Boating speed limits withdrawn

TALLAHASSEE - A proposed 30 mph boat speed limit for Florida waterways was withdrawn Tuesday by the state Department of Natural Resources following a series of public

The rule would have imposed the 30 mph limit during the day on boats operating on all Florida inland waters but not on those in the Gulf of Mexico or Atlantic Ocean. At night, the 30 mph limit would have applied everywhere.

DNR spokesman Bill Worth said officials decided to withdraw the proposal following a Tallahassee public hearing last week that "raised a number of concerns."

The department will hold additional hearings Wednesday in Coral Gables. Friday in Fort Myers and Dec. 11 in Daytona Beach to gather more information on boat speeds.

Judge to rule on FPL layoffs

FORT LAUDERDALE - A federal court judge said he would decide by Friday whether to grant an injunction against Florida Power & Light to halt layoffs of hundreds of union workers.

The International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers filed a lawsuit last month against the utility to stop layoffs of 350 workers until the dispute between the two groups is settled by an arbitrator.

The union says FPL did not give employees ample notice of their impending firings and that the company replaced the workers with outside contractors in order to save money.

Unionized workers represent about 5,400 positions.

Museum facelift OK

SANFORD — New architects will complete the plans for the Henry Shelton Sanford Memorial Library and Museum.

Two firms, Duer/Blackman Architects Inc. and Burke Bales and Mills Associates Inc., are currently being considered for the assignment. Sanford City Manager Bill Simmons said this

"We've talked to these firms. They both express a willingness to work toward the creation of a traditional design," Simmons said. "My

recommendation is that essentially either firm is acceptable. If commissioners express a preference Monday night, (at the next Sanford City Commission meeting) that will settle it. If not, Mr. Reeves may assign it." Simmons added.

Keith Reeves, who headed the project for

Architects Design Group, Winter Park, has recommended to the city the architects whom he feels could satisfy citizens' and city officials' clamors for a more traditional design.

Reeves' original drawing of the building was initially accepted by all of the city commissioners except Lon Howell, who voiced concerns that the design was too modern for a building set near a

"After the Herald printed a picture of the new design, I got a lot of phone calls. It mushroomed. Nobody seemed to like it so I kinda made a stink. I wanted to fire Reeves early on, and I guess I was acting like a spoiled brat," Howell said, "because they stuck a pacifier in my mouth by agreeing to talk to Reeven.

The commission requised that Reeves alter the first design.

Anderson reported free, safe

DAMASCUS, Syria - U.N. Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar said American hostage Terry Anderson had been freed today by his Shiite Muslim captors and was safely in Syrian hands.

The statement followed contradictory reports earlier about the whereabouts of Anderson, who had been held 61/2 years and was the last American hostage in Lebanon.

Perez de Cuellar, who oversaw the negotiations for the release of Western hostages, told The Associated Press in New York that Anderson was with Syrian officials in Lebanon's Bekaa Valley and heavy snow has delayed his transfer to Damascus.

"I am sure this is a technical problem. I think mainly due to snow, the usual road they use to go from somewhere in Lebanon to Damascus." Perez de Cuellar sald.

"I'm still hopeful it will take place today." he said, referring to Anderson's anticipated arrival in Damascus and his handover to U.S. officials.

'He is on his way and he is being protected by the Syrians, I imagine, because I think he must be in the Bekaa Valley," the secretary-general said. Earlier today, it was not clear where Anderson

was, despite reports from Arab and U.S. officials that he was released and turned over to the Syrian. Anderson, 44. The Associated Press chief Middle East correspondent, said in a videotaped statement that he was to be freed. The tape, released by his captors to The AP in Damascus, gave no indication

American, Syrian and Lebanese officials initially sald Anderson had been freed and turned over to Syrian troops in Lebanon. Later, however, Syrian Foreign Minister Farouk al-Sharaa said, "We hope he will be released this evening - the sooner the

A five-page Arabic-language statement from the Islamic Jihad group, which has held Anderson for 2,455 days, announced that he would be set free, but its wording was unclear as to whether he had already been released.

In the accompanying videotape Anderson spoke in the future tense, saying he will be freed. It was not known when the videotape was made.

SANFORD - Seminole County Commissioner Larry Furlong suggests cities and the county might save money and improve services by consolidating their fire departments into one agency.

"I'm not proposing the county absorb all the fire departments of the cities," said Furlong. "But I think this would be a better use of the money we take from all our constituents than we are now."

Furlong suggests merging the county and city fire departments into one agency, one that may be completely independent from the

county and cities. Representatives from the county and cities might serve on a board that operates the agency. The Seminole County Expressway Authority functions in much the same manner.

ASHVILLE, Fla. - A 3-year-old fatally shot her 18-month-old sister after finding their grandfather's shotgun in his bedroom closet, Jefferson County Sheriff Ken Fortune said.

Kashari Harris shot Jalisa Harris when their mother, Eunice

Jones, was in the bathroom Monday morning.

Jones, 32, said she heard what sounded like an explosion.

Thinking the little girls had knocked a television off a stand.

she went to see what happened.

She called 911 but Jaiina was already dead.

Kashari still is not aware of what has happened and "keeps

asking for her sister." Jones said Tuesday. The 12-guage shotgun belonged to Pettia Jones, who was not home at the time. His daughter and grandchildren live with him in this rural community near the Georgia border.

Two years ago, Florida became the first state to pass a law

that could punish an adult if a child shoots someone with the adult's loaded weapon.

Man remains jailed for sex crimes

CAPE CORAL - A man who confessed to sexually assaulting a 10-year-old girl and videotaping some of his sex acts with the child remained jailed on \$100,000 bond, police said.

Anthony Gomes Lages, 35, is charged with capital sexual battery, which is punishable by up to life in prison and not less than 25 years in Jail.

The trucker was arrested Saturday after the little girl told child protection authorities that Lages had been abusing her for more than two years, police spokesman Sgt. Mike Maher

The child said Lages forced her to have oral and anal sex and threatened to harm her if she told anyone, according to the police report.

Dorothy Dianne Rose, 33, no longer needs to be involuntarily confined at the Florida State Hospital in Chattahoochee. according to a letter by forensic services director Robert H.. Alcorn Jr. to Hillsborough County officials.

A Dec. 20 court hearing on the hospital's recommendation that Rose be released to a psychiatric halfway house in

The woman has been hospitalized since January 1990, the day deputies found her near death from a self-inflicted stab wound to the chest and slashed wrists.

The bodies of her 13-month-old daughter, Jessica Linn Rose, and 2-year-old son. Michael Holt Rose, were found in their beds. Both had been choked and strangled with neckties.

Arson suspected in school fire

GREENSBORO, Fla. - Arson is suspected in a pre-dawn fire that destroyed the main building of the Greensboro High School, an official said.

No one was injured in the fire, which was brought under control in about an hour, according to A.J. Pickels, Gadsden

County's chief sheriff's deputy.

Fire officials said Tuesday they had trouble getting enough water pressure to fight the blaze, which led to a call for people not to take showers to help maintain maximum water

Lawsuit filed after murder

PENSACOLA - The widow of a murder victim has filed lawsuit accusing a discount store of illegally selling the fatal bullets to her husband's teen-age killers.

The suit filed Monday by Sandra F. Coker in state Circuit Court against Wal-Mart Stores Inc. is based on federal regulations that ban the sale of handgun ammunition to people under 21. The suit did not specify the amount of damages being sought.

Three teen-agers, and a 26-year-old man accused of hiring them, were convicted in August for the mistaken-identity slaying of auto parts store clerk Billy Wayne Coker, 36, last Jan. 26. He was gunned down with bullets allegedly bought the same night at a Pensacola Wal-Mart.

Ma Bell rate hearings ordered

TALLAHASSEE — Utility regulators have ordered a major review of Southern Bell's rates next year for the first time in a decade, and granted a January hearing on a request to trim the telephone company's profits in the meantime.

The Florida Public Service Commission also ordered Southern Bell to begin giving customers monthly credits in January on \$44.9 million from excess profits made in 1991. An average residential customer's bill would show a 55 cent monthly credit.

Southern Bell will fight any rate cut. company officials said Tuesday.

Public Counsel Jack Shreve, representing utility customers before the PSC, said the economic slowdown, with its lower inflation and interest rates, was one reason the telephone company should have its profits

"Overall, it was a good day for the consumers," Shreve said.

The \$44.9 million was excess 1991 profits and interest earned under a rate incentive plan the PSC approved for the company three years ago.

The plan let Southern Bell earn added profits in return for promised improvements in operating efficiency and customer service improvements that the company said would save customers more than \$1 billion by 1992.

Proposal to shift road money criticized

TALLAHASSEE - A House proposal to shift \$25 million in highway money to help offset a \$622 million tax shortfall might delay important transportation projects, road advocates and some lawmakers say.

"We think it's a lack of leadership on the part of some leaders of the House to take the easy way out,"said Art Kennedy, a member of the Florida Transportation Commission. on Tuesday, "This would certainly set us back."

House leaders are considering taking the \$25 million from a \$50 million balance the Department of Transportation must maintain as a reserve cushion.

Kennedy and DOT officials say that could mean delays in road and bridge projects over the next year because more money from gas taxes and other transportation fees would have to be shifted into the reserve.

Beyond that, lobbyists for transportation-related businesses and advocates for better roads are upset that the Legislature would even consider DOT money, which is supposed to be set aside in a trust fund only for highway

"Any diversion of transportation user fees to other programs is a breach of faith with the public." Kennedy said.

MIAMI - Thousands of Haitlans remained trapped between the homeland they fled and tough U.S. immigration laws after a Miami federal judge renewed his ban on repatriation.

U.S. District Judge C. Clyde Atkins issued a temporary injunction Tuesday night that in effect continued, and strengthened, a Nov. 19 halt to repatriation of thousands of Haitians intercepted at sea by the Coast Guard.

African election

Democracy in Africa is still a distant dream, but it got an encouraging boost recently in Zambia, where voters turned a national institution out of office by an overwhelming margin. Founding father Kenneth Kaunda's opponent in the country's first presidential election in more than two decades, labor union leader Frederick Chiluba, won 76 percent of the vote and his Movement for Multi-party Democracy won more than 80 percent of parliamentary seats in an election that a small army of foreign observers adjudged as fair.

That fairness was assured not only by the presence of outside monitors, including a group led by former President Jimmy Carter, it also reflected a belated recognition by Kaunda, Zambia's president since independence from Britain in 1964, that his regime was discredited in the eyes of his people and that his statist economic policies, exacerbated by official incomptence, had turned a potentially prosperous country into a basket case.

Shortly after the polls closed, Kaunda conceded defeat, a rare example of peaceful political change in African history.

Solving the country's problems, however, will require more than good will. It means phasing out consumer subsidies and state control of industry, diversifying an economy overly dependent on copper mining and revitalizing a badly neglected farm sector.

Chiluba has warned Zambians that the able that they understand just how painful. especially given the dire conditions that already prevail.

Indicitions in the with debt forgiveness and investment credits through agencies like the World Bank and International Monetary Fund: Yet increasing eco-nomic problems even in rich countries, and a concomitant growth of "compassion fatigue," raise questions about foreign willingness to help Zambia and other African countries that want to move toward democracy and free markets.

Nor will Zambia's happy election experience necessarily be duplicated everywhere, Stubborn dictators cling to power in Zaire, Kenya and Malawi, among others; South Africa, a key factor in African change, is far from resolving the crisis of apartheid with a mutually acceptable power-sharing accord; and famine and disease - the combined result of bad weather, bad management and civil war - threaten several countries. Including Sudan, Ethiopia and Somalia.

Whatever Democratic gains are made African societies' struggle for a decent life will remain a race against a shortage of time and a surfeit of foreign indifference.

Contest: Name this new holiday!

I confess, I have been looking for a moment of opportunity. The establishment of the new mega-state of Ukraine offers it. Now is the time to declare an annual celebration to commemorate the victory in the Cold War. All we have to figure out is a date, a name and a ritual. So let's have a

contest.

The Cold War lasted almost half a century. It's purpetrater, the Soviet Union, is now lastery, not only diagraced, but dishended and distinshed. (Without Ultraine's BQ million puople; there can't be a threatening world class power over there. Even a remacent Russia would only have about 80 percent of the U.S. population.)

The victory in the Cold War is a testament to democracy. It's often said, typically by conservative gloom-pota, that free people lack discipline. That has now been shown to be untrue.

The Cold War revealed that free peoples, represented by freely elected governments of every political stripe, would stay a long course to save themselves from potential despotism. They would tax themselves and draft their children in order to destroy an evil empire. In doing that, the

order to destroy an evil empire. In doing that, the current generation has lifted a massive mortgage off the backs of succeeding generations.

It's a particularly American victory. America

led the coalition: American taxpayers paid the heaviest share of the bill. As the U.S.S.R. disintegrated, it was said to be

important that America not officially gloat about it. Gorbachev might lose face among the hard-liners, and that would make reform more difficult. But now, with Ukraine and Russia sepa-rately independent, there is no nation remaining whose face needs saving.
And so we ought to

have an annual holiday. In fact, we ought to invite our allies and our former adversaries to join us in s u c h a n end-of-the-Cold War celebration. The world could use a shared party.



Now is the time to declare an annu-al celebration. Annual festivals remind us of what we hold ser, and to what we aspire. This celebration of

the near-global victory of democracy could help us renew our committment to our cause.


Does it make sense to spend trillions to win a Cold War and then risk letting some of the fruits victory spoil because we won't send a coup billions to ex-Soviets facing a winter ager? When those ex-Soviets still have nuband suction experts who may get desperate in a world that seeks their hardware and their

It could remind us that Americans love a great cause, that there is none greater than liberty, and (if further public motivation is needed in an election year) that great causes make great politics. So far the U.S. government has done a better job at preventing despotism than at promoting democracy.

The way to establish the holiday for democra-

cy's triumph is by a grass-roots contest. Readers are herewith notified of their grass-roots contestant-eligibility status.

"End-of-the-Cold War" is not a good name for a holiday; neither is "Now-that-Ukraine-is-independent." So, first task for contestants: Come up with a name. It must be short.

A regeneration of the family

BOSTON — The cousins from California have shown up just in time to help with the annual roundup and delivery of my late grandmother's chins. Over the river and through the woods, to granddaughter's house

The younger generation was here as well. They had wended their way out of area codes that stretch all the way from 310 to 212. We brought them in like sheaves from their assorted airports and highways.

For a moment, I stood alone in the kitchen that was transformed into Thanksgiving Central, checking off the list of ingredients for Thursday's extravaganza. The wooden bridge chairs. The matching - well, mostly matching - glasses. The turkey platter that always shows up sooner or later. The 30-cup coffee pot that is the collective property of this exteneded

This is what I, the modern non-farm wife, harvested from the crop at our local market: three pans of sweet potatoes, 2 bowls and one cavity of stuffing, apples and onions, salad goodies, the makings for the dreaded and beloved string bean casserole, and a 25-pound

But as I survey the foodscape, it isn't the feast that impresses me. A middle-class child of 20th century America. I am no longer amazed by a 25-pound turkey. What seems more rare is the family that will come to share

After all, this is what we have learned about our country, isn't it? That in America, food is plentiful but family is scarce.

That in America, Thanksgiving was once a day to be grateful for the good luck of the land. That now we celebrate something that seems every bit as subject to weather patterns and disasters: our endangered families. That the holiday is less about food and more about that scarcer source of human sustenance.

In 1943, when Norman Rockwell finished his classic painting, the turkey was the cen-terpiece of Thankagiving. He drew an homage to Freedom From Want. In 1991, when our own eyes focus on that scene, family is the centerpiece. It's the family that we want. There is more than a little truth in all this. At

the supermarket, that urban acre that I work with a shopping cart, goods are sold in single servings. For most of the year, the turkey in the freezer comes packaged in parts for solitary In the wider world, we live more and more

household is not a family. But setting the table for 19 people who come together from eight different households to one family gathering. I wonder if we haven't

exaggerated the weakness of our family ties.

alone. Single-person households are the fastest growing part of our population. A single-person

Do we have an unrealistic portrait in our minds and memories of a Rockwell family? Does that image cloud the strengths of our own?

A series of surveys have been released, like season's greetings, in the past week. They show that Americans feel intensely the stresses of family life. But also the satisfactions. By huge margins, we think relationships

with our own children are good or excellent, but that family values are weaker than they used to be. We find our own families the most satisfying parts of our lives, but think that it's harder to be a parent "than it used to be." In one of these surveys 80 percent of Americans said they wouldn't give up Thankagiving dinner with their families for even \$1,000.

Well, I will not test this last theory with thousand-dollar options at my door. But

I wonder at the in ternal conflicts that one pollster described as the "I'm okay, but you're not" syndrome. Why do we believe that our own family attachments and strengths are an exception in a sea of dissolution?

When the airports and highways are clogged. Americans are not just going home for the giblets. When we pull up a million bridge chairs to tables laden with one cousin's pumpkin pie and another's turkey dressing, it ian't just to debate the merits of gravy. It's to reaffirm our belonging.

So it is here as well. The house was filled with lemon pie and stories. It echoed with people bound together by blood, affection, time, shared pride, even common tragedies. and the collective terror that someone will break one of Grandma Celia's dishes. On such a day, not so rare after all, it is the harvest of family that marks my sense of good fortune.

Kemp stretching beyond Baker

WASHINGTON - Jack Kemp is pushing his luck with the Bush administration. Kemp signed on to the Bush Cabinet as the secretary of Housing and Urban Development with some expectation from the White House that he would keep his nose out of politics. But that's like saking Garfield to keep his

nose out of lassene.

A worldwide organization of conservative political parties has picked Kemp as its next

likely deputy-chairman, sharing the job with former British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, If Kemp with the international Democratic Union, he will violate a secret agreement he made in 1988 with Secretary of State James Baker. Baker arranged the Cabinet job for Kemp on the condition that he stay out of inranged the ternational affairs as Cabinet job long as George Bush was in office. Bush wanted to be the star on the world scene,



for Kemp on condition and he didn't need a presidential aspirant like Kemp overshadowing and second-guessing him.

The IDU was formed in 1983 at a conference in London where Bush represented then-President Ronald Reagan. The group's goal is to promote democracy around the world, but its definition of democracy is to the right of center. The Republican Party

belongs to the IDU, but the Democrats do not. According to our sources, the agreement to make Kemp and Thatcher the new leaders next summer was brokered by Republican heavyweight Frank Fahrenkopf, who served as head of the Republican National Committee during part of the Reagan years. Fahrenkopf now practices law in Washington. He traveled to London with Bush in 1963 to organise the IDU and was one of the original aignatories to the charter representing the Republican Party. He is currently deputy chairman of the IDU.

Fahrenkopf told our reporter Jan Moller that while Thatcher is on the list of candidates considered for the chairmanship. the IDU is not close to making a decision. He also confirmed that Kemp has been mentioned for the job, and said he didn't know anything about Kemp's promise to Baker to stay out of international affairs.


Fahrenkopf said he doesn't believe Kemp would take the job without the blessings of the White House. But don't count on it.

Kemp's love affair with the administration is beginning to show signs of strain. He expected to be able to make big changes in the scandal-ridden HUD, but has been unable to get the president's ear for many of his ideas. The job has turned into a political backwater for him instead of a place where he could showcase his talents.

Last month, one of Kemp's big housing initiatives was rebuffed when Bush signed an appropriations bill that makes deep cuts in some of Kemp's pet programs. Kemp also crossed Bush recently by coming out in favor of tax cuts to stimulate the economy. something many conservatives think is necessary but Bush has declined to endorse.

The European branch of the IDU met in October and indicated a preference for awarding the chairmanship to Carl Bildt, the leader of the Moderate Party in Sweden that recently ousted the ruling Social Democrats. The minutes of the European meeting indicate that Thatcher is being considered as a "patron of honor" to the organization and Kemp as deputy chairman. But, according to our source. Fahrenkopf has more firm plans. He reportedly told Kemp that Thatcher would only agree to take the job of chairman if Kemp agreed to be the deputy-chairman. And then Fahrenkopf told Thatcher that Kemp had agreed to take the job, only if she shared

Kemp declined our requests for comment.

The denial of notice and an opportunity for a hearing was alleged to be a deprivation of Plaintiff's property interests in violation of the provision of the fourteenth. tion of the Due Process Clause of the fourteenth. Amendment to the United States Constitution.

Judge Fawsett entered a Preliminary Injunction on January 14, 1991 enjoining Defendant SHA from causing the seizure, towing or impounding of automobiles on the SHA premises without first providing notice and a hearing unless the automobile. bile jeopardizes public safety and ordering the

return of the named Plaintiffs' automobiles. The "Plaintiffs" who brought the lawsuit include four individuals and a "class" or group of people as follows: all persons who are tenants or quests of tenants of the HOUSING AUTHORITY OF THE CITY OF SANFORD, Florida (SHA) whose automobiles are parked at the parking lots of the SHA and are subject to seizure and impoundment by the SHA and its agents.

ITAPPEARS THAT YOU ARE ONE OF THOSE PLAINTIFFS.

2. SHA shall give written individual Notice of Violation to the registered owner of a vehicle claimed to be inoperative, without license plate or current registration, etc. which shall inform the owner of their right to request a hearing within 5 business days;

3. when vehicle poses clear safety or health

hazard, SHA shall cause the immediate removal by towing of the vehicle and provide post-towing notice to registered owner informing owner of opportunity for hearing; and





Second round of peace talks underway

WASHINGTON - Arab and Palestinian negotiators were ready to take their seats at a second round of Mideast peace talks despite an expected Israeli no-show.

The Bush administration said the talks would open this morning at the State Department even though lersel said it would not attend because it needed until Monday to prepare for the bilateral talks with Jordan, Syria, Lebanon and the Palestinians.

Without the Israelia, there is not much the talks can achieve. But the Palestinians, Jordanians, Syrians and Lebanese intend to make the most of it as proof that the Jewish state is not serious about peace.

Duke launches renegade campaign

WASHINGTON — David Duke is launching a renegade Republican campaign against President Bush in selected primaries, hoping to garner enough support to be a voice at the party's national convention next summer.

The former Ku Klux Klan grand wisard and Nazi sympathizer was announcing his plans in Washington today, less than three weeks after his landslide loss in the Louisians governor's race. In his defeat, Duke won the majority of white votes as he sounded many of the national GOP's themes.

Aides said Duke would concentrate on Southern and Southwestern primaries scheduled for early March, with an eye on states with delegate formulas favorable to challengers. It will be Duke's second presidential campaign. He ran in several Democratic primaries in 1988, barely causing a ripple.

Bush looks at Skinner as chief of staff

WASHINGTON - President Bush is turning his attention to naming a new chief of staff to replace the feisty John Sununu.

Heading the list of candidates was Transportation Secretary

One GOP congressional source said Tuesday that the decision to give Skinner the job was "definite but not official."
Word around the administration was that Bush approached Skinner about the possibility of taking over for Sununu, who resigned Tuesday. Skinner expressed interest in the job. according to another official.

NEW YORK - Pan American World Airways, the one-time glamour airline with a history of aviation firsts, scrambled for financing to keep on flying today after Delta backed out of a deal to put money into the business.

Delta Air Lines said Tuesday it would not provide an additional \$25 million as part of a bankruptcy reorganization plan that would have made the 64-year-old, globe-circling Pan Am a smaller airline concentrating on Latin America. Leon Marcus, an attorney for Pan Am creditors, said Delta

"betrayed all of us when Pan Am trusted Delta in its most desperate hour." Pan Am, which has 7,500 employees, said it had only

Stereotypes exposed in exhibit of collectibles

By DEBOIE NEWBY Associated Press Writer

ATLANTA - Grinning Sambos and faithful mammies stare down from an exhibit of racist icons from the Old South that still haunt the new.

There's a message in the 48 pieces that depict frozen smiles. and exaggerated facial features. Even its title, "Big Lips, Bulging Eyes," is provocative.

The caricatures depict a time when subservient, happy blacks served their powerful, white masters, says Edward Spriggs. executive director of Hammonds House gallery and resource center of black art.

His staff and some members of the public criticized him for naming the exhibit "Big Lips. Bulging Eyes."

'But we used that name because it really pulls up that picture right away." Spriggs said. "You didn't think of a Chinese when you saw that, did

"We thought we'd go ahead and bite the bullet, bring people out of their psyche-closet. Black people live with these things all the time."

Hammonds House has held seminars in connection with the exhibit to help black people. especially children, learn how to deal with the stereotypes. Spriggs said.

'It is aimed at black folk because we think the primary problem with these images is our own self-confidence and self-image," Spriggs said. "We have to purge ourselves of that in order to be whole.

"I've met so many black people who would not sit down in a restaurant and order a watermelon. ... They don't want to be seen in public doing it because of the image it would call up."

Kenneth Goings, a black professor of history at Florida Atlantic University, says collectors today long for what he

calls a mythical time before the civil rights movement.

"They want to return to a time when it seemed like Negroes were happy or African. Americans knew their place be-fore all this civil rights stuff started," said Goings, who is writing a book about black collectibles and collects them for his research.

"It's the same fantasy as trying to return to the Old South. There never really was an Old South. There never really was this tranquil time." Goings said.

The Hammonds House collection, which will be on display through November, includes caricatures of blacks used in song sheets, advertisements, newspapers and cartoons. A black jockey, once used as a hitching post for horses, stands in the entrance to the Victorian house.

White America's fascination with collecting Aunt Jemima salt and pepper shakers. Mammy cookie jars and lawn ornaments of black boys gobbiing watermelon stems from a longing for the plantation life. Spriggs said.

"It comes out of a desire to return and relive and maintain that kind of comfortable place whites had during slavery." Spriggs said. "It's the same thing I would say about 'Gone With the Wind' and the rest of the stuff they keep smearing in our faces as being great literature, great movies.

Interest in the collectibles has surged in recent years, Goings

"The reproduction market is just astronomical and people are buying them in increasing numbers. It's very disturbing. said Goings.

"I think people are sort of taken in. They see them as cute and it helps them accept the stereotypes they're representing. at ONLY YOU CAN PREVENT PORESTPRES They don't think about the stereotypes."

NEW YORK — Letters to Santa both heartwrenching and hopeful have been pouring into New York City's general post office by the thousands this troubled hol-

iday season.
"I am a very poor woman and I have three kids," wrote one New York mother. "If you will please send us something to eat, clothes to put them in and toys to play with.

In a tradition begun 60 years ago, postal workers in New York set aside letters addressed to Santa and let the public rummage through them and choose letters from needy families or

children they can help. John F. Kelly, general manager of the New York postal division, said the recession could push the number of letters most of which are actually written by adults - above last year's record of 26,000.

"It's just a guess, but based on the way things look now it's going to be a totale," Kelly season for a lot of people," Kelly said at a news conference Mon-day to kick off the annual Letters

to Santa campaign.
Sorted into cardboard boxes wrapped to look like chimneys. the letters - many of them addressed only to Santa USA or North Pole - come from all over the world and range from simple requests for Barble dolls and other toys, to more difficult requests destined to go unanswered.

"I sometimes hear my mom crying at night because my sister, Star, can't talk and she still gets sick," wrote Christopher of New York. "Me and Ulysses don't want a lot. We just want Star to get better."

Karen, a 7-year-old from Rox-bury, Mass., asked Santa to visit her because she's sick.

"I was hoping I would be better this year but I still cannot breathe through my nose so I'm stuck with these stupid machenes and taking all this dum medicine," she wrote. "Why can't I be well? Please come see me. Santa. I love you."

Many letters asked for toys all from kids who insisted they were absolutely, positively good this year.

None was quite as straightforward as the one from Christina of Massapequa Park. who cut pictures of four expensive toys from the tony FAO Schwarz catalog and told Santa to call the store's 800 number.

Kelly said 60 percent of the letters actually come from adults asking for basic things like socks, gloves, warm coats and even food.

He said it doesn't take much effort to brighten the holidays for a letter-writer.

Nine-year-old Madeline of New York explained in her letter that she lives with her grandmother who is very ill and can't afford to buy her presents.

Even if you could give me a pencil I will be so happy," she

WEST PALM BEACH — The woman who says William Kennedy Smith raped her was hysterical and disheveled when she left the Kennedy estate, a witness said. Smith's lawyer attacked the witness for selling her story to TV for \$40,000.

"You realized you could cash in on the Kennedy name," defense attorney Roy Black challenged the witness, Anne

"No, I did not." she said

Courtroom spectators gasped at the \$40,000 figure, the amount she received for her appearance on the tabloid TV

Me. Mercer, a 33-year-old friend of Smith's accuser, was to

continue testifying today.
On Tuesday, Ms. Mercer, who had gone out on the town with Smith's accuser the night of March 29, testified she saw the woman leave a disco with Smith about 3 s.m. She said she received a call from the woman about 4:15 s.m.

"What did she say to you?" asked prosecutor Motra Lasch.

"That she had been raped. She asked me to come and pick her up. She said she was at the Kennedy estate," Ms. Mercer

Ms. Mercer said she arrived with her boyfriend, whom the woman had asked her to bring "for safets"

When they arrived, she said, the woman was standing at the top of an outdoor staircase.

"She was literally shaking and she looked messed up," said Ms. Mercer. "Her makeup was running. She was hysterical cry-

ing."
"She had her knees up to her chest and when we tried to talk to her, she would jump like she didn't want someone to touch her." Ms. Mercer testified.

The 30-year-old woman says Smith, a 31-year-old nephew of Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., tackled and raped her on the lawn of the Kennedy family's Palm Beach estate March 30. The charges could bring 4½ years in prison.

On cross-examination. Black asked Ms. Mercer why, if she believed Smith was a rapist, she walked through the mansion alone with him, then down a dark stairwell onto a deserted beach in search of the alleged victim's shoes.

"You asked the rapist to help you find her shoes? Is that correct?" Black asked.

On cross-examination, Ms. Mercer acknowledged she was paid \$40,000 for two "Current Affair" interviews but said, "I was fair to both parties involved." Black suggested she tailored her story to intrigue TV producers. More members of Smith's famous family turned up to support him on the trial's second day. His aunts Ethel

Kennedy and Eunice Shriver were in the courtoom along with his cousin Chris Lawford.

Cathie Aime, a 26-year-old former girlfriend of Smith's, also joined his entourage. "I just think he needs some friends



SCC gets input from surveys

SANFORD - In preparation for next year's accreditation visits by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS). Seminole Community College is conducting a series of surveys to see where improvements are needed and where the college is doing a good job.

Every ten years the college is expected to take a hard look at itself and prepare for the reaffirmation of the accreditation by the SACS.

A self-study committee, directed by Dorothy Holtgrefe, developed seven separate surveys to get the opinions of the faculty, the administration, the support staff, the community, the alumni, the students and the board of trustees.

In all about 1,200 surveys have been sent out. The committee has asked that the responses be returned to the school by Monday. Holtgrefe reports that the re-

turn rate has been "quite good" so far. The self-study committee consists of volunteers from dif-

ferent areas at the college. "These people have worked long, hard hours," Holtgrefe

said. The committee had considered using a survey developed by the **Educational Testing Service, but** the \$2,000 price tag made them

think again. "In these tough economic times it was hard to justify spending that kind of money. Holtgrefe said.

She said that the only expense the committee has incurred so far is that of the paper on which the survey was printed.

The results of the survey will be incorporated into the text of a report that must be presented to the SACS visitation team that will come to the college in the spring of 1992.

"It will not be a lot of figures," Holtgrefe said. "We are more interested in perceptions about the college from the different

County planners OK land use change but nix subdivision

SANFORD - Seminole County planners have recommended approval of reconfigurations of two Markham Woods Road developments but rejected a proposal for a 7-home per acre subdivision adjacent to Heath-

County planners released their recommendations of the land use changes and rezonings Monday. Seminole County Planning and Zoniag Commission members will consider the recommendations Wednesday. County commissioners will consider P&Z recommendations Jan. 14 and will consider final approval May 12 under the current schedule.

Staff planners balked at a request by Engineering Management and Design Inc. of Orlando for a 21-acre, 86-home subdivision southeast of Heathrow Elementary, County planners wrote the 7.2-home per acredensity was incompatible with surrounding low-density development trends.

They recommended allowing no more than one home per acre if the residents would be able to drive to Markham Woods Road or three homes per acre if the subdivision can be reached only from Heathrow.

But planners recommend approval of a plan by Heathrow developer Arvida Corp. to shift into the subdivision. The parcel ling density. is located north of the Dawn Estates subdivision east of Markham Woods Road.

The plan calls for merging the 19 acres with a currentlyapproved Heathrow the homesites. As a result, the original neighborhood density of lowered to 1.4 homes per acre. County planners wrote the land use scheme was consistent with county development plans and with area densities of one to three homes to an acre.

The piece on display in Donaldson's home is a heavy. hollow bust of Lincoln. Its intricate workmanahip is readily visible and suggests its creator was a fine master craftsman.

Donaldson speaks of his mother's family who came from land en masse in the 1820's and fought the Seminoles. His father's family came from Scotland and his great grandfather was killed at Shiloh.

"They've all been traced from the boat." He doesn't know what boat brought them over.

With the families came cook-

ing styles and recipes from the old world that evolved into southern cooking over the years.

"Cooking comes natural" to me. I never write anything down: my mother didn't either. I gasss I taught myself to cook. I did watch my mother. When I was a kid she had asthma so I did some of the cooking. The first thing I cooked was collards. Now, I use a cookbook written by an old Army Air Force buddy. an old Army Air Force buddy. It's a hilatious book for southern cooks and includes cartoons. Bil Dwyer wrote it. He also did the comic strip Dumb Dora (a synthesized King feature). When we were stationed at Keesler Field in Biloki during WWII, he would hide in the latrine and draw Dumb Dora while I kept guard at the door. They told him not to do the strip while he was in the service but he did it anyway. He would have been sent to the guard house if he was caught. I make crackling bread from Dwyer's cookbook and I use my mother's pound cake

recipe."
Donaldson also has a large cookbook that includes Bess

Truman's pound cake.
Our cook hosts large outdoor parties, fish fries and an annual New Year's Day feast all cooked outside.

"I've cooked tons of fish and food on that outdoor fireplace." Donaldson said as a pleasant amile lit up his face.

Emotional upsets may trigger 'spells

DEAR DR. GOTT: For over a ear I've suffered from ghtheadedness, shortness of breath, total body weakness, followed by nausea and sometimes tremors. An MRI, CT scan, Holter monitor and blood tests are negative. The diagnosis to date has been autonomic dysfunction with a possibility of migraines.

Since I do not respond to any medication my doctor has pre-scribed, where do I turn next? With these spells occurring daily, normal life has become a

DEAR BRADER: Your array of complaints (and normal tests) do not suggest a ready diagnosis, although a malfunction of the autonomic nerve system (nerves not under your conscious con-

troi) is certainly a possibility.
In circumstances like this, in which physical disease seems remote, the prudent physician would consider a non-physical cause for your symptoms. For example, extreme stress could cause shortness of breath and hyperventilation that, in turn, leads to lightheadedness. weakness, tingling of your extremities, shakiness and nausea. In other words, the "spells" you describe could have an emotional basis.

To investigate this likelihood, you and your doctor will have to work fogether. First, meticulously analyze any factor that precedes your symptoms. For instance, do they occur in any identifiable pattern? Are they predictable? What can you do that makes them worse? Better? Do some symptoms follow others? Are the attacks always the same?

The answers to these and other questions will help you both to uncover the cause of your problem. If stress or emotional upset does seem to trigger your "spells," you and your doctor can decide how best to treat your symptoms; stresscounseling or anti-anxiety medicine (for short periods) may

return your life to normal.

In the event you are unable to establish a stress-related pattern, I suggest you request a referral to a diagnostic clinic in a teaching hospital, where ialists welcome unusual and

The declarer was Londoner Howard Cohen. Since he says he is well-known for finishing two down whenever he is doubled and redoubled, he didn't expect the opponents to run to a less expensive spot. Here five hearts would be down only one.

West led the club ace (the ace from A-K is standard in England) and, in answer to an encouraging nine from his partner, cashed the club king before TERPRISE ASSN.

switching to a heart.

Declarer now made his contract in comfort. He ruffed his one club and two heart losers in interest to lead a trump, even if the dummy, using diamond ruffs to get back to hand. Eventually West made the spade queen.


