Delinquent tax list last printing today

SANFORD — The Seminole County delinquent tax list is published in today's Herald, the last of four consecutive Thursday publishings. The list contains the names and addresses of people owing overdue property taxes and legal descriptions of the property on which taxes are due. The publication of the list is required by Florida statute. If taxes on the properties are not paid before May 19, they will be auctioned that day.

Man surrenders to Longwood police

LONGWOOD — An armed man who had barricaded himself in a Longwood home on Hunt Street walked out and surrendered to Longwood police at about 10:15 a.m. this morning, police report.

There was no report of injuries in the incident, which was initially reported as a hostage taking.

Longwood police said they have a suspect in custody. Additional information was not available early today.

Sheriff's captains change assignments

SANFORD — As part of routine practice, three of the four captains at the Seminole County Sheriff's Department are scheduled to rotate assignments May 15.

Capt. Jay Leman, 42, of Casselberry, who has been administrative captain for about two months since leaving the post of jail administrator, will head support services. Among his duties will be overseeing the vehicle fleet, communications division and computer services.

Capt. Beau Taylor, 42, of Winter Springs, who has headed the patrol division, will become administrative captain, and will supervise the City County Investigative Bureau and oversee other administrative duties.

Capt. Luke Stallworth, 48, of Forest City, is now support services head and will become supervisor of the patrol division.

Seminole County Sheriff John Polk, who ordered the switch for all captains except Capt. Roy Hughes, who heads criminal investigations, said it has been about two years since he reassigned his captains.

Effort to combine road authorities opposed

SANFORD — Despite Rep. Frank Stone's pessimism about the chances his bill to combine the Seminole and Orange County expressway authorities will pass, Seminole County Expressway Authority officials are not pleased with the re-emergence of the year-old effort. "I would rather see all of our representatives focus their attention on getting us money," said Fred Streetman, expressway authority chairman.

Tuesday, the House Transportation Committee unanimously passed a bill co-sponsored by Stone, R-Casselberry, which would give the residents of Seminole and Orange Counties an opportunity to decide whether the two expressway authorities should merge into one Central Florida Expressway Authority.

The new authority would have seven members, four from Orange County and three from Seminole County. The governor would appoint three members

from Orange and two from Seminole and the remaining two members would be the chairmen of each county's commission or commissioner.

Stone doesn't anticipate the bill will pass this year because it has no companion bill in the Senate, needed to become law this year.

The bill closely tracks a similar bill sponsored by Stone last year allowing the two county commissions to make the decision. Both commissions defeated the effort.

Stone said he isn't trying to force a regional authority on the two counties by going to voters.

"If I wanted to play real hardball, I could pass a bill that would require the merger," Stone said. "This way, it gives a chance for everybody to have a say."

Stone said the voter referendum approach will be his last effort at the merger.

"I can assure you if the people turn it down, you won't see me try it again," Stone said.

Stone said the merger would

benefit both counties. With a unified voice, he said they would have a better chance at receiving more funding from the state for the 100-mile road system, estimated to cost between \$500 million and \$1 billion.

But Streetman and Gerald Britton, executive director of the Seminole County Expressway Authority, disagree.

"Right now, there are two boards in two counties which means there are more spokespersons out there pointing

Search for survivors ends

Body found believed to be David Sprague

SANFORD — Sprague family members, preparing themselves for the worst, feel certain that the body recovered late Tuesday in the Gulf of Mexico was that of David Sprague.

David, 31, of Tampa, and his father Robert Sprague, 56, of Sanford, were lost at sea Saturday along with two other passengers on a 23-foot fishing boat when the craft was damaged and capsized in rough Gulf of Mexico waters.

The boat was found about 5:30 p.m. Tuesday by the Coast Guard. A body was later found under the hull of the boat, named "Dew Drop", which was owned by Robert Sprague, 109 Warts Drive.

"I feel very certain that it is (David) from the description they gave us," said Patricia Sprague, David's mother, Thursday morning.

David's wife, Barbara, of Winter Park, also tentatively identified the body via telephone while television cameras were filming her response. David and his wife are separated, according to Patricia.

An autopsy on the body will be performed this afternoon in Pinellas County, Patricia said that after the autopsy is performed she will be notified by County Sheriff John Polk as to when the body can be picked up. "We will bring him back," said Patricia. "We will bury him in

Oak Lawn cemetery."

She also said that the boat and trailer would be released today by authorities and returned to Sanford by family members.

According to Patricia, the Coast Guard has called off the search for the three people still missing: her husband Robert, Frank Clemente Jr. and an unidentified woman whose first name is Angel.

The Coast Guard found several life preservers inside the Dew Drop. However, Patricia she still harbors hope that her husband is alive. "There are still some flotation cushions missing," said Patricia. "There is still a chance."

County jail guard suspended

SANFORD — A Seminole County jail guard, accused of sexually harassing male inmates and making numerous complaints about jail operations has been suspended, and is to be fired in about a month.

The guard, Martha Brown, 40, of Winter Springs, was reportedly suspended because of her involvement with a convicted felon who allegedly stole her car and her pistol after she allegedly loaned him the car knowing the weapon was in the vehicle.

Seminole County Sheriff John Polk suspended Brown following

an internal department investigation during which Lt. Randy Pittman linked her to a convicted felon she allegedly had about visiting in the Mayo Correctional Institution in Mayo.

Tuesday Polk informed Brown that she was suspended with pay for 30 days and her employment will terminate at that time. During those 30 days, Brown can appeal Polk's decision to fire her to his department's Civil Service Board, he said today.

Polk said he and his attorney met with Brown and her attorney April 25 to give her the opportunity to address the allegations against her. Polk said

he at no time asked Brown to resign, but acting alone, made the decision to fire her based on the findings of the investigation.

Pittman also investigated allegations that Brown sexually harassed male Seminole County jail inmates. Twenty-nine male prisoners signed a complaint against stating she allegedly watched them shower and made sexual comments. That investigation has not led to charges against her and was not the basis for Brown's pending firing, Polk said.

Polk is terminating Brown based on results of her associate

Murdered man was well-liked

'It was supposed to be nice and quiet around Sanford' — slain man's brother

SANFORD — The lights inside Mr. C's Southern Fried Chicken restaurant have remained on since early Saturday morning. A small sign on the front door says "Closed."

A funeral for Li Teh Yu, a well-liked businessman who was stabbed more than 15 times by an intruder Friday night, were held Wednesday in Longwood.

Yu, 32, was killed in an apparent robbery at his restaurant at 2100 S. French Ave., located less than a mile from the Sanford Police Department. The amount of money taken is still unknown but was probably under \$50, according to family members.

"We are not talking about a lot of money," said Sanford Police Chief Steven Harriet.

Open-casket services for Yu, who lived at 1230 Rising Sun Blvd., Winter Springs, were held at the Garden Chapel Home for Funerals at 11 a.m. before a crowded room of mourners. Yu was to be cremated later in the afternoon and his ashes will be returned to his native Taiwan.

Yu's adopted, 13-year-old son Perry Chang and sisters Vickie Yu and Wendy Liu of Winter Springs, and brother Lin Sam Yu of California attended the funeral.

"We want the police to find out who the killer is," said Lin Sam after the funeral. "Not only because he is my brother but because there are other innocent people out there."

Says Chief Harriet, "The investigation is progressing."

Lin Sam said he, along with Yu's son and sister, will take his brother's remains back to his birthplace in Taipei, Taiwan, today. As is Chinese custom, according to Lin Sam, the entire

family will then be reunited on the land.

Yu's son Perry, whom he adopted two years ago as a single parent, is an eighth grader at Jackson Heights Middle School in Oviedo.

Yu's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fu-Lai of Taipei, did not attend their son's funeral. "They could not have stood it," said Lin Sam, who works as a real estate agent in LaPalma, Calif.

Lin Sam said his brother came to the United States in 1982 and worked in New Jersey until he moved to Winter Park in 1984. Yu moved to Winter Springs in 1986, his brother said.

Lin Sam said his brother worked for a private company before he bought his restaurant a little over a year ago.

"It was supposed to be nice and quiet around Sanford," said Lin Sam. "Then this happens."

Yu was very popular with area merchants who patronized his restaurant during the week.

"He was the kindest fellow," said Mary Citoren, manager of the Central Beauty and Barber Supply, two doors down from Mr. C's. "It was such a shame for

Senate report concludes Meese violated policy in scandal

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Edwin Meese's help for the scandal-ridden Wedtech Corp. while he was White House counsel violated administration policy and possibly hurt the integrity of the government procurement process, a Senate report concludes.

The report released Wednesday found that Meese, before he became attorney general, and a deputy "failed to observe the White House policy on contacts with procurement officials."

"Where White House intervention in a procurement is prompted by a personal relationship between a White House staff member and a friend or relative, there is a strong appearance of improper favoritism which can only undermine the public's faith in the integrity of the procurement process," the report said.

House pares SDI funding

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Having pared \$600 million from "Star Wars" with a promise to use some of the savings in the war on drugs, the House turned today to the issue of money for competing missiles. Its last major defense bill dispute.

The showdown emerged over Air Force attempts to put the 10-warhead MX missile on railcars vs. an alternative plan to develop a mobile single-warhead weapon dubbed the Midgetman, a project with strong support on Capitol Hill.

First off today, however, the Democratic-led House was expected to approve an amendment to give the Coast Guard \$350 million of the "Star Wars" savings and to apply the rest to various conventional defense programs, including buying another \$125 million naval minesweeper.

Split decision in mob trial

NEW YORK (UPI) — Anthony "Fat Tony" Salerno was acquitted of charges he rigged the elections of Teamsters presidents Roy Williams and Jackie Presser but convicted along with eight others of racketeering in the food and construction industries.

The split verdict Wednesday ended a yearlong trial of Salerno and 10 alleged associates of the Genovese crime family. Two of the defendants, alleged Cleveland mob associate Milton Rockman and reputed mobster John Tronolone, were acquitted of all charges.

Salerno, 77, already serving a 100-year prison term for his involvement in a Mafia commission, snapped a quick salute to the jurors as the panel acquitted him on the union charges.

Police raid strike-bound foundry; beat, arrest Polish workers

WARSAW, Poland (UPI) — Police tossing concussion grenades raided the strike-bound Lenin foundry in the southern city of Krakow today, beating and arresting participants in a 10-day-old strike by 12,000 steelworkers, witnesses said.

Dissident sources claimed many of the workers were injured and were taken away in ambulances.

The government also ordered operations suspended at the Lenin Shipyard in Baltic port of Gdansk, birthplace of the outlawed Solidarity trade union.

A source in Krakow said the two-stage raid on the foundry began at 1:45 a.m. (7:45 p.m. Wednesday EDT). The source said four vans filled with anti-terrorist police in black berets entered the sprawling compound where 12,000 workers demanding a 70 percent pay hike had been on strike for 10 days.

Aquino reaffirms bar to Marcos

MANILA, Philippines (UPI) — President Corazon Aquino said today she stands by her controversial decision to bar ousted ruler Ferdinand Marcos from attending his mother's funeral despite threats the move will lead to violence.

Marcos said from his exile home in Honolulu he will "exhaust all possibilities" to be able to return to Manila. His relatives said they would ask Aquino to reconsider her decision.

"I suppose we'll have to wait for him to exhaust all those measures, but I stand firm on my decision not to allow him to come back," Aquino told reporters during a four-hour visit to the central Philippine city of Iloilo.

Fuel plant explodes, thousands evacuated

HENDERSON, Nev. (UPI) — The National Guard patrolled today to prevent looting at hundreds of homes and businesses damaged by explosions that erupted with the force of earthquakes at a rocket fuel plant, killing one worker and injuring at least 200 people.

The destruction from Wednesday's blasts was so widespread that police imposed a sunset-to-dawn curfew in Nevada's third-largest city, and firefighters still were battling to neutralize highly volatile and toxic chemicals in the blackened skeleton of the Pacific Engineering Co. plant.

Officials said fire sparked by a machinery malfunction ignited the three explosions that demolished the plant and the Kidd & Co. marshmallow factory next door. A toxic mushroom cloud rose into the desert's noon sky and forced the evacuation of 15,000 people, including 40 patients from a convalescent home.

The explosions killed an identified man whose body was found in the parking lot of Pacific Engineering, which made propellant used in space shuttle boosters and ballistic missiles.

Officials first feared the death toll would rise, but late Wednesday, Clark County Fire Chief Roy Parrish said, "We have

accounted for all employees of both plants. The one confirmed fatality was an employee, but we are not sure of which plant."

"I think it is a complete miracle more people were not killed," he said.

Officials said at least 200 people went to hospitals for treatment, most with cuts, bruises and abrasions from flying glass and debris. Nine people remained hospitalized, three in critical condition.

The blasts dug a crater 400-feet wide at Pacific Engineering.

The explosions shattered windows and cracked walls in buildings as far as 15 miles away and generated shock waves 20 miles away in Las Vegas. A passenger aboard a jetliner flying into nearby McCarran International Airport said he saw the ground "ripple" as the plane passed by.

Seismologists at California Institute of Technology in Pasadena, Calif., said the first blast measured 3.0 on the Richter scale, about the same as a mild earthquake. Four minutes later, another blast registered 3.5. The seismic magnitudes were comparable to those generated by the underground detonation of a nuclear weapons at the Nevada Test Site near Las Vegas.

Federal authorities seize 8,800 pounds of cocaine in Tampa

TAMPA (UPI) — An anonymous tip led to the seizure of what federal authorities believe is a record 8,800 pounds of cocaine, concealed in hollowed Brazilian cedar boards by an "army" of workers and shipped out of Colombia along the Amazon River.

Agents spent the night in a heavily guarded Tarpon Springs warehouse X-raying the planks and expected to finish today with the counting of the packets of cocaine that officials say were bound for Chicago, Los Angeles, Miami and New York.

"We anticipate ... we will have 4,000 kilos (8,800 pounds) of cocaine, the largest seizure of cocaine in United States history," U.S. Attorney Robert Merkle said.

That amount would be worth an estimated \$1.7 billion on the street.

Three men were arrested Wednesday and charged with conspiracy to import the drug.

Last November, a record 8,666.6 pounds was seized by authorities who found the cocaine in hollowed picnic table boards at Port Everglades, near Fort Lauderdale. That shipment originated in Honduras.

By 7 p.m. Wednesday, officials counting the latest shipment seized had found "in excess of 3,500 kilos (7,700 pounds) and they're still finding more so we have reason to believe that the information that we had relative to 4,000 kilos is correct," said Drug Enforcement Administration agent Richard Crawford.

DEA agent Tom Cash said, "I think that this wood, this sophistication here, obviously does not give us the capability to go out and count one-two-three, because you're talking about a 4,000-square-foot warehouse full of wood to the ceiling. It's a needle in the haystack trying to find it to start with."

The DEA learned through an anonymous tip Feb. 10 the

coke was scheduled to arrive aboard the British-registered vessel Amazon Sky, Merkle said. The exact date of arrival was not specified.

Cash said the cocaine was placed in the boards in Leticia, Colombia, a city on the Amazon River. The vessel, allegedly owned by one of the three men arrested Wednesday, then sailed down the Amazon River through Brazil and stopped in Honduras before heading to Florida, said DEA agent Tom Cash.

Cash said the boards were hollowed out in Leticia in a time-consuming operation that he speculates required a minimum of 1,000 workers.

"It would have taken an army to put together this degree of sophistication," he said. "We know that the locations in Leticia are very large, complex organizations."

Merkle said the cocaine is believed to have been supplied by Colombia's Cali cartel, a

competitor of the notorious Medellin cartel, which is thought responsible for 80 percent of the cocaine imported into the United States.

Closing arguments are scheduled for Monday in federal court in Jacksonville in the trial of Carlos Lehder Rivas, an accused leader of the Medellin cartel.

The sealed packets of cocaine were found in hollowed out sections of the boards — measuring 4 inches high, 10 inches wide and 10 feet long.

Cash said some boards contained five compartments, each with 1 kilogram of cocaine, and others had four. The cocaine was packed inside waterproof Styrofoam containers wrapped with tape.

Cash said authorities expected the investigation to continue in Brazil and Colombia.

The laborious counting procedure began Tuesday when federal agents seized the shipment. Merkle announced the

seizure Wednesday.

Each packet was marked with numbers designating its destination — New York, Chicago, Los Angeles and Miami — which Cash said were centers of this organization's distribution.

The three men arrested were charged with conspiracy to import and conspiracy to possess with intent to distribute cocaine. U.S. Magistrate Paul Game Jr. ordered the three suspects held without bond after their first appearance Wednesday.

Agents arrested Michael Tsalickis, 60, owner of Amazon Trader of Pinellas in Tarpon Springs; Pedro Narvaez, president of Gull Exotic Wood Imports Inc.; and Freddy Perez, identified in the complaint as "the Latin male with a limp."

Search warrants were served late Tuesday on Tsalickis, his warehouse and his residence. Authorities said he agreed to cooperate when told of the warrants.

The anonymous tipster said the cocaine would be smuggled to Medesa Corp., allegedly owned by Vicente Rivera, a cocaine trafficker and associate of Tsalickis, according to DEA files.

The vessel arrived at St. Petersburg April 19 and the 9,000 boards were transferred to a local warehouse. A random check by Customs that day found nothing, but the following day inspectors saw Perez near one of the bundles.

The boards were tested after he left and cocaine was found. The lumber was moved to a Tarpon Springs warehouse the following week, where the boards were seized.

In Tsalickis' house, agents found a floor safe with \$20,000 cash, precious stones and jewelry. Also found was a recent cashier's check from Tsalickis to Medesa Corp. for \$100,000, which he said was payment for the lumber.

Adults, not kids, are victims in some child-molestation cases

DEAR ABBY: This concerns "Haunted," the gentleman who was "groped" under the blanket on an overnight flight by a precocious 10-year-old girl. You told him he should have told one of the adult members of the girl's family traveling with her that the child had a problem and needed counseling.

Sure, the child had a problem and needed counseling, but where do you think she learned such behavior? Obviously someone close to her had sexually abused her. Such seductive behavior is common in incest victims.

Had that man followed your advice, the girl would have denied it, and accused the man of touching her. It would be her word against his—and children always win in such cases!

I would have advised the man to find another seat, say nothing to anybody, and let it go at that. I speak from experience, having served 18 months in prison for child molestation. An 8-year-old girl lied. Now I never allow children in my house unless another adult is present, and I never allow a child to get within touching distance. My name and address are for your eyes alone if you want to verify this.

VICTIM OF A LIE

DEAR VICTIM: Judging from my mail, you belong to a very large fraternity. Read on:

DEAR ABBY: When I saw the letter from "Haunted," I had to write. As you can see by my address, I am in prison. I was sentenced to four years for child molestation—a crime I did not commit. I am 66 years old and will be released next month, but I am a broken old man. My wife suffered a massive heart attack and died four months ago, and I was not even allowed to attend her funeral.

The irony of this whole nightmarish experience is that shortly before my wife died, two of the three girls who falsely accused me came to my wife with their mothers and tearfully confessed that they had made up the story that convicted me. They said they got the idea from a TV program, "When Touching Is a Crime." Unfortunately, the third girl, now 15, whose testimony was the most damaging, could not be found, having run off with an older man.

It doesn't matter now. The damage is done, and I'll be going home to an empty house soon.

DEAR ABBY: Your reply to "Haunted" touched a nerve. While well-intended, it would have landed him in jail immediately. Had I been the gentleman in question, I would have gone immediately to my private attorney, put the whole incident down in affidavit form, had my attorney file an anonymous "friend of the court" petition on that child's behalf, and let the local child abuse authorities investigate it—without revealing my name or involving me.

The number of falsely accused in this country today would astonish you! I know. Three years ago, out of jealousy and meanness, my ex-wife accused me—falsely—of molesting one of our daughters. We have spent \$150,000 in attorney's fees in

the interim. I see my daughters only twice a month, with a court monitor, and the daughter who was manipulated by her mother is a psychiatrist's nightmare.

VICTIMIZED AND INNOCENT IN CALIFORNIA

DEAR ABBY: I read with interest your response to "Good Citizen" in the Great Falls Tribune. The question concerned the power of law enforcement officers to arrest drunk drivers.

In your answer, you gave an example of a Los Angeles officer investigating a driver who is slumped over the steering wheel (presumably drunk and passed out) while the car is stationary. Apparently, in L.A., this person could be arrested only by being drunk in public, but not for drunken driving.

In Montana and some other states, such as Missouri, Indiana, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Utah, Ohio and Arizona, the drunk person slumped over the steering wheel of the car would be considered in actual physical control of the vehicle and would, therefore, be arrested for drunk driving. The law courts in the above states came to this conclusion because the person had not relinquished authority or control of the vehicle to another person.

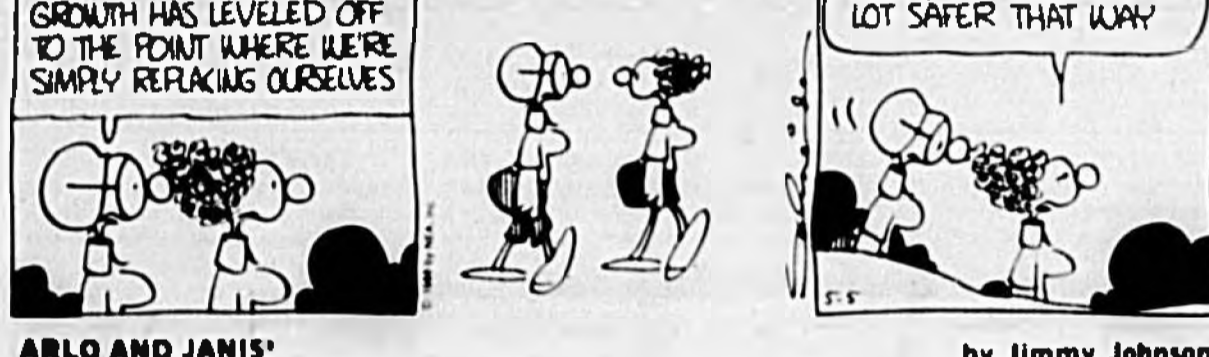

Missile silo duty puts him to sleep

DEAR DR. GOTT: I am on active military duty in a missile silo. My problem is that I get drowsy and nod off for several seconds at a time. This is not great for national security. I'm 25, male, rarely eat breakfast, eat light lunches, average seven hours sleep a night and drink moderately. What can you suggest?

DEAR READER: Staying awake and alert during mundane and tedious times is sometimes difficult for anyone, even when national security is at stake. To a degree, my answer to your question depends on the type of work you do, your personality and your health.

From what little I know of the subject, working in a missile silo must involve a fair amount of repetitive activity with a high boredom coefficient. You may be nodding off on duty because your brain is not challenged and has become numbed by rote.

Finally, is your health good? Are you getting enough exercise? How "moderate" is your drinking? What's moderate to you may not be to me.

I think that your best bet is to talk to your unit's medical officer. He will know your pattern and may already be familiar with men who have had similar problems. You should have an examination. In addition, he may know some tricks of the trade - other than reassignment - to keep you awake.

DEAR DR. GOTT: What value do the skins of fruits have? Do their nutritional values outweigh the dangers of pesticides or contamination?

DEAR READER: Some dieti-



tians believe that the skins of some fruit contain high concentrations of vitamins and minerals. However, I have not read any scientific studies that prove or disprove this view. Unquestionably, the coverings of fruits do supply a good source of fiber that is healthful. If you thoroughly wash fresh fruit before you eat it, you will get rid of any superficial contamination, such as pesticides.

WIN AT BRIDGE

By James Jacoby South played a comfortable two-heart contract. He expected to make nine tricks, and perhaps 10 if the defenders slipped a notch. But the defenders did just the right thing, taking the A-K of clubs and then switching to a spade. Then, of course, when the heart suit split badly, South had to lose two trump tricks, so he made only his contract. He didn't think anything unusual of the deal, until the scores came out for the session. Of the 13 pairs who played the deal in his same direction, only two others got a plus score, and plus 110 was worth 10 out of 12 match-points. This meant that declarer had a better score than 10 other pairs who played the same deal.

The deal illustrates what has been known for quite a while. Part-score contracts are the meat and potatoes of bridge. When my father and I began playing together, he was able to shrug it off if occasionally I misplayed a hand or we got to a slam that did not make, but he would be furious if the opponents played two hearts when we could have made two spades or three of a minor. In today's deal, East was at fault. With ace and A-K, plus a 10 and a 10-9 for kickers, he has plenty to open the bidding. If East-West get to three clubs, they will make it. If South bids to three hearts, he might very well be doubled and be set a trick.
