



The reporter who manages by trick or pull to extract that answer from the Chief Executive is likely to go down in the history as

The Herald has maintained for some time, 'without knowing anything about it, that Mr. Roosevelt would not seek a third term. We know this is in conflict with most of the expert opinion now being voiced throughout the country which seems to agree he is quietly laying his plans to capture the nomination and win re-election. We have always felt that regardless of how much pressure might be brought to bear on him to run again by present job holders. Bir. Roosevell's natural inclination to return to his Hyde Park estate would assert Haelf. However this may be, we don't think he ought to run again whether he wants to or not. Mr. Roosevelt has been elected twice to the highest office in the land and by the time his present term expires he will have held the Presi-dency for practically eight years. That if seems to us, is long enough for any man to be President, no matter how capable and well meaning he may be. If it was long enough for Washington, Jefferson, Jackson, Wilson, it should be long enough for Mr. Roosevelt's re-election that this is an emergency and that emergencies require unprecedented measures. It was an emergency, as we recall it, that resulted in Mr. Roosevelt's election in 1932. That was eight years ago. There has been an emergency almost continually ever since then. There were emergencies on hand every time "emergency cases to be an emergency and becomes a normal state of alfairs. It seems to us that the greatest emergency which ex-ists in the world today is the tendency of various nations to abandon the democratic form of government and be-come to fullural nets, or one-man shows. There is to be sure, a war, or a series of wars, going on abroad, hut every, one of them resulted, from the assumption of too

sure, a war, or a series of wars, going on abroad, but every one of them resulted from the assumption of too much power by a single man, the loss of power by the peo-ple, and the tendency of dictators to spread their dictatorships over neighboring democracies.

The most constructive demonstration of the democratic system which President Roosevelt could give the world today would be to publicly renounce any personal am-bition, for the perpetuation of his power. He could go further than that and simply refuse to run. He could show that in America a man can rise to the peak of political power and then just as cheerfully step down and become a private citizen giving someone else a chance to run the show. That is something which would be utterly inconceivable to men like Hitler, Stalin or Mussolini. Furthermore, if President Roosevelt seeks a third term.

he will be leading the Democratic party to almost certain defeat. The Republicans have considerable ammunition which they are able to use in this campaign under any cir-cumstances. They should not be supplied free of charge with the most formidable shells, the "third term" issue. If they are, they can be depended upon to make the most of the dictatorship charge....
