, apparently carried out of the realm of reason by the enthusiasm of the moment, have stooped to do things which no fair-minded newspaper could allow to pass without calling attention to them.

Recognizing that the moral fiber of all men is not sufficient to keep them from circulating lies about some candidate against whom a personal grudge may exist, the lawmakers of our state enacted primary election laws in which it is specifically forbidden that charges of any nature, if made at all, must be made before eighteen days of the primary, and that all political literature and advertisements must be signed.

Opponents of Mr. Evans—and we say again that we do not think Mr. Ballard himself is guilty, but some of his supporters are—have not only resorted to unfair trickery in their effort to defeat Mr. Evans, but have also stooped so low as actually to violate the laws of Florida and to violate such laws as they could be prosecuted for, if Mr. Evans were a vindictive person, and could be fined a thousand dollars and sentenced to one year in prison.

We merely mention these facts to show our readers the kind of opposition Mr. Evans is confronted with, and to put them on their guard less other last minute law-violations be also resorted to in a vain endeavor to cheat Mr. Evans out of the election which he has, by his excellent public record and conscientious service to the people, already won. So far as we have been able to find out, and we have investigated at length, Mr. Evans' opposition is based wholly on personal grudges and spite-work.

We ask our readers in voting to remember the excellent work of the board of county commissioners, of which Mr. Evans has been a member. We ask them to remember how the board built the county jail and the county home out of the county sinking fund monies, without selling bonds, at a saving of thousands of dollars in interest money to the citizens. ORLANDO REPORTER-STAR

A Chicago minister gives the newspapers of that city credit for defeating the Thompson-Small machine in the recent election. He says that all of the self-respecting publishers, irrespective of politics, joined in a crusade against a machine that was fostering vice and crime. This is what may generally be expected from a self-respecting press.

There are, to be sure, newspapers that are not concerned particularly with moral questions and business ethics; this small class of publications does not understand the mission of a newspaper to mean anything more than being a power in politics and a sort of a community dictator. Their ambition is to dominate politics and to boss business.

The newspaper that is concerned more with those great moral issues that undergird good government and make for sound business than being the mouthpiece of a winning political machine always can be depended upon to lift the community out of the political dumps when the crucial moment arrives. Chicago publishers who saw the drift of machine politics in that city and its spread to the entire state took a stand against the powerful ma-

chine and kept it up for four years before they were able to deliver the people out of the hands of corrupt politicians.

So long as some people of good intentions will be influenced by partisan considerations as to be blind to real facts, and others profit by machine patronage, it will be difficult to break up corrupt combinations in politics. It is this element that gives a sort of respectability to machine operations; deprived of the support of this touch of respectability, the machine would soon break down out of its own weakness.

It requires courage for a newspaper to make warfare on machine politics. The machine has far-reaching agencies that dares to oppose it, and its tentacles so invade business institutions that while the press is being corrupted on one hand it is being hampered on the other. But a courageous press never ceases to fight for a right cause. It takes time to awaken an indifferent public to the dangers of a smoothly working political machine. But when the public is awakened, it discovers that it has
