Ordinance unanimously adopted

LAKE MARY - A measure that places tighter restrictions on adult entertainment establishments in Lake Mary was unanimously adopted by the city commission last night.

The new ordinance restricts massage pariors and adult bookstores and theaters to M2-A zoning. The measure also requires a distance of at least 1,500 feet between an adult entertainment establishment and any other such business, and the same distance from such an establishment and a church, liquor store, bar or school.

No adult entertainment establishments are now located in Lake Mary.

Allied air strikes continue in Iraq; Israel deliberates attack retaliation

IN SAUDI ARABIA - U.S. warplanes struck at Iraqi missile launchers today, acting in the stead of an Israeli government that was still considering vengeance for the attack that rained rockets on Tel Aviv and Haifa.

A meeting of top Israeli officials adjourned without a decision on how to proceed in response to the night attack. The Bush administration had assured Israel that it

could be relied upon to eliminate the threat - without an Israeli intervention that threatened to splinter the anti-Iraq alliance or widen the war.

As Operation Desert Storm thundered into its second full day today, waves of U.S. warplanes took to the skies

SANFORD — The Seminole County School Board took the first step toward implementing rezoning for students who will attend Heathrow Elementary School in Lake Mary and Partin Elementary School in Oviedo.

The new schools, currently under construction, are scheduled to open by November of 1991.

Some students who attend Idyllwilde Elementary School, 430 Vilhen Rd. in Sandord: Lake Mary Elementary School, 132 Long-wood-Lake Mary Rd. in Lake Mary: Wilson Elementary School, 985 Orange Blvd. in Sanford and Woodlands Elementary School. 1420 E.E. Williamson Rd. in Longwood will be affected by the rezon-

There is a possibility that some students who attend Goldsboro Elementary School, 1301 W. 20th St. in Sanford, will also face rezoning.

With a unanimous vote of approval from the school board at yesterday's meeting, a district-level task force composed of Dr. Marion Dailey, the assistant superintendent for instruction: Nancy McNamara and Ken Bovio, the area directors of elementary schools and Jim Talmadge, the director of management information services will form and meet to review all the possible areas to be effected by the new schools.

The Edulog computer program, put into place by the school district after the last rezoning project last year, will allow the staff to map where students live and where they should attend school.

Board and staff members emphasized that the Edulog system will be used in conjunction with parent and school input to make the best choices for all.

'We are going to rely heavily on the input of parents." Dailey said.

Jeanne Morris, a board member who served as a parent on the rezoning task force prior to her election, pointed out that last night's move was just the beginning of the process.

"We're just getting started and this is the time for parents to give us their input." she said. Dailey noted that five items weigh

most heavily on the decision of which students and which schools will be affected by the rezoning:

 The safety of the students. The growth history and poten-

tial for enrollment at each school. The minority ratio in enroll-

Residents who had come to the meeting to hear and speak about changes to the city comprehensive plan gathered around the television set in the rear of the city

commission chambers to hear news of an Iraqi attack on Israel.

The commission passed a resolution adopting Company B,
1st Brigade of the 187th Infantry, 101st Airborne Division. The
adoption, through America Supporting Americans, of
California, will mean city employees will send letters and gifts to troops in that company.

Lake Mary is the first city in Florida to participate in the

Area gasoline prices remain stable

LAKE MARY — Florida gasoline prices remained stable as suppliers and station owners watched unfolding events in the Mideast and fluctuating oil markets, said the American Automobile Association Clubs of Florida.

"There doesn't seem to be any reaction either at the wholesale or retail level as yet, and we haven't heard that there's going to be any presently," spokesman Bill Todd, whose group is checking prices on a daily basis, said Thursday. A spot check of prices in metropolitan areas showed the lowest overall prices in Miami, where regular unleaded sold for \$1.20 a gallon, and the highest in Tallahasace, where premium unleaded topped out at \$1.495 premium unleaded.

Security police head for war

EGLIN AIR FORCE BASE — An undisclosed number of Air Force security police left for the Persian Gulf, the first personnel deployed from this Florida Panhandie base since war began.

"The question of whether fighting will break out has been answered," said a technical sergeant identified only as Mark in an Air Force news release Thursday. "That has taken out the roller-coaster ride aspect of deploying."

The sergeant is leader of the squad that left aboard a C-130 aircraft Thursday.

The troops are from the \$201st Security Police Squadron. Other elements of the squadron have been in Saudi Arabia since August. Other support personnel and F-15 Eagle fighters and their crews also deployed from Eglin in the months preceding an allied attack on Iraq that began Wednesday.

Slaying investigation hampered

GAINESVILLE - The war in the Middle East has cut into the group of investigators trying to find the killer of five college students slain here last August.

One Florida Department of Law Enforcement agent assigned to the task force probing the killings has been reassigned to work on anti-terrorism efforts, Sgt. Dick Gerard, a task force spokesman, said Wednesday.

Gov. Lawton Chiles has put the FDLE on alert to watch for possible terrorist activity in the state.

Another task force detective, Sgt. Gary Garner, went to the Persian Gulf when his Oriando-based 443nd Army Reserve unit

was called up in December.

Marines arrested for opposing war

CAMP PENDLETON, Calif. — Beven Marines were arrested, handcuffed and taken to the brig for refusing to participate in training for Parsian Gulf duty, a lawyer says.

The group has been jailed at Camp Pendleton since Nov. 21, when the soldiers staged their rebellion during infantry school. Bill Smith, an attorney who represents one of the Marines, said

Jacksonville pilot first casualty

JACKSONVILLE - A Jacksonville father of two who taught Sunday school became the first American casualty of Operation Desert Storm when his fighter attack jet was shot down over Iraq during the first night of battle.

Lt. Cmdr. Michael Scott Speicher, a 33-year-old pilot from Cecil Field Naval Air Station serving on the Mayport-based USS Saratoga, was listed as missing in action Thursday night by Pentagon officials, who said his body had not been recovered. Speicher's FA-18 Hornet fighter attack jet took off from the carrier in the Red Sea

Wednesday night. He was in one of the two FA-18 squadrons from Cecil Field on the

A Pentagon official said Speicher's plane was destroyed by a surface-to-air missile

One military source said reports indicated the plane "exploded to bits" in the sky after being hit. "Evidently, pieces of the plane were strewn over the Iraqi landscape," the source said.

A Pentagon spokesman, Lt. Cmdr. Edward Lundquist, said no other information about the victim would be released, in accordance with standard Pentagon pro-cedures on military personnel who are missing in action.

Pete Williams, the chief spokesman for Defense Secretary Dick Cheney, said Thursday that the Navy pilot was the only known U.S. casualty so far in the gulf war.

Speicher, a Jacksonville native who graduated from Forrest High School in 1975, is married and has a 3-year-old daughter and a 1-year-old son, said a family friend who asked not to be identified. The friend was at the Speicher home Thursday night.

Thomas P. Mills, the Speichers' neighbor and godfather to their children, told the Florida Times-Union in Jacksonville that he hasn't given up hope that the pilot will be found alive.

Democrats, **GOP** praise **Bush, troops**

WASHINGTON — Democrata who voted last weekend against giving President Bush war-making authority are now jum-ping aboard a resolution praising him and U.S. military personnel in the Persian Gulf.

The Senate, which had voted only 52-47 in favor of an immediate Middle East campaign, passed the new resolution Thursday 98-0.

"The Congress commends and supports the efforts and the leadership of the president as commander in chief in the Persian Gulf hostilities," it said. "The Congress unequivocally

supports the men and women of our armed forces who are carrying out their missions with professional excellence, dedicated patriotism and exempla-

ry bravery," it said.

The House was scheduled to take up the mostly symbolic measure today, and it was expected to pass by an overwhelming margin. But it almost stalled Thursday because

of partisan bickering.
House Speaker Thomas S.
Foley, D-Wash:, and Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine, initially drafted a reso-lution praising the servicemen and women but steering clear of did not want to rekindle last week's painful debate over the

gulf policy. Republican leaders countered with a version specifically praising the president "for his decisive leadership" in the crisis. After a day of wrangling, the

two parties agreed on the version praising the president only in his role as commander in chief.

GENEVA — The body of a woman found Wednesday on Painted Post Point off of State Road 46 has not been identified.

George Proechel, the Public Information Officer for the Sem-inole County Sheriff's Office said this morning that they are look-ing to the public for help in finding out who she is.

"We don't have any idea who she is." Procchel said, "We are

hoping the public will help us in this case."

Found fully clothed and wrapped in a blanket near the side of the road, the woman had

Procchel described the woman as being in her mid-20s. She was five feet three inches tall and weighed 90 pounds.

She had shoulder length red hair and blue eyes.

She also had a tatoo of a four-lesf clover on her back right shoulder blade.


An autopsy performed yesterday revealed that the woman had died as a result of multiple stab wounds. It was estimated that she had been dead approximately 48 hours at the time she was found.


"It had not been there too long," Procchel mid.

Rewarding inefficiency

The U.S. Postal Rate Commission seems to think it has struck a blow for the American consumer. It has rejected a proposed 5-cent increase for first-class postage in favor of a 4-cent increase.

Meanwhile, however, rates under the commission's plan will increase by as much as 25 percent next month for certain types of postage. In addition to the 16 percent increase for first-class mail, express and priority mail will increase by 15 and 19 percent, respectively. Second-class items such as newspapers and magazines will increase the second-class items. increase by a whopping 22 percent. Third-class or bulk mail will increase by 25 percent.

These higher rates are expected to yield an additional \$6.2 billion a year for the U.S. Postal Service, giving the quasi-public monopoly a total budget of \$48 billion in fiscal 1992. Yet, for this generous 13 percent overall boost in revenues, American businesses and consumers cannot expect to see

any improvement in service.

Consumer advocate Ralph Nader put 'It succinctly — and accurately — when he charged recently that the Postal Service is "riddled with mismanagement, waste, poor service, poor customer relations, and does not

deserve an increase."

More important, the rate increase that is about to take effect provides no incentive for the postal service to become more productive and cost efficient. In fact, it does just the opposite.

The Postal Service needs to overhaul its wasteful operations before it receives any sizable rate increase. As it is, the agency's cost structure is way out of line. Of its \$30 billion annual operating budget, 83 percent is consumed by labor costs. By comparison, Federal Express and the United Parcel Service, the Postal Service's biggest competi-tors in express and priority mall, spend less than 40 percent of their budgets on labor.

To its credit, the Postal Service has taken To its credit, the Postal Service has taken significant steps to automate its operations and thereby hold down costs and deliver the mail more efficiently. It has earmarked \$5 billion for high-tech equipment that will sort mail through a nine-digit bar code similar to that used in grocery stores. Yet, even factoring in inflation, postal costs are rising rather declining, despite the automation programs.

The Postal Rate Commission has done American businesses and consumers a bad turn. By permitting the Postal Service to raise its prices by as much as five times the rate of inflation, it has ensured that the agency will continue to conduct business as usual.

Pork chop lite

If you're feeling guilty about the way you ate during the holidays, take heart — or maybe have a pork chop. When Americans began worrying about cholesterol and other fatty substances, pig farmers started worrying about it. Now, thanks to new breeding methods, pork is leaner than it used to be, just as they say in those TV commercials about "the other white meat."

Maybe not as lean as many health-conscious people would like, but according to a Department of Agriculture report cited by the Washington Post, the pork you bought in

the Washington Post, the pork you bought in the supermarket last year was, on average, 31 percent lower in fat had 17 percent fewer calories and 10 percent less cholesterol than in 1983. That hardly makes pork a tofu substitute, and of course the lard level depends on which cuts you buy. But it's an encouraging start, especially for pig farmers, who have reversed the downward trend in U.S. pork consumption and sliced away a good bit of beef's status as America's meat of choice.

Some scientists want to help farmers grow even bigger hogs with still less fat content by using an artificial growth hormone called porcine somatotropin, used so far only experimentally. But some of the same farmers who made made progress the natural way are reluctant to take the chemical route to a leaner product, in part out of a fear of the kind of resistance that has already been mounted against a similar laboratory hormone that causes cows to produce much

larger amounts of milk.
If this hurdle can be safely overcome, what next? Dare one hope that the cost-benefit ratio of pigging out on pork chops will shift just enough to allow conscientious Americans to skip those dutiful trips to the saled bar every now and then?

What's in this for the U.S.?

The ice blanketing the Midwest is flipping us over on our backs like bugs and has us crawling on our hands and knees just to get up our driveways. But while the ice has dominated a lot

I guess if I had to choose an emotional bottom line for the way I'm feeling, it would be an aching adness and inadequacy. Many of us have listened to and read a multitude of accounts of the crisis as it's progressed, and some of us consistently try—usually somewhere between the time we get off work and put the kids to bed—to stay abreast of what's happening throughout the world. Yet we've felt inadequately schooled on the nuances of this conflict, unable to decide on the best course of action and seised with sympathy and fear for Americans soldiers and their families.

A few lines up from the bottom line are several lines of confusion and unanswered questions—the most obvious being what exactly it is we're

trying to accomplish. If we're not just trying to protect our oil interests, then why haven't we had such violent reactions to similar but unoiled builles who invade their weaker neighbors?

If our aim is to stop Hussein's progress toward nuclear weapons, why can't we get a straight an-swer as to how close he is to his goal. instead of accounts that vary from a couple of years to over a decade?

If oil is Iraq's main source of income,

why can't we use our troops to enforce an embargo on their export of oil, instead of risking our soldiers' lives in combat? Would a long-term embargo be too costly in dollars and cheaper to pay for in dead soldiers?



Why can't we get a straight answer.

Next, why only our soldiers? Where are our so-called allies? Sure, some have sent troops to join the U.N. force, but the vast majority are Americans. Forgive me this perhaps juvenile departure from our mission to be all things to all people, but I'm beginning to feel a little like the Little Red Hen who's not going to feel too generous with her oil once this is all over.

And with our recent track record in Asian land wars, why are we preparing to fight another one against the sixth largest military force in the world, whose specialty just happens to be land

A few lines up from confusion is anger. We've got our mothers, fathers, uncles, brothers, sons, daughters, sisters and cousins over in the Persian Gulf protecting the interests of hosts who won't give them access to their religious symbols or let them have a beer after a hard day spent saving the hosts' heinies. We also had the commander of our land forces in Saudi Arabia telling us we were not going to be ready for war by Jan. 15, and the president telling us, "Don't believe those reports you've been reading." We're supposed to be able to make some sense out of this?

Columnist Donald Kaul probably summed up this line the best: "I can't rid myself of the feeling that we're being had."

I hope fate will prove him wrong.

Take closer look at dollar bill

Editor's note: In his new book, "The First Universal Nation: Leading Indicators and Ideas about the Surge of America in the 1880s," Sen Watenberg predicts that America is on the brink of its most promising decade. Watenberg, an expert on trends and demographics, is a nationally syndicated columnist for Newspaper Enterprise Association. Here is an excerpt from "The First Universal Nation" (which is published by The Free Press, a division of Macmillan):

Some months ago, I announced a contest in my newspaper column. The word "superpower," I noted, was outdated. It came from a time when there were two superpowers.

There is now only one.

I learned something from the responses. The finalists were: hyperpower, magnapower, maxipower, megapower, multipower, cannipower, semperpower, suprapower, ultrapower and unipower.

How interesting. The words had Latin or Greek prefixes, Indeed, when we think of "No. 1" our first thoughts go to Greece and Rome, powers that shook, and shook up, the world, Here we are, 2,000 year later, still speaking their language, which reflects their culture. That's power!

But does anyone recall the merchandles trade balance of the Holy Roman Empire? Would we judge the Romans by how many chariot wheels they exported?

Have we been guiled in the current "No. 1" debate? The terms have been set by the ABC Gang — the Apocalyptic Bean Counters. Who appointed accountants and economists to tell us about which are the great civilisations?

Is the prize of being No. 1 going to go the nation that sells the most semiconductors, or textiles? Or who owns Rockefeller Center? Be serious.

The winner of my contest was "omnipower."
Of course. "Omni," as in "universal."
Now, as it happens, America is doing fine economically. Some of our industries, like automobiles, have suffered. Others have boomed: aircraft, pharmaceuticals, biogenetics, computers, and telecommunications.

The market value of what Americans own overseas is still much greater than what foreigners own here. (And just why is it had news if the Japanese pour billions into America, to make American movies, with American talent, in American studios, to exhibit around the world, to the greater glory of America?)

Our standard of living, is the highest in the world. Our trade and budget deficits are coming down as a proportion of the Green

National Product.

America's share of the world economy is what it was prior to World War II. In the '80s. America's economic growth was more rapid than West Europe's. America's share of world manufacturing jobs has remained steady.

That's not enough. America is not just about properties.

Bad bolts plague defense hardware


WASHINGTON — Judging by the numbers of counterfeit bolts in the Pentagon's hardware inventory, the U.S. war machine is held together by no better than chicken wire and duct tape.

An internal Pentagon report reveals that cheap bolts made from weak metals have found their way into the military stockpiles in alarming numbers.

Many of the back-up machine screws used to fasten wing parts on the Navy's Corsair A-7 attack jets are fakes - substandard imi-tations of what the Pentagon thought it was buying. The same weak screws are used in the helicopters and

Tomahawk missiles:

Many of the spare
machine bolts for the M174 gun mount are also bogus, as are the bolts on the Lamps Mark III helicopters and the stude on the



Phantom F-4 jets.

We have been warning for years that foreign manufacturers were passing off weak bolts as the real thing. Congress passed a bill in its last session to stop the traffic. But the Pentagon is just now figuring out how many of those bolts it bought and used before the brass realized it was being fleeced.

The revelations about the spread of bogus bolts through the military appear in a Defense Department inspector general report obtained by our associate Jim Lynch.

Pentagon investigators estimate that 62 percent of the hardware in the military's 'ready-to-issue' inventory does not meet the required strength and size demands. The investigators took samples and then projected that at least \$624 million in hardware on hand does not meet safety standards. It it junk that could fail and kill American junk that could fail and kill American soldiers. In the past three years, about 100 firms have been prosecuted for seiling bogus fasteners and for falsifying tests. But industry sources say that it will take another year to feel the full enforcement effect of the new consumer protection law. Meanwhile, distributors are acrambling to dump their bogus bolts on the market. "It's dump time," warned Tommy Grant of Grant Fasteners Inc. in Houston. Grant is the leader of a pack of honest bolt makers who forced the issue onto Congress's front burner with the help of Reps. John Dingell, D-Mich., James Bilbray, D-Nev, and Helen Bentley, R-Md. Many U.S. manufacturers were run out of business by the cheaper foreign fasteners before buyers in America caught on to why the foreign products were cheaper.

The counterfeit glut affects more than just The counterfeit glut affects more than just the military. A recent General Accounting Office report determined that almost two-thirds of the nation's nuclear power plants bought fasteners that don't meet safety standards. Bogus fasteners have also surfaced at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, the Energy Department and other federal agencies.

Fraud is rampant because it is easy. The bad bolts can't be detected by the eye. Expensive metallurgical tests are needed, and the test results in some cases have been faked. The Defense inspector general recommends that the Pentagon implement a rigid testing policy, including testing the bolts it gets from reputable manufacturers.

The Pentagon's supply system is so disorganized that it has been known to throw out bad boits and then buy them back again. Last year a California firm was convicted of falsifying tests and selling bad boits to the government. The company had picked up many of the bolts at military surplus



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



Anglers who can combine crapple fishing skill with a little good fortune can take home a share of \$406,750 in prizes offered by national and local sponsors.

A big addition for 1991 is the introduction by the Johnson Fishing Company of another \$65,000 prize fish to share the lake with "Tangle Free Tom." Johnson's traditional "big dollar" Crapplethon fish.

"Tangle Free Tom" pays \$65,000 if caught on one of Johnson's "Crapple Buster Combo" rod and spincast reel. The same crapple pays \$40,000 if caught on a Johnson "Tangle Free 8" or "Tangle Free 10" spincast reel.

"Country Mile Cal" will be worth \$65,000 to anyone who catches him on one of Johnson's "Country Mile" open-faced apinning reels or \$40,000 if taken on a Johnson "Country Mile 6" or "Country Mile 10" spincast reel.

A total of 2.019 other crapple will carry prizes worth between \$40,000 to \$25 for some locally sponsored fish. Some payoffs will be in

In the St. John's tournament, prize fish are designated by weight. The first crappic caught weighing 2 pounds, 7 ounces or more is "Tangle Free Tom." The comes "Country Mile Cal" at 2 pounds, 7 ounces.

Other crappic of various weights will qualify for other prizes, including some big bonuses if caught using a specific product. "Crab Claw Clem," for example, is the first crapple weighed in at 2 pounds, 6 ounces. He's worth \$1,000 if the angler possesses a valid "Bounty Hunter" badge and \$40,000 if the badge holder has a Johnson Crab Claw anchor in the boat at the time of the catch.

The lightest fish worth money must weigh i pound, 8 ounces and will be worth \$25, paid by a local sponsor. All fish must be weighed alive at an official Crappiethon weigh in location.

The tournament runs until midnight, March 19. "Bounty Hunter" badges, the tickets required to enter the tournament, can be purchased for \$6 each at local participating stores, tackle shops and marinas. These establishments display the large red and white Crappiethon banners.

For more serious crappie fishermen, Crap-

piethon sponsors a one-day tournament for two-person boat teams. This tournament pays cash prizes according to the total weight of 20 capples caught during the hours specified for the tournament. NFL opts to go ahead with playoff schedule

TAMPA - War in the Persian Gulf means tightened security for the NFL playoffs, but the games will go on.

Commissioner Paul Tagliabue said Thursday that the league expects to play this weekend's NFC and AFC championship games as well as the Super Bowl in Tampa Stadium on Jan. 27 despite the outbreak of fighting in the Persian Gulf.

But he added that NFL officials will continue to monitor the crisis and re-evaluate their position if necessary.

"We recognize that the American people will not be paralyzed by the events in the Middle East or allow the fabric of daily life to be destroyed," Tagliabue said.

The commissioner said the NFL is "taking all necessary security measures for the upcoming games. Local, state and federal law enforcement agencies have been enlisted in the league's efforts to provide the highest level of public safety to those attending our games."

Security personnel stationed around the clock at Tampa Stadium have been searching vehicles entering the grounds this week. Fans attending the game will be required to show their tickets for admittance to parking lots as well as a secured area outside the stadium.

About 1,600 law enforcement officers from 16 agencies will be assigned to the game - reportedly twice as many as the Super Bowl normally requires.

'Security that comes with major events like the Super Bowl means taking prudent measures and sending a message out to terrorists," said Robert Smith, Tampa's director of public

"The wrong message is saying there will be no terrorist attack and that, 'We aren't doing anything.' It's always prudent to harden a target and close the

On Thursday, work crews were installing a concrete barricade around the 74,000-seat stadium to prevent any vehicle from smashing into the

structure. A 6-foot high, chain-link fence also is going up on a nearby road to keep everyone out except ticketholders on game day. Bottles, cans and umbrellas are normally prohibited from the stands, but other items are being

added to the list. 'We won't allow radios, TVs, cameras or video cameras that could possibly hold some kind of explosive. People will be checked before they're allowed in," said Mickey Farrell, assistant director of operations for Tampa Stadium.

Stadium officials are considering using metal detectors at the gates, but Farrell said no decision has been made yet.

Meanwhile, a terrorism expert told the Tampa Tribune that the Super Bowl would be an unlikely target for a strike.

Terrorists generally go for soft targets because they don't want to be embarrassed if they fail," said Bruce Hoffman of Rand Corp., a non-profit research group specializing in se-curity. "One hopes that all the measures taken for the Super Bowl will convince terrorists that it's too tough a nut to crack."

Security is being beefed up at Rich Stadium near Buffalo for Sunday's AFC championship game between the Bills and Los Angeles Raiders. But the measures are aimed more at rowdy Bills' fans than terrorists.



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
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

Guarding against vitamin overdoses

DEAR DR. GOTT: How soon after taking a fat-soluble vitamin can you take it again without damage of overload? I'm think-

ing of vitamin E in particular.

DEAR READER: The fatsoluble vitamins (A, D, E and K) are stored in substantial amounts in the body's tissues. In particular, vitamin A is stored in large quantities in the liver. When the liver is saturated with vitamin A, it would take a well-nourished adult 200 days to use up just half the reserve, if no more vitamin A were ingested. Vitamin D is also stored in the liver: the reserve would require several months to be used up. Vitamins E and K are stored in less substantial amounts. Once the storage potential has been exhausted, the excess fat-soluble vitamins spill into the bloodstream and may poison tissues. Therefore, experts re-commend that people avoid taking these vitamins in quantitles exceeding the Recommended Daily Allowances.

Unlike vitamins A. D and K. excess vitamin E seems to cause little or no tissue toxicity. How-ever, patients who take high-dose vitamin E (well above the RDA of 10 international units) may experience an array of symptoms, including nausea, diarrhea, rapid pulse, blurred vision, lowered resistance to infection, rash, weakness and fatigue.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've heard that a dry mouth could be an indication of a disorder within the body. At 69, I now have the condition and wake up several times a week with a mouth that can best be described as being as dry as sand. Is this a warning of some unknown problem?
DEAR READER: Xerostomia

(dry mouth) is caused by a reduction in the amount of saliva. It is a symptom of several diseases, including diabetes. mouth infection, stones in the salivary ducts and Sjogren's syndrome (an unusual condition of self-allergy associated with

Many drugs, such as antihistamines, cause xerostomia as a side effect.

People who mouth-breathe at night (because of allergies, sinus congestion or other mechanical problems in the throat) often awaken with dry mouths awaken with dry mouths because the moisture is



Four killed in plane explosion

LANTANA — A twin-engine plane crashed and burst into flames after an apparent aborted landing at Lantana Airport. killing the pilot and three passengers after horrified witnesses heard their screams for help.

Witnesses said the 1981 Beechcraft Baron was trying to land at the Lantana airport at about 3:37 p.m. Thursday when it suddenly pulled up and veered into the wooded area, according to Palm Beach County Sheriff's Det. Bill Williams.

Nearly two dozen people went to aid those in the crash but were forced to look on helplessly as flames engulfed the wreckage. Some recalled the horror of hearing screams from those trapped inside the wreckage as it burned.

Bodies of the two men and two women on board were finally pulled from the wreckage at 8 p.m. and were turned over to the county medical examiner, Williams said.

Federal Aviation Administration officials said they had tentatively identified two of the four victims, but would not release any names until the badly burned bodies are identified through dental records.

Blimp crashes; TV Marti antenna sought

EVERGLADES NATIONAL PARK — A recovery crew planned to return to a remote mangrove swamp by helicopter today to examine a downed blimp and its valuable cargo — the TV Marti entenna.

The station was knocked off the air when the Air Force blimp carrying the antenna broke free from its tether Wednesday in the Florida Keys and salled 70 miles to its resting place two miles inshore from the Gulf of Mexico.

A replacement blimp can be launched, but the condition of the one-of-a-kind antenna unit causes the greatest concern.

Chiles authorizes more prisoner releases

TALLAHASSEE - Gov. Lawton Chiles has authorised state prison officials to release 1,052 inmates as required by a court because the state prison system reached its court-ordered

capacity.

Chiles issued the order Thursday when the inmate population reached 98 percent of capacity, or 44.537 inmates. The order shaves 30 days from most inmates sentences automatically, resulting in some releases.

"This automatic release of these inmates is deplorable, but I hereby comply with this law and the federal court mandates regarding prison capacity." Chiles said in a letter to Corrections Secretary Richard Dugger.

Prune juice firm softens claim

LAKELAND — The nation's largest distributor of pruns juice agreed to voluntarily stop advertising that its product is

healthier than three other fruit juices.

Sunsweet Growers Inc. of Piessanton, Calif., agreed to the change after the Florida Department of Citrus complained to the National Advertising Division of the Council of Better Business Bureaus, officials said.

The disputed television spots say Sunsweet Prune Juice "has more of the seven important vitamins and minerals than orange, tomato or grapefruit juices."

The citrus commission, however, put its legal staff on the offensive last year. They say the Sunsweet label lists only two nutrients - potassium and vitamin C in amounts that could contribute to a day's diet.

Reputed mob figure jelled

FORT LAUDERDALE — Police have arrested a reputed organized crime figure they say controls much of the storefront prostitution in Broward County.

Geraldo "Gerry" Chilli, 56, identified by police as a capo, or mid-level boss, in the New York-based Bonanno organised crime family, was arrested in Hollywood Wednesday after a 19-month investigation. He was being held in lieu of \$2 million

Citrus growers fear souring canker costs

LAKELAND — The state has set aside \$30 million to pay off citrus canker claims, but growers fear another \$34 million

could be needed to settle the disputes The ill-fated canker eradication program burned about 20 million trees, mostly nursery seedlings, in 1964, but scientists determined most cases actually were a harmless loaf-spotting ailment rather than the virulent canker confirmed in just a few

"We don't even know what the tab is going to be," Jim Russakis, a member of the Florida Citrus Commission and Fort Pierce grower, said Wednesday at a commission meeting. 'will have to pick up the tab."



New AIDS advisory from medical groups

ATLANTA — The American Medical Association and the American Dental Association urged AIDS-infected members to warn patients or stop doing surgery after a federal report indicated a dentiet passed the deadly virus to three patients.

The groups announced the new policies Thursday after the Atlanta-based Centers for Disease Control released its lettest

report on Dr. David Acer of Stuart. Fig., who died of acquired

immune deficiency sydrome in September.

Dr. Harold Jaffe, deputy director for science at the CDC's AIDS division, said Acer likely infected three patients through "direct blood to blood contact." perhaps from a cut to the dentiet during oral surgery.

All three patients had teeth pulled by the dentist, the CDC said.

The American Dental Association, whose officials were publicly skeptical of of preliminary CDC report on the case last August, announced a new policy, telling AIDS-carrying dentists to warn their patients or stop performing de

The American Medical Association went a step farther, saying doctors who perform surgery or other invasive procedures that carry a risk of acquiring HIV infection "should determine their HIV status."

The AMA said those who test positive for the disease "have an ethical obligation not to engage in any professional activity which has an identifiable risk of transmission of the infection to the patient."

Messels vaccination rate dropping

ATLANTA — As few as 50 percent of the preschoolers in some urban schools are vaccinated against messles, which is rising among inner-city children, the federal Centers for Discuss Control said.

The CDC released a survey of vaccination rates in eight big cities Thursday, amid what it termed "dramatic" increases of measles in inner-city preschoolers in 1990 and 1990.

The CDC said the study, conducted by tracing the medical histories of first- and fifth-graders, found that in inner-city schools in the same cities, "measles vaccination levels among ... students at black, Hispanic and mixed schools were

Chiles favors more money for city use

TALLAHASSEE - Gov. Lawton Chiles told city officials from around Florida that he would propose "a menu of revenue sources" for them and other local governments to state lawmakers.

The new governor did not specify what he had in mind when he spoke briefly to the Florida League of Cities Thursday, and he later told reporters his staff was still working on the details of what changes his office would advocate.

But Chiles told the city officials he wanted to "untie the hands of local government by allowing you all the flexibility that you need to get your jobs

Over the next decade, managing growth and paying for things like pridges and roads will be the biggest job facing local governments, he said.

"We want state government to step out of the way to let you determine how you will pay for the capital improvements that you need to support and manage your growth," Chiles said.

To that end, he plans to "go to the Legislature and ask for reform of the laws that currently restrict the ways in which cities can raise revenues.

Although the changes would let cities make more of the decisions about local taxes, local officials would also have to bear more of the responsibility for those taxes, Chiles cautioned.

Almost 40 percent of the money Florida's nearly 400 cities raised last year came from user fees for permits or licenses.

Nearly 14 percent came from state and federal grants, and 6 percent came from both utility taxes and investments. Counties and cities also get about half a penny of every 6 cents of sales tax Florida collects.

Just over 16 percent of the

money raised by cities comes from property tax.

The Florida Constitution caps

property taxes at 10 mills, meaning that the state's cities, 67 counties, 67 school districts and hundreds of local taxing districts, like hospitals, porta and lighting districts, can collect no snow than \$10 for every \$1,000 worth of property.

Beyond that limit, statutes add additional restrictions in some a. For instance, the level of taxation for school districts is set by lawmakers each year as they work out the state's school funding formula. And the special taxing districts usually have relatively low caps.

Investigators hope to solve "quite a few" cases in several states as a result of Wuornos' arrest. Binegar said. He would not identify the states involved.

"We want to clear up as many homicides as possible, ... We believe she pretty much meets the guidelines of a serial killer." he said.

Wuornos and a companion had been the subjects of a nationwide manhunt since November, when composite drawings were distributed and police publicly called for help in he series of mysterious

The companion implicated Ma. Wunrnos as the sole killer, officials said.

The victims' bodies were sensity found along rural roadways, some stripped nude.
