



SANFORD - Easter is just a hop, skip and a jump away and they're already getting ready at the Central Florida Zoo.

The Easter Bunny, who rumor has it lives at our zoo when he is not globe hopp-ing, is making plans for the traditional Easter Egg Hunt at the Central Florida Zoo on March 29.

The 19th annual event will be sponsored this year by Radio AAHS, the childrens' radio station.

According to the zoo's spokesbunny, the Easter Bunny will hide more than 6,000 colored hardbolled eggs in the areas just outside the zoo gates. There will be opportunities for children from toddler age to 10 years old to find the special eggs.


Hunters are encouraged to be there one hour before they are set to leap into their hunt as the hunts will start exactly at their appointed time this year.

Property appraiser announces streamlined taxing procedures

SANFORD - Seminole County Property Appraiser Bill Suber, a member of the Florida Ad Valorem Task Force appointed by Governor Lawton Chiles, along with Orange County Property Appraiser Richard Crotty and others, announced a new initiative to dramatically streamline the personal property taxation process in Floride.

The two were joined by Sen. John Ostalkiewicz and Rep. Bob Starks.

Presently, Florida property appraisers must identify, collect information on, and maintain personal property accounts which range from \$1 to nearly \$1 billion in property value for ad valorem tax purposes.

A significant number of accounts generate little or no property tax revenue.


The proposal is designed to

reduce paperwork required of small business owners and in-dividuals with small value accounts as well as the current workload placed on appraiser's offices throughout the state.

Violence free month

During the past few weeks, most of our local municipal governments have approved a proclamation declaring March as "Violence Free Community Month."

Now we wonder, just exactly what does it mean, and what improvements will it bring about?

A group has been formed to call attention to the observance. The Committee for a Violence Free Community is comprised of officials from the sheriff's office, Grove Counseling, SafeHouse of Seminole, Boys and Girls Club, State Attorney, Florida Hospital, and a number of others.

According to the wording in the cities' proclamations. "The month of March will see events and activities throughout the county. In area schools and communities, to raise the level of awareness about violence."

The first event will be a kick-off press gathering at Lake Mary City Hall, this Saturday, March 1. The culmination will be March 22 with a march from the Seminole County Courthouse to Fort Melon Park.

In some situations, participation in a march stands as an indication of unified support. People who join in a public march show they are willing to band together to bring about changes and improvements. Unfortunately, after some marches, the only things taken home are sore fect or aching joints.

Specific details for the month's activities still remain to be announced, with some still in the stages of being arranged. We hope the focus will be on what can be done to reduce community violence, rather than just pointing out that there is community violence. Most people know it is there. What they want is to know how to reduce or eliminate it.

It's just like many other situations. No one is going to get a thing out of this event unless we put something into it. It's simple to stand on the sidelines and any to ourselves. "Yes, we certainly have violence around our community. It's a sad thing. Too bad no one does anything."

The imperatives of free speech

The Boys and Girls Club of Maryland recently invited Justice Clarence Thomas to be the speaker at a Festival for Youth. Outraged, the Maryland NAACP said it intended to mount a protest there that would interfere with his talk. Thomas decided not to come "for the safety and well-being of the children involved." I waited to hear what National NAACP president, Kweisi Mfume, would say. His predecessor, Ben Chavis, now allied with Louis Farrakhan, allowed the Texas NAACP to fire its counsel. Anthony Griffin, a brilliant civil-rights lawyer, because Griffin accepted an American Civil Liberties Union invitation to defend the Grand Dragon of the Ku Klux Klan there. The Texas Human Rights Commission had gone to court to compel the Klan to turn over its membership list. It had been the national NAACP in 1958 that won a landmark victory in the Supreme Court against the state of Alabama, which was demanding its membership list.

Griffin, a man of constitutional principles, refused to dishonor that crucial NAACP victory for free association. But Chavis and the national NAACP cut Griffin loose.



In a speech this year at Johns Hopkins University on Martin Luther King's birthday, Kweist Miume spoke to what had happened to Clarence Thomas by an NAACP chapter.

"We must never be intimidated by another man's ideas, and we must never rush to silence iree speech. It does not matter how we feel about Justice Thomas, and some of you know I have some very strong opinions there. But free speech is the principle by which the NAACP has challenged injustice for almost a century. and it must be preserved for those we love as well as those whom we loathe.

"Free speech in a democratic society must be fought for, whether we like what we hear or not, because one day, someone will come to stience us. And then who will speak for us?"



The survival of 2 Bosnian women

it's 12 p.m. on a February Monday, and I am sitting in the coffee shop of the New York Sheraton with two Bosnian concentration-camp victims, their interpreter, and two publicists from Cinemax. The situation, in other words, is surreal.

But surreal has become a way of life for Jadranka Cigelj and Nuareta Bivac. And by their standards, this is nothing. The two women, a lawyer and a civil judge respectively, flew into JFK this morning, and Cigelj says she just had a sognes to by and revive herself. Unfortunately, she jokes, it had the opposite effect.

Along with 34 other women, Cigelj and Sivac slept in two former business offices, which were used as interrôgation rooms during the day. Each evening the women would wash the blood from the walls, the floors, the furniture before curling on the floor to sleep. And if you were lucky you did sleep. Or at least remained curled on the floor undisturbed. But each night, at least one woman was unlucky, and Cigel's first bad night came on July 17. It was 9:30 p.m. and the commander of the guarda, Zeljko Mejakic, took her to a room where several other guarda waited. She was raped and beaten until 2 a.m. Cigcij and Sivac don't like to talk about these nights. And yet they do. Constantly. In July 1995 they testified before the international War Crimes Tribunal. Last year, they went on a speaking tour sponsored by Amnesty International. This week, they are promoting the documentary "Calling the Ghosts." which will air on Cinemax March 3. "We hoped, we thought it would have some sort of effect, our speaking out," anys Stvac. 'Our efforts have taken a long time. There have been some results and some disappointments." One of the results is that for the first time in history, rape has been identified as a weapon of war. Which is to say that the international community now recognizes that the some 20,000 rapes committed during the war in Bosnia were not isolated acts, but rather part of a systematic scheme of ethnic cleansing. Styac and Cigeij's testimonies also helped indict 22 guards at Omaraka. Unfortunately, nearly two years later. none of those guards have been arrested. In fact, many Serbian war criminals are living comfortably in the homes of the people they expelled -- as are a number of civilians. After Styac was released, she found that a former colleague, a court reporter who she thought was her friend, was living in her apartment and had no intention of leaving. Which brings us back to that disturbing question: How can ordinary people turn on their friends and neighbors? How are they capable of such evil? "That is part of the question 'Why' for which I do not have an answer," says Cigelj. "We can allow for any 3 percent of the population being born evil. Maybe 1 percent born psychotic. But how do you explain the rest of them?" Though they have thought about this often, Cigelj and Sivac are sure they have no insight. And as the waiter clears away our Pellegrino bottles and salad plates, the talk turns to more mundane topics. CNN needs room to set up their cameras. NPR will be a call-in. Julia Ormond, the actress who is also an executive producer, is talking up "Calling the Ghosts" on her press junket for "Smilla's Sense of Snow." Has all of this been worth it? The women say yes, they had to speak out for the women who did not survive Omaraka. As to whether they will see justice, they are not so sure. "I have no reason to be optimistic." says Cigelj, "and every reason to be wary."

What we suggest is massive participation in the events, and events which are aimed at making real improvements.

The people on the Violence Free Community Board are fully aware of the damage which can be done to individuals, families, and loved ones through violence. Now let's unite and not only spend this month of March finding out what can be done to prevent this tragedy, but what our individual role should be.

Let your voice be heard

BOSTON--1 keep thinking about Josef and Mandula Korbel.

I did not know the Czech couple who were twice-forced into exile from their homeland. Nor do I know what amount of denial or determination, what quotient of fresh hopes or bleak history, what portion of survival instinct or survivor's guilt, they carried with them from postwar Europe to America.

But then it turns out, their children did not know these people either. Not completely.

Just weeks ago, the late Josef and Mandula Korbel's eldest daughter was sworn in as secretary of state for their adopted country. By any measure. Madeleine Albright fulfilled her diplomat parents' dreams as well as her own.

Yet this appointment brought with it, in the form of a reporter's note pad, a "major surprise."

The Episcopalian who had been raised a Catholic discovered that her grandparents were Jews, three of whom died in the Holocaust. She discovered that her parents converted to Catholicism before the war began. She discovered what they had kept secret their whole lives.

When this family story was made public. Albright spoke up instinctively and protectively. "I think my father and mother were the bravest people alive."

This daughter said that her parents "talked about how they met, and how they were highschool sweethearts." Yet they also created a fictional childhood: "They talked about getting ready for various holidays, for Easter and Christmas."

Now as she goes about her days, at quiet moments in planes and hotel rooms when the briefings and meetings stop, the secretary of state also must be thinking of Josef and Mandula Korbel. About their secret, its meaning and its price.

The young Korbels apparently were secular Jews--a subilety that escaped the Nazis. They were Czech nationalists in an assimilated homeland who had to run for their lives with a 2-year-old daughter in tow.

How hard it is to imagine motives for changing your Jewish identity in the late 1930s? A longing to escape roots or enemies? A terror-driven attempt to protect the children?

In the postwar world, the Holocaust affected survivors in individually traumatic ways. It drove many--like my own father's family--to a closer identity as Jews. It pushed others--like perhaps the Korbels--as far away as possible.

In exile in England, Mandula Korbel told a friend, "To be a Jew is to be constantly threatened by some kind of danger. That is our history." What map was this young mother plotting for her family? One that charted an exit route from that history?



And when they escaped Czechoslovakia for the second time, who could have convinced the Korbels that "it couldn't happen here?" Here in anti-Semitism, and Jewish quotas?

Yet what a powerful thing a secret becomes. Family secrets inevitably take on a life of their own. One follows another into a patchwork of small lies that cover up tracks and reality.

Thinking about the Korbels, I wonder how they mourned their own parents' deaths. In secret? What did they really feel when their young daughter became, in her own words, a debout little Catholic? Relieved? Guilty?

At some point did the Korbels' desire to protect their children become a desire to protect themselves from discovery? From the inevitable dismay and distilusionment of children who unstitch the quilt of lies?

The Korbel children grew up in an era of secrets. Cancer was a whispered word. Adoption often was denied. Homosexuality was kept in the closet. Talk about money or infidelity was prefaced with an all-purpose warning: not in front of the children.

Parents kept secrets "for the sake of the children." And sometimes they kept on keeping those secrets for the sake of their own image in the children's eyes.

Did the Korbels want to unburden themselves? At some point, surely, before Josef's death in 1977, before Mandula's death in 1989, the family's Jewish roots no longer seemed so dangerous. But by then, the secrecy itself must have been the more dangerous secret.

I do not know how Madeleine Albright will absorb all this. Slowly, I expect. At 59, the mother of three adults herself, she has come to the age when the wise among us say of our own flawed parents: They did the best they could.

But secrets cost the Korbels, elder and younger, dearly. Secrets cost them the chance to know each other fully as people. Secrets cost them a chance to understand and be understood.

The Korbela wanted to change history. But what a legacy they have bequeathed. They left their children wondering.







In many, but not all states, the right to vote is restored upon completion of the sentence or parole. Some states require a pardon or administrative or

The courts have upheld state laws that prohibit felons from serving on juries, holding elec-tive office and working as peace officers, and have limited other rights. 





DEAR DR. GOTT: In 1968, I had a mastectomy for breast cancer. In 1992, I had a second one. I have be taking Tamoxifen since 1988 but recently read that these pills are inef-fective after five years of therapy. My doctor recommends that I stay on the drug for another year. What should I do?

DEAR READER: Follow your doctor's advice and don't believe everything you read.

Tamoxilen, an anti-estrogen drug. has been shown to reduce the risk of metastasis as well as the possibility of second or third breast cancers. There is no unanimous consensus on how long it should be taken. Some specialists advise a five-year treatment period; other authorities recommend permanent Tamoxifen therapy. If your oncologist wants you to take a full 10year course, do so.

You haven't had any problems (such as blood clots) with the drug, I gather, so another year or so won't harm you and may actually do some good. If you're cancer-free in another year, don't be surprised if your oncologist urges you to continue treatment.

DEAR DR. GOTT: During a recent physical exam, I was found to have a platelet count of 120,000 (normal: 150,000). Should I worry about this? I'm perfectly healthy.

DEAR READER: The platelets are tiny blood cells that are essential for normal blood clotting. The normal count is 150,000 to 300,000 per microliter. Values below this level may indicate a blood disorder, such as thrombocytopenia or leukemia, that should be addressed.

However, the platelet count is sometimes difficult to perform and can be fraught with error. For example, during trivial virus infections, the platelets may clump together, making a precise count impossible.

True, a count of 129,000 is low. But if you're feeling normal, have no bleeding tendency and are in good health. I'd ignore a single abnormal reading.

I believe that you should have a repeat analysis, however, in a few weeks. If the count remains below normal, your doctor has a difficult decision: either to continue to monitor the count (and hope that it rises) or obtain other tests, such as a bone marrow examination. For now, I'd opt the repeat count and take it from

DEAR DR. GOTT: What is the prognis of someone with cirrhosis from Repatitie C? He cannot take interferon therapy.

DEAR READER: Liver inflammation from the hepatitis C virus often progresses to cirrhosis (liver scarring) and eventual liver failure. The treatment of choice to prevent this perious eventuality is interferon, an anti-vieus drug.

If a person cannot tolerate this ther-my (because of an allergy to the drug, for instance), and the cirrhosis progresses, the prognosis is grim. Ultimately, such a person would be a candidate for a liver transplant.

Born in Georgia, Jones moved to Daytona Beach when he was two years old. In 1937, he moved to Sanford and has lived there ever since with his wife. Clayda

He has been a member of the Sanford Seminole Artist Association since 1977 and has participated in the St Johns River Festival for the past 15 years.

Jones paints in acrylic and oils focusing on Florida seascapes and landscapes, his favorite topics. This studio is set up in a portion of his garage.

Jones describes his paintings as composites done mostly from memory. His sketches are of actual settings along lakes, the St. Johns River and the New Smyrna Beach area.

His paintings have adorned local buildings since the early 1970s when he started studying art at Seminole Community College with Instructor Beth Hodgens. He also studied under Sanford native E.B. Stowe, Presently, he is taking critique classes with Ralph Bagley of Winter Park

While he was still working at the Seminole County Clerk's Office, he spent his evenings and weekends on a piece which still decorates an entire wall at Rataan World on 1st Street. The mural, which he completed in 1976, depicts a scene on the St. Johns River and measures 26 feet by 6 feet.

Jones has been recognized at many art shows and has earned several awards. In addition he has received medals in the Golden Age Games Hobby Show, an event which attracts athletes and artists from states in the Southeast. He also paints and teaches weekly at a local church. 

Birds bathe in style

Ceramic birdbaths will be part of the many artforms introduced at the St. Johns River Festival this year.

Winter Park artist Suzanne Bluemenauer will exhibit a unique collection of handcrafted birdbaths each featuring intricate hand-painted designs.

Bluemenauer, a veleran participant in arts and crafts shows throughout Central Florida, has been working on the birdbaths since last spring when she began holding pottery classes out of her home.

Prior to that for about 20 years, she specialized in batik art, an art medium originating in Indonesia where fabric is dyed using painted wax.

An art education teacher with a degree from the University of Central Florida. Blumenauer had worked with clay during the early part of her career. When she purchased her own kiln last year, she decided to teach pottery classes and switch her focus from batik to ceramic.

The birdbath idea, Blumenauer said, came from an actual lesson she presented to her students.

She began giving them as gifts and placed several in her own yard. A friend was so impressed by the birdbaths that he distributed them to local nurseries.

"It's an unusual thing." Blumenauer said, "and something you don't see. It's colorful and delicate, and you don't need a big yard. You can even slick it in a flower pot or even on a fence."


Blumenauer said she develops her color schemes from nature and does not use a pottery wheel. She said **Bee Birds, Page 17**
