SANFORD - Despite Rep. Frank Stone's pessimism about the chances his bill to combine the Seminole and Orange County expressway authorities will pass. Seminole County Expressway Authority officials are not pleased with the reemergence of the year-old effort.

"I would rather see all of our representitives focus their attention on getting us money." said Fred Streetman. expressway authority chairman.

tation Committee unanimously passed a bill co-sponsored by Stone, R-Casselberry, which would give the residents of Seminole and Orange Counties an opportunity to decide. whether the two expressway authorities should merge into one Central Florida Expressway Authority.

The new authority would have seven members four from Orange County and three from Seminole County. The governor would appoint three members

SANFORD - A Seminole County bull guard, accused of sexually harassing male inmates. and making numerous complaints about jail operations has been suspended, and is to be tired in about a mouth.

The guard Martha Brown, 10, of Winter Springs, was reportedly suspended because of her ivolvement with a convicted. felon who allegedly stole her carand her pistol after she aflegedly loaned him the ear knowing the weapon was in the vehicle.

Semmole County Sherift John Polk suspended Brown following

an internal department investigation during which Lt. Randy Pittman linked her to a convicted felon she allegedly hed about visting in the Mayo Correctional histitution in Mayo-

Tuesday Polk informed Brown that she was suspended with payfor 30 days and her employment will terminate at that time During those 30 days, Brown can appeal Polk's decision to fire her to his department's Civil-Service Board, he said today.

Pulk said he and his attorney met with Brown and her attorney April 25 to give her the opportunity to address the allegations against her. Polk said

he at no time asked Brown to resign, but acting alone, made the decision to lire her based on the findings of the investigation

Pittinan also investigated allegations that Brown sexually hurassed male Seminole County pal inmates. Eventy muc male prisoners signed a complaint against stating she allegedly watched them shower and made sexual comments. That investigation has not led to charges against her and was not the basis for Brown's pending tiring, Polk said.

SANFORD — The lights inside Mr. C's Southern Fried Chicken restaurant have remained on since early Saturday morning A small sign on the front door says Titlesed.

A funeral for Li Tch Yu. a well-liked hustnessman who was stabled more than 15 times by an intruder Eriday night, were held Wednesday in Longwood.

Yu. 32, was killed in an apparent robbery at his testau-rant at 2100 S. French Ave. located less than a mile from the Sanford Police Department. The amount of money taken is still unknown but was probably under \$50 according to family members

Questioning of suspect leads to arrest of three Sanford men

SANFORD - A Sanford man has been arrested on multiple counts and two accomplices face drug charges after police reportedly noticed cocaine while attempting to question a suspect at a private residence.

Thomas Manor, 33, of 1811 W. 16th St., Sanford, was in the kitchen of a residence at 73 William Clark Court along with two other men when sheriffs deputies attempted to question Manor, but took all three men into custody when the officers discovered two pipes that allegedly contained

Arrested with Manor were Regional Lee Lock, 33, of 6 William Clark Court, and Willie Calvin McDonald, 28, of 18 William Clark Court, both of whom were charged with possession of cocaine and drug paraphernalia and are being held in lieu of \$2,000 bond each.

Additional charges were filed against Manor, including possesion of a firearm by a convicted felon, after police reported finding a loaded .357-magnum revolver in a bag at his feet.

Argument leads to man's arrest

LONGWOOD - A 22-year-old Longwood man was arrested Tuesday and charged with aggravated assault, battery and discharging a firearm in public following a domestic dispute.

According to police reports, Gracie Bash, the suspect's wife, fled the residence along with her teen-age daughter Tuesday evening and used a neighbor's telephone to summon sheriff's deputies after Bash allegedly attacked and threatened her during an argument.



Today's the day the sky fell on Seminole

So you didn't believe the prediction of no rain and you ran outside this morning to see what had been wrought weatherwise. Now you want to know what that was. Ok.

That was part of the front lying on your front yard. What happened was the weather front traveled from the nation's southwest, thence thitherward easterly across Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama dropping heavenly dew drops along the way. After much ado, it arrived over Seminole County, dry and exhausted. So there it was sans the wherewithal to rain and too pooped to precipitate. So it just fell from the sky. You know, the sky is falling, the sky is falling. You thought that was fog, didn't you? Now you know. Those were real clouds messing around our county. crawling about the ground.

Still want rain? Closest is about 26 miles due east of Daytona. Some up on the Panhandle but plenty starting around D.C.

If you're going to the Kentucky Derby, the weather will be perfect for racing. If you're staying home, it will also be near perfect. From now through the weekend, the temperatures were range from lows in the 60s to highs in the 80s. Clear skies and westerly breezes for the most part. Chances of rain? Less than 20 percent. Kinda like the last 24 hours.

But everywhere else, just about, it is messy.

Spring showers and thunderstorms dampened parts of the East and Pacific Northwest today, while snow showers scattered over north central California mountains but produced little accumulation.

Early morning rain reached from eastern Ohlo, Pennsylvania and southern

New Jersey across the Virginias, the Carolinas and eastern Georgia. Rainshowers were also scattered across western Montana, according to

Strong and gusty winds are expected to move into the Southwest early this morning and advisories have been posted for high winds across southern California, the Flaming Gorge portion of

the National Weather Service.

Utah, the weather service said. While today's high temperatures are expected to be in the 60s or 70s across much of the nation, the weather service said the mercury will dip into the 50s along the northern and central Pacific coast and the upper Ohio Valley and central Appalachians. Highs will reach the 90s over south central Texas.

Spring rains dampened parts of the Southeast Wednesday and residents of Butte. Mont., woke up to an inch of snow on the ground.

London, in southeast Kentucky, was pelted by more than an inch of rain by dawn. then got hit again by heavy thunderstorms and some small haif at midday, the NWS

But while remote sections of the state contended with foul weather, forecasters in Louisville painted a rosy picture for Saturday's 114th running of horse racing's premier event, the Kentucky Derby.

"At this point, the Kentucky Derby looks like it will be runin nearly ideal conditions, with no rain, agreeable humidity levels and temperatures in the 75- to 80-degree range," forecasters said.

Illegal aliens line up to beat deadline; Florida jammed MIAMI (UPI) - fliegal aliens from unemployed mothers

to laborers hoping to live in America lined up Wednesday at immigration offices across Florida, trying to beat the midnight expiration of the yearlong amnesty program.

Richard Smith, deputy district director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, said more than 114,000 people in Florida submitted applications for amnesty. The total excludes private agencies, which could account for a couple thousand more.

By 10 p.m. Wednesday, 3,126 people around Florida had submitted applications that day, Smith said. About 4,000 people submitted applications Tuesday, double the usual number, said INS District Director Perry Rivkind said.

Officials expect about 1.7 million illegal aliens nationwide to apply for legal residency, far fewer than the 3 million people originally expected.

Criminal justice plan introduced

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - House Speaker Jon Mills says his \$80 million criminal justice and corrections proposal will eventually ease prison overcrowding and reduce crime.

Mills' eight-part package reflects the House leadership's philosophy of attacking crime from all angles, and not relying solely on longer jall terms and more prisons. The package includes "boot camp" style incarceration for juvenile offenders, parole-like community supervision for those convicted of lesser crimes, parole with minimum sentences for long-term offenders and basic education for illiterate inmates.

The plan was endorsed by Attorney General Bob Butterworth, who said it would work far better than Gov. Bob Martinez' proposed criminal justice package. Asked if the joint news conference arranged by Mills had been called to make Martinez appear "soft on crime," Butterworth said, "He can do that himself.

HRS unveils plan for handicapped

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - State officials Wednesday outlined a five-year plan to improve services and help an estimated 55,000 Floridians with developmental disabilities become as independent as possible.

The plan is designed to eliminate waiting lists, close gaps in services, provide better family support and open more employment opportunities," said Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services Secretary Gregory Coler Wednesday.

Developmental disabilities are defined as challenges brought by mental retardation, autism, cerebral palsy or spina bifida. Those afflicted can take care of many personal needs, but may need help to complete an education or find

Astronauts 'survive' emergency exercise

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI) -Seven shuttle astronauts, two faking injuries, completed an emergency launch pad evacuation Wednesday after a makebelieve fire and explosion in a major test of post-Challenger safety improvements.

The "emergency egress simulation" began with the astronauts and launch technicians in the launch pad "white room" at the end of an access arm that would butt up against a shuttle's hatch before launch. The shuttle Discovery, on tap for blastoff this summer, will not be mounted on the pad until June.

The test ended shortly after 11:30 a.m. when nine people faking injuries, including two astronaut stand-ins, were airlifted to area hospitals.

"Everything went well," according to a NASA spokeswoman.

Challenger's destruction in January 1986, launch pad 39B has been equipped with more fire detectors along with fireblocking plates protecting steel mesh decking. A new under-ground bunker has been built at the base of the pad and procedures have been streamlined to improve efficiency and safety.

As the crew was in the process of pretending to board the imaginary shuttle, a smoke bomb on the pad gantry was set off about 8:58 a.m., emergency water deluge systems began drenching the gantry structure and the

"emergency" began. Participating in the exercise were rookle astronauts Frank Culbertson Jr., Kenneth Cameron. Kathryn Thornton. Charles "Sam" Gemar, David Low, Pierre Thuot and Jay Apt.

NASA spokeswoman Lisa Malone reported a make believe fire on the gantry level below the astronauts and later said an explosion was simulated as fire fighters battled the fake flames.

The access arm is located at the 195-foot level of the launch pad. In an emergency requiring a fast exit, elevators could prove dangerous or inoperative and for that reason, "slidewire baskets" are anchored on one side of the gantry attached to 1,200-foot cables stretching away to the ground below.

In a real crisis, up to 21 astronauts and pad technicians could jump in the baskets for a dizzying 50-mph ride to the ground where they could either enter a new reinforced underground bunker or climb aboard an armored personnel carrier for a speedy exit.

For the test Wednesday, however, the astronauts and rescue personnel rode elevators to the ground while the baskets made the trip loaded with sand bags. Once on the ground, the astronauts climbed back in and proceed from there as if they had lust arrived

Only five baskets were available at the time of the Challenger accident, but two more have been added and all seven now feature protective blankets to shield against flame.

To date, no one has ridden to the ground in one of the slidewire baskets and for the exercise Wednesday, the plan called for all seven to make the descent loaded with sacks of sand weighing 440 pounds.

The original plan called for 660 pounds of sand per basket to simulate the weight of three people. But the two new baskets, No. 1 and No. 7, did not work properly during a weekend test. Both came to rest far closer to the ground than desired because of trouble with cable tension.

In a test in March, a different basket slammed into the ground when a clamp that helped maintain cable tension suddenly broke during an unmanned test. NASA officials say the basket system will be fixed in time for the first post-Challenger flight.

Legislators seek to ban open alcohol containers in vehicles

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - The House Wednesday gave pre-liminary approval to a bill banning open alcohol containers in moving vehicles, despite charges it would disrupt Floridians "natural right" to enjoy football game tailgate parties.

The bill (HB 165) would make possession of an open container a non-criminal moving violation, punishable by a \$52 fine and the loss of drivers license points. A passenger would be charged only if he were actually holding the container; otherwise the driver would be responsible for any open container in the vehicle.

Many legislators strongly objected to an amendment banning open containers under all circumstances, even if the driver of a motor home.

bus or van hosting a moving party were not drinking. With that amendment, drinking in a vehicle would be legal only if the vehicle were driven by a hired driver, such as a bus driver.

"This restricts my natural right to enjoy a pastime that's very near and dear to me football!" said Rep. James King. R-Jacksonville. King said he and a group of friends take his motor home from Jacksonville to Tallahassee for all Florida State University home games, using a nondrinking designated driver while the rest party in the back scats.

"This amendment would require me to lock the liquor in a cabinet or hire a driver, and that's a little bit ludicrous for a four-hour drive."

Guidelines need to be consistent

Every year, about 40,000 convicted criminals come up for sentencing in the federal courts. But at the moment, there's no system in place to determine what sort of punishment they should receive. The result is a state of complete confusion that Congress and the Supreme Court will have to untangle.

The problem arises from a compromise struck four years ago in the U.S. Senate by liberals and conservatives, who found they couldn't agree on the terms of a new set of uniform sentencing standards for the federal judiciary. Instead, they created a new commission, appointed by the president, to adopt rules that are supposed to be binding upon all federal courts.

That bit of buck passing has prompted a furious constitutional debate over the validity of the standards the commission has come up with. The argument isn't over the stiff penalties the new standards prescribe. Instead, judges, lawyers and legal scholars have split sharply on the question of whether the law creating the commission itself stumbles over a whole host of constitutional barriers separating the powers of Congress, the executive branch, and the judiciary.

Until that debate is resolved, each federal judge has to decide whether to use the new standards promulgated by the commission or to continue relying on the old procedures. Recently, 14 federal judges throughout the country rejected the new sentencing rules as unconstitutional. In the meantime, 21 other judges have upheld them. As a result, the definition of justice varies depending upon whose courtroom you happen to be in. And no matter which sentencing system a judge selects, the attorneys for the accused will almost always appeal, claiming that it should have been the other one.

Congress created this mess, and Congress is going to have to lend a hand in cleaning it up. Some legal scholars have suggested that many (but not all) of the constitutional questions might be resolved if Congress simply adopted the rules that the commission has proposed in a new bill. But that's just going back to square one politically—if Congress could agree on those rules it wouldn't have needed to set up the commission in the first place. It would be better to wait for the Supreme Court to define which parts of the existing statute need fixing. In the meantime, the commission should withdraw its new rules until the high court has ruled on

Enough's enough

The same people who mounted a successful campaign seven years ago to restrict the number of Japanese cars imported into this country are crusading now to stem the flow of Japanese pickup trucks to these shores. How tronic that Detroit is singing the protectionism blues when American pickup-truck manufacturers are racking up record sales.

While sales of U.S. pickup trucks increased 17 percent over 1986. Japanese truck sales plummeted 19 percent. In fact, Detroit's share of the domestic truck market jumped from 40 percent in 1986 to 55 percent during the first two months of 1988, even as Japan's share sank to the lowest level since it introduced small trucks to the American public in 1958.

Yet domestic manufacturers want the playing field tilted even more in their favor. They contend that Japanese trucks are being dumped in the United States because the sticker price for these vehicles has gone up about 30 percent, even though the yen has appreciated by more than 60 percent against the dollar. The reason for this disparity is simple enough: Japanese manufacturers have cut their average profit margin per truck by about \$800 and pared production costs.

Principles of Gulf convoy policy reviewed

As the U.S. Navy reduces the number of ships deployed to protect convoys in the Persian Gulf. it is time to review our policy there. Public statements to the contrary, the U.S. has not been acting as the world's policeman defending abstract principles of international law. Instead. we are protecting our own national geopolitical interests

If the U.S. commitment was truly to freedom of navigation for neutral shipping in the Gulf. then the Navy would have been asked to protect all such shipping against attack from either Iran or Iraq. However, the Navy was ordered only to protect those ships that placed themselves under the American flag. The Navy has not acted to defend ships sailing independently or the convoys. Also, though the U.S. has carried out reprisals against Iran for attacks on shipping, there have been no threats against Iraq for its attacks on neutral ships.

This represents a maturing of American strategy, but a change that the White House has been reluctant to acknowledge because of the ideal of "freedom of the seas" that lives on in the

embarramement to naval strategy. The truth is that in a future war, the U.S. may need to do the same thing Iran and Iraq have tried to do: isolate an enemy from the sea.

In the early days of the Republic, the U.S. had

a small navy and a large merchant fleet. Free of great power entanglements, it was in a position to profit enormously from neutral commerce. Thus the country took the lead in promoting freedom of the seas and the maritime rights of neutrals like itself. However, by the end of the 19th centruy, this view began to change as the U.S. became a major naval power.

Alfred Thayer Mahan, the nation's premier strategist, urged that we learn from England who "not only protected her own commerce, but also annihilated that of the enemy; and both conditions-not one alone-were essential to her triumph." Neutral rights were "the dream of weaker sea belligerents in all ages," but the U.S. was no longer to be in that category. Thus. Mahan was able to convince President Theodore Roosevelt not to promote neutral rights at the

second Hague Conference in 1907.

Should another all-out conflict like the world wars occur, no one expects international law to prevent campaigns against merchant shipping. However, U.S. policy-makers should beware of letting abstract principles interfere with the use of U.S. naval power in limited wars.

During Vietnam, the Navy was not permitted to blockade North Vietnam, nor attack its ports. All ships, even those of the Soviet bloc, were considered innocent neutrals and thus inviolate. This is arguably the greatest single mistake in strategy committed by the U.S. in that war, for it prevented the use of the most effective means available for isolating the theater of war. When mining of Haiphong Harbor was briefly permitted from May to October of 1972, the communists found it impossible to fully supply themselves by other means.

The U.S. Navy is a powerful asset that our adversaries in limited war situations cannot match. We must be free to use it.

Our new political parties

The names remain the same, Democratic and Republican, but at some point in the recent past their identities have been transformed. They both used to be ideological coalitions. Now we have a party of the Left and a party of the Right. new wine in old bottles.

Within living memory, the Democratic Speaker of the House was Sam Rayburn, Mr. Sam of Texas. not of the Left and not even a liberal. His successor, John Mc-Cormack of Massachusetts, was a conservative New Dealer. President Harry Truman was a domestic liberal and a foreign policy hardliner. The Democratic Party was a mixed bag, and contained its own contradictions, strong for doing so.

During the same period, roughly, there were conservative and liberal Republicans-for shorthand, let us say Robert Taft and Earl Warren.

Many analysts and theorists thought that all of this was a good thing, while others argued for greater definition. Tuday we have to.
Since the failed 1972 campaign of

Sen. Henry Jackson-I recall his forlorn Mianu headquarters full of antiquated labor leaders—and then his premature death, the Democratic Party has moved relentlessly leftward. Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynthan was supposed to be Jackson's heir, but he lacked the stomach for it. Now, rather poetically, we have another Democratic Jackson, Jesse, the most leftward major candidate since the 1948 campaign of Henry Wallace, and perhaps further to the Left. Jackson has made himself a major voice in the Democratic Party, which does not dare to repudiate him.

After the 1984 election, in which Reagan carried 49 states against Mondale, a faction of the Democratic Party made a determined effort to move toward the national center. This was the point of Super Tuesday, which was supposed to magnify the supposed centerism of the South. But the process has ushered in three candidates who are probably more leftist than Walter Mondale.

During the same period, the Republican Party has moved strongly to the right. There is today no Rockefeller, Lindsay, Scott, Saltonstall, Javits, Scranton. The only prominent Republican on the left is Lowell Weicker of Connecticut, whom many suspect of being insane, or at least a freak.

Keeping eye on CBS

As the 1988 election approaches. it occurs to me that my readers might appreciate a rundown of the political backgrounds of some of the key figures in the major media on which we will all be forced to rely for information.

Thanks to the painstaking Lichter-Rothman report of 1981, we know that upward of 80 percent of a random sampling of key media elite voted for the Democratic presidential candidate in every presidential election from 1964 to the beginning of the Reagan era, and there is certainly no reason to assume that these journalistic leopards have changed their spots.

But knowing such things in a general way is no substitute for information about particular individuals. In a recent column, therefore, I named a slew of people in key jobs at ABC News who were publicly active in leftist or liberal operations before turning their energies to the field of journalism. Today we shall take a similar look at

Please remember that what follows is in no sense a list of all the liberals at CBS. This is merely the tip of the iceberg - the handful of individuals whose public records of left or liberal activism have been traced by Washington's Media Research Center. Also, as in the case of ABC, there's one token Republican: Diane Sawyer of "60 Minutes," who was a staffer in the Nixon White

At CBS the bias in favor of liberal policies starts high. No less than two members of the CBS board were ranking officials of Democratic administrations: Newton Minow, who was chairman of the Federal Communications Commission under both John Kennedy and Lyndon Johnson; and Harold Brown, who was Jimmy Carter's defense secretary. No former Republican Cabinet members or agency chairmen need

Zeroing in on political affairs, the "political editor" of CBS News is Dotty Lynch. Lynch's long record of Democratic political activism stressed polling, which she conducted for George McGovern's presidential campaign in 1972, for Ted Kennedy in 1980, for the Democratic National Committee in 1981-82. and for first Gary Hart and then Walter Mondale in 1984.

ther immediate predecessor as political editor of CBS News, by the way, was the versatile Wally Chalmers, who came to the job from the Nuclear Freeze Foundation and the Fund for a Democratic Majority and left it in 1986 to become executive director of the Democratic National Committee.)

Roaming Washington with the broad-gauged title "national affairs correspondent of CBS News" is Lesley Stahl, who cut her political teeth in the 1960s as an aide to New York City's ultimate liberal, Mayor John Lindsay.

Stahl is perhaps best known as the host of CBS's "Face The Nation." That program's producer in 1985-86, interestingly, was Mary Fifield, who honed her own political skills as press secretary to Gov. Michael Dukakis in 1974-75 and press officer on Jimmy Carter's campaign plane in 1976.

America's indulgent attitude

lives in the nation's capital knows that it is a major center of the drug traffic. The drug situation has been bad here for many years, but it's getting worse. Jamaican drug dealers have invaded the capital city and brought a new degree of terror. Women and children are gunned down in the street. People in public housing projects find themselves in a no-man's land created by heavily armed drug dealers. The police have had to equip themselves with semi-automatic weapons because the drug dealers are armed with submachine guns School children are enlisted by drug dealers and "earn" thousands of dollars for acting as runners.

Overall, it's an appalling situation, a national disgrace. One wonders how we got to this pass in America. What can be done to rid our country of drugs? Certainly. local, state and federal government agencies aren't winning the war against drugs. Anyone who believes the U.S. is making headway simply hasn't looked at what's happening in our cities. Law enforcement agencies are being overwhelmed.

How did we get into this situation? Undoubtedly because Americans didn't insist upon a truly tough attitude from the first. Dr. John Howard, counselor of The Rockford Institute, said in a recent speech that existing methods haven't worked. He added that "If it were not for our non-judgmental culture. we could bring the matter under control rather quickly, simply by using a technique that has been remarkably successful in other nations." He pointed out that "If we wish to control drug use, the proven method is to place heavy penalties on the possession of even a small amount of drugs. If the penalty is severe enough, it will drastically reduce the usage. If the demand for drugs is greatly reduced, you don't need to worry about the clusive traffickers, In Spain, when the problem began to surface, the penalty for any person caught with any amount of marijuana, even one eigarette, was six years and one day in jail."

The drug wars in Washington and elsewhere in the nation result from the fact that our society won't insist upon standard of behavior. Colleges and universities turn a blind eye to drug use on thier campuses, as Secretary of Education William Bennett has said.

Random quality-control checks by inspectors working for the USDA and for meatpacking companies ensure that the beef is wholesome. according to Ron Prucha, assistant administrator for the USDA's Food Safety and Inspection Service.

But records we obtained under the Freedom of Information Act raise questions about the integrity of quality-control cheeks conducted at one pilot plant participating in the USDA program. The records describe an incident that may flag a weak link in that new system.

As we reported previously, the new streamlined inspection system. or SIS, being tested at four plants in Texas, Nebraska and Colorado, puts meatpacking plants in charge of controlling filth, a task traditionally performed by government inspectors. Company inspectors keep records of their activities, which are reviewed by USDA inspectors. Government inspectors are also supposed to conduct their own surprise inspections.

Prucha told our associate Stewart Harris that if the meatpackers failed to detect contaminated beef, the contamination would be caught in the random checks by qualitycontrol inspectors.

But a memo written by a government inspector on May 21, 1987 describes how company workers at the Monfort plant in Grand Island, Neb., gave a special cleaning to some cattle tongues before they were seen by a quality-control inspector.

"I ask how can this monitoring be a true picture of their product?" USDA inspector Dora Fries says in her official memo about the alleged incident.

Fries' memo says she was working on the slaughtering floor when a quality-control inspector employed by Monfort came along inspecting cattle tongues, which were being prepared for the supermarket. The quality-control inspector took five finished tongues from the assembly line and hung them on inspection hooks. He then walked away to

wash his hands. While the inspector had his back turned, a worker on the Monfort assembly line reportedly took pains to make sure the tongues passed inspection even though they had already been processed. He took one tongue off the inspection hook and washed it. He trimmed the tonsils from another tongue and hide from a third before the inspector returned, according to the memo.

Fries and another government inspector, Marvin Miller, told their supervisor, Franklin Powers Jr., who wrote a memo of his own. Powers quotes a company inspector who said the workers washed tongues that were not destined to be examined by quality control.

Prucha told us incidents like this are few and far between because the government inspectors are there to catch company workers who try to doctor the quality-control cheeks.

A Monfort official told us that a flurry of memos from government Inspectors criticizing SIS is largely

"bull." The government inspectors resent the fact that company workers are taking over their jobs. said Dr. Rod Bowling, Monfort vice

president for quality control. Bowling said that Monfort has half a dozen quality-control inspectors on the plant's "kill floor," and it is impossible for workers to know when the next inspection will be And he said testing at the end of the production line shows Monfort has reduced the rate of contaminated meat to one third of what it was under the traditional inspection

USDA officials in charge of the experimental inspection system recognize the possibility that companies might be able to thwart the quality-control system. A USDA official in Washington, Dr. Douglas Berndt, wrote in a memo last Aug-31 that "inspection and quality control programs may be blased" because the inspections and monitoring are not truly random. Berndt's memo was attached to a new set of instructions on how to maintain the integrity of the random quality-control inspections.

Senate report concludes Meese violated policy in scandal

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Edwin Meese's help for the scandal-ridden Wedtech Corp. while he was White House counsel violated administration policy and possibly hurt the integrity of the government procurement process, a Senate report concludes.

The report released Wednesday found that Meese, before he became attorney general, and a deputy "falled to observe the White House policy on contacts with procurement officials."

"Where White House intervention in a procurement is prompted by a personal relationship between a White House staff member and a friend or relative, there is a strong appearance of improper favoritism which can only undermine the public's faith in the integrity of the procurement process," the report said.

House pares SDI funding

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Having pared \$600 million from "Star Wars" with a promise to use some of the savings in the war on drugs, the House turned today to the issue of money for competing missiles, its last major defense bill dispute.

The showdown emerged over Air Force attempts to put the 10-warhead MX missile on railcars vs. an alternative plan to develop a mobile single-warhead weapon dubbed the Midgetman, a project with strong support on Capitol

First off today, however, the Democratic-led House was expected to approve an amendment to give the Coast Guard \$350 million of the "Star Wars" savings and to apply the rest to various conventional defense programs. including buying another \$125 million naval minesweeper.

Split decision in mob trial

NEW YORK (UPI) - Anthony "Fat Tony" Salerno was acquitted of charges he rigged the elections of Teamsters presidents Roy Williams and Jackie Presser but convicted along with "ght others of racketeering in the food and constructio, industries.

The split verdict Wednesday ended a yearlong trial of Salerno and 10 affeged associates of the Genovese crime family. Two of the defendants, alleged Cleveland mob associate Milton Rockman and reputed mobster John Tronolone, were acquitted of all charges.

Salerno, 77, already serving a 100-year prison term for his involvement in a Mafia commission, snapped a quick salute to the jurors as the panel acquitted him on the union charges.

Police raid strike-bound foundry; beat, arrest Polish workers

WARSAW, Poland (UPI) - Police tossing concussion grenades raided the strike-bound Lenin foundry in the southern city of Krakow today, beating and arresting participants in a 10-day-old strike by 12,000 steelworkers.

Dissident sources claimed many of the workers were injured and were taken away in ambulances.

The government also ordered operations suspended at the Lenin Shipyard in Baltic port of Gdansk, birthplace of the outlawed Solidarity trade union.

A source in Krakow said the two-stage raid on the foundry began at 145 a.m. (7:45 p.m. Wednesday EDT). The source said four vans filled with anti-terrorist police in black berets entered the sprawling compound where 12,000 workers demanding a 70 percent pay hike had been on strike for 10 days.

Aquino reaffirms bar to Marcos

MANILA, Philippines (UPI) - President Corazon Aquino said today she stands by her controverstal decision to bar ousted ruler Ferdinand Marcos from attending his mother's funeral despite threats the move will lead to violence

Marcos said from his exile home in Honolulu he will 'exhaust all possibilities" to be able to return to Manifa. His relatives said they would ask Aquino to reconsider her

"I suppose we'll have to wait for him to exhaust all those measures, but I stand firm on my decision not to allow him to come back." Aquino told reporters during a four-hour visit to the central Philippine city of Rollo.

Fuel plant explodes, thousands evacuated

The National Guard patrolled today to prevent looting at hundreds of homes and bustnesses damaged by explosions that erupted with the force of earthquakes at a rocket fuel plant, killing one worker and injuring at least 200 people.

The destruction from Wednesday's blasts was so widespread that police imposed a sunset-to-dawn curfew in Nevada's third-largest city, and firefighters still were battling to neutralize highly volatile and toxic chemicals in the blackened skeleton of the Pacific Engineering Co. plant.

Officials said fire sparked by a machinery malfunction ignited the three explosions that demolished the plant and the Kidd & Co marshmallow factory next door. A toxic mushroom cloud rose into the desert's noon sky. and forced the evacuation of 15,000 people, including 40 patients from a convalescent home.

The explosions killed an identifted man whose body was found in the parking lot of Pacific Engineering, which made propellant used in space shuttle boosters and ballistic missiles.

Officials first feared the death toll would rise, but late Wednesday, Clark County Fire Chief Roy Parrish said, "We have accounted for all employees of both plants. The one confirmed fatality was an employee, but we are not sure of which plant."

"I think it is a complete miracle more people were not killed," he said.

Officials said at least 200 people went to hospitals for treatment, most with cuts. bruises and abrasions from flying glass and debris. Nine people remained hospitalized, three in critical condition.

The blasts dug a crater 400-

feet wide at Pacific Engineering. The explosions shattered windows and cracked walls in buildings as far as 15 miles away and generated shock waves 20 miles away in Las Vegas. A passenger aboard a jetliner flying into nearby McCarran International Airport said he saw

the ground "ripple" as the plane

passed by.

Seismologists at California in-stitute of Technology in Pasadena, Calif., said the first blast measured 3.0 on the Richter scale, about the same as a mild earthquake. Four minutes later, another blast registered 3.5. The seismic magnitudes were comparable to those generated by the underground detonation of a nuclear weapons at the Nevada Test Site near Las-

Federal authorities seize 8,800 pounds of cocaine in Tampa

TAMPA (UPI) — An anonymous tip led to the seizure of what federal authorities believe is a record 8,800 pounds of cocaine, concealed in hollowed Brazilian cedar boards by an "army" of workers and shipped out of Colombia along the Ama-700 River.

Agents spent the night in a heavily guarded Tarpon Springs warehouse X-raying the planks and expected to linish today with the counting of the packets of cocaine that officials say were bound for Chicago, Los Angeles, Miami and New York.

"We anticipate ... we will have 4,000 kilos (8,800 pounds) of cocaine, the largest seizure of cocaine, in United States history." U.S. Attorney Robert Merkle said.

That amount would be worth an estimated \$1.7 billion on the street.

Three men were arrested Wednesday and charged with conspiracy to import the drug.

Last November, a record 8.698.6 pounds was seized by authorities who found the cocaine in hollowed piente table boards at Port Everglades, near Fort Lauderdale. That shipment originated in Honduras.

By 7 p.m. Wednesday, officials counting the latest shipment seized had found "in excess of 3,500 kilos (7,700 pounds) and they're still finding more so we have reason to believe that the information that we had relative to 4,000 kilos is correct," said Drug Enforcement Administration agent Richard Crawford.

DEA agent Tom Cash said. "I think that this wood, this sophistication here, obviously does not give us the capability to go out and count one-two-three, because you're talking about a 4,000-square-foot warehouse full of wood to the ceiling. It's a needle in the haystack trying to find it to start with."

The DEA learned through an anonymous tip Feb. 10 the

aboard the British-registered vessel Amazon Sky, Merkle said. The exact date of arrival was not specified.

Cash said the cocaine was placed in the boards in Leticia. Colombia, a city on the Amazon River. The vessel, allegedly owned by one of the three men arrested Wednesday, then sailed down the Amazon River through Brazil and stopped in Honduras before heading to Florida, said DEA agent Tom Cash.

Cash said the boards were hollowed out in Leticia in a time-consuming operation that he speculates required a minimum of 1,000 workers.

"It would have taken an army to put together this degree of sophistication," he said. "We know that the locations in Leticia are very large, complex organizations."

Merkle said the cocaine is believed to have been supplied by Colombia's Call cartel, a

competitor of the notorious Medeilin cartel, which is thought responsible for 80 percent of the cocaine imported into the United States.

Closing arguments are scheduled for Monday in federal court in Jacksonville in the trial of Carlos Lehder Rivas, an accused leader of the Medellin cartel.

The scaled packets of cocaine were found in hollowed out sections of the boards measuring 4 inches high. 10 inches wide and 10 feet long.

Cash said some boards contained five compartments, each with 1 kilogram of cocaine, and others had four. The cocaine was packed inside waterproof Styrofoam containers wrapped

Cash said authorities expected the investigation to continue in Brazil and Colombia.

The laborious counting procedure began Tuesday when federal agents selzed the shipment. Merkle announced the

Each packet was marked with numbers designating its destination - New York, Chicago, Los Angeles and Mlamt - which Cash said were centers of this organization's distribution.

The three men arrested were charged with conspiracy to import and conspiracy to possess with intent to distribute cocaine. U.S. Magistrate Paul Game Jr. ordered the three suspects held without bond after their first appearance Wednesday.

Agents arrested Michael Tsalickis, 60, owner of Amazon Trader of Pinellas in Tarpon Springs: Pedro Narvaez, president of Gulf Exotic Wood Imports Inc.; and Freddy Perez. identified in the complaint as "the Latin male with a limp."

Search warrants were served late Tuesday on Tsalickis, his warehouse and his residence. Authorities said he agreed to cooperate when told of the war-

The anonymous tipster said the cocaine would be smuggled to Medesa Corp., allegedly owned by Vincente Rivera, a cocaine trafficker and associate of Tsalickis, according to DEA files.

The vessel arrived at St. Petersburg April 19 and the 9,000 boards were transferred to a local warehouse. A random check by Customs that day found nothing, but the following day Inspectors saw Perez near

one of the bundles. The boards were tested after he left and cocaine was found, The lumber was moved to a Tarpon Springs warehouse the following week, where the boards were seized.

In Tsalickis' house, agents found a floor safe with \$20,000 cash, precious stones and Jewelry. Also found was a recent eashier's check from Tsalickis to Medesa Corp. for \$100,000. which he said was payment for the lumber.

Chrysler-UAW pact powers union

DETROIT (UPI) - The United Auto Workers' tentative agreement with Chrysler Corp., establishing pay parity among the Big Three car makers and setting a common expiration on their labor contract, will give the union greater power in future bargaining, analysts say.

"The union's bargaining power has been severely weakened in recent years. mainly by the onslaught of imports," said industry analyst Thomas O'Grady of Integrated Automotive Resources in Wayne, Pa. "With parity, the union will now have the power of consolidating the nation's top three car companies and hopefully work with all of them to fight off the imports."

The agreement, reached late Wednesday and subject to ratification by 68,000 union menibers, means the UAW can pit two carmakers against the third at bargaining time, O'Grady

"In the event of a strike at one. the other two would be able to steal market shares, which might pressure the first one to settle quicker," O'Grady said.

Judge says PTL faces 'end of the road'

COLUMBIA, S.C. (UPI) - The federal bankruptey judge overseeing PTL's battle for surits chances, saying he believes the television ministry that Jim Bakker founded is facing "the end of the road."

PTL's court-appointed trustee. meanwhile, disclosed that he has rejected Bakker's plea to return to the ministry. Trustee David Clark said he wrote Bakker that legal and "spiritual" concerns prevent the return sought by dissident PTL supporters since Bakker and his wife, Tammy Faye, departed in a sex scandal.

At a hearing Wednesday, U.S. Bankruptey Judge Reynolds offered one of his most pessimistic statements in the course of PTL's bankruptey that began after the Bakkers resigned last year and their replacement, the Rev. Jerry Falwell, also left.

Reynolds questioned whether the ministry can save any part of what was once a multimilliondollar enterprise.

"I would ... say we're at the end of the road." Reynolds told Clark. "The only question is

ORLANDO (UPI) - A man charged with drunken-driving manslaughter in the death of an 18-month-old boy this week has a string of DUI arrests covering more than a decade, including one last year for which his license was revoked.

State records and court documents show Thomas Warren. 51, has accumulated five DUI charges since 1977.

He was jailed today in lieu of \$7.500 bond on the manslaughter charge stemming from Tuesday's death of Courtney

Records show Warren was convicted and paid a \$150 fine on his first DUI arrest in Orlando. In 1980 his license was revoked for two years with another DUI conviction in Georgia.

Two years later Seminole County authorities charged him with DUL but the case was later dismissed. Apopka police charged him with DUI in 1986. That charge was reduced to

reckless driving and Warren pleaded guilty. He still owes \$710 on a \$1,140 fine

Orange County deputies made Warren's lifth DUI arrest in March 1987. His license was revoked for five years and he was sentenced to a year's probation and counseling and community service.

DUI manslaughter suspects often have long records of traffic and alcohol problems, said Mary Wiley, founder of Orange County's Mothers Against Drunk Driving chapter.

Washington finished the regu-

TAMPA (UPI) - Bascball's passive response to expansion could soon cost the sport its antitrust exemption.

So warned Sen. Bob Graham. D-Fla., Wednesday at a news conference with baseball union chief Donald Fehr.

"They (owners) can't have it both ways," Graham said. "They can't have an exemption from antitrust law and at the same time tell Congress that we can't look over their shoulder."

Baseball has been exempt from federal antitrust laws since a 1922 Supreme Court decision. The ruling has withstood years of challenges. Management contends administering the game would become unruly without such legal protection. Commissioner (Peter)

BASEBALL Ueberroth has to realize the fact

that antitrust exemption carries with it certain responsibilities," Graham said. "I say if majorleague baseball wants to cut that cord, let's repeal that antitrust exemption."

Graham's remarks followed the announcement of results from an expansion study commissioned by the Major League Baseball Players Association to examine the capability of 23 North American cities to support a major-league team.

The report, prepared by the Zev Bufman Sports, Entertainment Facility Development Group, favorably viewed the Tampa-St. Petersburg region.

Graham, a former Florida governor, is a longtime supporter of bringing baseball to Florida. where 18 of the 26 major-league teams train each spring.

"Congress has asked majorleague baseball to submit a schedule of decisions on expansion and we have received a very poor response to date," Graham said. "If we do not get a satisfactory response, a number of us have intentions of submitting legislation to repeal baseball's antitrust exemption."

According to Fehr, baseball management is reluctant to add franchises because the presence of cities looking for a team can help an owner extract concessions. The Chicago White Sox are threatening to relocate to St. Petersburg.

Leyoff expert favors trade **Bill provision**

GAINESVILLE (UPI) - Forcing companies to give employees 60 days notice of plant closings is as likely to boost production as reduce it, and could even reduce unemployment, says a University of Florida expert on layoffs.

Daniel C. Feldman. professor of management in UF's College of Business Administration, says his research shows the provision in the trade bill now on President Reagan's desk has more advantages than drawbacks.

Since it generally takes companies more than three months to plan the closing of a plant, providing advance notice would allow workers a head start in finding other jobs, Feldman said.

That would reduce the amount of unemployment compensation and other government assistance needed, he said.

Last year, Feldman and fellow researcher Carrie Leana of the University of Pittsburgh surveyed a total of 500 people who were laid off from their jobs in Pittsburgh steel mills and the aerospace industry in Brevard County.

"Advance notification would actually reduce the need for ayoffs," Feldman said.

One reason management opposes advance notification of layoffs is the fear that productivity would suffer following the announcement. Feldman said.

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
